ANNUAL REPORT AND BALANCE SHEET

For Season 1933

Presented at the Annual Meeting of the Association, held at the Amateur Sports Club on the 7th day of March, 1934.

Gentlemen,

In presenting, for your approval, the Annual Report and Balance Sheet for the 1933 season, your Committee is confident that you will review the season's activities with pleasure and some degree of pride.

The increase in our personnel (31 clubs, 62 teams, and 1,068 players, compared with 30 clubs, 60 teams, and 982 players registered last season) although slight is nevertheless gratifying as unemployment was still rife. The advancement of our game has been retarded in the past by the fact that the initial cost of equipment for a lacrosseur has been comparatively heavier than that of other amateur games. With this in mind, your Committee has watched very closely the development of the Australian made racquet, of which several makes were marketed for the first time last year.

The Malvern Senior team suffered their only defeat at the hands of their old rivals, M.C.C., in the final game but reversed the tables in the grand final and became the first holders of the splendid Cup donated by your President. The Malvern "A" team again annexed the premiership of their section by defeating Williamstown. There was a most interesting struggle for semi-final places in this section. After winning the B1 division, Hawthorn accounted for Legacy, the winners of B2, by the smallest of margins. Brunswick won the grand final of "C" section after a very close contest with Essendon. The "D" section honours are very often contended for by M.H.S.O.B. and Williamstown and this year the former team triumphed. Essendon gained the laurels of "E" section, the runners-up being Williamstown. A new club, St. Kilda, did very well in this section.

A good entry was received for the third Annual six-a-side tournament held on King's Birthday on the M.C.C. Malvern again carried off the senior honours, and Williamstown won the junior grade. Your Committee extends an invitation to country teams to compete in this event this year.

Your Committee heartily congratulates all the winning teams. Defeated clubs at all times fought hard and winners and losers alike always displayed true sportsmanship. Congratulations are also accorded to Mr. S. McCorkell (Camberwell) who again carried off the best and fairest player trophy in the senior section, and to Mr. G. McGuiness (Adult Deaf) who won the coveted honour in the "A" section.

At Adelaide our interstate team recorded its seventh successive win against South Australia after a splendid game. Last season marked the Jubilee Year of South Australian Lacrosse and that State should indeed feel proud of the part it has played in the history of the game in Australia. We thank our South Australian friends for the magnificent way they entertained our team, which comprised Messrs. J. Beattie (Capt.), S. McCorkell (Vice-Capt.), J. Reid, O. Unkenstein, N. Gibbs, D. Marshall, G. Knowles, W. Edwards, N. Robson, R. Read, B. Lilburne, H. Woods, J. Lake, with Mr. A. J. Fowler as Manager.

Also during the past season representative matches were played in Melbourne against the combined Universities, the South Australian Lacrosse Association (second grade) and the Ballarat Lacrosse Association. Junior teams from the Williamstown club had enjoyable visits to Adelaide, Ballarat and Geelong; Malvern also visited Ballarat, and St. Kilda journeyed to Geelong, and a school team from W. M. College travelled to Adelaide. Your Committee is hopeful that the game will be re-established at Geelong. A club was formed at Horsham during the season and we wish increased success to it and to our Ballarat friends.

After last year's successful debut, the Box Lacrosse Committee confidently arranged a full series of inter-club matches, but after two rounds had been played the ownership of Wattle Path Palais changed hands, and this phase of our activities has been abandoned for the time being.

Messrs. Webb, Fawcett, Dunn, Gay, Pearce, and Grace again creditably performed their onerous duties as members of the Investigation Committee. We also thank Mr. A. E. Clark, for his services as an Honorary Referee and record our gratitude to the members of the Referees' Association for the valued suggestions made by them during the season. Mr. H. R. Balmer deserves especial praise for his services as referees' instructor. We thank the members of the Press for their work on our behalf, and Messrs Balmer and Flood as our delegates to the Amateur Sports Council of Victoria.

It is with deep regret that we mention that the Assistant Hon. Secretary, Mr. Ron. Gibbs, is unable to seek re-election, as during his all too short stay in office, he has proved an exceedingly efficient and zealous office bearer.

Considerable interest was taken in the work of consolidating and revising the Constitution and Rules. New proposals were thoroughly and at times warmly debated, and many meetings were held before this important task was finally accomplished. The new Constitution and Rules have been printed and are on sale at the price of sixpence.

As practically all of the season's revenue was expended on administrating and popularising the game, our credit balance is very small. Clubs are urged to pay their dues promptly and do all in their power to assist the efforts the Committee will be making to build up a fund for the 1935 Carnival expenses.

Last year's appeal for Referees and Coaches met with little response. Your Committee again seeks support in this direction and will gladly accept any offer of service from those who have retired from actual playing. A game that is worth playing is worth working for, and with unity and zeal our watchwords, your Committee confidently expects the further progress of Lacrosse this coming season.
