Mr. President and Gentlemen,

I have much pleasure in submitting for your approval the 58th Annual Report of the South Australian Lacrosse Association dealing with the activities of the Season 1946.

With the ending of the war and the discharge of a large number of former players from the Services, all Clubs showed a substantial increase in membership. Three Clubs (North Adelaide, Legacy, and Glenelg), which were unable to field teams during the war, re-formed, and each Club nominated two teams. The Port Piric Lacrosse Association again affiliated with the SALA.

Competition Results:

Many keen contests were witnessed during the year, and the quality of play in the final matches was little inferior to pre-war standard. In winning the A and B Grades premierships the Brighton Club set a new record in S.A. Lacrosse. This club, which was formed in 1929, is the only club to win the A and B Grade premierships in the same year three times.

Congratulations are extended to the following clubs on winning the 1946 premierships:—

A Grade—Brighton. B Grade—Brighton. C Grade-Glenels

A Grade,—Brighton gained the Minor Premiership from East Torrens with a slightly better goal percentage. They defeated Sturt in a semi-final match by one goal and won the 1946 Premiership from East Torrens with one goal again separating the teams at the final bell. Sturt and Gleneig finished third and fourth respectively, followed by West Torrens, Port Adelaide, University, North Adelaide, and Legacy in that order.

B Grade,—Deaf Adult team went through the Minor round undefeated. They were unfortunate to meet a much improved Brighton team in the Final and Challenge Final matches and were defeated in both contests. The remaining teams finished in the following order: Port Adelaide, East Torrens, Sturt, and West Torrens.

C Grade,—Gleneig (Minor Premiers) were defeated in the semi-final by East Torrens. They made no mistake in the Challenge Final game and defeated East Torrens by 9 goals to 1. Legacy, North Adelaide, University, and Port Adelaide filled the remaining positions.

Roll of Henor,—To commemorate the splendid record of lacrosseurs in World War II, the names of all members who volunteered and the names of players who made the supreme sacrifice will be recorded in a specially bound volume. Provision will be made in the Roll of Honor to register the name of the winner of the trophy awarded to the best and fairest player each season. In future this trophy will be known as the "Memorial Trophy," and will serve to perpetuate the memory of the 71 players who lost their lives in the war. The "Memorial Trophy" will replace the "Dunks Trophy," first awarded in 1936. The Association extends congratulations to Don, L. Gorman, of the East Torrens Club on winning the first "Memorial Trophy." Don tied with W. J. B. Symonds for the trophy in 1941.

Mr. Harold Rule, who has been prominently associated with lacrosse in S.A. for over 40 years, kindly donated a shield to the Association. The shield is for perpetual competition, and will be presented to the Premiers of B Grade each year in place of the Gattorna Cup, which will remain in the possession of the Association.

The Association is deeply indebted to Mr. Rule for his generous action.

Interstate.—Messrs. A. E. Harvey, J. Martin, and A. C. Davis were elected to select the S.A. Team to play against Victoria The match was played at Melbourne and was the first post-war contest between the two States. The S.A. Team gave a brillian exhibition of team work, particularly in the forward lines, and defeated the Victorian team by 14 goals to 11. This was the first victory by a South Australian team over Victoria at Melbourne since 1906. The "Bob Symonds" Cup, presented for perpetual competition in contests between S.A. and Victoria as presented to the S.A. Captain by the President of the Victoria Lacrosse Association (Mr. C. A. M. West). The following players represented South Australia:—J. R. Thompson (Captain), W. J. B. Symonds (Vice-Captain), A. J. Vial, K. B. Roennfeldt, F. Hansford, L. Oats, K. Forrest, R. Matthewman, J. Gitsham, D. L. Gorman-J. Edwards, R. Alexander; reserves, W. L. Robinson and D. O'Sullivan. Thanks are due to Wally Edwards, prominent in Victorian Lacrosse for many years, for the efficient manner in which he carried out his duties as coach to the S.A. Team. The Hon, Secretary of the S.A.L.A. acted as Manager.

Other Matches.—Adelaide University defeated Melbourne University at Melbourne, 16 to 12; Victoria defeated the combiner Adelaide and Melbourne University at Melbourne; Legacy Club defeated Port Pirie, 13 to 5.

Henorary Referees.—The S.A. Lacrosse Referees' Association did splendid work during the season, and with the help of the "off" A Grade team were able to cover all premiership matches. Australian Lacrosse Council.-The parcel of sticks imported through the Council arrived in Adelaide in July and were immedistributed to Clubs. The late arrival of the aticks imported through the Council arrived in Adelaide in July and were immediately distributed to Clubs. The late arrival of the aticks meant a smaller number of teams competing than otherwise would have been the case. The value of the Australian Lacrosse Council has again been amply illustrated by the efforts of the Honorary Secretary in obtaining an import licence for the importation of lacrosse sticks for the 1947 season after the Australian Distributing Agents had been refused a permit. The Council has notified Associations that the manufacture of lacrosse balls has been delayed and the prospect of obtaining supplies for this reason is very remote. Clubs are urged to exercise the greatest care with whatever stocks they have in hand.

Association Ground,—In September last a price was accepted to grade and level the playing field of approximately six acres held by the Association in the South Parklands. The work will be commenced early in March and will cost £147. When the grading is completed it is anticipated that three playing grounds can be fitted into the area.

Visit of Come Lacrosse Club (W.A.) to Adelaide.—The Association has invited the Come Lacrosse Club of Western Australia to visit and play a match in Adelaide in 1947. It is anticipated the team will play a combined B Grade side on July 12th.

Officials.—The Association extends congratulations to our President (Mr. Justice Abbott, K.C.) on his elevation to the Bench of the Supreme Court of South Australia.

Tonight Messrs. W. R. Stansfield, A. Sheard, and J. S. Muecke retire as Elected Members to the General Committee as pro-

vided by the Constitution.

Mr. H. E. Irving continued as our delegate on the Board of the Amateur Sports Club.

Messrs. A. J. Hannan, K.C., H. E. Irving, and H. Rule were appointed members of the Complaints Committee. It was not necessary for this committee to meet during the season.

Financial.—By introducing a levy on players each Saturday and reducing affiliation fees to a nominal fee of 1/, more funds were available to the Association. From these funds the Association met the cost of all playing grounds. The amount spent during the year on grounds was £64/12/. More enclosed grounds were available than ever before and improvement in play was noticeable. Ovals used were Kensington, Norwood, Thebarton, Alberton, Gleneig, Brighton, Adelaide Oval No. 2, Kingswood, and Thebarton, Theorems.

Conclusion.—I wish to thank Club Secretaries for the assistance they have given me in carrying out my duties.
