Gentlemen,

Your Committee presents for your consideration and approval the 79th Annual Report, Statement of Income and Expenditure and Balance Sheet for Season 1957.

The season opened on 27th April with 20 teams competing in the three Open-Age sections, and 16 teams in the Junior sections. Results of these competitions together with those of the mid-week competitions conducted in the High and Technical Schools, are set out in the Honorary Record Secretary's report.

ASSOCIATION MANAGEMENT.

Management of Association affairs was carried out by the Executive Committee as in the previous season. The Executive Committee's decisions and recommendations have met with the general approval of members, and it is considered that this procedure has enabled the Association to carry on its functions in a prompt and effective manner.

At the same time, it is felt that the Committee could be further improved by a wider representation from the Clubs, all of whom will have the opportunity this evening to nominate a member or members to take part in the administration of the V.A.L.A.

BEST AND FAIREST PLAYER.

The honour of Best and Fairest Player for Season 1957 was won by Roy Dickson, Surrey Park goal-keeper, who polled 31 points to take possession of the Vince Healey Memorial Cup.

Roy Reddaway (Malvern - 23 pts.), and Don See (M.H.S.O.B. - 14 pts.), filled second and third places, and the season's voting was spread over a total of 61 players.

The contest was exceptionally interesting, as only two points separated winner and runner-up at the end of the second round, and the result was in doubt up to the last match but one of the season.

The Association President, Mr. Robert Coldstream, presented the Cup at the Surrey Park social evening on 31st October.

THE "P.J. BRADY" TROPHY.

Voting for this trophy covers the States of Victoria, South Australia and West Australia, and is under the control of the Australian Lacrosse Council. Your Association is indeed proud that this award has come to Victoria, the recipient being Roy Dickson.

We offer our heartiest congratulations to Roy, who, in winning both the Australian and Victorian awards in one season has earned a distinction unlikely to be equalled for many years.

COMMITTEE MEETINGS.

During the year the General Committee met on four occasions, and the Executive Committee on thirteen occasions.

INTERSTATE VISIT - SENIOR.

South Australia visited Melbourne late in July for the annual contest against Victoria for the Bob Symonds Cup.

The game was played at the Albert Ground, in ideal weather and with a very satisfactory attendance.

The response to approaches made by your Association has been very disappointing, and Clubs are invited to give their earnest attention to this matter before the commencement of next season.

PUBLICITY.

We have again been accorded good support by the Press, and results and articles have appeared each week.

Through Stations 3AW and 3DB we have recorded the scores each Saturday, and towards the end of the season the A.B.C. included a commentary on lacrosse in its weekly Sports Round-Up. This courtesy to our Association is greatly appreciated and our thanks go to the Broadcasting Stations, Press and Press Correspondents for their efforts on our behalf. To the TV Channel HSV7 and their sports commentator we express our appreciation of the prominence given to lacrosse in their "Sporting High-Spot" on the eve of the Interstate matches.

We also express our sincere thanks to Mr. J.M. Dobbie for his valuable assistance in collating the scores each week for Radio and Press.

SOCIAL.

Social functions for the season were restricted to a Smoke Night following the Interstate matches on 27th July. As in previous functions of various types, the attendance was disappointing and the Executive Committee reluctantly concluded that the holding of an end-of-season function was not warranted.

Whilst the Association feels that social gatherings are of considerable value in promoting mutual interest and good will between its members, it feels bound to point out that such functions must pay their way as well as provide entertainment. The Association will give earnest consideration to any proposals which meet these requirements.

PROPOSED INTERNATIONAL VISIT.

Members have already been advised of the proposed visit of an American Combined-Universities team, possibly in 1959. It will be appreciated that the financial aspect of such a visit is very considerable and the State Associations have been asked by the A.L.C. to give this matter their closest attention.

It is with considerable regret that I have to advise that I shall not seek re-nomination as Hon. Secretary. Since setting up in business on my own account, I have found it impossible to give to Association affairs the time and attention which they require. For the first time since the war the loss of clubs oeased over the last three years and each club in the Association regularly fielded at least two teams. Registrations remained the same as last year although the slow downward trend in the number of open age players has not been halted. In most cases club memberships have remained steady or made slight increases only Caulfield and University showing any marked decrease over the last three seasons in relation to the size of the clubs.

Players competing regularly (i.e. in at least half the possible games) show an increase of 42 on the previous season divided between 26 open age and 16 under age players. An analysis of registrations together with comparisons with the two previous years are set out below.

The total number of teams increased by one and a third section was restored to the open age competition. Alterations in the composition of each section are detailed under the competition results.

Malvern was the outstanding club of the season competing in all five grand finals and winning four of them — a record so far as can be ascertained.
