After the excitement of the 1974 World Championships played in Melbourne it was thought that 1975 may well be an anti-climax with a rather quiet year at This has been far from the truth as in fact we have been through Council level. a very busy and eventful year.

A National Coaching Conference was held in Adelaide during March, when four top coaches from each State assembled in Adelaide. Each coach submitted a paper on an allotted subject, which was then discussed by the complete panel of coaches. The conference provided an excellent forum for an exchange of ideas both formally and informally, and we were particularly pleased when we were requested to provide a fyll report for inclusion in the publication "Sport" issued by the then Department of Tourism and Recreation.

The Colts Championships were held in Perth in July, and again provided an exciting spectacle of Lacrosse. Close matches and brilliant Lacrosse were the order of the day.

The Annual match played between Victoria and South Australia was staged in Hobart under the auspices of Council, but regrettably the weather conditions were atrocious and this was reflected in the attendance which was very poor. Suffice to say that all other sports were cancelled in Hobart on that day. On the other hand the game was telecast live through Tasmania, and replayed later on mainland States so the object of the exercise was achieved inasmuch as the game was presented to the Tasmanian public.

But the main activity has been the preparation of the 1976 tour of U. S. A., Canada and England with the International Tournament to be held in Canada in the first week of May. The setting up of itineraries, the selection of officials, the selection of players and the resultant myriad of detail has taken up many hours of time of those concerned.

During January we were favored by a visit from the President of the Canadian Lacrosse Association, Mr. Douglas Budden, and his wife, Pat. Whilst Mr. Budden was only able to visit Perth and Adelaide, we were able to have many hours of valuable discussion with him, and additionally were able to secure publicity It is very pleasing to note the new in the form of press and radio interviews. outlook of the Canadian Association as regards International competition in Field Lacrosse, although our Canadian friends are prepared to develop any form of Lacrosse be it field, box, indoor or "soft" lacrosse as a recreational activity. have formed an international squad of top players to take part not only in World Championships, but to visit all lacrosse playing countries as and when the opportunity arises.

AUSTRALIAN CHAMPIONSHIPS

As mentioned in the preamble, Colts Championships were conducted in South Australia were the winners of the Turnbull Shield, but full credit must be given to all competing teams for their performances as well as the often overlooked second team provided by the host State. The Western Australian Association carried out the organisational duties associated with the Championships in the manner that we have come to expect, and must again be congratulated on a very fine effort.

The Trophy for the Fairest & Best player of the Championships was won by Paul Lynch of South Australia.

STATE OF THE GAME

In dissecting statisticsit is possible to get many varying answers, and such is the case for 1975. The number of affiliated clubs remained constant, the number of participating teams remained constant, the number of playing grades remained constant, but in Victoria, we find quite a dramatic increase in the number of registered players, especially in the important junior ranks. We do tend to underline the importance of junior players in our sport, but we have still to find the right solution to the problem of keeping these juniors through their senior years. But overall, we can claim a 30% increase in numbers over the past five years and if this rate of progress can continue we will soon achieve our rightful place as a major "minor" sport. And in using the term minor sport I do this in the amateur context as opposed to the professional sports.

Each member association is becoming far more coaching conscious, and this is reflected in greater interest in the sport. There is much to be done in the field of coaching and coaching aids, but at least we are on the way.

One feature of the year that deserves special mention is the spread of premierships throughout clubs, particularly in South Australia and Victoria. In South Australia, it will be noted that no club won more than one premiership, and In Victoria the situation is almost likewise. In Western Australia the practice of competing for premierships in very junior grades was discontinued, and this feature will no doubt be the subject of much debate.

There is little doubt that assistance from the Australian Government has had considerable impact during the past two years, but at the time of writing this report we have no indication of the future. It would be a minor tragedy if south financial assistance to amateur sports were to be discontinued, but the game has survived for 100 years in Australia without this support, and I have little doubt that if needs be, then we will survive for another 100 years, Not only will we survive but we will continue to progress in a manner that will achieve distinction.

COUNCIL MEETINGS

Following upon the 43rd Annual general meeting, meetings were held in Perth during July, co-inciding with the National Colts Championships, and in Adelaide in October. The latter meeting was principally for the purpose of selection of the Australian team to tour in 1976, and to deal with matters relative to the tour.

INTERNATIONAL LACROSSE FEDERATION

There has been little activity on this scene, but with the advancement towards the 1978 World Championships in England, activity will undoubtedly increase.

ADMINIS, MATION

Whilst there is currently much emphasis on the need for coaching in all sports, and Lacrosse in particular, I am aware that there is also a crying need for administrators. Perhaps this could be construed as speaking from a vested interest, but I can claim to have a rather close observation of the difficulties experienced by each of our member Associations. Each in their turn have their peculiar problems which will be eventually solved, but we certainly lack the close contact and rapporte that is so necessary.

There is a distinct lack of people coming forward to assist in the field of administration right down to the grass roots level of Club lacrosse. How often to we find the mere one or two overworked volunteers keeping clubs alive. But of equal importance to numbers, we require the skills of persons who have a conscience—the desire to get the job at hand done in an efficient and capable manner.

I find that each State Association is administered in a completely different manner, and many hours of debate could be conducted on the merits and demerits of each system. But all do need to work closely together in harmony with the common objective of achieving the end result. Too often do we find envy and jealousy rearing their ugly head, and success will not be enjoyed whilst this is the case. Certainly we must have rivalry — this is the core of any sport, but rivalry kept within reasonable bounds.

In recent years I have labored at length on the subject of comminucation. In some areas I can see rays of sunshine as personnel changes and I am quietly confident of an improvement in this all too important area.

GENERAL

This report could not be concluded without reference to the many members of Council who have so willingly given of their services during the past year. It is not widely known that all Council Officers are completely voluntary — their reward is the satisfaction of a job well done.

To our President, Mr. Ivor Wiles, may I say a generous thank you for the able support given to me on those many occasions when I have really needed support. Your leadership has not only been appreciated by me, I am sure you have a wide and general commendation.
