I congratulate the Premiership teams and remind all clubs that what was done by Surrey Park this year is possible if the application and desire is applied.

To Victorian team coaches Bill Stahmer, Paul Mollison, Joe Downie, their players and support groups I would, on behalf of the association, say thank you and also congratulate you all for your efforts.

We saw the inauguration of an Under 19 World Championships in Adelaide in July, and Victoria was well resprented by twelve players, a Coach and a Manager.

My congratulations and thanks to all for the manner in which they conducted themselves not only as Australian reps but also as representitives of the Victorian Lacrosse Association Inc.

#### 1. ADMINISTRATION

### (a) Management Committee

The Management Committee met seven(7) times during the year, two(2) meetings were not minuted for lack of a corum and one(1) was cancelled due to members being in Adelaide.

The minutes of the mens and the womens association were exchanged and a number of joint efforts were carried out. These types of interactions are improving the communications between the V.L.A. and the V.W.L.A. and must continue for lacrosse to benifit.

Alan Chiron has made note of his dissappointment in the Clubs in reguard to responces, not only to the mandatory things in the Operations Manual like registration lists but also to circulars and minutes. Some of the reasons for this include, the ages and inexperience of most Club Committee personnel and the lack of importance that Club Committees place on association communications. A Management Committee or sub-committees can not be perceived as to having a crystal ball, it <u>must</u> rely on information (even if only a few lines) back from the Clubs as to their opinions, this also includes team sheets in on time.

There was one(1) Special General meeting of the Association this year with the attendance fair by most clubs. Two(2) clubs were not represented at all.

There was also a meeting of Club secretaries with the V.F.U. Player Accident Fund representative where each was provided with information and all the relevent "Claims Material". This meeting was held in conjuntion with V.W.L.A. Club secretaties some of whom fullfill both roles.

### (d) By-Laws Committee

Notice of Motion's for alterations to the <u>Association By-Laws</u> have been prepared by this Committee for consideration at this A.G.M., as has many other alterations and additions to the <u>Committee By-laws</u>. We were quite fortunate to have on the By-Laws Committee this year two long standing members of the Permit Committee which provided the experience to improve the by-laws considerably.

### (e) Permit Committee

The general running of the fixtured games was attended to on Tuesdays at lunch times by the Permit Committee and on behalf of the members of the association, I thank you for your dedication to your daytime meetings.

I am told that the Operations Manual and additional changes to the By-Laws are continuing to improve the funtions of this Committee, which is terrific.

Also that the submitting of score sheets is as bad as it has ever been and is the major cause of unavailable and late ladders.

It will be a consideration of the incoming Management Committee to take steps to remedy this continuing situation. The suggestion of raising the fine may not even be enough to deter offending Clubs and that the approach of the V.W.L.A. may be the only answer, that is loss of match points. It definitely works because yhe V.W.L.A. have there scores in the paper every Monday.

Many thanks to Peter Stiglich who has sat on this Committee for the past 4 years and has acted as Secretary for the past 3 years. Peter is unable to stand for this Committee in 1989 due to work comittments.

### (f) Investigation Committee

This Committe was required to meet on 9 occassions this year.

Appreciation of the Association is extended to the Investigation Committee members for their Wednesday Night attendances to matters involving many clubs of all senior grades and two in the under 17 grade.

The majority of reports came from State League; there were 9 reports in senior games and 2 reports in junior games.

It is pleasing to see that this is 6 reports less than last year.

Many thanks to Wes George who acted as Chairman/Secretary again this year, and to the M.C.C. Club for the use of their clubs rooms on each Wednesday Night.

### (g) Match Committee

It was unfortunate the Melbourne Cricket Club did not allow the women to play their finals over the same weekends as the men at the Albert Cricket Ground.

There were two U/13, one Div. 1 and one Div. 3 team withdrawals this year.

The fixture was provided in the Magazine. All rounds, mens and womens, and all Special Events information was provided in the EVENTS CALENDAR.

Many thanks to the members of this Committee for their long hours and late nights to grade teams and to produce our fixtures and finals schedule.

#### 2. PLAYING ACTIVITIES

### (a) Domestic

There were six(6) State League and one(1) Division One game played at Olympic Park No. 2 this year. All were played on Saturday nights because all the Friday nights had been booked in January. If we are to continue the promotion of our game at this venue, or any other night time venue, we will have to book for Friday nights pryor to Christmas, as the Saturday night attendances this year were well down on the Friday night attendances of last year. Also at this venue was a Victorian Under 22 Team vs. U.S.A. Under 19's where the visitors ran out winners 14-12.

The Victorian seniors met the Australian Under 19's for two matches, the 4th July Local International's Annual game, the U.S.A Under 19's for a game and Yale University for a game all pryor to the Australian Championships in Adelaide. Many thanks to Bill Stahmer and Alan Gandy for their efforts with the senior state team and assistance with the visiting teams this year.

State League and Division 1 finals were played at the Albert ground, with attendances of approximately 400-500 for each weekend. The Grand Final of each of these grades were of a very high standard and very exciting games to watch.

The State League section saw 3rd place team Malvern beating 4th place Chadstone. Williamstown 2nd place were beaten by 1st place Surrey Park. Malvern then beat Williamstown in the preliminary final. The Grand Final between Surrey Park and Malvern provided a spectacular display of skills, fitness and excitment with the lead changing many times during the game. It was a very releived Surrey Park coach in Dennis Trainor after the game since his previous two attempts had resulted in losses, 87 with Chadstone and 85 with Surrey Park. 1981 and 84 had been wins for him with Surrey.

The presentation was well attended by all players and spectators, with all clubs being present to accept Pennants.

### 4. CONCLUSION

I have enjoyed my three years as secretary in so much as the satisfation of the Operations Manual and the challenge of a newly structured Management Committee. The Manual will always be a chore to upgrade the pages as they are required but this is far outweighed by the value in which it should help Club Committees.

The most disappointting thing about my three years is the lack of time available to work on new projects. All time and energys seem to be swallowed up into the daily runnings of the Association and the associated paper work. My computer is the only reason I have been able to complete three years and it is a purchase that the V.L.A. must make. There are some 5 years of data stored on disc to make the duties of secretary more efficient.

Our Standing Committees must respond to the difficient areas of our game or we are going to be left futher and further behind. If you remember the growth of soccer about ten years ago, the explosion of basketball in the past two years and the present planning of the National Baseball competition we must get off our backsides and help ourselves. Its a fact that kids won't become any easier to recruit with all these high profile sports to choose from, so each Club must do their own little bit and recruit a good supply of juniors and at least get some publicity in their local papers.

The whole idea of the night games at Olympic Park No. 2 over the past two years, has not only been to expose players to the synthetic surface, but also to increase the publicity possibilities and to gauge the attendance figures and costs as to whether we could sustain our own venue. It is obvious to me now that at this point in time we do not have the support for such a venture.

Earlier this year a Club Treasurer was voicing his disapproval to the night games and also the finacial burden on Clubs. I informed the said Treasurer that if the night games attendances could be built up to 500-600 Adults per game, that each Club could look forward to a healthy little rebate at the end of the season as happened in 87. It is unfortunate that attendances this year were lower than last year and the result being a cost to the Association (Clubs).

I would sincerely like to thank the Record Secretaries, Barrie Moore 14 years and Frank Lansbury 21 years for their valued services. It is obvious that these two men will not hold these positions for ever and that someone else will have to take over one day. Our Treasurer Lester Young for his 5th year in the position. To the Deputy President Graham Sharpe and other Members of the management Committee Rob Jackson, Roger Barnes, Mike Hilsberg and Mark Kinderman thankyou very much for your contributions this year.

It is unfortunate the Alan Chiron is not standing for a third term but I understand completely. Alan has been fully committed in his role as President and his two year term has produced varied changes and improvements in the running of Association.

As for previous years Lacrosse Victoria has continued its programme of promoting lacrosse throughout Victoria.

Utilizing the services of experienced players and ex-players SOF-CROSSE clinics have been conducted at a large number of schools in both the metropolitan and country areas under arrangements made (a) with individual schools (b) with organizers of the Melbourne Sports Network and (c) as an active participant in the Victorian Sports Experience Program conducted under the successful Australian Sports Commission's AUSSIE SPORTS scheme.

Experience has shown that SOF-CROSSE is one of the most popular of the "modified" sports played under the V.S.E.P. with usually in excess of 200 participating during each clinic.(refer attached newspaper cuttings). It also continues to attract several teachers in each of the seminars conducted by the Australian Council for Health, Physical Education and Research with assistance of lecturers acting on behalf of Lacrosse Victoria.

Despite some difficulty with human resources Lacrosse Victoria is able to meet most requests for clinics largely as a result of the co-operation and assistance of several members of the V.W.L.A. and on occasions by members of the V.L.A. Lacrosse Victoria is extremely grateful to those who have assisted them in their efforts.

As part of its promotional activities Lacrosse Victoria undertook to provide SOF-CROSSE information on a "free" basis to school children in receipt of a publication printed by Five Mile Press - Free Stuff for Kids. Subsequently requests from over 200 children have been received from children in all Australian States and are being processed.

In addition to the above activities Lacrosse Victoria has continued to work on behalf of its member Association in the submission of grants to Government for assistance. It also continues to be a "contact point" for people seeking information on a wide range of activities concerning the VLA Inc and V.W.L.A. Inc.

It is essential therefore that it is kept up to date with matters of interest as far as they concern the public and member clubs.

A very important and time consuming task is the preparation and publication of "The Lacrosse Player". Through the assistance of Keith Chamberlain envelope labels are produced at little monetary cost but considerable difficulty continues because of the lack of co-operation of some clubs in providing magazine lists and of importance clubs and recipients failing to keep Lacrosse Victoria up to date with the correct addresses of their members. Of some concern is the apathy of clubs in meeting dead-lines and providing articles of general interest to the lacrosse fraternity. To the regular contributors "THANK YOU".

As part of the development plan prepared for the next 3 years efforts planned for the next 12 months include the development of Mod-crosse in conjunction with the continued development of SOF-CROSSE. MOD-CROSSE will occupy an important place in overall development being the transitionary game between SOF-CROSSE and Lacrosse. Regional school competitions are being investigated.

Provision has also been made for the conduct of Level O coaching courses to aid the development of suitable skills to teach MOD-CROSSE.

Reports on the activities of Lacrosse Victoria are regularly reviewed at regular meetings of the Directorate comprising delegates - Mr.L.W.Taylor (Chairman), (VLA), MrA.Chiron (VLA), Mrs J.Jacksen (VWLA) and Mrs S.Green (VWLA). Reports on clinics on known sof-crosse activities are provided to clubs for action as appropriate.

It is most important that clubs utilize this information for recruiting purposes. It is unfortunate however that Lacrosse Victoria is unable to provide precise information of purchasing of equipment as it only has access to the records of its own activities.

The financial situation of Lacrosse Victoria remains satisfactory with income being derived from Government Grants, Equipment Hire and Sales, Clinics and Subsidies provided by member Associations. It is strongly urged that clubs and their members utilize the services of "The Lacrosse Shop" for the supply of the complete range (Brine and STX) lacrosse equipment and reduce the dependance on Associations for its operation.
