With the formation of the Victorian Women's Lacrosse Association in Melbourne in 1936 Australia's Women's Lacrosse history began. By 1938 we had affiliated with the All England Women's Lacrosse Association, and in 1940 were seeking affiliation with the United States Women's Lacrosse Association.

The second World War forced sport aside and it wasn't until 1961 that moves were made simultaneously in both Victoria and South Australia to revive Women's Lacrosse. The following year the Australian Women's Lacrosse Council was formed. Western Australia joined the Council in 1965, to be followed thirteen years later by Tasmania.

National senior and junior championships are held every year, while an under 19 event is held every two years.

Australia is looking forward to defending the World Cup in Perth and anticipate spirited competition during the week. On behalf of the Council I would like to pass my congratulations to the Australian team members and recognize the dedication and hard work they have put into training in the past few months. The other two key people in this event who deserve the recognition and thanks are our Australian Coach Noel Smith and Manageress June Clerk, Both Noel and June and the team members have lived and breathed lacrosse for the past few months and we in Australia hope they will be rewarded for their efforts.

Regardless of its specific nature, Lacrosse was characterized by a deeply spiritual involvement and those who took part did so with dedicated spirit and with the highest ideals of bringing glory and honour to themselves and the tribes to which they belonged. This is a somewhat universal sporting truth which centuries later dominated the thinking of one Pierre de Coubertin.

It was in the early 1800's that the Montreal townspeople became interested in this activity of the Mohawk tribes. In the 1840's the first games of Lacrosse were played between the townsfolk and the Natives. The action and skill of the game soon won the hearts of the locals and, though it was many years before any significant wins were logged against the Natives, the game of Lacrosse was quickly winning the loyalty and interest of the newest North Americans.

By the late 1850's and early 1860's non-Native Lacrosse clubs were being formed. In the 60's the game was given more structure and stability by the European settlers, and the transition was led by Montreal's Dr. George W. Beers. In 1867 Dr. Beers set out to create a national body to govern the sport throughout the newly formed country. This became North America's first national sport governing body, dedicated to the standardization of rules and competition, and the running of national championships to promote good fellowship and unity across the country.

Lacrosse reached its height of popularity in the early 1900's. The Olympics of 1904 and 1908 saw Lacrosse chosen as part of the program, due to its popularity in Canada, the United States and Great Britain. The sport, so much a part of the community life, provided one of Canada's gold medals in 1904 in St. Louis, Mo. — the first Olympics to which Canada sent an official delegation.

The Olympic program of those early years was determined a great deal by the host country. Therefore when the venues shifted to European sites, Lacrosse, not popular on the continent, was dropped from the program of competition. Though its career in the Olympics was short lived, Lacrosse still remains the only team sport in which Canada has won more gold medals than the rest of the world combined.

Although men's box lacrosse has retained the most popularity in Canada over the last few decades, in 1979 the first women's teams were formed in Toronto and Vancouver. In 1982, Canada sent a women's team to the first World Cup in Nottingham, England and was proud to finish third in the tournament. In 1983, the Women's Program of the Canadian Lacrosse Association was formed with the participating provinces of Ontario, British Columbia and Quebec. In the following three years. Manitcha Sackarchauser. Alberto and Nordow Alberto. three years, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and Newfoundland founded associations.

Since this time, the National Team has toured Scotland and Wales (1984), the USA (1985), hosted the Celtic Team (1988) and will host the USA in 1990. The team participated in the second World Cup in Philadelphia, PA in 1986, and are happy to be in Perth for the third World Cup of Women's Lacrosse.

We applaud the outstanding job the World Cup Organizers have done and we look forward to an excellent tournament and an enjoyable stay "Down Under".

LACROSSE IN ENGLAND

The Lacrosse Association in England was founded in 1912, but long before that — in 1876 — lacrosse had been demonstrated in front of Queen Victoria by a visiting party of Canadian and Iroquois Indians:

There are now nearly 900 Individual Members, 119 Schools, and 70 Clubs and Colleges affiliated to the AEWLA

There are now nearly 900 Individual Members, 119 Schools, and 70 Clubs and Colleges affiliated to the AEWLA. In 1986 a new 3 year Development Programme funded by the Sports Council and the National Westminster Bank, was begun under the direction of Janet O'Neill as the National Development Officer. This has been successful in giving lacrosse a much higher media profile and in 1987, as part of the AEWLA 75th Anniversary Celebrations, the mini-game of pop-lacrosse was officially launched at the London Youth Games. Since then hundreds of players of both sexes and all ages, including mentally and physically handicapped groups, have been introduced to pop-lacrosse. As the result of the success of this programme the Sports Council and NatWest are to continue funding the next phase of the Development Programme through a network of Regional Development Officers. The main priority is to encourage the progress of players from pop-lacrosse through to field lacrosse. There is concern that as Physical Education Colleges take in fewer lacrosse players, and some drop it from their curriculum altogether, the number of field lacrosse players and coaches will begin to fall unless action is taken. The AEWLA of the men's association, the ELU, have co-operated in the formation of the British Lacrosse Coaching Foundation to administer a new joint coaching award scheme. This will replace the separate award structures which previously existed in the men's and women's game and will train coaches at all levels.

International play began in 1912/13 with England playing Scotland and Wales and these matches continue every season for the Brailsford Trophy. In 1934 the first English team played and coached in the USA, and in 1935 the first US touring team came to Britain. In 1969 the combined teams of England and the USA came to Australia to coach and play, and in 1972 we welcomed the first Australian touring team to England. 1972 also saw the founding of the International Federation of Women's Lacrosse Associations, the brainchild of one of the English game's most esteemed players, Maggie Boyd, who became its first President.

10 years later in 1982 the first World Cup was held at Trent Bridge Cricket Ground in Nottingham. Since the 2nd World Cup in Philadelphia in 1986, England have played and beaten 4 of the other competing nations including a 30 series win over the USA and a drawn 3 match

We look forward to the challenge of the 3rd World Cup in Perth, and we wish the exciting first-ever World Developmental Tour which follows every success.



LACROSSE IN SCOTLAND

Lacrosse was played in Scotland by girls at St. Leonards School, St. Andrews as early as March 1890.

The first Headmistress, Dame Louisa Lumsden, on a visit to the White Mountains, N.H. in 1884 watched the Canqhawaya Indians play against the Montreal Club. She felt the game would be suitable for girls and was instrumental in introducing lacrosse at St. Leonards.

St. Leonards contributed greatly to the development of lacrosse in other schools, in other areas of Britain and in the U.S.A. In an article in the 'Baltimore Sun' dated 1955, Rosabelle Sinclair, a St Leonards Senior (Old Girl) is attributed as having introduced lacrosse to Bryn Mawr School in Baltimore in 1926. Her pupils took the game into the Colleges in the East and the game spread quickly as a result.

St. Leonards has had a considerable and valuable association with lacrosse and has essentially been a parent of the Women's game in both Scotland, other parts of Britain and America.

In more recent times Scotland has continued to do well in International matches. They were fourth in the Brine 1982 World Lacrosse Tournament, third in the second World Cup in America in 1986 and are looking forward, with almost a century of Lacrosse behind them, of doing well in the coming World Cup in Australia.



Development of Lacrosse in Wales

Lacrosse was played in Wales in the late 1920s by ten schools and a few clubs and colleges. After the Second World War the number of schools playing the game declined.

It is the advent of 'Pop' lacrosse, play days, more tournaments, T.V. coverage, travel to other countries for national, club and school teams that have combined to increase the interest in Wales. Increasing numbers of players are attending trials for the national teams, junior schools are wanting to try 'Pop' lacrosse, comprehensive schools are trying field lacrosse at play days and consequently including the games in their school programmes, universities are beginning again to field teams.

All this is good news for Welsh Lacrosse and some exciting things are happening. We have some 19 schools up and down the country wanting to play 'Pop' or field lacrosse and recently we have taken the 'Pop' game into a school for the disabled where a wheel-chair version is being pioneered. Mixed lacrosse is being played at all levels and is proving very popular.

FOR THE UNINITIATED...

Women's lacrosse is thought to have begun in the 1880's, in an English preparatory school, playing the same rules as applied to the men's game at that time.

A team consists of twelve players on the field and four substitutes. There may be a maximum of four substitutions in each half, and four at the half time break, for each team.

Reading from the goal, the players are traditionally known as:

Goalkeeper, Point, Cover Point, Third Man, Right Defence, Left Defence, Centre, Right Attack, Left Attack, Third Home, Second Home and First Home.


Players are free to move where they wish on the field except:

- on an umpire's whistle for an infringement, injury, substitution etc., when they must "stand" until "Play" is called:
- in or over the goal circle with any part of the body or crosse.

The play behind goal is a feature of lacrosse and reminds us that the original game, played by Indian people of the North American continent, used a single pole as the target.

There should be no body contact, and the umpire will penalize crosse checking or shooting at goal which might endanger a player. Nor may a defensive team adopt a loose man defence in front of goal because of the danger to that unprotected player facing a shot on goal.

The sports fan may see similarities in positioning, attack, defence, tactics and general field play, to that of other running games like soccer, field hockey, basketball and so on, but none can match the end speed of lacrosse.



HISTORY OF THE WORLD CUP

The International Federation of Women's Lacrosse Associations was founded in 1972 by Miss Margaret Boyd OBE (England) who became its first President. Since then all international tours and World Cups have been played to IFWLA rules.

The inaugural World Cup was held in England in 1982 on the hallowed ground of Trent Bridge. All member countries of the IFWLA competed, i.e. Australia, Canada, England, Scotland, U.S.A. and Wales, in a round-robin tournament conducted over a six day period. The final day saw play-offs for all positions... Canada took bronze, Australia silver and the U.S.A. gold.

Members of the IFWLA were given the opportunity to act as World Cup hosts, and in 1986 U.S.A. took up the challenge. The 2nd World Cup was conducted in Philadelphia, amidst the beautiful setting of Swarthmore College. Another week of exciting matches in glorious sunshine saw Scotland take home bronze, and a repeat of the 1982 final, with Australia reversing their defeat just 4 years earlier.

Australia was afforded the privilege of hosting the 3rd World Cup, and decided to break with tradition, and have only 3 years between events. The reason for this was that with the Commonwealth games being held in 1990, it was considered that sports funding might be at a premium in that year.

Perth is to be host city to the 1989 World Cup, and for the first time in the history of lacrosse Japan will be present as Observers, having become the 7th member nation to be affiliated with the IFWLA.

In 1993 lacrosse followers throughout the world will gather in Edinburgh, Scotland for the 4th World Cup.

Edinburgh and Scotland have a great deal to offer at this time of the year, and so we look forward to welcoming not only the teams, but, hopefully many supporters as well.






GREETINGS FROM JAPAN


