Gentlemen,

Your Committee has pleasure in presenting for your consideration this the 78th Annual Report, Statement of Income and Expenditure and Balance Sheet for Season 1956.

It is noteworthy that the decline in numbers of senior players continues. The juniors, however, are still increasing and it would appear that we are passing a transitionary period. A note of warning is issued here however that every effort must be applied to retain those juniors now entering into the game.

Full details of membership, numbers of Clubs and players and match results are contained in the Honorary Record Secretary's Report which is attached.

Management of the Association by your Executive continued to function smoothly although it is felt that the success of the various committees would be materially assisted if these were run and organised by younger enthusiasts.

Best and Fairest Player

The Vince Healey Memorial Cup for 1956 was won by Keith Atkins, goalkeeper for Malvern Red. This was a most worthy performance as Keith was playing his first year in goals. He had a close tussle with another goalkeeper, Roy Dickson of Surrey Park and the result was in doubt until the final home and home match. Congratulations to both Keith and Roy and to Malvern Club in once again providing this season's best and fairest player.

Interstate Visits

This was Carnival year, and what a year! After me difficulties had been encountered in finally getting away the best available team, the critics were confounded when the team which was considered to be one of the weakest ever to have been sent interstate, actually brought home the Garland McHaig Cup.

Our thanks must go to Ern Selth who did a colossal job as team manager. He was ably supported by several assistants who made the trip at their own expense.

Plaudits for this team would be incomplete without praising the efforts of Alf Evans as Coach. To him and to Mr. J. L. Patching as P. T. Instructor, go our very sincerest thanks for all the time and effort which they put into the job.

The team spirit developed on the trip to Perth was materially assisted by the hospitality provided by the Western Australian Association, and our sincerest thanks must go to the W.A.L.A. The Perth trip is one which we will always look forward to, win or lose.

Mention must also be made of our opponents, both W.A. and S.A. We trust they can forgive us for trying so hard to retain the Garland McHaig Cup.

Juniors: Early in September, the under 16 boys completed a happy year for Victoria in narrowly defeating South Australia 18-16 in Adelaide. The team was:-

This was an excellent match, the Victorians just lasting long enough with better physical condition. The standard of play both tactical and stickwork was as high as has been seen in these matches.

Phil. Shappere once again is to be thanked for the fatherly manner in which he handles these boys. It contributes materially to their success.

Some measure of the team's success must also go to the coach, Fred Graf.

Finance:

Faced with a year of heavy expenditure in financing a Carnival Team to Perth and a Junior Team to Adelaide, strenuous efforts were made to raise money.

A Barbecue arranged at the property of Mr. Hugh Wood in February was marred by shocking weather and resulted in a small lose, despite the support of many who braved the elements. Our thanks go to Hughie for all the facilities he provided.

Another venture in which nearly every senior member of the Association participated, viz. the Monster Special Effort with a Holden Car as the prize, resulted in a nett profit to the Association of £1190. This amount will place your Association on a much firmer footing and provided some similar effort,

possibly on a smaller scale, can be organised each year, we need have no further financial worries.

The driving force behind this Monster Special Effort has been Mr. Noel Jeffrey and your Committee feels that a mere commendation in this report would be a totally inadequate gesture to Noel for the energy and application which he so successfully put into this venture.

Several Clubs were materially assisted by the Association in the purchase of sticks, for, despite a subsidy of £2 per stick provided for 97 sticks to various clubs, at least three Clubs had difficulty in meeting their commitments to the Association.

The supply of sticks through the Association has proved to be a severe strain on our finances and it has been decided to provide for the merchandising of sticks through normal channels of sports stores.

Sticks:

Although the shape and weight of Brady Hickory sticks is still open to improvement, breakages have been reduced to a minimum and the stick problem now seems to have solved itself.

A newly developed laminated stick proved unsuccessful in the developmental stages, however, by the introduction of several improvements, a satisfactory design and shape has now been evolved which should provide a stick equal in quality to the pre-war Lally's "Extra-Special". These also will be available through sports stores.

SOCIAL

Mention has already been made of the Barbecue. The only other social function was the Annual Smoke and Presentation Night. Despite the success of this function last year, the attendance was most disappointing and your Committee could not recommend continuance of this function unless it receives better support.

Together with all other Amateur Sporting bodies, your Association was invited to provide one member to participate in the Olympic Torch Relay. Our interstate captain John Heathcote was accorded this honour.

The annual Queen's Birthday Gymkhana suffered also from lack of interest from senior players. A series of matches for under age players was held in order that the interest in this spectacular event should not completely die out:

One of the most encouraging signs of the return to popularity of our game was the mid-week competitions. Two separate series under the Associations auspices were held in four High Schools and five Technical Schools competed. Williamstown won the High Schools and Swinburne the Technical Schools competitions. Both are to be heartily congratulated as it was first time up for each of them.

Committee Meetings:

Four General Committee Meetings were held during the year at which respectively 25, 20, 23, and 18 members and delegates were present.

Donations:

A few small donations were received and to these supporters we express our sincere thanks for their continued interest. There are however, many others whose support we would relish.

Referees:

The problem of referees now appears to be the only serious hurdle in our progress yet to be overcome. The apathy with which many senior players regard this chore must be criticised in the strongest terms.

Many times senior players are required to referee junior and lower grade matches because former players cannot be found to do so. This arduous task is not always tackled with relish and the result is a match which nobody enjoys. It is surely the senior players' responsibility when umpiring to see that other players get as much enjoyment from the game as he would expect himself.

There are however a small number of senior players who do tackle their job with enthusiasm and it ispleasing to read the complimentary remarks made by Captains about them in their match reports. It is also encouraging to your Committee to read some of the comments and criticisms by these referees. It is of interest to quote the following from Referees' reports of Under 16 matches:-

- 1. "A good even game but the players are inclined to be over-vigorous. It is suggested that this Club be asked to teach their players to treat their lacrosse racquets as racquets, not axes, when checking".
- 2. "If more interest was taken in this team, they would do much better".
- 3. "Apparently seniors not interested in this team.

 Morale of team not high, interest of at least one senior player would work wonders".

Your Committee desires to record its great appreciation of those men who gave of their best in regularly turning out when they were required. In particular Messrs. Fred Durham Alec Donald and Charlie Middleton are to be sincerely thanked for their co-operation. We look forward to their continued assistance.

It is proposed to form an Amateur Referees Association which will organise and train referees to a uniform standard. Details of this Association will be announced before the commencement of next season.

CONCLUSION

The season has ended on a bright note. Finances are sound, prospects for juniors are good and provided matches can be made enjoyable with good refereeing, the new season can be approached with an optimistic outlook.

Your Committee has already announced the formation of a fund of £500 for the promotion of new Clubs. So with the lead provided by the M.C.C. and Williamstown Clubs with their junior team activities, let us all put our shoulders to the wheel and make 1957 season a good one.

In conclusion we must record the return to good health by your Executive Chairman, Mr. I. J. Taylor. Ike became very ill in June and was most disappointed when he was unable to visit Perth with the Carnival Team. He is now almost completely recovered and should soon again be able to provide us with his advice and guidance. Best of luck, Ike!

Others who suffered illnesses during the year and to whom we extend our best wishes are Hon. Treasurer, Bill Tickner, Eddie Taylor and President Bob Coldstream.

Obituary: It is with regret that we record the untimely passing in a car smash of Alan Curry, a young and popular member of Caulfield Club, who it may be recalled was a member of the 1952 Junior Victorian team.

The same clubs which took part in the 1955 competitions again fielded teams in the 1956 season and fourteen players from U.H.S.O.B. - disbanded at the end of 1954 - were playing with some regularity. The last time no club was lost to the Association was between the 1950 and 1951 seasons.

The slow downward trend in the number of teams taking part in the open age sections continued but the junior grades showed a net increase of three after taking into account the amalgamation of the Camberwell-Glen Iris and Surrey Park Under 16 sides late in the season.

Registrations showed the same trends as with teams. A drop of 13 in open age players was more than offset by an increase of 35 amongst the juniors helped mainly by a substantial influx to the Williamstown Club. Of the other clubs only Caulfield, with a marked loss, showed no gain in under age players.

As was indicated in last season's report the total number of re registrations is apt to cause a misleading impression of the strength of the game in the State. The summary below gives the division between those who played regularly and those who did not do so.
