ANNUAL REPORT AND BALANCE SHEET

For Season 1934

Presented at the Annual Meeting of the Association, held at the Amateur Sports Club, Melbourne, on the 5th day of March, 1935.

Gentlemen.

Your Committee has very much pleasure in presenting for your approval the Annual Report and Balance Sheet for the 1934 season.

The South Melbourne Technical School and Y.M.C.A. clubs disbanded at the commencement of the season and the North Fitzroy and Ivanhoe clubs amalgamated. Despite this, the 1934 personnel (28 clubs, 60 teams, and 1,039 registered players) compares favourably with the 1933 figures (31 clubs, 62 teams, and 1,068 players). The size of the Association is still some distance behind the record established in 1930, of 30 clubs, 68 teams, and 1,115 players, and it is our earnest desire to create a new membership record for the ensuing season. This objective has already been brought nearer by the formation, during the summer months, of new clubs at Preston and Wattle Park.

The season commenced with the re-naming of the various sections and a reversion to the former playing length of the field. With surprise results becoming the feature of every Saturday's play, it is no exaggeration to state that the season produced the most interesting Senior Lacrosse yet witnessed. Malvern were again the outstanding team and, for the fourth year in succession, won the premiership from M.C.C. Caulfield's greatly improved form won merited recognition, and Coburg advanced to fifth place. Malvern again defeated Williamstown to gain the "B" premiership. Glen Iris gained their first premiership since 1931 in the "C" Section, at Coburg's expense. U.H.S.O.B. won the grand final of "D" Section Fow Power House, St. Kilda defeated Melbourne Technical College in "E" Section, and Williamstown narrowly gained the "F" Section premiership from their old rivals, Essendon.

The fourth Annual six-a-side tournament, held at Malvern, was again very popular. Malvern and St. Kilda won their respective grades. Club secretaries are asked to assist the management of this tournament by lodging their entries more promptly.

Mr. S. McCorkell performed the amazing feat of winning the best and fairest senior player award for the third successive year, and will receive the trophy presented by Mr. W. B. Grace. One of your vice-presidents, Mr. R. Gibbs (Caulfield), shared this coveted honour with M. J. Bettles (Legacy) in the "B" Section.

The annual fixture with South Australia was played at Malvern, and a fast exhibition of contrasting styles of the game was witnessed. The successful Victorian team comprised Messrs. J. Beattie (Capt.), J. Reid (Vice-Capt.), S. McCorkell, J. Lake, O. Unkenstein, D. Marshall, T. Corrigan, W. Edwards, N. Robson, R. Read, H. Woods, and W. Ashby. Reserves: J. Murrowwood, N. Gibbs, and G. Knowles.

A visit to Queensland was arranged during the year, and our thanks are due to the participants who volunteered to go, at their own expense, to assist our friends in the Northern State. The party comprised Messrs. J. Beattie (Captain and Manager), H. Woods, C. Foster, A. Evans, V. Healy, F. Lansbury, F. Tranter, B. Newgreen, K. O'Brien, K. Sitlington, L. Bassett, M. Logan, T. Clancy, R. Cole, L. Jenkin, and H. Anderson.

We thank the New South Wales and Queensland Associations for the lavish hospitality they extended to our players.

Your President, Capt. J. H. Fearon, is also to be highly commended for his action in sponsoring teams from the Williamstown club on enjoyable trips to Launceston and Adelaide, where the home associations also looked after our members in royal fashion.

Interstate visits undoubtedly do more than any other aspect of our game to advance Lacrosse in Australia. We are proud of the leading position, in Australian Lacrosse, gained by our Association by virtue of the prowess of our players and our numerical strength. Such a position carries with it a duty to assist other States, and your Committee is sure you will approve of its action in accepting an oft repeated invitation to visit West Australia. It is hoped to send a representative team to Perth, next August, playing at Adelaide on its return. As fares alone total over £200 (to which the W.A.L.A. is contributing £50), a glance at our Balance Sheet will indicate that your heartiest co-operation is needed.

Malvern again enjoyed a visit to Ballarat, who hope, this year, to play home and home matches in "B" Grade. University had a successful visit to Adelaide.

Our sincere thanks are due to the members of the Investigation Committee, viz., Messrs. Webb, Fawcett, Dunn, Gay, Pearce, and Grace; to our delegates to the Australian Lacrosse Council and the Amateur Sports Council of Victoria and to the officials of the Amateur Sports Club. We gratefully record that the Press gave us an increased share of publicity during the season. The Permit Committee also had a very busy term of office.

We thank the members of the Referees Association and, in particular, their energetic secretary, Mr. E. Axford, for their help and valued suggestions. A meeting of captains and referees to discuss rule interpretations proved so helpful and popular that this should become an annual fixture to which all players are invited.

There are ample opportunities for experienced players to serve as referees on relinquishing the game, and there is a pressing need for the right man to come forward and form an Old Players' Association. You are requested to assist the compilation of an old players' register by sending in the names and present addresses of former players.

It is pointed out that rule books (6d.) and badges (1/-) are still available for disposal. Also, interstate players may now obtain Victorian blazers.

The attention of Club Secretaries is directed to the need of lodging, as early as possible, their team entries and ground dates. Although the loss to the Association, caused by the recent disbandment of the North Fitzroy club, is considerable, your Committee is confident that a successful season is again indicated. An appeal is made to every member to endeavour to gain one recruit, for his club, before the commencement of the season.
