Australian lacrosse lost one of its greatest friends and staunchest supporters when Mr. I. J. Taylor passed away on 2nd December, 1958, after a long illness.

As Honorary Secretary of the Australian Lacrosse Council over a period of more than 25 years, "Ike" Taylor was known and respected by lacrosseurs in every State of the Commonwealth, and in England, Canada and the U.S.A.

A West Australian by birth, he was Secretary of the W.A.L.A. for many years, and was associated with the visit of the Canadian team in 1907. Always interested and anxious to help in the betterment of the game, he took an active part in the administration of the V.A.L.A. during the latter part of his life. He was elected to the Executive Committee soon after his arrival in Victoria in 1937, and served continuously in this capacity until compelled by failing health to retire in 1956. For many years he was Chairman of this committee.

Mr. Taylor held the unique distinction of being a Life Member of both the West Australian and Victorian Iaorosse Associations, and could well be called the "father of lacrosse" in this country.

"Ike" Taylor has left an indelible impression on the history of Australian lacrosse, and will be remembered with affection and respect wherever the game is played.

Gentlemen,

Your Committee presents for your consideration and approval the 80th Annual Report, Statement of Income and Expenditure and Balance Sheet for Season 1958.

The season opened on 19th April with a total of 37 teams, 19 in Open-Age sections, and 18 in the Under 16 and Under 14. Results in each section are set out fully in the Hon. Record Secretary's report.

STRENGTH OF GAME:

That the junior sections of the game are in a fairly healthy state is shown by the figures and comments submitted by the Record Secretary, and Clubs are to be congratulated on their efforts to build up this vital foundation. Nevertheless, some concern must be felt at our inability over the past few years to carry this increase in juniors through to the Open-age sections. Since 1955 the junior sections have increased from 13 to 18 teams, whereas the seniors have remained static at 19-20 teams.

In order to fill the vacancies caused by retirement of older players, and <u>in addition</u>, build up strong senior grades from which can be drawn first-class interstate representatives it is essential that clubs retain the interest and participation of the 16-17 years group. There appears to be a tendency for juniors, some of them very promising material for senior honours, to "give the game away" at this stage. We must make every effort to encourage and enthuse these players if Victoria is to regain its former position in senior interstate competition.

VINCE HEALY MEMORIAL TROPHY:

The Vince Healy Trophy for best and fairest was won by Roy Sloggett (Malvern) 20 points), with Geoff. Mayne (Williamstown) and Bill Daw (Malvern) equal second with 14 points. Roy polled consistently throughout the season, and is to be heartily congratulated not only on his success, but also on the high standard of sportsmanship which he at all times displays.

The popularity of his win was well demonstrated when he received the Cup from our President, Mr. Robert Coldstream, at the Association's Presentation Night on 12th September.

"P. J. BRADY" TROPHY:

As well as winning the Victorian trophy, Roy Sloggett went very close to winning the all-Australian award. The following result was received from the Australian Iaorosse Council on 21st December:-

The Executive Committee desires to record its appreciation of the hospitality extended to them by members and wives of members in the conduct of their meetings in private homes.

REFEREES:

For the first time for several years, "A" section comprised an even number of teams, and it became necessary to divert from the established practice of obtaining parttime referees from club members. From newspaper advertising and contact with the secretary of the former Professional Referees Association, we were able to obtain sufficient referees to overcome our main difficulties.

Several senior club members made themselves available from time to time, and their services given in this way are sincerely appreciated.

We are also greatly indebted to Mr. Fred Durham, who turned out in an honorary capacity practically every Saturday throughout the season. This is but one of many ways in which Fred and Mrs. Durham assist our game, and to both of them we say a sincere "Thank you" for their continued interest and support.

Comments from officials and players during the season indicate an improvement in refereeing standards over those of previous years, and that the return to professional referees has met with general approval. Acceptance of it as a general feature of the game must, however, be viewed in relation to its cost, as it will be seen from the Balance Sheet that referees' fees accounted for a considerable proportion of the Association's expenses.

GYMKHANA:

The Annual Gymkhana was held at Malvern Cricket Ground on Queen's Birthday, 16th June. By decision of the General Committee, events were restricted this year to six-aside contests in Under 21, Under 16 and Under 14 sections. The Under 21 section had to be abandoned due to insufficient entries, but the other contests were carried through successfully and a very high standard of play was shown in both sections. Results are set out in the Hon. Record Secretary's Report, and we offer our congratulations to the winners and also to the other teams who gave them such spirited competition.

We were again fortunate in having good weather, and a very willing and capable band of officials. The Association conveys its sincere thanks to its members and supporters who gave their time and energy to ensure the success of this day for the junior players.

INTERSTATE VISIT-SENIOR:

The following team, with Mr. C. F. Lansbury as Manager and Mr. A. L. Evans as Coach, left Melbourne on 7th August to compete against South Australia in Adelaide for the Bob Symonds Memorial Cup.

The Victorians were welcomed at the Amateur Sports Club by Mr. Justice Abbott, President of the S.A.L.A., and other leading officials. During the weekend entertainment was provided by way of a barbeque, and trip to the hills, and your Association wishes to record its appreciation of the hospitality arranged by the S.A.L.A. through its liaison officer, Mr. J. Wright.

South Australia retained the Symonds Cup by an overwhelming win of 23 goals to 11, clinching the match in the third quarter by scoring 11 goals to 1, after leading 8-6 at half time. For Victoria, D. Trainor scored 7 goals, and best players were Trainor, Sloggett and Miller.

We congratulate South Australia on their convincing victory, and thank Messrs. Logan, Bamford, Lansbury and Evans for their work in selecting, managing and coaching our team before and during the trip.

INTERSTATE VISIT-JUNIOR:

Under Manager Mr. P. H. Shappere and Coach Mr. Frank Moore, our juniors played in Adelaide on 23rd August, and were successful in wresting the Carl Schulz Cup from South Australia.

Victoria gained a lead of 13 goals to 1 in the first quarter, playing what the Manager described as "one of the finest displays of junior lacrosse I have ever seen," and went on to win 20-10. Toomey (6), Coad and Graham (5 each) were the main goal-throwers, and best players were Graham, Chiron and Pirzas.

The team comprised R. G. Graham (Capt.-Surrey Park), A. Chiron (V.Capt.-W'town), G. Tate, C. Pirzas, G. Coad (Malvern), F. J. Worcester (Coburg), J. A. Harris, R. B. Alcock, E. J. Toomey, F. A. Stewart (W'town), I. Daley, R. Heginbotham (Caulfield), R. Barnes, D. Spreadborough (Surrey Park).

Their performance deserves our highest praise, and we also acknowledge our appreciation of the assistance given by Mr. Frank Moore and Mr. Chas. Middleton in preparing the team for the task which it carried out so successfully.

As with the senior team, the juniors received the warmest hospitality from their South Australian hosts, to whom we express our sincere thanks.

SPECIAL EFFORT:

The outstanding success of the 1958 Special Effort, as shown in the Balance Sheet and also in the report distributed earlier to Club Secretaries, must be a source of satisfaction to all players and supporters of the game.

It is doubtful, however, if other than those most directly concerned with the venture can appreciate the debt we owe to Mr. Noel Jeffrey for his work in raising this substantial sum of money.

In organising and conducting the effort practically single-handed, Mr. Jeffrey carried out his self-imposed task in a manner which must earn the admiration and thanks of every member of the Association. In the early stages he had to face difficulties which would have deterred a lesser man, but by enthusiasm and sheer hard work he overcame them with the result which you see before you tonight.

I am sure that all members will support the Committee in conveying to Noel our sincere appreciation of his work on our behalf.

SOCIAL:

A very pleasant and well attended function was conducted at the Caulfield Park pavilion on the evening of 12th September.

Mr. Jeffrey's thoroughness was well demonstrated by the manner in which he had arranged the wind-up of the Special Effort, and this part of the proceedings was watched with considerable interest and excitement.

The President then presented trophies and medallions to the winners of the various sections as listed in the Record Secretary's report. Mr. Roy Sloggett was given a great ovation on receiving the Vince Healey Memorial Cup, and similar enthusiasm was shown when the Junior Interstate team, with its Manager and Coach, was brought forward to receive the Carl Schulz Cup.

It was most pleasing to your Committee to see so many parents of these lads present on this occasion, and I am sure that their interest and support is a great encouragement to the boys themselves.

The balance of the evening was taken up with the Beaurepaire Olympic film, followed by light refreshments.

To Mr. Ron Cameron of the M.C.C. Club, who arranged and supervised film projection, and to the Secretary and members of the Caulfield Club who carried out the supper arrangements, we express our thanks for their part in making the evening such a success.

PUBLICITY:

From time to time questions are asked in General Committee regarding increased publicity for our game. I would like to point out that apart from the regular newspaper articles contributed by Messrs. Selth, Tickner and Dobbie, whose assistance we include acknowledge, we are entirely dependent on our own efforts to bring news of lacrosse to public attention. In this respect we are falling far short of what we could and should do.

Games are scheduled to start at 2.30.p.m., and allowing for even bad hold-ups occasioned at some grounds by baseball, it should be possible for all senior scores to be phoned between 4.45. and 5.p.m. In many cases last season, scores were coming through at 5.45.p.m. or later, by which time radio news-rooms have received all other sporting information and closed down. It was only through the courtesy and co-operation of the 3A.W. switchboard operator, who recorded the scores herself, that we were able to get our results over the air.

Towards the end of the season, I refrained from reporting the scores unless four or more were available, as I considered that to submit less was bad publicity, which is worse than none.

I feel sure that 3A.W. will accept our "A" and "B" section results this year, but we cannot expect them to extend this courtesy to us unless we submit the scores within the times observed by other sporting bodies.

INDOOR LACROSSE:

During the year the Association was advised that the Albert Park Committee of Management was considering the conversion of a building for use as an indoor running track. Subject to this conversion, the building would be suitable for indoor lacrosse. A Special Meeting of the Gneral Committee held on 2nd September, 1958, approved the expenditure of up to £500 to conduct indoor lacrosse similar to that carried out so successfully by the Indoor Lacrosse Group.

As the V.A.A.A., which was to bear the major cost, did not proceed with the scheme, the proposed conversion was not carried out and the building has been occupied by other interests.

No suitable alternative building of the area and height necessary for indoor lacrosse has yet been found.

U.S.A. VISIT - 1959 CARNIVAL:

The Australian Lacrosse Council has suggested 1st-8th August as Carnival dates, but this is by no means binding as much will depend on the outcome of the proposed visit from U.S.A.

In a letter received by the Council on 3rd January, the Americans state that they have had their proposed trip raised in the U.S. Congress, and are now very hopeful of obtaining sufficient support to make the trip possible. However, as no further news has been received, we must assume they are still having some problems to overcome and that as yet their visit is by no means a certainty.

As it is most desirable that any visit from them be conducted conjointly with the Carnival, it has not been possible to proceed much beyond indicating our proposed arrangements to ground managements and other sources of assistance. Whilst this uncertainty is a matter of some concern, I feel that the interest displayed in the quarters which I have approached indicates that we can expect a good deal of support and co-operation.

Several members of the Association have already contacted me with offers of assistance in the U.S.A. visit and, or Carnival, and I trust that this spirit will prevail generally throughout our membership. The carrying out of this function will entail a great deal of work and time, and every ounce of help will do much towards insuring its smooth running and success. The Council is expected to meet again in Adelaide on 8th March, by which time it is hoped to have a definite reply from America. If not, the Association will have no option but to proceed immediately with Carnival plans and trust that any overseas visit can be arranged to coincide.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS:

Apart from those already mentioned in this Report, I would like to record the Committee's appreciation of the encouragement given to it at all times by our President, Mr. Robert Coldstream. In his quiet, thoughtful way he is always ready to guide and assist us through any difficulties, and his knowledge and experience in so many matters helpful to the game have been of inestimable value throughout the year.

On my own part, I cannot speak too highly of the loyal service rendered to the Association by Messrs. Lansbury, Ponton and Sterck in their respective offices. To them, to the members of the Executive Committee, and to all others who have assisted in the smooth running of the Association and made my own job appreciably easier, I say a very sincere "Thank you".

For the first time for many years a new club entered the field. No Club has withdrawn over the past four years. So with registrations on the upward trend, an actual increase of 67 players on last season, Lacrosse appears to have 'turned the corner' after having been in the doldrums over the past few years. It now depends entirely upon ourselves to keep this improvement moving. An analysis of registrations together with comparisons with the two previous years are set out below. The number of players who played irregularly is up sharply on last season particularly the under age sections, still this could mean more juniors have been introduced to the game and that they will be playing more regularly next season. A feature of this season is the small number of 'registered but did not play' members, I doubt if this figure could be much lower. Totals

A new team entered the competition, Heidelberg, and Malvern entered a second team bringing the total strength to nine teams which is an increase of two on last year.
