1. BOARD OF DIRECTORS:

3. BUSINESS PLAN:

In 1998 there was a major review of the Business Plan following a meeting with State Presidents and the Board of Directors resulting in the creation of the portfolio Special Projects and the subsequent establishment of the 'Gain and Retain' project. The Business Plan for the period 1999 -2003 was distributed to State Associations and the Australian Sports Commission. The Council's Business Plan was reviewed and updated at the November meeting. Progress against established targets was recorded and minor changes in direction were also made. With a change in Board structure a major review will be undertaken at the November 2000 meeting and the revised plan will circulated to members.

4. INTERNATIONAL LACROSSE:

Peter Hobbs continued to represent Australia on the International Lacrosse Federation Development Committee. The expansion of lacrosse to new nations continues with the admission of Korea to the ILF as a member and continuing activity in China and Argentina.

Leighton Beamsley, Peter Hobbs and Malcolm Stokes attended the ILF meeting held in Glasgow during August in conjunction with the European Championships.

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5 COMPETITIONS:

5.1 National Championships

National Championships were conducted for Seniors in Perth and for Under 17 in Melbourne.

Congratulations are extended to Western Australia which was successful in winning the Senior Championship and to Victoria for their success in the Under 17 Championship.

5.2 Under 15 National Tournament

The Under 15 National Tournament was held in Perth with 8 teams participating. The Western Metros were the ultimate winners of the Tournament

6. REFEREES

Lindsay Scott continued his good work in the role of Referee in Chief of the Australian Lacrosse Referees Association. The Association works through its training and assessment programs to maintain and elevate officiating standards and to recruit new referees. The high standard of refereeing all competitions is testament to the continuing efforts of ALRA.

7. LIAISON:

7.1 Australian Sports Commission

Communications with the Australian Sports Commission continue to be maintained via ASC Liaison Officer Kylie Bloodworth.

The ASC provided administration, coach and referee development and participation grants over the past year and in addition supported training camp costs for the Australian team.

As part of a joint arrangement with the AWLC a part-time position has been maintained. Mr. Rex Wigney has completed a further successful year as National Development Officer based in Brisbane.

A change in funding arrangements has meant a reduction in financial support from the ASC and we are in communication with the ASC in an attempt to improve our position.

7.2 Member Associations

The practice of inviting State Association representatives to meet with the Board and/or attend Board sessions as observers when ALC is meeting in their State has been maintained.

7.3 Australian Women's Lacrosse Council

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Liaison with the AWLC continued via the work of individual Directors and the joint activity to co-ordinate the activities of the part-time NDO position. The Presidents of each body met during the year to discuss matters of mutual interest.

7.4 Confederation of Australian Sport

The ALC maintains membership of the CAS.

8. PUBLICATIONS:

The Australian Lacrosse Journal and the ALC web site continued to provide a general communications service to lacrosse.

The congratulations and thanks of the ALC are extended to all State Association officials and interested lacrosse personnel who have contributed to these projects. Special thanks are recorded to Mavis Owens, ALC Media and Marketing Director and to Malcolm Stokes as Journal Editor for their extensive work in maintaining and improving the Journal, and to Barrie Moore for building and maintaining the ALC web site.

The initial three year contracted period for publication of the magazine has expired. In the last edition an article reviewed the future of the Australian Lacrosse Journal. To be financially viable the magazine needs the support of South Australia, Victoria and Western Australia. Unfortunately Victoria has chosen not to participate which could have spelled the demise of the magazine. To keep faith with supporters of the magazine in South Australia and Western Australia it has been decided by Lacrosse Australia to subsidise publication in 2000 with a reduction to 2 editions this year. We hope that individuals and perhaps clubs will subscribe from Victoria and provide the opportunity to publish again in 2001.

The ALC Calendar of Events, Personnel Directory, 1998 Annual Report, Business Plan and updates of Playing Rules and Tournament Handbook were produced and distributed to State Associations and, where appropriate, to clubs.

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DIRECTOR OF ADMINISTRATION & FINANCE Leighton Beamsley

1. FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1.1 ALC Audited Financial Statements

The result for the year is a surplus of \$20,781 (1999 \$7,306).

The following items require specific comment.

An licence fee of US \$4,000 was received from Jass International for granting to them the clothing marketing rights of Australian lacrosse logos.

Surpluses in Development and Coaching & Officiating result from timing differences and given the obligation to fully expend Government Grants there will be deficit spending in 2000 / 2001 at least equivalent to the 1999 / 2000 surplus.

The surplus in Competition results directly from the share of income received from the 1999 World Under 19 Championships staged in Adelaide.

1.2 ALC Trust Fund

Funds on hand at 30 September 2000 were \$ 11,415.56. An advance of \$10,000 has been made to the 2002 Australian.

2. DIRECTORS

In accordance with the ALC Articles of Association three Directors retired by rotation at the last Annual Meeting. They were Malcolm Stokes, Graeme Reddaway and Leighton Beamsley. All offered themselves for re-election and were elected at the Annual General Meeting. At the first meeting of Directors held after the Annual Meeting Leighton Beamsley was elected as President and Peter Hobbs elected as Vice President in accordance with the Articles of Association.

3. AUDITOR

Ross Melville continues as auditor of the ALC and on behalf of the board I express our thanks for his services.

4. BUSINESS PLAN / CO-OPERATIVE AGREEMENT

The development plan was again revised and performance reviewed against the Business Plan. This forms the basis of our future operations and also the basis of funding applications to Government.

5. FINANCIAL ARRANGEMENTS WITH MEMBERS

The method of financial arrangement currently in place will be continued. There was an increase in the basis of calculating fees charged to members after no increase for a number of years.

7. ADMINISTRATION HANDBOOK

The handbook is now in the hands of all members and a restricted number of others. The handbook is updated as and when required. There are plans to make the handbook available on Compact Disc.

8. ANNUAL REPORT

There is an ongoing function of making the Annual Report a comprehensive document, dealing with not only current year issues but recording historical information for posterity.

Suggestions from members for other information that could be included in the Annual Report are welcomed.

Barrie Moore continued as ALC Webmaster and I wish to record my thanks for his efforts.

DIRECTOR OF COMPETITION

Peter Hobbs

The last year of Lacrosse competition has been one which has seen considerable development in the skill of the game, obviously enhanced through the ongoing exposure to top coaching standards in this country and international competition. The Baltimore World Series of 1998 exposed many Australians to the skills which can be achieved in our sport and it is pleasing to see this development taking place.

1. INTERNATIONAL VISITS

The year 2000 saw the visit of two international teams to our shores, with a tour of Rutgers University from the United States, to Melbourne, Adelaide and Perth. Rutgers played matches in each of these states, together with undertaking coaching clinics for young Lacrosse players. Rutgers were coached by International Lacrosse Federation President Tom Hayes, who used his visit to examine the proposed organisation of the 2002 World Series in Perth.

Also visiting were an Under 17 team organised by Bill McGowan of Connecticut, United States and this team participated very well in the Under 17 Tournament in Melbourne.

2. AUSTRALIAN CHAMPIONSHIPS & TOURNAMENTS

At the time of going to press with this report, the Under 15 Tournament had not commenced and this Tournament is being held in Perth with the participation of 8 teams. Numbers of participants have reduced this year as a result of the cost of travel and the timing of the series, however we find ourselves very restricted on timing as a result of school holidays in the various states.

2.1 SENIOR

The Senior Championship was held in Perth, conducted for the first time, in the modern era with two rounds for the three participating states. The Championship was won by Western Australia, who defeated Victoria in the final 16-11. Top standard Lacrosse was the order of the day and Western Australia are congratulated on their organisation. The experiment of the double round for teams seems to have been warmly applauded, players and coaches alike seem to have favoured this option.

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2.2 UNDER 17

The Under 17 Tournament was held this year in Victoria and all participants congratulated the hosting of Victoria for 2000. The Tournament was very successful for displaying the skills developed by young players in Victoria, as they very successfully defended their Championship. A total of 6 teams participated in the Tournament, which included the ALC Presidents, the team from the United States titled World Class Lacrosse together with two Victorian teams being Victoria and the Hurricanes. Both Victorian teams showed outstanding skills to be successful in defeating other state teams.

3. 2002 WORLD SERIES

The 2002 World Series will be conducted in Perth during the period 6th – 14th July, 2002 and will be held at the University of Western Australia Sports Park.

The Committee of organisation for the World Series, headed by Chairman George Halleen and assisted ably by the President of the Western Australian Lacrosse Association Don Rudderham and many other active workers for Lacrosse, are well into their planning process and the anticipation is of another highly successful Championship to be hosted in Western Australia.

4. FUTURE NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

Under the plans of the ALC to rotate amongst the States the conduct of National Championships and Tournaments, in the year 2001 the Senior Championships will be conducted in Melbourne, Under 17 in Adelaide and for the first year for many years a Lacrosse Australia Tournament will be held in Queensland, that being on the Gold Coast, in September 2001 for the Under 15's.

For the year 2002, all National Championships and Tournaments will be held in Perth in conjunction with the exciting World Series.

5. CHAMPIONSHIP HANDBOOK

The Lacrosse Australia Board continues to monitor the Championship Handbook and receive submissions from its Member States from time to time. Submissions are also made by State Team Officials through the Tournament Directors, who submit these to the Board. Changes are made as considered necessary and the handbook is continually updated.

6. TOURNAMENT DIRECTORS

Lacrosse Australia had been very pleased with the continuation of efforts of the Tournament Directors being Alec Inglis (Senior), Helen Keane (Under 17) and Dennis Mulroney (Under 15). The Tournament Directors have contributed greatly in adding to the organisation and control of the National Tournaments and Lacrosse Australia is indebted to them.

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7. INTERNATIONAL PROGRAM COORDINATOR

Lacrosse Australia at its last meeting determined to create a new position, that being of International Program Coordinator. The purpose of this appointment is to coordinate, plan and promote international competition for Australian Lacrosse players, both inside and outside of Australia. The position has been advertised, applications received and the appointment is expected in the next few months.

8. CONCLUSION

Whilst the year did not include a World Series or matters in competition of particular note, it was another successful one for Australian Lacrosse and we look forward to this having laid a strong foundation for future competition in forthcoming years.

I thank all those who have assisted in the competition area of Lacrosse in Australia during this year, particularly the Directors and Secretary of Lacrosse Australia. I also thank the Officials of State Teams who have contributed greatly to the success of the events which are conducted.

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During the past year liaison has been maintained with the Australian Women's Lacrosse Council through Shelley Maher, the AWLC Director responsible for development. Joint initiatives have included publication of resource materials, a National Conference for State Development Officers and the continued united action to re-establish lacrosse in Queensland, Tasmania and New South Wales. These developments are detailed below.

This joint participation development work could not have been undertaken without the valued support which is received via grants from the Australian Sports Commission.

1. NATIONAL DEVELOPMENT CONFERENCE:

Seventeen participants representing each Australian State, the AWLC and Lacrosse Australia attended a two-day conference on Lacrosse Development in Melbourne during March. The Conference included information exchange, sessions on Active Australia, Sport in Schools, Lacrosse Clinic formats, development case studies and strategic planning. An important aspect of the outcome was the positive networking among Development Officers and a subsequent increase in liaison and information sharing.

2. QUEENSLAND:

New junior activity for boys and girls on the Gold Coast was added to the existing junior lacrosse being conducted at Caboolture and Camira. The distances between these junior cells continue to provide a challenge for the Queensland Lacrosse Association. Wherever possible control of these programs is handed to local parents and supporters with overall progress monitored and assisted by QLA and Rex Wigney, our National Development Officer.

Detailed planning work is being undertaken in preparation for the 2001 National Under 15 Tournament to be played at Tallebudgera on the Gold Coast.

A significant new development during late 1999 and throughout 2000 has taken place in Townsville, North Queensland. Promotional work undertaken by ex-Adelaide University player, Daren Potts at James Cook University has established lacrosse both within the campus and in the Townsville community. Formally constituted clubs in James Cook University and Stuart Lacrosse Club have been established.

Playing equipment together with referee training has been supplied by Lacrosse Australia/AWLC to assist this growth and two seasons involving 3-4 teams have been conducted. Work is progressing to add a junior competition and North Queensland is planning to send teams to the Gold Coast Paradise Tournament in October and to the 2001 Under 15 National Tournament.

A successful indoor competition has continued for male and female players in Brisbane and a private girl's school has adopted lacrosse as a semester sport in Toowoomba.

3. TASMANIA:

Direct promotional and recruiting support was provided to the Tasmanian Lacrosse Association through a one-week placement in Hobart of visiting US junior coach Peter Ericson. Thirty-five new boys and girls were added to the four teams of boys and girls which make up the junior competitions. Future growth in the junior program is currently constrained by the lack of sufficient playing fields. The TLA is addressing this issue and is hopeful of expanded participant numbers in 2001.

4. **NEW SOUTH WALES:**

The disappointing loss of much of the infrastructure of men's lacrosse in New South Wales during 1999 has not been corrected during the past twelve months. Some men's lacrosse scrimmages have occurred for interested players and a regular indoor mixed competition has re-emerged.

It is hoped that Lacrosse NSW will achieve its indicated administrative restructure and recapture the competition base and participant numbers which had previously offered significant promise. A positive step was the attendance by New South Wales at the National Development Conference.

5. RESOURCE MATERIALS:

Reprinting of "The Name of the Game" and "Get into the Action" leaflets was undertaken and supplies distributed to each State. Work is progressing on a review and reprint of Lacrosse Lesson Plans for use in schools.

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6. ACTIVE AUSTRALIA PROVIDER STATUS:

Lacrosse Australia was registered as an Active Australia Provider during March 2000. This national program has been developed by the Australian Sports Commission as a quality elevation and assurance program for sporting associations and clubs. The process of attaining Provider Status includes a self-assessment audit which was conducted by the Lacrosse Australia Board.

7. NEW ZEALAND:

Communications have been established with Mark Freemon in Auckland, New Zealand. Mark is planning to re-establish lacrosse in New Zealand and has taken pro-active steps to set up four clubs and a competition which he hopes will get underway in November 2000.

A donation of equipment to encourage and assist this development has been made by Lacrosse Australia and further support has been indicated through the International Lacrosse Federation. Progress reports are being provided to the ILF and it is hoped that New Zealand will take a team to the 2002 World Championships in Perth.

After ten years as a member of the ALC Board of Directors the time has come for me to stand aside. I have greatly enjoyed the work as Development Director and a term as President. It would please me no end to be able to report vibrant lacrosse Associations, clubs and competitions in the States which have been re-introduced to lacrosse in the past decade. Our numbers still remain relatively small in Queensland, New South Wales and Tasmania but we have a significant foothold and I look to the future to see this consolidated and expanded.

I have ongoing admiration for the quality and enthusiastic professional input made by my colleagues on the Lacrosse Australia Board. Thank you Malcolm, Peter, Leighton, Mavis, Graeme, Helen and, of course, the late George Tillotson.

My thanks also to Rex Wigney, Matt Duryea, Robin Weckert and Helen Markham who have assisted my role as employed officers during the past eight years and to all of the committed State Association personnel who I have had the pleasure of working with. I leave the Board but intend to continue to contribute to the advancement of our sport. Best wishes to all incoming Directors.

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1. COACHING

1.1 NATIONAL COACHING BODY

A Coaches Forum organised by the ALC Ltd was held in February 2000 in Melbourne and attended by 24 coaches from SA, Vic and WA.

Using facilitated discussion a framework of intent and operation was decided upon so that the National Coaching Body could proceed in 2000. However the framework will need to be refined and formalised as a Charter of Operations or Constitution and the formal name to be used will be decided as a result of a foundation meeting.

The primary outcome of the Forum was the unanimous decision by those attending - to establish a National Coaching Body.

1.2 General purpose of the National Coaching Body

To bring about continued improvement in the standard of lacrosse coaching in Australia and to act as an advisory body to the ALC Ltd in matters relating to play of the game.

To further develop the sport of lacrosse in the context of Australian conditions and promote a core set of values to advance the sport of lacrosse at all levels of its development.

The core values are for the members to be: committed; informed; innovative; cooperative; and ethical.

1.3 Functions

To make recommendations to the governing body of the ALC Ltd and provide a forum for the exchange of information, resources, skills and knowledge.

To foster various kinds of communication amongst coaches of men's lacrosse, such as:

formal State representation informal coaches forums review processes (such as review after National Championships) electronic communication coach education processes

To monitor the process of coach education and accreditation.

To maintain a national register of coaches of men's lacrosse.

To embrace the ongoing development of a code of ethics and conduct for coaches of men's lacrosse.

To develop strategies to advance the career pathway of coaches.

1.4 Notes

The National Coaching Body (NCB) to be affiliated to the ALC Ltd.

The ALC Ltd National director of Coaching will act as the National Convenor but will not have voting status on the NCB.

The Chairperson of the NCB will not be the National Convenor but elected from and by the State representatives.

The Chairperson will be rotated on a State basis.

Western Australia, South Australia and Victoria will each have 2 representatives with voting status on the NCB. The other States, currently at development levels, such as Tasmania, Queensland and New South Wales will each have 1 representative without voting status on the NCB.

The concept of the NBC should receive endorsement from the relevant State governing bodies.

It is envisaged that at a State level the respective State Director of Coaching will act as a State Convenor of a Coaches Association to facilitate meetings of coaches and the election of State representatives to the NCB.

It remains to be seen what the participants do with the outcomes.

1.5 Australian Coaching Council

Our new contact with the ACC is Mr Warwick Povey. He has informed us that under the Terms and Conditions of our agreement with the Australian Sports Commission dated November 1999 it is necessary for us to have all registered coaches sign The Code of Ethics adopted by us last year. It will be necessary for us to have a number of 'the Ethics' printed incorporating the ACC, ASC and ALC logos.

2. OFFICIATING

With the development of Lacrosse in Townsville and the allocation of the under 15's to QLA in 2001 the ALC co-opted the assistance of ex WA ref Patrick Brennan to conduct a referee training course in Townsville and I conducted a similar course in Brisbane.

In all 18 participants took part, 14 of these achieved pass standard.

Referee in Chief Lindsay Scott and I attended the 2nd National Convention for Elite Officials in Sydney. Director of the National Officiating Program (NOP), Sean Scott confirmed approval of our Core materials for Referee Accreditation.

Lindsay Scott attended the European Games in Glasgow this year and assisted Graham Lester from the UK as Referee in Chief. Prior to the games he participated in the first ILF Technical Committee as Australia's representative. He was also formally appointed as Referee in Chief for the Senior World games in Perth in 2002.

Once again I must thank Lindsay for his valuable contributions throughout the year and also Peter Noble SA whose yearly reports on ALRA SA are exceptional in their content and clarity.

I have pleasure in reporting to Members of the Australian Lacrosse Council at this the 69th Annual General Meeting. Throughout the year I have endeavoured to promote the sport of lacrosse and the following items are a brief account of areas that I have concentrated upon.

1. Lacrosse Australia Directory

This publication includes contact details of personnel within State Associations, Clubs, Lacrosse Australia Directors / Office bearers and affiliated bodies. My thanks to those who provide information. The document includes a calendar of events and school term dates for 2000-2002. It is distributed widely to facilitate communication, and is included on the Lacrosse Australia web site.

2. Awards

To ensure lacrosse nominees are submitted for sports awards, Lacrosse Australia Board Members have worked cooperatively with Member States. These nominations include:

2.1 Sport Australia Hall of Fame

The induction of Brian Griffin into the Sport Australia Hall of Fame on November 24, 1999 in a glittering ceremony in Melbourne was a deserving accolade for Brian and the sport of lacrosse. Lacrosse stalwarts and son Scot accompanied Brian to honour such a prestigious occasion. His selection was the culmination of a process by Lacrosse Australia inviting clubs and State Associations to nominate potential candidates. Congratulations to Brian Griffin who joins fellow lacrosse inductee, John Butkiewcz.

2.2 Australian Sports Medal

At the invitation of the Federal Government, Lacrosse Australia has submitted lacrosse nominees for the Australian Sports Medal. The award recognises persons who have made a contribution to Australian sport and is to be awarded in the year 2000. At this stage details are still embargoed.

3. Licensing Agreement

It is pleasing to report the renewal of our international licensing agreement for a further three-year term. Whilst the optimism of an upturn in the Japanese economy has not materialised, and the full contract value has yet be reinstated, the value of the contract to lacrosse is significant. The continued lacrosse development that is occurring in Japan and Southeast Asia is beneficial to this contract.

4. Web Site

Thanks to Leighton Beamsley and Web Master, Barrie Moore, our web site is constantly maintained and upgraded and serves as an important communication tool.

5. Lacrosse Resources

Promotional material "Get Into The Action" leaflets are currently being printed. These, together with "The Name of The Game" pamphlets printed at the end of last year, are available to support lacrosse development.

6. Lacrosse Australia Certificate of Merit

A new style Lacrosse Australia Certificate of Merit has been produced this year in keeping with the Lacrosse Australia Business Plan to constantly review and improve the image of lacrosse.

7. Australian Lacrosse Journal

Two issues (December 1999 and August 2000) of the Australian Lacrosse Journal have been produced since the last annual report with the next issue due for distribution in December. Since its inception in 1997 a total of 11 issues have been produced - three per year in each of the first three years and two in 2000 - with distribution to media, universities, colleges, libraries etc, as well as the lacrosse fraternity.

However, changes have occurred throughout the year and the future of the Journal is in doubt. This is unfortunate, as it does not reflect the opinions expressed by lacrosseurs to the questionnaire distributed in Issue 8, responding overwhelmingly in favour of the Journal.

Those changes include the appointment of the new editor, Tracie Spicer, who has an extensive sports media background; a new format with greater appeal to the younger reader; "Rising Star" features; and additional colour pages etc. These changes are all part of the proposal entitled "Take the Next Step" which was distributed to State Associations, seeking their continued support in subscribing their registered members. Whilst SA and WA State bodies accepted the proposal, which included a small subscription increase of \$2 per annum (from \$10 - \$12) for three issues, Victoria did not. Consequently, two issues only will be produced in 2000.

I am firmly of the opinion that the Journal is a most worthwhile lacrosse publication, having nowhere near reached its full potential, and I will be disappointed if it ceases. However, the Lacrosse Australia Board whilst committed to the Journal, must in the final analysis assess the Journal along strict criteria, as it does all projects that come before it.

It is appropriate for me at this time to thank retiring Director and editor, Malcolm Stokes, for his enormous contribution to Lacrosse Australia over many years, and in particular the support he has given me in establishing the Journal and making it happen over the first three years.

I also take this opportunity to record my appreciation of the work undertaken by retiring Director, Doug Fox and to fellow Board Members for their support and encouragement.

May the Spirit of Lacrosse continue.

DIRECTOR OF SPECIAL PROJECTS

Malcolm Stokes

My continued desire to make a contribution to lacrosse in Australia led to my nomination for another term as a Director of Lacrosse Australia from November 1999. However I decided in April 2000 that my efforts would be better focussed in the Australian Team Executive Director position and that is where most of my efforts have been directed from my appointment in May 2000 till my resignation as a Lacrosse Australia Director from 30 September 2000.

1. World Lacrosse League

Active Marketing Managing Director Jim McKay attended the November 1999 meeting of the Board and reported on the state of televised sport and the status of the World Lacrosse League project. He emphasised the need to provide protection for the WLL project by way of ensuring that the best players are available to play in that competition. The Lacrosse Australia Board developed strategies to have this adopted by ILF, firstly by circulating a paper "Protecting Lacrosse", and arranging a postal ballot of ILF members on the issue. When this was not supported ILF Rule changes were proposed and discussed at the August 2000 ILF meeting, but again failed to win support.

The USA Major Lacrosse League (MLL) project has now progressed and I believe it is unlikely that the WLL project will be able to compete with it. However Active Marketing are the appointed agents of Lacrosse Australia and ILF until 30 June 2001, and it is an unpredictable marketplace.

2. Gain and Retain

My first priority was to develop methodologies to enable accurate data to be collected. This is required to identify where, and what size, our player numbers strengths and weaknesses really are, and what are the causes of them. The Player Statistical Model was too complex and I have not been able to convert it to a computer program which would simplify the use of such a model.

A Participation Statistical Report was designed in an effort to provide better information about different competitions being conducted in each State but this also was complex and not implemented.

An Incentive Scheme to reward specific growth factors was also designed but depends on the accuracy of reported numbers and again was not implemented. I have obtained copies of research conducted by other sport organisations which may have some transfer value for lacrosse.

One strategy which is available at national, State and Club level is the "Active Australia" program which does offer some guidance to organisations which are prepared to apply themselves honestly to the self evaluation process involved.

Resigning my position is a loss to me for I have enjoyed the support and friendship of many people in the seventeen years I have been privileged to serve as a Delegate and Director. The fact that Lacrosse Australia enjoys a well deserved reputation as one of the best managed national sport associations is a credit to all those people. I am comforted in my belief that those who continue to provide the direction for lacrosse in Australia by serving on the Lacrosse Australia Board will continue the process of constant improvement which has served us well.

My thanks and best wishes to all my colleagues on the Lacrosse Australia Board.

INTERNATIONAL LACROSSE FEDERATION

Lacrosse Australia has been a major influence in the changing face of the International Lacrosse Federation over the past ten years.

We do much more than send two delegates to meetings of the International Lacrosse Federation (ILF).

As a member of the ILF Development Committee Lacrosse Australia, represented by Peter Hobbs, has been a major influence in the 100% increase in ILF membership from 6 members in 1990 to 12 members in 2000.

As Convenor of the ILF Constitution and Rules Committee, Lacrosse Australia has re-written the ILF Constitution, which was accepted in 1994, and coordinated or proposed regular changes to improve the management of international lacrosse. This role has been expanded to encompass playing rules.

Lacrosse Australia enabled me to attend the August 2000 meeting of the ILF where we proposed a raft of changes covering issues such as categories of membership, nominations for elected positions, introduction of a Vice President position and Executive Committee, sanctioning of ILF events and changes to ILF Championship Rules which were primarily derived from recommendations of the 1999 World Under 19 Championships Organising Committee.

Not all proposed changes were accepted, but ILF is improved by those proposals which were adopted.

Lacrosse Australia also considered and provided responses to playing rule changes proposed by USA, which were defeated, and also developed a more acceptable game schedule for the 2002 World Championships than a proposal recommended by Championships Convenor Ron Balls of England.

In 1992 Lacrosse Australia supported the entry of the Czech Republic into ILF membership by paying their Affiliation Fees and it was an excellent demonstration of the spirit of international lacrosse to see the entry of Korea into ILF membership supported in the same way. It also reflects credit on Lacrosse Australia to have recognised the good work done by ILF President Tom Hayes by nominating him for his fourth, and last, term as ILF President.

EDITOR - AUSTRALIAN LACROSSE JOURNAL

My three year term as Editor of the Australian Lacrosse Journal was finalised after publication of Issue 9 in December 1999 and the collation of the Readership Survey Results which produced very positive results.

I recognised the need for editorial change and fully supported Director of Media, Marketing and Promotions Mavis Owens in contracting the editorial role to a commercial organisation.

The decision of the Victorian Lacrosse Association to reject the proposal for a further 3 year subscription for their membership was a disservice to their members and to lacrosse in Australia.

I congratulate Mavis on the publication of two issues in 2000 and believe that the publication of the Journal should be adopted as a national project with publication costs included in Lacrosse Australia membership fees for all States - thus removing any financial rational for any State not to subscribe.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR AUSTRALIAN LACROSSE TEAM

Appointments have been made to the positions of Coach (John Denic) and Assistant Coach (Ken Nichols). Selection processes are still in progress for various other Team coaching and management positions. A squad of 83 players has been selected to be invited to join a Squad from which the team to compete in the 2002 World Lacrosse Championships will be selected.

A Business Plan has been developed and is being continually updated as decisions on personnel, program, budget etc are taken.

1. GENERAL.

This has been my first year in the position and the activities have given me a great deal of pleasure and an insight into the work of the national body.

2. INTERSTATE CLEARANCES.

There have been five clearances during 2000:-

The process of clearances has been rather messy so I have designed a new form which has been approved by the Board, to allow for a system using the fax, which is how most clearances are done these days. These will be distributed soon.

3. ISAACHSEN TROPHY.

The Trophy was won this year by Darren Nicholas of the Eltham Club in Victoria with Peter Inge of Woodville Club in South Australia a close runner up.

4. 19th FELLOWS AWARD (1999).

The choice of Doug Fox for this highest Australian lacrosse award was a very popular one. His playing career began at Camberwell in 1954 and saw him play at Club, State and Australian level, including Australian Captain in 1968, 1970, and the 1974 World Series in Melbourne.

He coached at Junior and Senior Club level and as an Administrator has been on Club and State level committees and has been a Director on the Australian Lacrosse Council since 1990. His recent achievements have seen the development of Lacrosse in Queensland and further activities in N.S.W. and Tasmania. His assistance to New Zealand may well result in the game being played there in the near future.

INTERNATIONAL LACROSSE FEDERATION

Leighton Beamsley

The International Lacrosse Federation met in Glasgow in July/August during the European Championships. With a full attendance from delegates of all nations, the meeting was a very successful one for international Lacrosse.

The countries represented were United States, Canada, Australia, England, Iroquois Nationals, Japan, Czech Republic, Sweden, Scotland, Germany and Wales.

The meetings were Chaired by President Tom Hayes and assisted by Secretary John Phillips and were preceded by meetings during the preceding months of various Sub-Committees of the organisation including Sub-Committees on which Australians sit. They being the Constitution/By Laws Committee and the Development Committee.

Many constitutional and by-law rule changes were placed before the ILF at this meeting, but in the final resolve, very few of these motions actually passed with the majority needed to carry them.

The ILF considered an Application for Membership from South Korea and resolved unanimously that South Korea would be introduced as the twelfth and newest member of the ILF.

It should be noted that the ILF has its own Website which provides considerable information in relation to the activities of the ILF in world lacrosse. The Website address is **www.intlaxfed.org**

The ILF was very warm in their congratulations in relation to the conduct of the Under 19 World Series in Adelaide and was pleased to receive a Report from the Organising Committee of the World Series in Perth. They continue to look forward to future World Series.

Of concern was the fact that no tender had been received for the next Under 19 World Series to be held in either 2003 or 2004, although the possibility exists that the United States may still yet tender. Lacrosse Australia members should examine this as a possibility for Australia to again act as host.

Of particular note was the Report from the Technical Committee, Chaired by Stan Cockerton of Canada and it was noted that this Committee had been particularly active in establishing their plans for the future of the Technical Committee, particularly as regards to the collating production and distribution of technical detail for the purpose of promoting and coaching our sport. They also request offers from Australian coaches to assist in developing nations in Europe and Asia.

DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

Two days prior to the ILF Committee Meeting, Peter Hobbs attended the Development Committee Sub-Committee meetings Chaired by Steve Stenerson of the United States. This Committee has been very active in recent years in the introduction of Lacrosse to new countries and this year was no exception. It was attended by four members of the IFWLA, together with six members of the ILF and its member countries.

The Development Committee considered various Grant Applications and requests from developing nations and in the final decision resolved subject to ILF approval, that distributions of equipment would be made to Korea, China, New Zealand, Argentina, Holland and in addition, coaching and umpiring assistance would be provided to China, Korea, Germany and Czech Republic. In addition, England will be providing equipment to Italy. Japan continues to support both with coaching and equipment, China and Korea and is now targeting additionally, the Philippines and Vietnam.

Japan intends to host a Pan-Pacific Championship which would involve an Australian youth team, probably in the year 2004.

The Development Committee has hitherto conducted its meetings with members from the International Lacrosse Federation with invitees from the IFWLA. The Committee in resolution determined to formalise an arrangement of merging the Development Committee with the development activities of the IFWLA and resolved the composition of that Committee with the arrangement subsequently being recommended to and approved by subject to amendment, the ILF.

The Development Committee continues to be a strong Committee of the ILF, being a Committee which has been substantially responsible for the success achieved in the development of Lacrosse internationally.

WORLD SERIES 2002

The ILF fully expect that Perth will see the participation of 11 nations, with additional participation from Korea in appropriately arranged development matches. Some anticipation exists for representatives from China, Argentina and New Zealand to visit without the expectation of full participating teams.
