I submit for your approval the 64th Annual Report of the South Australian Lacrosse Association, covering the 1952 season.

OBITUARY.

During 1952 your Association suffered a sad loss in the death of Mr. Harold Rule. For 48 years Mr. Rule was actively associated with Lacrosse in Australia, as player, umpire and administrator, and was a Vice-President and Life-Member of this Association.

These figures show an increase of 10 teams and 76 players, and can be attributed mainly to the excellent work of the Junior and New Teams Committee, which, under the capable leadership of Don Hobbs, last season formed a new grade for Junior players.

The efforts of Mr. M.B. Selth with the assistance of Club Secretary Bernard Fowell enabled Goodwood to field two teams. This is most commendable, as the Goodwood Club only re-formed in 1951, after a lapse of nine years.

Jim. Harvey was primarily responsible for the formation of the new Burnside Lacrosse Club, and deserves the highest praise for his keenness. With the assistance of the Club Chairman (Ken Gellert) he gathered together a team of players, most of whom were new to the game. Ken Gellert acted as coach and also played a few games with the club. The team finished fifth in the "B" Grade competition, which speaks well of both players and organisers.

RESULTS.

Abbott Shield. - "A" Grade:-

After having been defeated in the final by Port Adelaide, East Torrens, as minor premiers, challenging and defeating Port Adelaide 13 - 9, retained the Abbott Shield. We offer this Club our congratulations.

Harold Rule Shield. - "B" Grade: Port Adelaide lost only one match in the minor round, to finish five points in front of Brighton, whom they defeated by 23 goals to 4 in the final.

Lance Parsons Cup. - "C" Grade: Matches in this grade were keenly played and only three points separated the first three teams at the end of the minor round, with Port Adelaide minor premiers. After being defeated 18 - 3 in the final, Port Adelaide challenged and defeated Sturt 23 - 12 in the challenge match.

Langdon Parsons Cup. - "D" Grade: Port Adelaide won their third minor premiership by defeating Sturt on percentage, and won their third premiership for the season, defeating Sturt 12 - 4 in the challenge final.

A.E. Harvey Shield. - "E" Grade. Brighton were undefeated in the minor and major rounds, and defeated Port Adelaide 23 - 10 in the final.

South Australia versus Western Australia in Perth. The South Australian team consisted of N. Parr (Captain), J. McCoy (Vice Capt.), R. Martin, T. Builder, D. Gomer, R. Clisby, P. Drew, J. Seekamp, P. Bulbeck, K. Richards, J. Harcourt and G. Higgs (Playing Manager). This team, with an average age of $22\frac{1}{2}$ years, played two matches against Western Australia and one against a combined Port side. ALTERATIONS
TO RULES OF
LACROSSE.

Interest for the 1952 season was centred on the alterations made to the playing rules by the Australian Lacrosse Council with a view to improving the game for players and spectators.

Playing ten a side on a smaller field had the effect of increasing the number of goals thrown per match and of making the play faster. The new rules regarding centre play were found to be a great improvement.

A special Committee Meeting, with A. Grade Captains present as guests, was convened at the conclusion of the season to discuss the alterations to rules. The opinion of the Committee was that the alterations were basically successful, but that a further season under the altered rules was necessary to form a definite opinion on the relative advantages or disadvantages. However, the Australian Lacrosse Council has seen fit to revert to teams of twelve a side, but has adopted the larger centre circle and the amended centre rules as played this season. We will await the result of this innovation with considerable interest.

FINANCE.

As can be seen by the statements of account, the financial position of the Association is in fair condition, and Mr. Schulz has done his usual excellent work as Treasurer.

REFEREES'
ASSOCIATION.

To those who officiated in an honorary capacity as referees during the season, we extend our sincere thanks for their interest, help and co-operation.

SOCIAL CLUB.

Lacrosse Ball. The Social Club once again organised an excellent Ball for members and it is regrettable that the number attending were less than in previous years. Bill Symonds, as Secretary-Treasurer, with his Committee, worked hard to arrange this first class function, and the success of the Ball was due to their efforts.

Queen Competition. A Queen Competition raised £215 for the Association and £212 for the Clubs. Miss Colleen Stock, the Sturt Club nominee, raised £100 and was crowned Miss Lacrosse for 1952, at the Ball. Most clubs participated in this Competition and benefited financially. The work of all those who helped to raise funds is worthy of the highest praise, as this method of obtaining funds will benefit our game and enable the Association to supply sticks free to schools and junior players.

PERMIT AND GRADING COMMITTEE

Mr. T.D. McCormick (Chairman), Messrs. O.C. Isaachsen, C.H. Schulz, J. Langdon Parsons, J.W. Gubbins and K.S. Christie-Ling. This Committee had a very difficult task to perform and faced added difficulties when some clubs forwarded exaggerated estimates of the numbers of probable players. Two C. grade teams were unfortunately withdrawn from the competition during the year, but very few forfeits were given in other grades. This speaks well of the grading.

COMPLAINTS COMMITTEE.

Mr. F. Lancelot Parsons (Chairman), Messrs. A.E. Harvey and A.C.Davis. This Committee met on two occasions and imposed penalties.

JUNIOR AND NEW TEAMS COMMITTEE.

The work of this Committee in building up Junior Lacrosse has been referred to elsewhere, but special mention must be made of the success of the Committee in starting the Technical Schools' mid-week competition again.

COMMITTEES.

In addition to the above, the By-Laws, Ovals, Selection and Programme Committees functioned during the year. The By-Laws Committee redrafted the By-Laws, bringing them up to date, and is in the process of revising the Constitution of this Association, a work of considerable magnitude.

The Ovals Committee investigated a number of probable playing fields but as yet has been unable to locate a playing area suitable for the Association to attempt to purchase as a home for Lacrosse in this State.

Two new ovals were obtained for play this season. Through the efforts of Fred Hansford and the East Torrens Club, we had the use of the Murray Park Oval every Saturday during the year, and we hope these arrangements will stand for some years to come.

We are also indebted to Ralph Anderson, of the West Torrens Club, who was instrumental in obtaining the use of a fine oval at the Thebarton Boys Technical School.

Messrs. R.G. Cathie, K.B. Roennfeldt and A.H. Taylor constituted the Selection Committee and were called upon to select no less than three Interstate teams during the season. Results have proven their selections.

Ray Cathie very capably formulated the Programme for the 1952 season.

GROUNDS.

The action of the Adelaide City Council in increasing ground fees from $\pounds l_0 l_0 0$. to £7.10.0. per season is to be deplored, and the Association was represented on a committee formed by amateur sporting bodies to appeal against the increase. The City Council has decided that a decrease of 20% of the 1952 fees will apply next season.

CROSSES.

Sticks manufactured locally have been used during the year with some success. Some of the first batch supplied were broken, and this, our stick Committee concedes, was due to lack of oil. Minor alterations to the shape of the frame have been made by the manufacturer to give greater strength to the crosse and, together with a longer period of oiling, should produce a first class stick.

Brian Nottage has produced a metal frame covered with rubber which has great possibilities, and we are waiting for two sticks to be finished and tested before allowing their use in match play.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS. I wish to thank my employer, Mr. J. Rolfe Sabine, for his generosity in allowing me to perform some of my secretarial duties in working hours and for making his staff available for Association work. I would have been unable to accept the position without this help.

I am extremely grateful to all officials, club secretaries and especially to our Chairman, of Committees, Mr. T.D. McCormick, and members of the Executive, for the help and guidance I have received during this my first year as Association secretary.

CONCLUSION.

The past year has seen a certain amount of progress in the Association, and it is to be hoped that this will continue in the coming season. If all players and officials co-operate for the good of Lacrosse, the 1953 Carnival Beason should be highly successful.
