ANNUAL REPORT - SEASON 1962

Gentlemen,

Your Committee presents for your consideration and approval the 84th Annual Report, Statement of Income and Expenditure and Balance Sheet for Season 1962.

1. MEMBERSHIP

The slight upward trend in team and player membership has been maintained, however the number of Clubs engaged in the Saturday competitions has not increased. We gained NEWPORT but unfortunately lost CLAYTON.

The encouraging feature was the additional schools taking part in the mid-week fixtures, particularly the Technical Schools.

The Honorary Record Secretary, Mr. H.E. Sterck, has again compiled a most comprehensive and detailed report of all team results and the performances of individual players, and the Committee wish to place on record their sincere thanks and appreciation for his invaluable work.

2. ASSOCIATION MANAGEMENT.

A. GENERAL

(i) The management of the Association's affairs was again carried out primarily by the Executive Committee, whose decisions and recommendations, generally, met with the approval of members.

This administrative procedure has proved successful over a number of years and has expedited and facilitated the running of the Association's business.

(ii) There was one Special General Meeting of members called.

Due to insufficient numbers to form a Quorum (15), the meeting lapsed and a further date set for the meeting. This reflects sadly the lack of interest in the affairs of the Association.

When the meeting was subsequently held, eight (8) Clubs were represented and five (5) Clubs were not represented.

This meeting was open to all registered members of the Association.

B. A.I.C. CHAMPIONSHIPS LACROSSE

The change of name from "Carnival" to "Championships" became effective this year.

The Championships were held in Adelaide and this series comprised a double round, or six (6) matches.

Eight of the nine senior Clubs were represented on the team, who finished as runners-up to South Australia.

The players and Coach are congratulated by the Committee for the fine effort they made on the field.

The Committee wish to especially record their sincere thanks and appreciation to Mr. J. Liddell, a former member of this Association now resident in South Australia, for his excellent services as Manager of the V.A.L.A. Championship team.

C. JUNIOR INTER-STATE LACROSSE

The annual South Australia versus Victoria Junior Match for the Carl Schulz Cup was also played in Adelaide this year.

The team scored a most convincing win for Victoria, and the standard of play displayed by the Juniors augurs well for the future.

The Committee extends hearty congratulations to the players, the Coach and the Manager on their outstanding success.

The Committee wish to highly commend the members of both the Championships team and the Junior team for their exemplary conduct off the field, which was a credit both to themselves and Victorian Lacrosse.

The Committee acknowledges with thanks the services of the Selectors, Coaches and Managers of the State teams, and also to Mr. T. Campbell for conducting the Potential Colts Training Squad.

D. INTERNATIONAL LACROSSE(i) AUSTRALIAN OVERSEAS TEAM

The highlight of 1962 was the first ever Australian team to play overseas. A party of 27, made up of 22 players and 5 officials, played a series of 11 matches in the U.S.A. and 3 matches in England. Full match results are given in the Honorary Record Secretary's Report.

Of the 22 players in the overseas team, 17 were Victorians.

Victorian Don Miller was the Captain and the Committee wish to record their congratulations to him.

Of the 5 Officials, 4 were Victorians. The A.I.C. President, Mr. R. Goldstream, the Team Coach, Mr. C. Weatherill, the Assistant to the Manager, Mr. F. Durhan, and the Team Secretary, Mr. H. Sterck.

The Committee wish to extend congratulations to the Victorian members of this, the first Australian Overseas Team.

(ii) COMBINED ENGLISH UNIVERSITIES TEAM

It can be reported that the A.I.C. confidently expects a visit to Australia next year of a combined English Universities Lacrosse Team.

(iii) EXHIBITION MATCH

The Victorian members of the recent Australian Overseas Team, with the assistance of several senior players from member Clubs, staged an Exhibition Match at the conclusion of the season.

This match, which was well attended, gave an excellent demonstration of certain of the playing Rules encountered overseas, and which could well be considered for adoption for a trial period in Australian Lacrosse.

4. SPECIAL EFFORTS

The Special Effort concluded early in the year, and to assist finances for the Victorian contingent of the overseas team, was most successful.

The Committee wish to record their thanks and congratulations to Mr. N. Jeffrey for the wonderful job he did in organising the Special Effort.

The later Special Effort, conducted during the season and to assist the Victorian team to the A.L.C. Championships in Adelaide, was very poorly supported. The Committee regrets that Lacrosseurs were unable to live up to their usual generous support in this instance.

The Committee also wish to record their grateful thanks to Mr. F. Hogarth, who did everything possible to try and make a success of this Special Effort.

Permission has been granted to Mr. N. Jeffrey to conduct a Special Effort in 1963, and the Committee hopes that all Clubs and players will again give their full support.

5. SOCIAL ACTIVITIES

A Highly successful and enjoyable "Send-Off" evening was given to the Victorian members of the overseas team.

The Committee wish to record thanks to all who ably assisted in the success of this function.

There were a number of Club exchanges of social visits with Clubs from South Australia at the conclusion of the season. Such inter-change of visits must go a long way toward establishing good relations between the two States and individually, must yield many good and firm friendships.

6. GENERAL

A. LIFE MEMBER

The Committee has pleasure in recording that at the last Annual General Meeting, Mr. C.F.Lansbury was appointed as a Life Member of the Association.

Over many years Mr. Lansbury has given invaluable service to the Game and the Committee trust that for many more years to come he will enjoy, in the best of good health, the honor of being a Life Member of our Association.

D. FINANCE

This past year there was no major contribution to Association funds from Special Efforts, and the Association made several Grants of Assistance to new teams. Operating expenses are considerable and never adequately covered by normal income.

The Committee wish to record their thanks and appreciation to the Honorary Treasurer, Mr. C.F. Lansbury, for a job well done.

E. STICKS

Mr. F. Maggs, the only retail supplier in Victoria, has maintained adequate stocks of imported sticks and Victorian Lacrosse is grateful for his foresight and co-operation.

Certain Clubs have been able to arrange the import of sticks direct which has been of benefit to the individual purchaser.

The Association has to hand for testing purposes, two Lacrosse Sticks of English manufacture and a report will be submitted to member Clubs in due course.

F. A.L.C.

The current A.L.C. would appear to be a progressive and vigorous body, as the recent overseas tour and the proposed English visit would tend to indicate. They have held several meetings in the past year and are fast achieving one of their main objectives - unanimity and a better understanding between the member States.

The Committee wish to extend their congratulations and best wishes for a successful term of office to our Honorary Record Secretary, Mr. H. Sterck, who has been elected as Honorary Secretary of the Australian Lacrosse Council.

G. REFEREES ASSOCIATION

The regular Referees have now formed their own Association. It is to be hoped that this organisation is successful and grows in number.

The Committee congratulate the Referees on forming the Association and wish to thank all Referees, both Professional and Amateur, full-time and part-time, for officiating at the various Association matches.

H. DEVELOPMENTAL SUB-COMMITTEE

A Developmental Sub-Committee has been formed with a primary object in view of establishing junior Lacrosse in new districts and schools.

Whilst the work if this sub-committee may not bear fruit for a couple of years, it should prove of tremendous advancement to the Game.

Two possible new teams next season are Glenroy and Waverley High School.

I. MEETING OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE AND SENIOR CLUB OFFICIALS

A meeting of the Executive Committee and Club Presidents and Secretaries proved so successful that it has been requested that at least three similar meetings be held during next season.

J. GARNET PEAGRAM MEMORIAL TROPHY

Thanks to the generosity of Mrs. M. Peagram, a handsome trophy, in memory of her late husband, has been established for perpetual competition for the Best and Fairest player in the Under 16 section. - The first award will take place at the conclusion of the 1963 season.

K. PUBLICITY

The Committee wish to record their grateful thanks to Messrs. J. Daw and H. Sterck who voluntarily under-took to obtain such publicity for Lacrosse as they could. They contributed regularly to the newspapers and also forwarded items to radio and T.V. Stations.

Mr. R. Goslin, the Publicity Officer, also obtained news coverage for which the Committee extends thanks.

L. APPRECIATION

The Committee wish to record their sincere thanks to our Auditor, Mr. O. Unkenstein, for his services.

The Committee wish to place on record their grateful thanks to Mr. J. Daw for making his telephone available each Saturday to receive match results and also for his untiring and ever-ready assistance in any capacity at Association matches and functions.

The Committee wish to extend thanks to all who assisted Lacrosse in any way.

Season 1962 had many facets. Some good, some a little disturbing. HON. RECORD SECRETARY'S REPORT FOR SEASON 1962

Gentlemen,

The 1962 Season proved to be another milestone in the History of Australian Lacrosse. The successful tour of an Australian Team to the United States of America and the United Kingdom should be the forerunner of further tours abroad. Within the next few years an International programme could be established with exchange of visits from teams from the four Lacrosse playing countries. Victoria, through the work, initiative and drive of the President and Noel Jeffrey aided by a solid core of workers, gained the lions share of the membership of the Australian Team and in fact made the tour possible. Further mention is made later in this report.

On the home front Victoria was faced with the task of fielding a Carnival team with almost all the experienced top line players unavailable owing to the necessity of further absence from work. This gave more players than usual the opportunity of training and representing their State. The net result was the most representative team ever to play on behalf of Victoria. A record of the Carnival is to be found at the end of this report.

In the meantime the number of registered players again increased. The unfortunate withdrawal of Clayton was somewhat compensated by the formation of the Newport Club. Footscray doubled their strength and managed two "C" and one Under 16 team for the whole season. A second under 16 team was tried but withdrew after playing five matches. Club strengths remained close to the 1961 level with the exception of University whose number fell by almost 40%. This places them in a very precarious position. Williamstown entered a record number of teams for one Club. They had eleven teams participating in five sections.

FINAL COMPETITION RESULTS"A" SECTION

This section contained 9 teams as against 10 teams last season. Coburg re-entered and the two extra Caulfield and Malvern teams withdrew. A bad feature of the "A" section was the giving of two Walk Overs at the end of the Home and Home round.

Caulfield brilliantly won their third successive Premiership. Brian Griffin (Caulfield) again headed the goalthrowing list with 94 goals for the season. Caulfield recorded further "A" section success when Iven Bryning won the Vince Healy Memorial Trophy for the Best and Fairest player.

Malvern went right through the season undefeated until the Grand Final but could not withstand Caulfield's final challenge. Williamstown continued to improve and finished third. Coburg, 1961 Premiers of "B" Section, finished a creditable fourth. Caulfield equalled an old record having won three successive Premierships in 1892, 3 and 4.
