Gentlemen,

Another playing season has been successfully completed, and tonight we see the appointment of the office-bearers and other officials who will steer us through the 1978 season. This incidently will be the 100th year of the V.A.L.A.'s existence, the Association having been founded in 1879.

After perusing the excellent and comprehensive Annual Report compiled by our secretary I feel I can make this address briefer than usual.

I should however like to add my congratulations to all teams, clubs and members who have achieved successes or awards during 1977. All are specifically named in the Annual Report. It was pleasing to see that seven clubs shared premiership honours in our Saturday competition, while six clubs shared the six penmants awarded for wins in the successful Gymkhana held on the Queen's birthday for under-age teams.

I endorse my secretary's words of thanks to the numerous officials and members who have been responsible for the actual functioning of the Association - these include the members of our several sub-committees, coaches, team managers, referees and many others who give unselfishly of their time and talents for the good of lacrosse. These too are named in the body of the report.

1978 will undoubtedly be an interesting and important year for lacrosse not only in Victoria, but also Australia, for, as you know, we shall be sending two Australian teams overseas. One goes to Manchester to represent Australia in the third World Championship Series while the second - the first Australian Bo. Lacrosse Team - will travel to Canada, primarily to play an exhibition game against that country during the Commonwealth Games of 1978.

The V.A.L.A. can be justly proud that five of the officials connected with the Championship Series are Victorians, and that the Australian Lacrosse Council has entrusted all arrangements for the Box Lacrosse tour to a sub-committee appointed by the Management Committee of the V.A.L.A.

A few lines now about our games in Victoria. In 1974 a Committee of Advice consisting of eight members prominent in the several areas associated with lacrosse e. g. administration, team grading, publicity, coaching, refereeing etc. met to discuss the problems facing lacrosse in our State. Their recommendations were carefully considered and thought provoking and with several minor exceptions were endorsed by meetings of club representatives who examined them.

It is generally agreed, I suggest, that the recommendations of the Committee have improved the game in Victoria, notably in the strengthening of a number of the smaller clubs, several of which have now reached A section status and has thereby fulfilled one of the aims of the Committee of Advice, namely A and B sections with second teams from the one Club not permitted. Next year we shall have an A section of nine if not ten clubs. Other notable advances are the now firmly established Under 19 section and our magazine "Lacrosse".

The Committee of Advice is again being called together this summer to examine our game and to make further recommendations for the expansion and improvement of our game. They will have many matters to consider but I suggest that there are some four major items that need attention namely:

(a) The appointment of a full time administrator and the definition of his duties. The possibility of help from the Department of

Youth, Sport and Recreation to the tune of \$8,000 annually makes this a matter to be seriously considered.

- (b) A method of taking advantage of the recent interest in the game by a number of high and technical schools as the result of physical education teachers having been introduced to lacrosse during their qualification courses. This season our lacrosse kits have been requested and used by several such schools. The Association cannot afford to let this interest die if we hope to increase the numbers playing our game. One method of course would be for a near-by established club to adopt one of the schools. Such a move would surely pay dividends in the new players that would undoubtedly move to the club concerned at the end of their school years.
 - (c) A serious look at our efforts at promotion and publicity is undoubtedly called for. Compared with other sports, even very minor ones, our media coverage can only be regarded as very poor.
 - (d) And fourthly, something which has been in the minds of some of us since 1974, namely the establishment of new clubs. How this is to be accomplished calls for imaginative and positive thinking, and requires any suggested solution to have the support of senior and influential club officials who are prepared to consider the game of lacrosse before even the immediate interest of their clubs. In the long term both must benefit.

In conclusion I thank all associated with the management of the game for their continued support, and especially our very competent and dedicated secretary whose work, and valuable assistance is of untold value.

To all officials, players and their families I extend my very best wishes for the forthcoming festive season and for 1978.

On behalf of your Committee I take pleasure in submitting for your approval this 99th Annual Report covering the Association's activities during the 1977 season.

The Treasurer's Report and Financial Statements are attached together with detailed summary of the Tribunal's activities and reports of the two Record Secretaries.

1. ADMINISTRATION

(a) Management Committee

This Committee which maintains overall control over the Association's affairs, met ten times during the year on the regular night of 3rd Wednesday.

It has been stressed on many occasions and through numerous Annual Reports that this Committee is the main line of communication between Clubs and Administration and it is imperative that every Club has a delegate at each Management Committee meeting. During 1977 there was some improvement but delegates from some Clubs were irregular in attendance and others were absent for several consecutive meetings. This led to a resolution being passed that the Association's Rules be invoked and as a consequence, several clubs have been fined and the ultimate step of unseating a delegate was taken.

The Clubs themselves form the Association and in their own interests it is vital for each and every one of them to be represented at all meetings.

(b) Permit Committee

This Committee met every Tuesday during the season and it is a tribute to its members that they donate one complete lunch hour each week to Lacrosse work. Not everyone connected with lacrosse realises the volume of work that these gentlemen transact. Apart from dealing with permits and transfers as the title suggests, this Committee collates all match scores and reports, issues progress ladders during the year and deals with all extraneous matters which do not come within the scope of any specific subcommittee

It has been most noticeable this year that the number of fines imposed for late or non-lodgement of match reports shows no signs of decreasing. Match reports must be in the box at 14 McKillop St. by midday on Tuesday following the game. Failure to comply with this rule not only affects the finances of the Club concerned but increases the work of the Record Secretaries and, as everyone must realise, they have enough to do.

The Association again places on record its appreciation for the work of this Committee and in particular to Don Miller for his work as Permit Committee Secretary and the two Record Secretaries for the onerous tasks they perform.

(c) Tribunal

It is pleasing to report that the Tribunal was brought up to full complement during the year with the appointment of Mr. N.J.Gibbs in July.

Our appreciation once more is extended to Ed. Spreadborough for his most capable work as Tribunal Secretary and to the M.C.C. Club for the use of their rooms.

A detailed report on the Tribunal's activity for the year is attached.

(d) Visits Committee

This small but efficient group has had an extremely busy year. The hosting of South Australian and West Australian Colts teams and the South Australian Juniors all in the one week was no mean feat. This together with the many tasks involved in arranging Championships, required a massive amount of organisation and effort which often goes unnoticed in the glamour of the event itself. In all 52 billets had to be secured and other accommodation and transport arranged. The Association sincerely thanks the families who made their homes available to our visitors.

The Committee has also borne the brunt of fund-raising to date in connection with the coming World Series and assumed entire responsibility for the Presentation Ball.

A sincere 'thank you' to the three hard working members of the Committee and to those on whom they were able to call for assistance when needed.

(e) Weather Committee

It has been a long time since this Committee has been called into action but the incessint rain throughout June and its effect on many grounds necessitated a decision to cancel the round on July 2 for all sections.

(f) Match Committee

Team entries for 1977 were received in reasonable time to enable the Match Committee to undertake gradings and have fixtures for all sections printed and distributed at the start of the season.

It is not widely recognised nor appreciated how much work is undertaken over a very short period by members of this Committee and they are to be warmly congratulated on their pre-season preparations.

(g) Youth, Sport & Recreation

The Association's interests have been very capably handled by Doug Fox, our Liaison officer to the Department. There is currently an application before the Department for further assistance in the form of an additional promotional kit. Applications for assistance in other areas within the Department's guidelines have not yet been decided upon.

(h Amateur Sports Club

The Association wishes to place on record its appreciation to the Amateur Sports Club for making its facilities available throughout the year for meetings and on those special occasions when visiting teams were entertained.

Congratulations to Hob Jackson on winning the Sportsman of the Year award. This award is made by the Amateur Sports Club for each individual sport and is bestowed upon the recipient in recognition not only of playing ability, but for administrative, coaching and general contributions to his particular sport over a period of time. There is no doubt that Rob Jackson has given a lot to Lacrosse over many years and the honor is well deserved.

(i) Sports Council of Victoria

Our delegate, Les Goding, has been an active participant in the affairs of this body and during the year, Les was elected to the Council's Executive Committee. Congratulations Les, you are looking after a very important area of Lacrosse promotion in this position.

(j) Special Sub-Committees

There are many aspects of Lacrosse which need to be looked at again with a view to improving the overall status of the sport. It has been decided that the Committee of Advice will again be reconvened and consider the various suggestions which have been put forward by Clubs. This Committee will meet during the off-season and its recommendations will be placed before the Management Committee early in the New Year.

(k) Sponsorship

Whilst a few individual clubs have been fortunate enough to obtain sponsorship in some form or another, Mobil Australia Ltd. has made a very generous donation to the Association as a whole by supplying our annual requirement of score sheets. Thank you Mobil for this gesture, it is really appreciated.

(1) Grants of Assistance

Apart from the grant made to Tasmania (referred to in Section 3 (e)) of this report.) only one request for assistance was received from Clubs and an amount of \$200 was allocated from Association funds.

2. PLAYING ACTIVITIES

(a) Domestic

Eighteen home and away rounds were scheduled for 1977 season, one game being cancelled owing to the state of the grounds on July 2.

Williamstown again proved too strong for the opposition and won the senior flag. However a cliff-hanging Preliminary Final between Chadstone and Surrey Park, with the former getting into the grand final on a 17 - 16 result provided plenty of interest and is a pointer to more evenly contested competition in future years.

A new section (e2) was introduced for 1977 making eleven sections in all. Seven clubs shared the premierships which is another good indication for the future of the game. Congratulations to the winning teams and a special word of thanks to those non-playing, but hard working club members and supporters who form an integral part of any successful side.

Appreciation is also recorded for the work over the finals carried out by Roy Freeman and Michael Hilsberg, the Altona Club and the handful of helpers who cleaned up the grounds after the games. The final series resulted in a profit of approx. \$1000.

Visiting American Coach, Larry Storey, who played most of the season with Chadstone, conducted a coaching clinic at the Albert Ground on June 19. This excellent clinic and talk on modern American coaching methods deserved more than the poor attendance it received.

The Association extends appreciation to Jim and Bill Daw for donating the J.T. Daw Memorial Trophy for E1 Section in replacement of the T.L. Fullarton Shield which has been contested since 1960. The shield has no further space remaining and will be held in trust by the Association's Property Officer.

(b) Interstate

The Colts Championships were hosted by Victoria and held on the Albert Ground over 14th, 16th and 18th June. This normally excellent venue was subjected to continual rain before and during the Championships and deteriorated through overuse as the week progressed.

The West Australians were defeated 15 - 9 by South Austand 19 - 10 by Victoria on the first two days. The final game between Victoria and S.A. on which the Championship hinged was played in appalling conditions. Mud and slush covered most of the ground and the ever present rain made things difficult for the players and unpleasant for officials and spectators.

These conditions were handled a little better by the South Australian boys who clinched the game 12 - 9 to retain the Hickey Shield.

The President's team was defeated in all three games but was far from disgraced. Results were Vic. 25 d. Pres. 10, S.A. 21 d Pres. 9, W.A. 21 d Pres. 14. A special thank you to those players who made up the team, and the co-coaches Alan Datsun and Larry Story and Roy Freeman who acted as team manager.

The annual juniors match against South Australia was also held in Melbourne. Following immediately on the Colts Championships on June 19, the venue was switched from the Albert Ground to Caulfield outer where the playing surface was excellent. The weather was also kind and the game attracted a large number of spectators. This time our boys were far too strong and won convincingly 24 - 6 to regain the Carl Schulz cup.

Perth was the venue for the Senior Championships over 12th, 14th and 16th July.

In an evenly fought game during which the lead changed several times, the South Aussies finally got on top to take the opening round against Victoria 17 - 15. The Victorians defeated V.A. confortably in the second round 22 - 14 but the writing was on the wall. In the final game South Aust. kept W.A. scoreless for the entire second half and went on to a well deserved victory, 20 - 7 to take out the Championship.

Thanks to all team managers and coaches for a job well done and to all the players who tried so hard. A special mention is warranted regarding the excellent arrangements for Perth made by Senior Team Manager, Bob Stahmer and the way he solved all the minor problems which inevitably occur during an interstate visit.

(c) Gymkhana

This special day for Junior Lacrosse was once more organised and hosted by the Glenroy Club, being held on 13th June. Several rule changes were made to the six-a-side game which proved beneficial. Results were:-

It was largely due to this innovation that capdrinking was non-existent and the spectators were able to enjoy the day's Lacrosse without the unpleasantness that sometimes occurs when cans are consumed in their midst.

Congratulations Glenroy! A very well organised event.

(d) Fairest and Best Player Award

(e) Referees Association

Our Referees are now stronger numerically at 13 than they have been for many years. Ken Read and Maurie Aitken joined the ranks of the regulars this year and there have been no retirements. When we can double this number and allocate an official Referee to each game, Lacrosse will have made it!

More permanent Referees are needed and the Referees Association will arrange practical training, coaching and supervision for anyone willing to take on this important and rewarding occupation.

Appreciations go to those players who during the year have taken up the whistle on the days of their team bye and allowed 32 other players to have a game. Thanks also to John Gunn and Don Miller for taking the responsibility of allocating Referees for all home and away games during the year.

The Referees have had the benefit of Terry Allington's observations and advice throughout the year and this has proved most beneficial. Thank you Terry for looking after a most important aspect of the game in addition to the many other duties you perform for Lacrosse.

(f) Box Lacrosse

For the fourth consecutive season Box Lacrosse was played as a summer competition at the Fearon Reserve, Williamstown. Two floodlit playing areas were available and the season commenced in late October through December; of 1976. Six teams played 10 matches with a knock-out lightning premiership being played at the conclusion of each half of the season.

At the end of the first round of matches Dolphins were on top of the premiership ladder. The second half of the competition was played from February through March of 1977 and the eventual overall winner of the "Jack Hodges Perpetual Trophy" was the Dolphins.

(g) International Competition

There was no activity on the international scene this year but 1978 should be a memorable one for Lacrosse when two Australian teams will depart for different parts of the globe.

The World Series will be contested in Manchester, England during the first week of July and Victoria has a large representation in the training squad from which the team will be selected. We wish the team every success and those supporters who are going good voice with their cheering.

On August 11 in Edmonton, Canada, Lacrosse is making its first ever appearance at a Commonwealth Games when Box Lacrosse is to be the demonstration sport. Australia has been invited to participate and a team of Box players will leave at the end of July to play several games in Vancouver prior to meeting a Canadian side in the Commonwealth Games event.

3. GENERAL

(a) Australian Lacrosse Council

The A.L.C. has continued to be very active following the busy period of 1976. At the completion of the Senior Championships in Perth selection of officials for the World Series was carried out and we are pleased to record the following Victorians have been successful.

Publicity is an area that requires considerable thought and planning and should be a priority subject for the Committee of Advice. With two Australian teams leaving the country next year there is plenty of material for Sports Editors if only we can get through to them.

(c) Magazine

Terry Allington has done a stirling job in keeping "Lacrosse" rolling. However, Terry has hardly been an Editor in the true sense. It is only when contributions are too numerous for publication that an "editor" is required and I an sure Terry will agree that "editing" has not been any problem. Let's have it Clubs in 1978 - send in all your information whether you think it is worthwhile or not and leave it up to the Editor.

Thanks again Sue Fox for preparing the magazine for publication and the members of Melbourne University Club for its distribution.

(d) Presentation Ball

Arrangements this year were handled by the Visits Committee and any proceeds will be applied towards financing the World Series team.

As in the past a good band, good meal and ample refreshments paved the way for a tremendous night. Attendance was 370 which was a disappointment compared with last year. There is a lot of room in the Royale Ballroom for a larger number next year. Those members who have not been to one of these nights know not what they have missed!

Formalities were again kept to a minimum but, at some tables, the match replays seemed to take up a lot of time.

(e) Promotion

Early in 1977, Peter Lane from the C.G.I. club took up residence in Hobart and immediately set about reviving the game there. The V.A.L.A. allocated \$1000 worth of equipment to the newly formed Tasmanian Association. This equipment is on loan for two years after which time it becomes the property of the Tasmanian Association provided active competition is still current. We have to report that there is an active competition and a few Lacrosse stalwarts have gathered around to keep the game expanding.

The Glenroy and C.G.I. Clubs visited Hobart at end of the current season 'n play an exhibition game and help stimulate interest. The Glenroy Women's team also made the trip and played against a team from Hobart.

Promotional kits, of which the Association has only two, have been allocated to the following schools during the year:
Merrilands High School, Horsham High School, Wellington High School, Lyndale High School, Chandler High School and Altona North Technical School.

In addition, Lacrosse has been included in the Physical Education courses at the Preston Institute of Technology (for the second consecutive year) and Rusden College. Don Miller and Les Goding are tutoring and providing practical coaching at these Colleges.

Lacrosse is poised to make rapid advances in Victoria where there is an increasing interest in the game as an alternative sport in schools and we <u>must</u> grasp this opportunity. Existing clubs each will need to take at least one school under its wing and give the new recruits to the game somewhere to play in regular competition. Preston and Rusden Colleges are turning out Phys. Ed. teachers with a good working knowledge of Lacrosse and the keenness to teach and promote it.

With a little effort on everybody's part we could more than double the number of senior players and teams inside five years and also have an active schools competition once again. The Springvale-Noble Park area is absolutely ripe for the formation of a new club and research is being undertaken through the Association's records to locate likely ex-lacrossuers in the area who would do the necessary foundation work. The Bentleigh- Moorabbin area also needs serious consideration as a site for new club formation.

(f) Rules of Lacrosse

It is very pleasing to record that 10 Clubs have purchased a stock of Rule Books since they became available. The Association still has an adequate supply should any other clubs wish to purchase copies.

4. CONCLUSION

The year 1978 will be Centenary Year for the V.A.L.A. as a constituted body and some thought should be given by Clubs and possibly the Committee of Advice, as to how we can celebrate this occasion and gain the most publicity from it.

It has been a very rewarding year for me as Secretary as I can see so many indications that Lacrosse is about to forge ahead. The public awareness of this great sport is increasing - my telephone convinces me of that, and within our midst there are people who have become dedicated to promotion and expansion and who will do the work required to ensure that it happens. All we need is a few more like them.

I would like to place on record my personal appreciation for the work done by the Record Secretaries, Barrie Moore and Frank Lansbury, the Permit Committee Secretary, In Miler, and Steve Spreadborough the Assistant Secretary who also is able to make any with an accurate set of minutes under circumstances which are the ficult. I know everyone connected with Victoria Largest Miles and to make the property of the past few years.

I cannot write praise enough for Sue Fox for the manner in which she copes with all the notices to be issued, magazine typing and and the sundry other jobs placed upon her.
