PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

The withdrawal by some Clubs of various teams just prior to, or early in, the season must be viewed with concern. Information given to the Management Committee during the year, shows that the most dangerous age for losing players is 16-20 years of age.

I would urge all club administration to look at their own approach and attitudes to their members in this bracket. A high priority on juniors for some years now, has given most clubs a very good base. It would be a great shame if all that effort was to be eroded by lack of consideration by clubs to the next stage of that group becoming senior club members.

Our local season provided some excellent competition despite a large number of personnel going to the World Series. The finals in all sections were of a high standard and closely contested with a number of surprise results. My congratulations to all section winners.

The depth of Victorian Lacrosse was highlighted this year by 14 members — two coaches. two referees. Physio/Trainer and nine players being included in the Australian team which competed with distinction in the Baltimore World Series.

Australian Champions in Colts with our second team winning against W.A. and S.A.: Australian Champions in under 16.

A young senior team gaining valuable experience for the future in Perth.

The best and fairest awards in all Championships were won by Victorians:

David Mounsey: U.16

Nick Skewes: Equal in Colts

Rick Tillotson: Seniors

Rick also won the Vince Healy trophy, Best and Fairest State League Player. My congratulations to all members connected with these teams.

GENERAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

Gentlemen,

On behalf of your Committee, it gives me pleasure to submit for your approval this, the 104th Annual Report covering the activities of the Association for 1982.

With a World Series being held in Baltimore and three National Championships taking place during the season it has been a very busy year for all concerned. The mid-season Elimination Cup was discarded this year in favour of a Lightning Premiership before the start of the home-and-away series and this type of event seemed to have more acceptance. Details of these various events are covered later in this report.

The Treasurer's Report and Financial Statements are appendiced together with reports of the two Record Secretaries and the Tribunal.

1. ADMINISTRATION

(a) Management Committee:

This Committee met 10 times during the year and attendances by club delegates were as follows: Altona 10, Eltham 10, Mitcham 8, Camberwell 10, Footscray 8, Melb. University 9, Cauffield 9, Glenroy 5, Surrey Park 9, Chadstone 8, Malvern 9, Williamstown 8, Coburg 7, M.C.C. 9, Referees 9.

This Committee sets the policies of the V.A.L.A. and all clubs should exercise their rights of being part of the decision making by having a delegate at every meeting.

(b) Permit Committee:

The day-to-day problems associated with the running of our competitions are dealt with by this Committee which meets every Tuesday lunch-time during the season. Year after year the same complaint arises — incomplete match reports and incomplete registration lists. This entails a lot of unnecessary work and a high incidence of fines. Club administration should look into this aspect of their duties and ensure that it is carried out correctly; fines constitute the only type of revenue the Association would rather not have.

To those members of the Permit Committee who donate their Tuesday lunch break to Lacrosse please accept our thanks and appreciation for a job well done.

(c) Tribunal

It has been an extremely busy year for this Committee which was required to meet on 16 occasions in all, the most for five years.

Perhaps the most disturbing feature of the report is the incidence of offences in our junior grades, which have shown an alarming increase during the current season. It is to be hoped that tighter refereeing during 1983 will help stamp out these incidents so that bad habits will not be formed to carry through to senior grades.

The Association's gratitude is extended to the Tribunal members for performing these unenviable tasks, to Ed Spreadborough for his excellent job as Secretary and to the M.C.C. Club for making its rooms available for the meetings.

A full report of the Tribunal's activities is attached.

(d) Visits Committee:

In the absence of a formalised committee to host the Colts' Championships in Melbourne this year, the Caulfield Club took on this role with John Seekamp as co-ordinator. The arrangements were extremely well handled and a most successful championship series resulted. However, owing to the lack of an enclosed ground a considerable loss was incurred. Thanks are extended to all those Caulfield Club members who assisted John in the running of the event and to the families who provided accommodation for the visitors.

(e) Weather Committee:

The members recaptured their old form this year and kept Melbourne free of heavy rain on Saturdays during the season.

(f) Match Committee:

The pressure time for members of this Committee is before the season starts and once again they were able to overcome the inevitable problems that arise and get a fixture out in good time as well as organise the Lightning Premiership. The Association's thanks are extended to those members who are responsible each year for getting the game under way.

(g) Youth, Sport & Recreation:

The Department of Youth, Sport and Recreation has continued to support L'acrosse with financial assistance in those areas where we are most likely to expand our sport. This has enabled our Promotions and Development Officer, Don Miller, to take Lacrosse into many schools and institutions for the first time. Approximately 60 physical education teachers do a course on Lacrosse annually, which means that the opportunities for club recruitment in local schools is ever present. Don Miller is creating Lacrosse players — the clubs themselves must do the follow-up and get them into Saturday competition.

Our appreciation is extended to the Department for the support they give and to Don for his efforts in carrying out the projects.

Details of the funds made available and the projects to which these are allocated are included with the Directorate Report — paragraph (I).

Decision by the Management Committee to run the 1985 World Box Lacrosse Championships was easily made. Putting it into effect means action right now! A Committee along the lines of the 1974 World Series Committee must be formed without delay and an extensive program of arrangements formulated and started. The dates are 24th Feb.-2nd March, 1985, and the Sports Centre has been booked.

The proposed marriage of Footscray and Altona at State League level is both sensible and necessary. Individually the clubs are not yet strong enough for State League but the combined talents of their better players would form a very creditable side in that division and help pave the way for entry of the clubs on an individual basis in the future. Possibly Eltham and Mitcham could work towards a similar plan.

During the period 11th-20th December, 1981, Australia was fortunate to receive a visit from the President of the Canadian Lacrosse Association, Mr. Bill McBain. During that time Bill visited both South Australia and Victoria and witnessed all types of Lacrosse games as we play them, field, box, soft and women's. In a very lengthy and comprehensive report he highlighted the benefits and detractions of both our administration of the sport and that of Canada. His advice has already been put into effect as regards our box competitions and hopefully now that the rough play had been eliminated, more of the better field players will join in this exciting code.

The report covered a multitude of subjects concerning Lacrosse in general and will be the basis from which the 1985 Box World Series Committee will work.

His visit and subsequent comments were very much appreciated.

2. PLAYING ACTIVITIES.

(a) Domestic:

The eight-team section format was continued for the 1982 season but in lieu of an Elimination Cup being played mid-season, a Lightning Premiership was held prior to commencement of the home-and-away games. This arrangement resulted in an uninterrupted series of premiership games and was supported by a great majority of clubs.

Highlight of the season was the dominance of Williamstown in taking the first three senior division premierships even though the wins in Divisions 1 and 2 were by the narrowest possible margin.

A very successful start was made on zoning of the U-12 competition. The immediate benefits to emerge were the saving in travel by team managers and supporters and the higher player participation which has resulted.

Full details of the year's competition are set out in the Record Secretaries' Reports appended.

(b) Interstate:

Following much deliberation at A.L.C. level the Senior Championships in Perth were put back to a time slot which enabled the returning Australian team players to participate and this must have had some bearing on the result. Victoria went down to South Australia 13-20 in the first game and 12-20 against W.A. in the second, W.A. went on to win the final 23-9 against S.A. Our relatively young side defeated the A.L.C. President's Team 24-7 and gained plenty of valuable experience from the series. Rick Tillotson was a clear winner in the Best and Fairest voting and was awarded the W. G. Hobbs' Trophy. Rick was also selected in the All Stars Team along with Simon Wister and Graeme Antrim.

The Colts' Championships were held in Melbourne and all arrangements were made by the Caulfield Club. The results of the games wee a clear indication of the benefits accruing from a domestic U-19 competition. Not only did the Victorian team make a clean sweep of the opposition but so also did the President's Team.

Results were:

Vic. 30-President's 14, S.A. 20-W.A. 10, President's 17-S.A. 16, Vic. 29-W.A. 9, President's 18-W.A. 17, Vic. 23-S.A. 14.

Congratulations to Nick Skewes, who shared the Best and Fairest voting for the L. S. Turnbull Cup with Tim Keen of South Australia. Six Victorians featured in the All Stars line-up. They were: Bret Barnard, Mark Brown, Mark Butler, Wayne Graham, Glen Meredith and Nick Skewes. Peter Weatherill was selected as the All Stars' coach.

The Juniors (U-16) Championship was held in Adelaide and the strength of the Victoria's Junior Lacrosse was again demonstrated. Our boys won all three games to take the Championship, defeating W.A. 25-10. The President's 22-2 and S.A. 20-13. As with the Colts, six players and the coach made the All Stars' side. They were: W. Stewart, Coach: S. Aitken, M. Seekamp, D. Mounsey, J. Hearnan, C. Brown and C. Gibson.

(c) Intervarsity

The 1982 competition was hosted by Adelaide University during 23rd-28th August.

General results were:

Monash 21 Adelaide 12

Monash winning the competition for the second consecutive year. Melbourne had the consolation of winning the sculling races.

University Blue was awarded to Andrew Vague; David Russell and Darren Coulson were awarded half blues.

Monash will be host to the 1983 competition and, in view of its success over the past two years, the time seems ripe to reactivate Lacrosse within the University with the aim of getting a Monash team back into V.A.L.A. competition.

(a) Box Lacrosse:

A four-team competition was held at the Hawthorn Centre prior to Christmas and involved 39 first-year players out of the 69 participants.

The Renegades won the Read Cup from the Mohawks, second, Redmen third and Redbacks fourth.

Best and Fairest players were David Gerrard (Renegades), Nick Skewes (Redbacks), Darren Gibson (Redmen) and Tony Lewer (Mohawks). Highest point scorer of the series was Greg Mollison.

At interstate level we were unsuccessful, being defeated in three games by South Australia 25-16, 21-14 and 10-9.

(e) Soft Lacrosse:

For the first time a mixed competition along the lines of that so successfully staged in Adelaide for a number of years, was staged at the Hawthorn Centre. Six teams were entered with 69 players taking part, 10 of whom were new to the game of Lacrosse. The male-female ratio was 47-22. The competition was staged over seven Sunday nights and was very much enjoyed by those who participated.

The Association's thanks are extended to the hardworking Renegades Team who did all the organisation for both the Box and Soft Competitions.

(f) International Lacrosse:

This year was a World Series Year, the event being staged by the U.S.A. in Baltimore. Those who were fortunate enough to attend that series will remember it for the first-class organisation of the event, the electric atmosphere, the friendliness of Lacrosse people of all nations and the spirit with which our players were able win their way to the grand final where they went down to the U.S.A. which fielded the most powerful Lacrosse team yet seen.

Victorian players included in the team were: R. Tatlow, G. Garnsworthy, R. Walton, J. Buckiewcz, K. Nicholls, G. Fox, P. Morley, R. Tillotson, A. Bower, M. Haddad and S. Ellis; coach, A. Ingles; asst. coach, D. Trainor and Physiotherapist Joy Clayfield. John Buckiewcz was selected in the World Team along with Peter Cann and Jeff Kennedy of W.A. Jeff Kennedy won the high honour of Most Valuable Player for the series.

(g) Gymkhana:

This annual event for our juniors was conducted by the Surrey Park Club. Unfortunately that Club's good arrangements were marred by the lack of support from referees and the non-attendance of six of the teams fixtured to play. A system of fines to overcome this latter problem seems appropriate. Winners were: U-14, Glenroy; U-12 Div. 1, Malvern; U-12 Div. 2, Eltham.

(h) Lightning Premiership:

This program was held on 3rd April and encompassed all Senior Divisions and the U-16. The winners were:

International Lacrosse in both codes is increasing in volume and the work load on the honorary office-bearers of A.L.C. is getting beyond that which can be considered reasonble. Accordingly, there is a proposal to completely restructure the Council, up-date its constitution and spread the workload to more managable proportions. Hon. Secretary George Tillotson and I.L.O. CLive Carr have shouldered too much of the burden in recent years.

(b) Life Membership:

It was pleasing to all Lacrosse players and supporters when Doug Fox was the recipient of V.A.L.A's. highest award at the 1981 Annual Meeting. Doug has been a tireless worker for Lacrosse at all levels and has reached the highest peak as a player — Australian Captain. The rebirth of the Camberwell Club from the doldrums of 1970, the Committees of Advice, Elimination Cup and many other initiatives which have benefited the Association stemmed from Doug's agile mind. Congratulations Doug it was well deserved.

(e) Presentation Ball

This year the presentation night was organised and hosted by the M.C.C. Club at the Melbourne Cricket Ground. This is an excellent venue and the night was enjoyed by approximately 260 Lacrosse enthusiasts. Good food, good music and the effort put into the arrangements by the M.C.C. Club members ensured the success of the function.

The Presentation Night is the social highlight of the year for many followers of Lacrosse and hopefully it will be continued in its present form for many years.

Thanks M.C.C. for the hard work you put into the event.

Magazine:

Thanks again to Terry Allington for his job as Editor. Now that South Australia is publishing its own magazine it is all the more important for Terry to be supplied with club notes and articles to enable regular and interesting issues to be published.

(e) Conclusion:

My personal thanks are extended to the two Record Secretaries Barrie Moore and Frank Lansbury, both of whom have produced accurate and concise reports for many years now. Thanks also to Rob Joy, who filled in during my three months' absence this year and to John Nolan, who must be the most capable Treasurer any organisation could wish for.

Our President, Phil Humphreys, has announced that he will not be standing for re-election. After four years of his giving 100 per cent effort to leadership of the Association everyone connected with the V.A.L.A. will be sorry to see him vacate the post. Whoever assumes the Presidency will be doing a mighty job if he contributes half of the drive, enthusiasm and practical effort given by Phil during his term.

My own term as Secretary has now extended over seven years and it is due time that someone else became involved in looking after the business of the Association. Whoever it turns out to be can rest assured of plenty of support from myself and also Don Miller, who has been of great assistance to me in recent years.
