




# Under 19 World Lacrosse Championships

## Men's International Lacrosse Rules



#### The Team

There are 23 players on each team, but only 10 players from each team are on the field at one time, one goaltender, three defensemen, three midfielders, and three attackmen.

#### The Game

Each game consists of four quarters, each 20 minutes in length. A stop clock operates for the last three minutes of the fourth quarter. Teams change end at the conclusion of each quarter. Between halves there is a 10-minute break. Each team is permitted two timeouts per half, with each timeout being 90 seconds in length.

#### The Field

The playing field is 110 yards (100 meters) long by 60 yards (55 meters) wide and is either grass of artificial turf. The goals are six feet (1.8 meters) high by six feet (1.8 meters) wide.

#### Faceoffs

Play starts at the beginning of each quarter and after each goal with a faceoff at midfield. Players facing off may not kick or step on an opponent's stick but may use any other type of faceoff technique to gain possession of the ball. The two players on the wing areas are released to take part in the play when the whistle is blown, but all other players at both ends of the field must remain behind the restraining lines until possession has been signalled by the referee.

#### Shot out of Bounds

If a shot is taken on goal, the team who was closest to the ball when it went out of bounds is awarded possession.

#### Ball out of Play

When a ball goes out of play, the last team in contact prior to the ball going out of bounds loses possession. Play resumes with a whistle.

#### Checking

Bodychecking of another player is legal as long as the opponent is in possession of the ball or is withing three yards (2.7 meters) of a loose ball, or if the ball is in flight withing three yards (2.7 meters) of the player, and is not from the rear. Stick checking of an opponent can occur when the opponent has possession of the ball, is within three yards (2.7 meters) of a loose ball, or if the ball is in flight within three yards (2.7 meters) of the player.

#### Offside

Offside occurs when a team has less than three men in its attack-half of the field or when it has less than four men in its defensive-half of the field.

#### Penalties

There are three types of fouls for penalties in field lacrosse. A Technical Foul is 30 seconds penalty or loss of possession for an offside, interference, touching the ball with a hand, pushing, or holding. A Personal Foul is 1-3 minutes depending on the severity of the violation, which includes illegal stick check, slashing, cross-checking, and unnecessary roughness. An Expulsion Foul expells the player for the remainder of the game for violations such as fighting and unsportsmanlike conduct, or the accumulation of five Personal Fouls.

#### Procedure for a Tied Game

There is a five-minute break and the teams change ends. Overtime begins with a faceoff and consists of two four-minute periods with stop clock. There is a two-minute interval between overtime periods and the teams change ends. Each team is allowed one timeout per period. If the game is still tied after the two overtime periods, the game goes to sudden death overtime, in which the first goal scored wins. A one-minute break follows the regular overtime and a coin flip determines goals for sudden death, which begins with a faceoff.

# Women's International Lacrosse Rules

#### The Game

Women's lacrosse is played with a team of 12 players; one of the players is usually the goalkeeper. The duration of the game is 60 minutes, two halves of 30 minutes each. Each team is allowed one 90-second team time-out per half. Time-outs may be taken only after a goal has been scored.

The women's game begins and is restarted after each goal and after half time with a draw. The half is placed between two crosses at the center of the field, and on the whistle, the half is flung into the air.

Historically the women's International game has been played using only visible boundary guidelines, and the player closest to ball where the ball went out of bounds was given possession of the ball to resume play. In July 2002, IFWLA member countries voted to change the international rule and play with hard boundaries. Consistent with other sports, if a player touches the boundary with any part of her body or crosse, she is out of bounds. The last team to touch or have possession of the ball before it goes out of bounds loses possession of the ball when play resumes. When a ball goes out of bounds following a shot or deflected shot, the player nearest the ball is awarded possession to resume play.

The IFWLA member countries also voted to adopt a restraining line rule. Nine defense and eight attack players are allowed below/goal side of the Restraining Line is a Minor Foul.

Substitution is unlimited and occurs during play on the fly, after goals or after a team time-out. Whenever the whistle sounds to stop play, all players must stand and may not move until play resumes. Players are not required to stand during the draw.

Major Fouls jeopardize the safety of players and threaten the spirit of the game. Minor Fouls have little bearing on safety and result from misplays on the ball, illegal equipment, or procedural errors.

The penalty for a foul is called a Free Position. When a player commits a Major Foul, the offending player is moved four meters directly behind the player awarded the Free Position. When a player commits a Minor Foul, the offending player moves four meters away from the player awarded the Free Position in the direction from which she approached before committing the foul. All other players within four meters of the ball carrier must also move four meters away. When the whistle blows the ball carrier may run, pass or shoot.

A player may attempt to gain possession of the ball by checking an opponent's crosse. Legal checks must be controlled and in a direction away from an opponent's head and/or body. Aggressive contact to the body with the crosse and rough/dangerous checks are penalized with a Free Position. When a defensive player is in good defensive position to make a legal check, the ball carrier may not protect the ball in her crosse by cradling so close to her body or face thereby making a legal, safe check by the defense impossible.

Lone defenders are not allowed to obstruct the free space, i.e. barricade the area in front of goal for the purpose of preventing an attack ball carrier to shoot safely. A defender has three seconds to move through and out of the 11-Meter Area unless she is directly marking an attack player.

The field markings in front of each goal are called the 15-Meter Fan and the 11-Meter Marking Area. When the defense commits a Major Foul against the attacking team while the attack is in the 15-Meter Fan and on a scoring play, a Yellow Advantage Flag is raised to allow the attack to complete their scoring opportunity. If the scoring play ends without a shot, a Free Position penalty is awarded to the attack.

The onus is on all players to conduct themselves in a safe manner and to avoid any type of behavior that amounts to misconduct. In addition to awarding a free position, the umpire may give warning cards for personal misconduct and delaying the game. In some instances the offending team must play short for a period of playing time.

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#### A Brief History of the International Lacrosse Federation

Founded in 1974, the International Lacrosse Federation (ILF) promotes and develops the game of tacrosse throughout the world, establishes rules and regulations for international competition, and conducts world championships. As the international governing body of men's lacrosse, the ILF is comprised of 13 full-member and six affiliate member nations.

The first official men's ILF World Lacrosse Championship was conducted in Melbourne, Australia in 1974, and the event continues every four years. Only Canada (1978) has been able to knock off the U.S. The next championship will be held in late June and/or early July 2006 in London. Ontario, Canada.

In 1988, the ILF sanctioned an Under-19 Championship, beginning in Adelaide, Australia. The World Indoor Lacrosse Championship, sanctioned by the International Lacrosse Federation, officially marked the arrival of indoor lacrosse to the international scene in May 2003 in Ontario, Canada.

In 1993, the ILF recognized a need to place more emphasis on developing the sport of lacrosse throughout the world - particularly in non-member nations. As a result, the ILF established a Development Committee which established criteria to evaluate the developmental potential of non-member nations, as well as qualifying standards for admission to the ILF. The Development Committee also became responsible for negotiating and coordinating equipment grants to qualified nations, facilitating coach and officials exchange programs, and providing support to nations needing assistance.

In 2000, the International Lacrosse Development Committee was recognized as a joint committee of the ILF and the IFWLA. The committee coordinates assistance for developing both men's and women's lacrosse throughout the world.

Today, development efforts are underway in Argentina, Austria, China, Denmark, Finland, France, Hong Kong, Ireland, Italy, Latvia, Lithuania, Netherlands, Poland, Singapore, South Korea, Spain, Switzerland, and

It is the goal of the ILF to stimulate development efforts in emerging nations and transition affiliate members into full-member nations with their own governing bodies.

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#### A Brief History of the International Federation of Women's Lacrosse Associations

The International Federation of Women's Lacrosse Associations (IFWLA) was formed in 1972 to promote and develop the game of women's lacrosse throughout the world. Inaugural members were Australia, England, Scotland, Wales and the United States.

First and foremost, the idea for this organization belonged to Margaret Boyd of England, Awarded by her country with an OBE (Order of the British Empire), the IFWLA has honored her by naming the World

Championship Trophy after her.

Promotion and development are always on the agenda. The number of member countries has doubled as lacrosse has spread. New member countries are from Asia and Europe, and the IFWLA is now nurturing interest shown in South America.

Promoting all levels of lacrosse includes the IFWLA sponsorship of the World Cup and the Under-19 World Championship Tournament.

Each event is held every four years.

The IFWLA is the rules writing body for international women's lacrosse. Training and certification of umpires also comes from this










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
