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Gentlemen,

Your Committee presents for your consideration and approval the 82nd Annual Report, Statement of Income and Expenditure and Balance Sheet for Season 1960.

STRENGTH OF GAME, PREMIERSHIP & INTERSTATE RESULTS.

The Hon. Records Secretary has included in his report such a wealth of detail as to give a very clear picture of all aspects of the game covered by the above heading.

I feel that the tables and comments offered by Mr. Sterck will adequately answer any questions which members may wish to raise, and that it is not necessary for me to add anything to the information which he has so capably presented.

CONSTITUTION AND RULES.

Amendments made since 1955 were consolidated during the course of the year, and an up-to-date edition of the Constitution and Rules was printed after the draft had been approved at a Special General Meeting.

It is hoped that the new rule-book will overcome any difficulties that clubs or players may have had in the past in determining what was required of them. Club Secretaries have been asked to advise the Association of the number of copies required by their members.

We are indebted to Mr. J. E. Taylor for checking the revised rules, and for his assistance in having them printed at very reasonable cost.

COMMITTEE MEETING.

The General Committee met on three occasions through the year, and the Executive Committee on nine occasions.

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REFEREES.

This is still one of our main problems, and while the excellent work of Mr. Fred Durham and others has improved the standard and consistency of senior refereeing, we are still far short of the numbers we really need.

It is the junior sections who especially need the benefit of good referees, and I again appeal to those who are retiring from the game to give a few afternoons per year to this important matter. Young players coming up to senior ranks cannot be expected to "unlearn" things which their experience in lower grades has caused them to regard as being within the rules.

THE "T. L. FULTON MEMORIAL SHIELD"

I mentioned in my last report that a generous donation has been received from Miss Agnes Fulton in memory of her late father.

Your Committee decided that a perpetual trophy for the Under 16 Section would be a fitting memorial to our late Life-Member, and would encourage the younger players in whom he took such an interest.

The shield is now available, and will be presented tonight with the other trophies.

THE "VINCE HEALY" MEMORIAL CUP.

We congratulate Graham Reid on winning this coveted award, which is a tribute to his sportsmanship as well as to his ability as a player.

This "best & fairest" award was presented to Graham at the Malvern Cricket Ground on the day of the Grand Final.

PUBLICITY.

Despite assurances given us early in the year and repeated efforts by senior officers throughout the season, our newspaper coverage has again been restricted.

We are therefore particularly grateful to the "Age" for giving us the same space as in previous years both for the mid-week review and for the results and comments published on Mondays.

News broadcast from 3XY at 12.35 p.m. on Saturdays has also been helpful in keeping players and supporters informed of the afternoon's fixtures.

Early in the season, Mr. J. Daw took over the task of receiving telephoned scores, and has carried out this duty very efficiently. Thank you, Jim!

FINANCE.

There are two matters in the Hon. Treasurer's Report on which with his concurrence I wish to comment.

Our income from clubs this year was £655. The amounts paid out on behalf of clubs and players (Interstate trips, trophies, referees, gymkhana, sticks, subsidies) was £1105. It will be obvious that without the Special Effort many of these things could not have been provided. It must be equally obvious that while the success of the Special Effort was ensured by the splendid support given by many of the Clubs, it almost certainly would not have been conducted but for the initiative and drive of one individual.

Although Mr. Jeffrey has indicated his willingness to assist the game in a similar way next year, we cannot expect it to be financed indefinitely by this method, and we must give some thought to the time when this source of income is no longer available.

The second matter which concerns me is the large amount owing to the Association at the end of the year. In view of the opportunity presented by Special Efforts for clubs to improve their finances, and the considerable assistance given from Association funds in recent years, it is disturbing to find that several clubs have still not met their obligations.

I trust that by mentioning these items in my report, the general body of members may have a better appreciation of some of the Association's problems and the need for the Committee to examine closely the increasing number of calls for financial aid.

INVITATION TO VISIT U.S.A.

An official invitation for an Australian team to play in the United States has been received by the A.L.C., and in a recent letter Mr. Gene Corrigan submitted a tentative programme for March/April 1962. The proposed tour would include some 2,600 miles of travel through eight States, and ll matches played over a period of six weeks. Accommodation, transport and entertainment would be provided by our hosts.

Our President has discussed the invitation informally with the Hon. Secretary of the A.L.C., and has also written to Mr. Corrigan. I am sure he will take the opportunity this evening to offer some sound advice on how this Association should act in the matter.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

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We have this year, as in the past, been ably and loyally supported by a number of senior members without whose assistance the game could not be successfully conducted.

I would like particularly to thank the selectors, managers and coaches of our three State teams - Messrs. G.Smith, P. H. Shappere, C. F. Lansbury, W. Logan and C. P. Weatherill (Seniors & Colts); Messrs. J. C. Morphet, E. A. Clough, A. Pearson, M. Aitken and T. Allington (Juniors) - each of whom gave much of his time and energy to seeing that the players were properly prepared and well looked after.

To the Gymkhana officials, goal and boundary umpires, and to those who helped in many other ways throughout the year, the Committee also expresses its appreciation.

Hon. Record Secretary's Report for Season 1960.

Gentlemen,

The 1960 Lacrosse season showed improvement in several directions but fell back in others. The formation of three new Clubs and a building up of some of the older Clubs were signs of progress. For the first time in the History of Lacrosse (war years excepted) there were as many Junior as Senior teams. Registrations rose by 138 but this was countered by the large number of irregular and no playing members. This report deals with this item in more detail than in previous years. The season produced seven more teams than last year (allowing for one late entry and four withdrawals). The newspaper coverage left a lot to be desired. The "Age" was the only paper to give us good coverage. The "C" Section finished with only two full teams completing the season and it would appear that we have over-reached our ability to accommodate 4 Senior sections at the present time. On the other hand the additional Junior section, 'G', proved very successful, and should the present rate of progress be maintained with the junior sections then the senior sections should be much stronger and wide spread within a few years.

It may be interesting to compare the above figures with 1926-1927. In 1926 we had 708 registered players and 44 teams and in 1927 770 registered players in 44 teams. This steadily rose to 1,115 Registered players and 68 teams in 1930. There were 6 sections, none of which were Under Age.

Detailed figures are not available but in 1938 we had 8 sections including the first strictly Under Age (U17 and U15) with about 1,000 registered players. History could repeat itself and now, possibly on a better foundation, Lacrosse progress should be achieved. Today players are acquired from the age of nine years and upward which is a far greater minimum than during the Golden years of Lacrosse from 1920 to 1939.

FINAL COMPETITION RESULTS.

The "A" Section once again consisted of six teams. The top three teams proving evenly matched with only four points separating them at the end of the Home and Home round. Caulfield were the leaders for the first time since 1948. During the season Malvern, Caulfield and Williamstown alternated at the head of the Premiership ladder and an excellent final series was expected. M.C.C. who had been well below the form shown by the leaders managed fourth place, this being their first "A" section semi-final appearance for a good number of years. Their performance in the semi-final was a vast improvement and in an excellent game Williamstown managed to win by the rather small margin of 8 goals to 4. The Grand Final resulted in a draw, even after an extra five minutes, with Caulfield keeping their Premiership chances alive by saving the game twice with only seconds to go. The Grand Final replay was won by Caulfield. Although Malvern established a four goal lead early in the match Caulfield showed superior team work and ability to win by six goals. This would be the largest margin that Malvern has been de-feated by in a Grand Final. Caulfield are to be congratulated on their consistent play throughout the season and they on their consistent play throughout the season and they thoroughly deserved their success. This is their first "A" Grand Final success since 1949. Williamstown showed great improvement during the season and will be the team to watch from now on.

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Although ten teams were entered for "E" Section only eight completed the season. The competition was excellent and a great deal of ability was unearthed. Surrey Park proved too strong and won the Premiership but Malvern, Williamstown Blue, C.G.I. and Coburg were never easy to defeat and every week there was at least one first-rate match. It is worthy of note that this section produced the only successful Victorian State team for 1960.

With the formation of three new Clubs the Under 14 section was divided into two sections to wit: "F" and "G".

The "F" Section proved a triumph for Caulfield with both their teams playing in the semi-finals. Malvern were undefeated in the Home and Home matches and when they won their semi-final they appeared sure of the Premiership. Caulfield Sioux turned the tables and won the Premiership with their sister team Caulfield Mohawks fourth. Caulfield have many promising players and many good years are in store for them. A big feature of this section was the fact that there were only two Walk-Overs given during the season although the section consisted of nine teams.

"G" SECTION:

The "G" Section was a very successful experiment. The three new Clubs, Salvation Army Boys' Home, Clayton and Chadstone did well. Teams were entered from Malvern (2), Caulfield, S.A.B.H., Clayton and Chadstone (2), making seven teams (all players new to the game). At a latter stage Chadstone entered a third team so great was the enthusiasm for the game amongst the players and their friends.

S.A.B.H., although three weeks late in starting, were the glamour team of the competition. They remained undefeated and appeared certain to win the Premiership but went down in the Grand Final. S.A.B.H. had two aboriginal lads playing and they took to the game as ducks do to water. Their ball control and positional play was exceptional for first year players.

Malvern won the premiership much to the surprise of not only the Association members but also their own officials. The lads had shown great improvement over the concluding stages of the Home & Home matches but even after defeating Clayton in the preliminary final they were not expected to upset the leaders.

The Chadstone Club, although not producing any spectacular match results, showed they were on a sound basis by being able to field three teams per week. Parent support has been noticeable here and should assure a big future for this enthusiastic Club.

These results and achievements show that new areas and strangers to the game will take up Lacrosse if there are any ex-players (and players) prepared to assist in the formulative stages of a new Club and in so doing help spread the game into the growing outer suburbs. It is essential that minds are made up now because in years to come grounds will be at a premium and other sports will have made inroads too deep to divert.
