PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

November, 1979.

Gentlemen,

Any worthwhile project always seems to have its share of disappointments and the appointment of a full time Development Officer to promote Lacrosse throughout Victoria has been no exception.

It is to the credit of all those many people who have worked towards making this position possible that the rapid increase in numbers of boys and girls, schools, P.E. Teachers and trainee teachers now actively involved in Lacrosse, in all the various forms has occurred. The long hours of time have proved the value of thorough forward planning.

The task has only begun however, with such great interest as is now occurring we must be prepared and capable of looking inwards to the methods of conducting our sport. We need to achieve a higher professional attitude, to consider changes and above all be prepared to accept the challenge that now lies ahead.

Many people have given willingly of their time and effort to carry out the organization required to successfully complete our 100 years of competition. I would like to take this opertunity to say "thank-you" to all those concerned.

Victorian, Australian Champions 1979, both seniors and juniors - Many members did not have the opportunity of representing their State this year but those who did performed to such a high standard, I'm sure that all of us were rightly proud of Victorian Lacrosse. The Annual Report covers in detail all the activities of the 1979 Season, however I would like to congratulate the Williamstown Club on its outstanding achievement in having a team in all senior Grand Finals - winning three.

Vince Healy winner, Graeme Fox was undoubtedly the most outstanding player for season 1979.

Sponsorship in Sport is a popular saying these days particularly with rising costs. I firmly believe that any sponsorship entered into is a contract and that value for services must be given. The Association and Clubs must ensure that every effort is made to repay in kind any sponsorship agreement entered into.

I would like to record my appreciation to all those Companies that have supported us this year and look forward to a continuing association in the future.

The realization of the Development Officer is having a dramatic impact on our Sport and could not have been achieved without the help and support of the Department of Youth, Sport and Recreation and its officers. Not only the financial support we have received but also the professional advice, suggestions and encouragement that we have been given from the Department Officers has been invaluable.

It is in our hands to repay the support that has been received by ensuring that Lacrosse will be the fast growing sport in Victoria, efficiently conducted and above all - A Sport For All.

Gentlemen.

On behalf of your Committee it gives me a great deal of pleasure to submit for your approval this 101st Annual Report covering the activities of 1979.

The 1979 season has been a milestone year for Lacrosse with the appointment of a full time Promotional & Development Officer, the formation of a Directorate under the name of Lacrosse Victoria which encompasses both the Men's and Women's Associations and the opening of a Lacrosse shop, rum for the benefit of Lacrosse. These matters are covered in detail later in the report.

The Treasurer's Report and Financial Statements are attached together with the reports of the two Record Secretaries and the Tribunal.

1. ADMINISTRATION

(a) Management Committee - This Committee met on eleven occasions during the year and generally the meetings were well attended.

A few clubs continue to offer little support for the Association and except when their own interests are involved, frequently fail to send a delegate. It is at these meetings where major policy decisions are taken and it is essential that all clubs are represented.

(b) Permit Committee - The weekly meetings continued throughout the season and it is a credit to those members that they are willing to forgo their lunch hours once a week in the interests of Lacrosse.

Late and incomplete match reports continue to be the main source of problems for the Permit Committee and prevent the issuing of up-to-date ladders as early as they would desire. Incomplete reports are also a headache for the Record Secretaries. A little more thought by club secretaries would save an enormous amount of follow-up work.

(c) <u>Tribunal</u> - This Committee began the year at full strength and we welcomed Dr. A. N. Watkins to the ranks of the Committee which undertakes what are, probably, the most difficult tasks of all.

The Association's thanks are again extended to these dedicated people, Ed. Spreadborough for his very accurate recording of the Tribunal's findings and the M.C.C. Club for making a central venue available.

A detailed report of the Tribunal's activities for the year is attached.

(d) <u>Visits Committee</u> - As a formal committee this did not function owing to the lack of personnel. However the work was undertaken by several volunteers as the necessity arose.

Arranging of accommodation and transport for visiting teams at the 1979 Championships was capably handled by Mike Hilsberg with assistance from Alan Gandy and Jim Walker.

An allocation of \$500 from Association funds was made to assist the Junior State Team attending the Championships in Adelaide.

We appreciate Harald Doerner providing transport, hospitality and accommodation for Canadian coach, Bob Babcock during the latter's official visit to Australia in March.

The Vice Presidents of the Association organised a very successful dinner for past players and visiting officials during Championship week. The function was held at the Melbourne Cricket Ground and was a very enjoyable night out. Ted Clayfield acted as convenor and his efforts were very much appreciated.

- (e) Weather Committee With one of the driest winters on record the members again had a very easy year.
- (f) <u>Match Committee</u> The excellent work put in by the members of this committee in producing fixtures for the start of the season was again spoiled by clubs withdrawing teams.

As mentioned in the last Annual Report, it is the Association's earnest desire that Lacrosse expands at club level but when teams are with-drawn midway through a season, Lacrosse as a whole is the sufferer.

(g) Youth, Sport & Recreation - The Department of Youth, Sport and Recreation continues to make a most appreciated and beneficial contribution to the progress of our sport.

Our last Annual Report advised that we were awaiting the outcome of an application for financial assistance to employ a full-time officer and undertake a development program. The result was most encouraging: a grant in conjunction with Womens Lacrosse of \$8,500 to employ a Development Officer and supporting grants totalling \$7,700 for the 1978 - 79 financial year. These grants have been followed in 1979 - 80 with assistance amounting to \$15,000. Don Miller's appointment to and work in the position of Director of Promotions and Coaching has been covered elsewhere in this report.

In addition to direct financial assistance, the Department has continued to sponsor a range of support programs which lacrosse could use to great advantage. These include coaching and administration courses, a printing service and loans service for video equipment.

Once again the Association is deeply indebted to Doug Fox for his work in this area. His comprehensive, and very successful, submissions to the Department enabled that body to recognise the unique needs of Lacrosse in its present expanding stages.

(h) Sports Council of Victoria - With the advent of the Victorian Sports Council, the abovementioned body changed its name to the Sports Federation of Victoria.

Our delegate, Les Goding, continues to hold office on the Federation's Executive and we appreciate the good work done by Les in this capacity.

(i) <u>Sponsorship</u> - Mobil Australia Ltd. has continued its support of Lacrosse by supplying our annual requirement of score sheets. This type of donation is a very practical one and we appreciate it very much.

Our bankers, the Commonwealth Banking Corporation, made a very substantial contribution towards the cost of hosting the 1979 Championships. The funds were handed over by the Bank's Chief Manager, Mr. G. S. Lawry to our President, Mr. Phil Humphreys at a morning coffee function held at the Bank's Melbourne office. Promotion and Development Officer, Don Miller and Secretary, Bill Taylor also attended.

We also appreciate the donations of products made by Pub Squash Pty. Ltd. and Staminade Pty. Ltd. which were used during championship week to good effect.

(j) Amateur Sports Club - The meeting facilities provided by the Victorian Club/Amateur Sports Club have been very satisfactory and we appreciated the Club's other facilities being made to members on meeting nights.

Arrangements were made with the club management for accredited V.A.L.A. members to use the facilities of the Club at times other than meeting nights. A special membership card, which is to be renewed annually was printed for the purpose and approximately sixty V.A.L.A. members have made use of this membership.

Our appreciations are again expended to Keith Waite who has continued to be our delegate to the club.

(k) Grants of Assistance - A grant of \$200 was made to the Surrey Park club to initiate a primary schools competition within its own area. This has proved most successful and we trust that the good work will be continued and, if possible, expanded.

A grant of \$200 was made to the Eltham Club to assist with purchase of equipment for a new junior side.

(1) <u>Directorate</u> - This body was formed from two members of the Men's Association, Phil Humphreys and Bill Taylor, Two members of the Women's Association, Maria Weatherill and Sue Carrol together with the Promotions and Development Officer, Don Miller.

In conjunction with the Liaison Officer, Doug Fox, the Directorate has handled applications for funds to the Department of Youth, Sport and Recreation, the disbursement of those funds as they apply to the joint Associations, the direction of the P & D Officer in his duties, the opening and stocking of a retail shop for Lacrosse supplies and, out of necessity, the running of the 1979 Mens Championships.

The Lacrosse Shop at 21 Waverley Road, East Malvern was opened in May under management of the Directorate Officers and they would like to record their appreciation to the Brine and S.T.X suppliers, Eddie Toomey and Les Goding, who lodged the opening stock on consignment thus enabling the shop to become operational on the meagre capital which was available. Our appreciations also go to Stahmers Carpets

and several others who assisted in a very practical way by donating furnishings and furniture to establish the shop. The shop is open every Wednesday and Friday evening and Saturday morning during the season and is also the working office for the P. & D. Officer.

Since the event of our Promotional & Development Officer, Don Miller, there has been a great deal of activity in the schools which is in keeping with our foremost priority. Lacrosse has been introduced to 29 schools so far by personal visits from Don.

During the second term an active inter-school competition was started and culminated in a four-match playoff at Royal Park. Caulfield Technical School was the eventual winner. The co-operation and enthusiasm of the various schools' staff has been most appreciated. Lacrosse is still very much alive in third term and has become anything but a winter sport.

Courses at Rusden State College and Preston Institute are again being conducted for potential Phys. Ed. teachers with 64 students taking part. As these teachers filter out into schools across the State demand for Lacrosse in the school system will increase.

Lacrosse players are being created in schools all around Melbour we and it is up to the clubs to make sure that invitations are extended to these newcomers to the game to take part in Saturday competition. Clubs could readily fill their junior teams by a simple approach to the appropriate school. These potential recruits have all seen Lacrosse and been coached in the basic skills of the game. We look forward to 1980 being a vast improvement on the current season as far as Junior Lacrosse is concerned. There is every reason why a full Junior competition, i.e., representation in all sections by all clubs and a zoning system should be possible.

Is your club making adequate preparation to receive these new players? Can it cope administratively? The time to act is now - don't let these enthusiastic recruits be lost to the game.

The Directorate would like to place on record its appreciation of the manner in which Don Miller has carried out his duties and the successes he has achieved. Working for Lacrosse full time has not dulled Don's enthusiasm for playing, club administration or participation in V.A.L.A. affairs.

PLAYING ACTIVITIES

(a) <u>Domestic</u> - The normal eighteen rounds were scheduled for the senior section and suitable fixtures formulated for the other sections. Teacm withdrawals from senior sections other than A grade necessitated redraws which again ruined the work of the Match Committee and made printed fixtures obsolete.

In a cliff hanger preliminary final Surrey Park defeated Malvern and won the right for the second year in succession to play off in the Grand Final. However, Williamstown again proved far too strong and took the Senior Premiership with a convincing win.

(b) <u>Interstate</u> - The 1979 Championships were held at the Albert Ground over July 10, 12 and 14 in perfect weather conditions.

In the opening round W.A. and S.A. provided a thriller with the South

Australians taking the honours in the last minutes to win 12 - 11. From there on in it was all Victoria who defeated W.A. 10 - 11 and S.A. 19

W.A. goalie, Terry Magee won the Fairest and Best Award with Victoria's Graeme Fox as runner up.

Victorian players selected in the All Stars Team were: R. Walton, G. Garmsworthy, A. Bower, T. Hardy, P. Morley, S. Ellis, G. Tillotson, J. Butkiewicz, O. Middelhuis., G. Fox, B. Smith, W. Stahmer, with Dennis Trainor selected as All Star Coach.

The Victorian No. 2 side was composed of players all under the age of 23 and performed very creditably.

The Association would like to place on record its appreciation for the work performed by Mike Hilsberg towards the smooth running of the championships and in undertaking responsibility for many of the arrangements which had to be made beforehand.

The Under 16 side travelled to Adelaide for the Junior Championships held on 4th, 6th and 8th September.

In the opening round Victoria defeated W.A. 18 - 15, a margin which was to be the deciding factor in the outcome of the series. In the second game W.A. notched a 21 - 15 win over South Australia leaving the championship wide open for the Victorians. However this was not to be and at the end of the third round Vic. and S.A. were tied 15 all. In the eight minutes of overtime S.A. scored three goals whilst Vic. failed to score. Heavy ground conditions and the infliction of over forty penalties spoiled the game as a spectacle.

Victoria took the Championships on percentage.

Victorian players selected in the All Stars Team were:-

- (c) <u>International</u> There was no participation by Australian Lacrosse in international competition during the year.

However, arrangements are in hand for an International Tournament to be held in Baltimore during May 1980 for Under 19 representative teams.

(d) Box Lacrosse

(i) <u>Domestic</u> - Four teams made up the competition over the summer months of 1978 - 79 and provided the Williamstown Lacrosse Centre with another successful year. The Squids took out the premiership and the Jack Hodges Perpetual Trophy with 8 wins and 2 draws and 2 losses. In the two lightning premierships the Gropers won in December and the Seawapps in March.

There was a noticeable improvement in the standard of play and stick handling ability during the season and this was no doubt brought about by the experience gained by the Victorian members who took part in the Canadian Tour last year imparting their knowledge. Box Lacrosse was also fortunate to have Ian Fennell, a top Canadian coach out here on a prolonged private visit. Ian not only helped our local Box scene but

also put in time in Adelaide and Perth. An official visit by Canadian Bob Baboock also assisted.

We would like to record appreciation to the sub-committee members M. Jennings, K. Read and M. Taylor for their work in organising the competition and to the referees, W. Taylor, J. Harris, K. Read, M. Jennings, R. Traeger and J. Nolan.

(ii) Interstate - The first Interstate Championship for Box Lacrosse was held in Adelaide during March. The South Australians had provided an excellent indoor venue with good spectator facilities for 250/300 people. This proved to be inadequate after the first game when the popularity of Box became evident among the S.A. Lacrosse supporters and their friends. The series proved to be a great financial success for S.A. and they now have a really good indoor venue for their domestic competition.

In the opening game S.A. defeated Victoria 23 - 19. After this shock defeat the Victorians notched a 22 - 16 win over a surprisingly good W.A. side which was having its first year in Box Lacrosse and without any benefit from a domestic competition in its home state. S.A. also defeated W.A. by 20 - 13 which left S.A. and Vic. to fight out the play off. The S.A. team really turned on the heat and gave Victoria a lesson in tactics and stickwork. Final score was S.A. 24 Vic. 9.

Victorians in the All Star side were, D. Carter, R. Benedierks, G. Antrin, R. Van Dyke and I. Barker.

- (iii) International The British Colombia Lacrosse Association will be host to an international Box Lacrosse Championships in July of 1980. To be known as 'Nations 1980' the series will be held in Yancouver and teams from U.S.A., Australia, England, Eastern Canada, Western Canada and Native Indians will take part.
- (e) Gymkhana Twenty eight teams took part in the Queens Birthday gymkhana on 18th June. The event was held at the Malvern Cricket Ground and once again the weather was kind to us.

Matches were kept to time throughout the day and the finals were played on schedule due to good organisation supported by appropriate comments from the commentator Alan Chiron who kept things moving.

(f) Fairest and Best Player Awards - Congratulations to Graeme Fox of the Surrey Park Club on winning the coveted Vince Healy award for A Section. Congratulations also to John Butkiewicz of Williamstown and Peter Stiglich of Caulfield who polled second and third respectively.

(g) Referees Association - The Association extends best wishes for a successful future to Keith Little who has moved to Ararat. As well as refereeing, Keith put in many years of effort at club and association level and his contributions to the game have been most appreciated. Just how soon Lacrosse will start in Ararat remains to be seen.

Ken Read and Leon Gardiner returned to the ranks of players this year but fortunately three new referees were recruited to fill these gaps. A welcome is extended to Leighton Beamsley, Blair Freeman and Rob Speakman, may they be with us for many years in this important role.

Congratulations to Don Reyment and Gordon Elder on their appointment to the National Championships.

The work done by Referees Secretary, John Gunn, in dealing with A.L.R.A. correspondence and the hassles involved in allocating weekly games has been most appreciated.

We are still looking for more referees and any past player with reasonable fitness and a desire to do something constructive for the game would be most velcome to our ranks.

GENERAL

(a) Australian Lacrosse Council - We welcome George Tillotson into the demanding position of A.L.C. Secretary, having taken over upon the retirement of Clive Carr. With George's many years of experience and his enthusiasm for the game the job remains in very capable hands.

At its Annual General Meeting in February the A.L.C. awarded certificates of Merit to Phil Humphreys, Doug Fox and Bill Taylor for their contributions to Lacrosse.

- (b) <u>Life Membership</u> Bill Gray's outstanding contribution to lacrosse over many years was recognised at the Association Amnual Meeting in November by the award of Life Membership. Congratulations Bill, your service in almost every V.A.L.A. office over a long period is sincerely appreciated.
- (c) Publicity Again we had some excellent publicity in press, T.V. and radio throughout the year.

Television and press coverage of the National Championships was by far the best ever and a channel commercial featuring Lacrosse was given daily exposure for some months. Pre-games forcasts by Alan Chiron over 3LO were a very popular weekly feature.

Clubs did some good work in obtaining coverage in local press and this is of immeasureable assistance to the Promotions and Development Officer in his job of spreading the benefits of Lacrosse throughout schools.

(d) <u>Magazine</u> - Regular monthly issues have been published and since South Australian news has been incorporated, the interest and circulation has increased considerably.

Appreciations are again due to Editor, Terry Allington, for an excellent job. Thanks also for the continued support of our advertisers and we trust that "Lacrosse" readers will return the support as occasions arise.

Articles submitted from clubs have been much more numerous this year and hopefully this will continue.

(e) <u>Presentation Ball</u> - Held at the St. Kilda Palaise on Show Night, this annual function was a great success. Approximately 350 attended and enjoyed a very pleasant night of dancing, dining, wining and Lacrosse.

Congratulations again to Surrey Park for another very successful job of organisation.

(f) <u>Coaching</u> - The Referees Association held a coaching clinic for player referees early in April. The clinic was very successful and the 39 players who attended were from all age groups. Each was given a certificate of proficiency at the end.

The Malvern Club, at the request of the V.A.L.A. organised two clinics for coaches at the end of the season. The first for junior coaches was poorly attended but the second, for seniors, was well supported. Visiting American players, Mike O'Neill, Craig Jaeger and Brian Conway demonstrated some of the enlightening techniques currently being used by the top U.S.A. Coaches.

4. CONCLUSION

My personal thanks are extended to the two Record Secretaries, Barrie Moore and Frank Lansbury for their work during the year and the excellent reports which they have again rendered to become part of Lacrosse history. Thanks also to Sue Fox, whose preparation of the magazine, numerous circulars, minutes and this annual report has taken many hours of work. Also to Mike Hilsberg for the accuracy of his minutes and his ability to record them in sometimes difficult circumstances.

It has been a pleasure working with our new President, Phil. Humphreys, and Treasurer, John Nolan, both of whom took office at the beginning of a very busy year and innovative program. It has been an exciting year to be involved.
