President's Welcome

As President of the Australian Lacrosse Council I take the opportunity to welcome to this Carnival our guests of honor from the United States of America and past and present players from all parts of the Commonwealth of Australia. Here, former players will meet old friends of other days, and will find that the same spirit of friendship exists amongst our present players.

The Carnival of 1959, which marks the first visit to Australia of an American Lacrosse team, will conclude with an Australia vs. America "Test Match" on the Melbourne Cricket Ground on Saturday, 8th August. It is fitting that this ground, which was the Main Stadium for the 1956 Olympic Games and also the scene of several epic Lacrosse matches against the Canadians in 1907, should again be the scene of an international contest.

The American visit is due in great measure to the enthusiasm of Mr. Gene Corrigan, of the University of Virginia, who, after receiving reports of Australian Lacrosse from members of the U.S.A. Olympic Field Hockey Team of 1956, contacted the controlling bodies of Lacrosse in this country early in 1957. Since then he has worked unceasingly towards the fulfilment of his idea, and we sincerely regret

that, at virtually the last moment, he was prevented from making the trip himself.

In paying their own fares to Australia, the American teams from the Universities of Virginia and Washington and Lee have shown the true amateur spirit. I am sure that their sportsmanship, ability on the field, and general friendliness will make a lasting impression on us, helping to cement those ties of friendship and understanding which already exist between our two countries.

During their tour of Australia, the Americans are being billeted by Australian players and supporters, and to these hosts and hostesses we are indeed grateful.

The South Australian, Western Australian and Victorian teams, with their supporters and past players, are welcomed as old friends. I trust they will have a stimulating series of matches and will return to their homes with happy memories of new friendships made and old friendships renewed, looking forward to the time when an Australian Lacrosse team will visit America.

With your support in the matches and in the functions arranged for entertainment, I have no doubt that this Carnival will be a truly memorable occasion and a milestone in the history of Australian Lacrosse.

The formation of the Australian Lacrosse Council was accomplished only after many years of negotiation between the various Lacrosse bodies. So long ago as 1907, when the Canadian visit was first mooted, the absence of a controlling body was severely felt. Much of the unpleasantness of the Canadian tour was due to the variations in the playing rules of the two Dominions, of which the Australian authorities had been advised, but through the absence of a Council, nothing was done to iron out these difficulties in advance.

The Associations were fully conscious of this weakness in the Australian set-up, and as a result, at an Inter-State Conference of delegates held in Adelaide in 1910, during the first Australian Lacrosse Carnival, an Australian Lacrosse Union was agreed to. However, a majority of the States failed to ratify the proposal, and the Union was stillborn.

At the Melbourne Carnival of 1912, the project was again revived, but the 1914-1918 war intervened, and the idea was not revived again for many years.

At the Adelaide Conference of 1926, the formation of a Council was agreed to and a Committee, comprising Messrs.

H. R. Balmer, the late J. W. Schafe and the late Captain J. H. Fearon, was appointed to draw up a draft constitution. This constitution was submitted to a Conference held in Perth in 1929, and, with a few amendments, was agreed to and forwarded to the State Associations for confirmation.

Western Australia, Victoria and Queensland subsequently ratified the constitution at a meeting held in Melbourne on June 8th, 1931. New South Wales was admitted in 1932, and in the following year South Australia joined. Thus the Council became truly representative of Australian Lacrosse.

No history of the Australian Lacrosse Council would be complete without reference to the late Mr. I. J. Taylor, Honorary Secretary of the A.L.C. from 1934 until his death in 1958. During his 25 years in office, "Ike" Taylor, as he was affectionately known throughout the length and breadth of Australia, devoted an untold amount of time and energy to the furtherance of Lacrosse in this country, and the enduring strength and unity of the Council over the last quarter of a century is a fitting monument to his untiring efforts.

History of the Garland-McHarg Cup

After the visit of the Canadian Lacrosse team in 1907, the Cup was presented to the Victorian Lacrosse Association for competition between the States, the donors being Mr. Garland, a Canadian, and Mr. Andrew McHarg, of Melbourne. The Carnival matches were then originated and now take place every third year, each competing State taking its turn in organising the series. The Cup, which is valued at approximately £200, is at present held by Victoria. The Cup has been competed for fourteen times; Victoria having won ten times, South Australia three times, and Western Australia once.

(The Cup is on view at the Melbourne Sports Depot, Elizabeth Street, Melbourne.)

Carnival Rules

The Carnival shall be played under the following rules:—

1. The team of each State or Territory shall play one match against the team of each other State or Territory.
2. For a win, two points shall be scored; for a draw, one point.
3. In the event of a match being abandoned, two points shall be awarded to each of the teams drawn for such match.
4. In the event of a walkover, two points shall be scored by the team receiving the walkover.
5. The State or Territory whose team obtains the highest number of points shall be declared Champion State of Australia.
6. In the event of two or more teams scoring an equal number of points their relative positions shall be determined on the percentage of goals thrown for and against during the Carnival matches, such percentage to be ascertained by dividing the total number of goals thrown by a team by the total number of goals thrown against such team. The State whose team has the highest percentage shall be declared the Champion State of Australia.

HISTORY OF LACROSSE

Lacrosse, first played by the North American Indians, is said to be the oldest organised sport of America. The name was given to the old Indian game of "baggetaway" by the French settlers of Canada because the implement used, the curved netted stick, resembles a bishop's crozier.

Before Columbus landed at San Salvador in 1492, Lacrosse, being of Iroquois origin, was played by the tribes of the Six Nations throughout what is now New York State and lower Ontario. The Iroquois Confederation adopted the sport as a training measure for war at one time in its history because of the fierceness of the game. It was extremely brutal when played by the Indians, mostly for a pastime. However, the sport was modified by the French in 1740 and the English in 1847, but it is still a rough and tough game and is considered by many to be the fastest game played on two feet.

According to history, the first Lacrosse club is thought to have been formed in 1840 at Montreal, Canada. In 1867, when Canada became a dominion, the National Lacrosse Association of Canada was organised — the result of which has much to do with making Lacrosse the national summer sport of Canada. This honor it still holds. Some of the early Canadian teams were the Montrealers and the Nationals of Montreal, and the Cornwalls of Cornwall, Canada. Lacrosse is becoming more and more popular in Canada — games drawing immense crowds of spectators with competition extremely sharp.

A Canadian introduced the sport in England during the middle 1880's and gradually clubs were organised. At the present time, England has two Lacrosse associations — the North of England Lacrosse Association, and the South of England Lacrosse Association.

In the past, many international matches were held between England and Canada, and between England and the United States — the All-America team travelling to England in 1937.

About the same time it was introduced in England, Lacrosse took a foothold in the United States — especially around New York and Boston. Some of the earliest clubs formed were the Baltimore Athletic Club and the Mount Washington Club of Baltimore, and the Crescent Club and the Ravenswood Lacrosse Club of New York. Several of these clubs are still in existence and are due for a comeback now that war restrictions and upsets are over.

In addition to club competition, lacrosse has flourished over a period of fifty years in inter-collegiate competition. Several intercollegiate Lacrosse leagues and associations were formed, which later developed into the United States Inter-collegiate Lacrosse Association organised in 1926. Yale, Harvard and Princeton introduced some of the earliest championship teams around the year 1880, and since then many colleges have taken part in intercollegiate matches, including our present visitors, Virginia and Washington-Lee.

History of Lacrosse in Victoria

Melbourne has the honor of being the birthplace of Australian Lacrosse.

In 1874 there arrived in this city Mr. L. L. Mount, a Canadian, who was an enthusiastic Lacrosse player, and he had brought with him a number of Lacrosse sticks in the hope of introducing his beloved game into the land of his adoption.

Very soon a number of youths became interested in the game, and, under Mr. Mount's instructions, practice games between "The Reds" and "The Blues" became a weekly affair. Eventually clubs were formed, Melbourne, South Melbourne and Carlton being the first.

Mr. George Beech, who has been acclaimed the father of Lacrosse in Australia, was the first Australian player. He gave long and valuable service to the game, including a period as Secretary of the Association.

Among the pioneers of the game were Mr. Joel Fox, who was President of the Association for many years, E. Phillips Fox, the artist, and Mr. Philip Shappere, who also filled the presidential chair.

The Victorian Lacrosse Association was founded in 1879 and, two years later, the "Herald" was able to report on

the 29th of June, 1881: "Lacrosse, the great national game of Canada, is promising to become a favourite pastime for Victorians. There are now six clubs and more than 200 members." From that date the game continued to prosper, until the advent of the war of 1939, when there were approximately 80 teams and 1300 players.

Like other amateur games, Lacrosse suffered a setback by the war from which it has not yet fully recovered. Another post-war factor which has retarded the game is the acute shortage of sticks owing to the dollar position.

Among the many officers who have served the Association throughout the years, mention must be made of Mr. Howard R. Balmer. Mr. Balmer was Honorary Secretary of the Association for many years, and later President, and it was during his term of office, in the nineteen-twenties, that the Association made its greatest advancement.

The Australian Lacrosse Carnivals were inaugurated in 1910, and since that date fourteen carnivals have been played, of which Victoria has won ten and has been runner-up in four; truly a remarkable record!

Next to Carnival games, the annual match between Victoria and South Australia, in recent years for the "Bob Symonds" Cup, creates most interest.

HOW TO FOLLOW THE GAME

For the benefit of spectators who may not be conversant with the game of Lacrosse, the following comments on the game and rules may be of assistance.

PLAYERS

Twelve players comprise a team, with two reserves who are permitted to take the field to replace injured players.

The twelve positions on the field are as follows:—

Three forwards — First Home (closest to goal), Second Home and Third Home.

Two Wing Attacks — Right and Left.

Centre.

Two Wing Defences — Right and Left.

Three Backmen — Third Man, Cover Point, Point (closest to goal).

Goalkeeper.

FIELD

The field is a rectangle, 130 yards by 80 yards, with the goals set 20 yards inside the boundary at either end. Unrestricted play is permitted behind the goals.

The centre is a circle 10 yards in diameter. No player other than the two centremen is allowed to enter this area or touch the ball until the ball has been played clear.

The face of the goal net is six feet square, with a "crease" 18 feet by 12 feet marked around it.

THE GAME

The ball is of solid rubber, about the size of a tennis ball and the weight of a cricket ball.

The game is divided into four quarters, the first two of 25 minutes, the second two of 20 minutes each, with intervals of 10 minutes between second and third quarters, and five minutes between third and fourth quarters.

At the commencement of each quarter and after a goal has been scored, play is recommenced by the ball being "faced-off" in the centre. The ball is placed on the ground between the racquets of the two centremen and on the Referee's signal each centremen attempts to draw the ball out to a position where he or one of his team-mates can obtain possession.

Most of the play is centred around the goals, with the attacks and centre feeding the ball to the forwards, who attempt to obtain possession of the ball in a position from which they may score by throwing the ball into the goal, while the opposing defence men endeavour to prevent the forwards obtaining possession or, where the forward has obtained possession, prevent him from moving into a scoring position.

It is during these manoeuvres that the finer points of Lacrosse tactics and finesse are demonstrated. Fast and accurate passing, usually to a fast-moving team-mate, swift dodging, turning, feinting and baulking, are the repertoire of a good forward, while the defenders specialise in checking, either with the body or racquet, forcing the forward out of position and intercepting passes between forwards. One of the most spectacular sights in sport must surely be an intercepting or clearing dash by a backman as he gathers up the ball and on the run delivers it on the full neatly into the racquet of a forward 60 or 70 yards away. The goalkeeper's task is, of course, to prevent the ball from

entering his goal either by stopping it with his racquet or body.

When the ball goes "out of bounds," the Referee may bounce the ball between the nearest two opposing players or award a free throw to the player nearest the ball.

When the Referee signals a "foul" or "out of bounds," every player on the field must "freeze" in the position he then occupies until the Referee signals "play." A goalkeeper has the option of resuming his place in goals provided a "foul" has not been called against him or his side.

The Referee, at his discretion, need not suspend play when the player who has been fouled, or his side, retains possession of the ball.

FOULS

The following are classed as "fouls":—

Touching the ball with the hand, save by the goalkeeper, who may do so while defending his goal within the goal-crease, although he is not allowed to catch and throw the ball with his hand but may put away with hands and feet or block the ball in any manner with his racquet or body.

Charging into, shouldering or interfering in any way with another player who is in pursuit of a team-mate or the ball. This does not prevent the use of the "body-check" against a player in possession of the ball or the pushing of an opponent with the shoulder in ground scuffles.

"Shepherding." Tripping.

Holding an opponent's racquet, pushing him with racquet in hand, running in front of him or interfering in any way to keep him from the ball, checking the racquet of an opponent who is not actually in possession of, or in the act of taking possession of the ball.

Using the "free arm" to protect the racquet.

Holding, striking or tripping a player with the racquet.

Hitting wildly with the racquet or throwing it at an opponent or the ball.

Participating in play after dropping the racquet.

"Cross-checking," which consists of charging with both hands on the racquet so that it meets the body of the opponent.

Swinging the racquet into or across the body of an opponent in such a manner as to hit or otherwise endanger the body.

"Up-checking," which consists of swinging the racquet upwards.

"Jab-checking," which consists of poking the end of the racquet into an opponent's racquet or body.

No attacking player is permitted to stand, obstruct or check the goalkeeper within the area of the goal-crease until the ball has entered the crease.

PENALTIES

The Referee may order a "face-off," bounce or free position at the place where the foul occurred, but not nearer either goal post than 10 yards unless justified in the opinion of the Referee.

He may order any offending player or players out of the game for such period as he thinks fit.

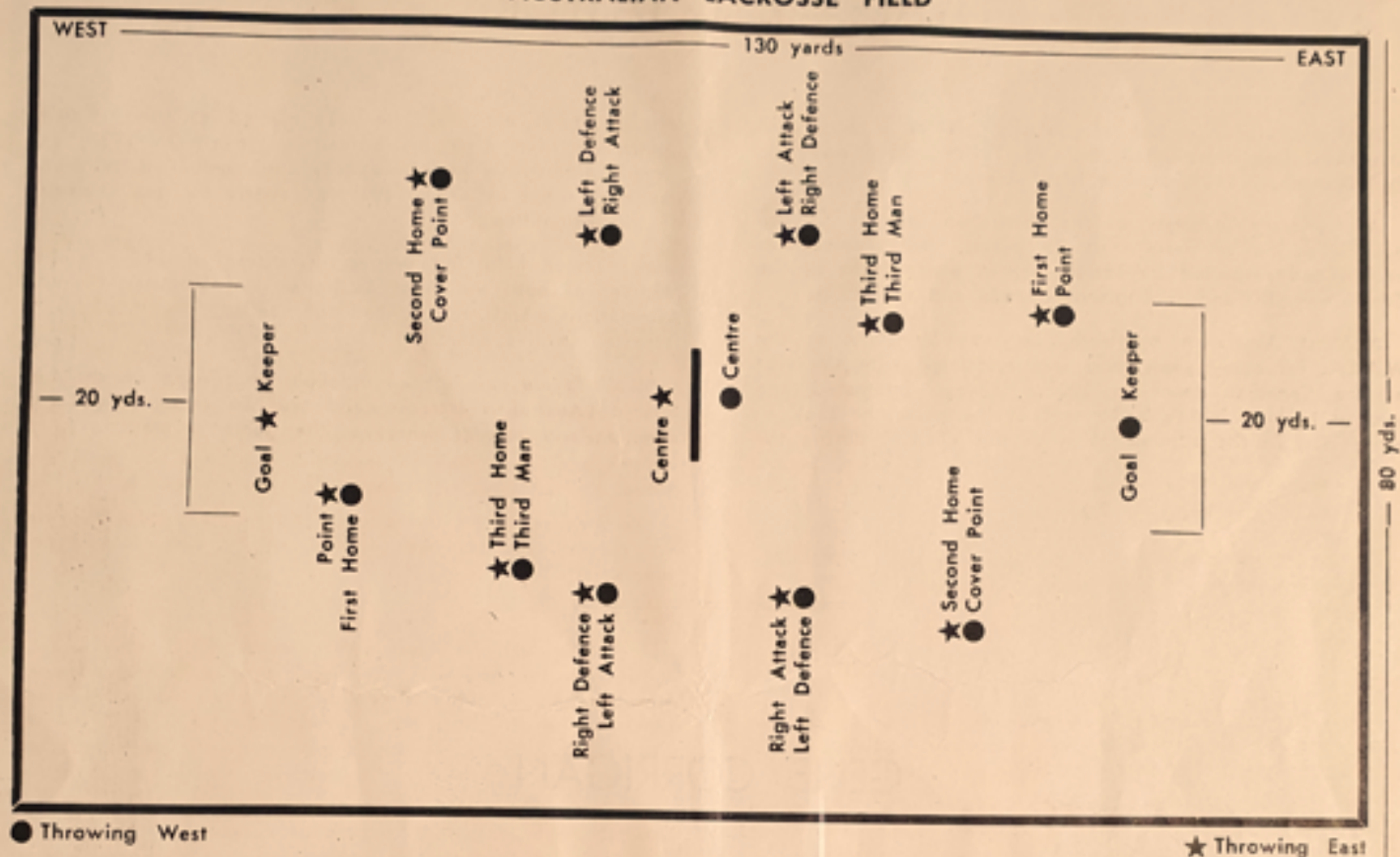
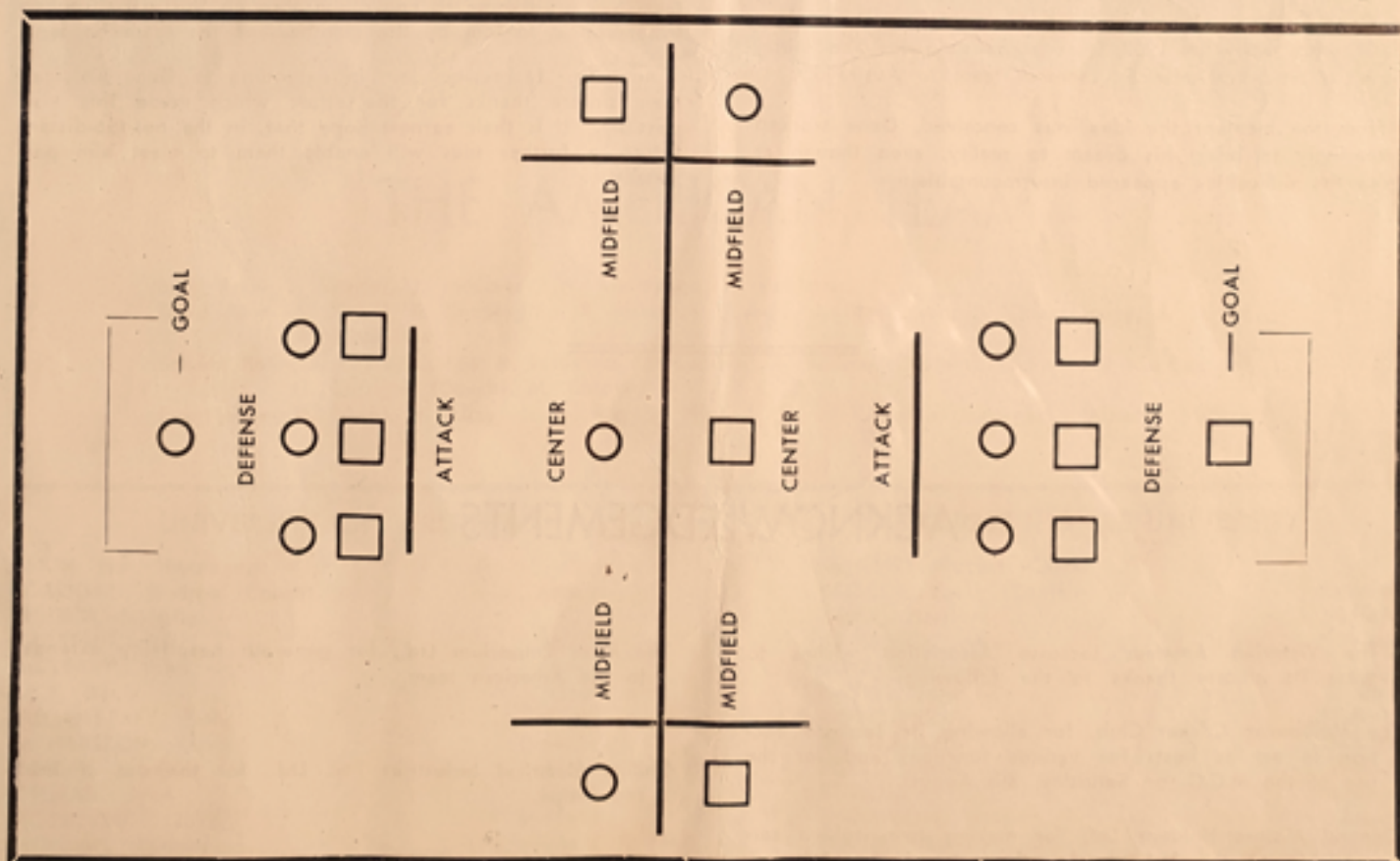


DIAGRAM OF AMERICAN FIELD LINE-UP

Australian Lacrosse lost one of its greatest friends and staunchest supporters when Mr. I. J. Taylor passed away on 2nd December, 1958, after a long illness.

As Honorary Secretary of the Australian Lacrosse Council over a period of more than 25 years, "Ike" Taylor was known and respected by Lacrosseurs in every State of the Commonwealth, and in England, Canada and the U.S.A.

A West Australian by birth, he was Secretary of the W.A.L.A. for many years, and was associated with the visit of the Canadian team in 1907. Always interested and anxious to help in the betterment of the game, he took an active part in the administration of the V.A.L.A. during the

latter part of his life. He was elected to the Executive Committee soon after his arrival in Victoria in 1937, and served continuously in this capacity until compelled by failing health to retire in 1956. For many years he was Chairman of this committee.

Mr. Taylor held the unique distinction of being a Life Member of both the West Australian and Victorian Lacrosse Associations, and could well be called the "father of lacrosse" in this country.

"Ike" Taylor has left an indelible impression on the history of Australian lacrosse, and will be remembered with affection and respect wherever the game is played.

GENE CORRIGAN

No reference to the touring American Lacrosse Team of 1959 would be complete without the inclusion of the name of Gene Corrigan, Lacrosse Coach of the University of Virginia, who, early in 1957, was responsible for the initial move to send an American Lacrosse team to Australia.

From the moment the idea was conceived, Gene worked unceasingly to bring his dream to reality, even though at times the difficulties appeared insurmountable.

Despite the fact that, at the last moment, Gene was unable to make the trip, Australian players and supporters feel that they have come to know him through the many spoken tributes paid to him by the members of the team he sent.

Australian Lacrosseurs join in extending to Gene Corrigan their sincere thanks for the effort which made this visit possible. It is their earnest hope that, in the not-too-distant future, a further tour will enable them to meet him personally.
