PREMIERSHIP AND INTERSTATE RESULTS.

The Hon. Records Secretary has again compiled a most comprehensive and detailed report of all team results and the performances of individual players.

The time and care which Mr. Sterck devotes to his duties has provided the Association with a valuable record over many years, and on your behalf I would like to convey to him our sincere thanks and appreciation.

COMMITTEE MEETINGS.

The General Committee met on three occasions throughout the year, and the Executive Committee on fourteen occasions.

PERMIT COMMITTEE.

The work of this body is taken so much as a matter of course that members probably have little appreciation of the time devoted to this part of our activities. The following information will indicate the constant attention which the Permit Committee gave to its duties during 1961.

During a period of 4½ months, it dealt with over 100 permit applications - 8 Interstate, 26 Interclub and 69 Intersection or Inter-team. It met weekly on 21 occasions, and in addition conferred by telephone whenever additional information was required or the records had to be further checked. Each application had to be registered for future reference, and the Committee's findings typed, circulated to other Officers, and posted on the notice board.

As well as permit duties, the Committee is responsible for the allocation of referees each week, which again requires considerable paper work and telephone contact.

The proper conduct of the game depends to a great extent on the work of the Permit Committee, and we should be duly appreciative of the manner in which they have carried out their duties. Special thanks are due to Mr. Reg Ponton, who this year undertook the job of Permit Committee Secretary in addition to his other work as Assistant Secretary of the Association.

REFEREES.

In last year's report, I drew attention to the dearth of referees, and particularly to the position in the junior sections. There has been no noticeable improvement this season, and your Executive has recently expressed its grave concern on the question of referees for 1962.

The provision of competent referees should be of vital interest to every official and player, yet we find little if any effort being made by Clubs to obtain the services of retiring players.

Most Clubs are aware of the very unsatisfactory state of refereeing which existed this year in practically every grade except "A" section, and I wish to make it clear that on present indications the position in 1962 may be appreciably worse.

TELEPHONE SCORES.

Through the courtesy of Mr. J. Daw, assisted by Mr. Sterck, the weekly scores have been passed on to the Press as in previous years. Thank you, Jim and Bert.

PUBLICITY.

I feel there has been a considerable improvement in publicity over that of the previous year, and that we have had a very fair share of the space and time made available to the amateur sports.

On your behalf, I extend our sincere thanks for publicity given by Press, radio and television:-

The Sporting Editor and Mr. Ken Knox of the "Age" for the mid-week reviews and match results on Mondays. In addition to these regular items, Mr. Knox on several occasions gave a most interesting and informative "write-up" on some of our leading players.

The Sporting Editor, the "Sun".

Mr. Ken Dakin, A.B.C. Sporting Supervisor, for the telecast of the Malvern .v. Caulfield match on 27th May. This was the first and only "live" telecast of lacrosse in Australia, and was most capably handled by Mr. John Markham (producer) and Messrs. Bob Bower and Bill Tickner (commentators).

Messrs. Percy Taylor and Noel Bailey, also of the A.B.C., for their lacrosse news in 3AR's "Sporting Highlights" on numerous occasions during the season. An interview with Noel Jeffrey, conducted by Bob Bower, was also broadcast from 3AR.

The News Editor, A.B.C., for the film "Lacrosse Booms Again", telecast twice from ABV2 in their evening news, which covered the game at Salvation Army Boys' Home, University High School, and the Interstate Trials. The A.B.C. very kindly arranged for us to obtain a copy of the film, which will be a valuable addition to our records.

Mr. Ken McPhail, whose midday session over 3XY on Saturdays was most helpful in keeping supporters informed of the afternoon's fixtures.

Mr. Tony Charlton and GTV9 for their film coverage of the Senior Interstate Match.

SPECIAL EFFORT.

I feel that words cannot adequately express our admiration for the work which Mr. Noel Jeffrey continues to do to assist the game in this State. His success this year in raising over £5000 towards the American visit brings the total of his efforts since 1955 to over £10,000, and is

He has proved over the years that his ideas on fund raising are practicable as well as profitable. The support given by Clubs and players has in the main been most commendable, but the interest and co-operation of the remainder is necessary if we are to expect Noel to undertake further efforts on our behalf.

This proposal received a considerable set-back when at the A.L.C. meeting on 6th November, S.A.L.A. withdrew its entire support.

Your Executive called a meeting immediately and also convened a meeting of the players who had indicated their ability to go. As a result of these meetings, it was felt that it was still possible to carry on with a U.S.A. visit providing a reasonable measure of support was available from W.A.L.A. This view was confirmed by the General Committee on 30th November, and your President and I have since been in close contact with Perth by telephone.

W.A.L.A. has promised to give a firm decision by 7th December, and in the meantime Mr. Jeffrey and a Finance Committee have been very active in raising further funds.

Clubs will be aware, through their Delegates, of the position as it existed at the Committee Meeting last Thursday, and there is no need to deal with it at length in this report. The President will, I am sure, wish to inform you this evening of his views on the proposal, and I trust you will give close attention to his remarks and support your Association in its efforts to establish Lacrosse as an International sport.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS.

As in previous years, we have again had the unstinted support of our selectors, managers and coaches, whose duties absorbed much of their week-end time as well as attendance at mid-week training.

It is pleasing to record that the work of these gentlemen (Messrs. G. Smith, C. F. Lansbury, F. Hogarth, F. F. Durham, C. G. Middleton and C. P. Weatherill - Seniors, and Messrs. A. Pearson, T. Cheevers, E. Clough, H. E. Sterck and T. Allington - Juniors) culminated in Victoria defeating S.A. decisively in both matches. To them, and to the members of the respective teams, we offer our sincere congratulations.

Mr. Bob Coldstream, as President, again made his home available for a barbecue during the Interstate visit, and we are most grateful to him for the way in which he ensures the social success of these week-ends. We also express our thanks to Messrs. Durham and Sterck for the excellent dinner-parties which they organised for the Saturday night. Mr. O. G. Unkenstein has again acted as our Hon. Auditor, and we extend to him also our thanks for filling this

important office.

To Association Officers, Club officials and to all who assisted in many ways both on and off the field, we also tender our sincere thanks.

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VICTORIAN AMATEUR LACROSSE ASSOCIATION HON. RECORD SECRETARY'S REPORT FOR SEASON 1961

Gentlemen,

The 1961 Lacrosse season saw the formation of the Footscray Technical School Old Boys Lacrosse Club, Victoria's first Bob Symonds Cup win since 1956, Caulfield's second successive "A" section Premiership and the first direct Telecast of Lacrosse in Victoria.

Registrations rose by 29 and the number of teams entered and who completed the season exceeded that of 1960 by one. The consolidation of the senior sections into three groups instead of four resulted in better competition and the three junior sections continued the good work of last season. For the first time in the History of Lacrosse (war years excepted) more junior players were registered than seniors. Junior treams outnumbered senior teams by one.

Although Caulfield, M.C.C. and Coburg's registrations have tended to slip over the last three years.

Influx of junior players through the establishment of new Clubs coupled with increases by Malvern, and Surrey Park has more than offset these losses. M.C.C. proved to be the main supplier of over-age players to the new Footscray Club, transferring seven players.

A further break-down of these figures reveal the number of regular and irregular players with each Club. Both the regular players and those who did not play at all were higher than last season. The irregular players showed a decline.

FINAL COMPETITION RESULTS

"A" SECTION.

The "A" section consisted of ten teams as against 6 teams last year. Caulfield, Malvern and Williamstown added a second team each and Surrey Park and University rejoined "A" section ranks for the first time since 1957. Coburg withdrew to "B" section. Following the reconstruction of this section the competition improved to the extent of at least one good match every Saturday. Malvern and Caulfield were well ahead of the rest and Williamstown earned the distinction of having both teams in the Semi-Finals. M.H.S.O.B. put up an improved showing over last season and made a last minute bid to enter the finals. They eventually finished fifth.

Caulfield and Malvern staged two closely fought matches in the home and home series. Each won one match by the narrow margin of one goal. Caulfield then won the semi-final by two goals and continued in winning vein by winning the Grand Final, Although Caulfield established a 7 goal to 0 lead early in the game Melvern fought back in the second and final quarters and just failed to catch Caulfield's lead. This gave Caulfield their second successive premiership. occasion Caulfield were in this position was in 1893/4.

The goalthrowing list was headed by Brian Griffin (Caulfield), who scored almost twice as many goals as his nearest rival. His tally of 122 goals was the highest scored in one season for several years.

The two Williamstown teams provided a thrilling semi-final when they drew. Although extra time was played they were still tied. Both Surrey Park and University showed promise of better things to come by finishing sixth and seventh respectively.

The "B" Section was also re-organised. The section consisted of Cambor-well-Glen Iris and M.C.C. from 1960, Coburg from "A", Williamstown Fearon, Malvern, Surrey Park and Caulfield from "C" and an extra team, Williamstown City. This gave an increase of one over last season. Unfortunately five walk-overs were recorded in this section.

Reg. Ratcliffe, Coburg headed the goalthrowing list with 101 goals and Eric Nicholls, C.G.I., was runner-up with 78 goals.

In a high scoring semi-final C.G.I. defeated Coburg by four goals and inflicted Coburg's first loss for the season. In the other semi-final Malvern gained a ten goal break and although Williamstown finished well they were unable to reach Malvern's tally.

Coburg found Malvern tough opposition in the preliminary final but with Reg Ratcliffo in top form Coburg won by two goals. The Grand Final proved a good match and although C.G.I. fought hard Coburg held an edge for most of the match and ran out comfortable winners. C.G.I., a younger team than in previous years, showed improvement and should be hard to beat next season.
