PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

Gentlemen,

November, 1975,

1975 has undoubtedly been an interesting year for Victorian lacrosseurs. Six innovations come readily to my mind.

Firstly the new system of grading our open-age teams as recommended by our Committee of Advice in December, 1974. As stated by that Committee "the intention and effect of this system is to produce an undivided multiple club format for A section and B section with "second" teams not permitted from any club." This system I suggest worked sufficiently well in 1975 to warrant its continuance in 1976.

Secondly we saw the adoption of the international rules of lacrosse, with a couple of minor alterations to suit local conditions. This is a major achievement if international games are to become a regular feature of lacrosse competition.

Two further recommendations of the Committee of Advice which were put into practice this year were the elimination of a final series of games in E, F. and G. sections and the introduction of an Uunder 19 section.

A most important venture was the production of "Lacrosse" a news letter, that by disseminating not only Association, A.L.C. and club news, but by also including numerous items of interest to followers of lacrosse, hopes to gain and retain the interest and support of all interested in our game. Terry Allington who undertook the task of editing this paper deserves our sincere congratulations for an excellent production. Its future depends on the support it receives from the clubs - several of whom have made little effort to contribute articles or news items this year.

My sixth point concerns the gradual introduction of appointing two referees to this control of senior section and home and home games. While this ideally/most desirable, I doubt its wisdom while we have such a small pool of referees to draw on. Surely our other open-age sections, and particularly our Under 19 section, not only deserve, but need the services of experienced referees in as many of their games as possible. This is something I suggest the clubs through their representatives on the Management Committee, should lay down firm guide lines for the 1976 season.

Preparations for the 1976 tour of the U.S.A., Canada and England are well advanced. Congratulations to the nine Victorians who "made" the team and to Ron Toomey on his appointment as co-captain. Our congratulations too, to Ted and Joy Clayfield, the husband and wife combination who have been selected as Tour Director and Trainer/Physiotherapist respectively, also to our publicity officer, Alan Chiron who has been appointed manager of the team. I know I speak for all Victorians when I wish them an enjoyable and successful tour.

Our secretary Steve Jacobs through pressure of work and the undertaking of further study has not re-nominated. Thank you Steve for the work you have done for the Association during the last two years. Although there was no nomination lodged for the position I am delighted to be able to report we have secured an eminently suitable replacement who only needsyour endorsement this evening to become our secretary. I refer to Bill Taylor.

Premiership pennants were again widely distributed this year and it was very pleasing to see some new names included in the list of successful clubs. Our hearty congratulations to all concerned, both

ANNUAL REPORT

Gentlemen,

Your Committee presents for your consideration and approval the 97th Annual Report and the Records for season 1975.

Season 1975 has seen many changes in various administrative areas and attitudes and most of these are covered in the President's address, most notable of these perhaps, being the successful introduction of a lacrosse news magazine and the alteration to the grading system. Both of these changes, and many others resulted from the meeting of the Committee of Advice which was formed and met late in 1974.

A. Administration

(1) Management Committee

The general administrative affairs of the Association were carried out through regular monthly meetings of the Management Committee. One additional meeting was held to consider the report of the Committee of Advice, a total of 12 meetings being held. As has come almost to be expected many occasions existed when Clubs were not represented at Management Committee meetings, and by now all Clubs must be well aware that their interests would be best served using their opportunity to take part in the Association.

It was particularly noticable that this year almost all meetings ran to quite lengthy sessions, and it was often necessary to defer matters until the next meeting. While the system of Management we are using continues to function adequately, should much more growth in the Association occur, the present system could become unwieldy and the need to reorganise our system of management could become apparent.

(2) Permit Committee

This year the Permit Committee functioned with an extremely high degree of efficiency.

The thanks of the Committee are extended to all members for their efforts, and particularly to Mr. Don Miller who served his first term as Secretary to this Committee in a most satisfactory manner.

(3) Tribunal

Many meetings of the tribunal were convened during this year to resolve the various matters referred to it and to consider player reports and appeals.

Appreciations are extended to all members and particularly to Mr. Ed. Spreadborough who accepted the duties of Secretary to the Tribunal in the absence of any formal nomination for the position.

(4) Visits Committee

With the senior interstate match held in Hobart and organised through A.L.C. The Visits Committee was not active. The various officials of senior, colts and juniors teams carried the responsibility for organising the various trips as all the games this year were played outside Victoria.

The thanks of the Committee are extended to all those who placed so much effort in those areas.

(5) Match Committee

This Committee has by undesirable tradition been hampered by late team entries and withdrawals. This year redraws of fixtures were found to be necessary even after the season had started. This situation is certainly unsatisfactory in the extreme and is one reason that the Committee of Advice devoted considerable time to the problems of grading. Many people involved with lacrosse but not with the mechanics of grading teams and producing a fixture were critical at this years gradings, however if the system adopted is perservered with and eventually forced to its logical conclusion a satisfactory pattern can be set, gradings and fixtures can be made available at an early date if and when Clubs accept their responsibilities in this regard.

The Association's thanks are due to those members of the Committee who produced a fixture for 1975 despite (difficulties.

B. Playing Activities

(1) Playing Rules

In anticipation of A.L.C. approval International playing rules were adopted for season 1975. This followed on the meeting of the National Coaching Conference, and thanks to the efforts of those coaches who attended that conference and subsequently made available copies of the new rules, and convened an orientation night, the introduction ran quite smoothly.

(2) Junior Gymkhana

The popularity of the Annual Queens Birthday six a side competition appears to grow. Mr. Bruce Freeman once again did an excellent job of organising this event and the Association's thanks are due to him and to those who supported and assisted him.

(3) Fairest and Best Player Award

The congratulations of the Committee are extended to John Butkiewich of Williamstown Club.

(4) Interstate Lacrosse

Appreciations are extended to Selectors, Managers, Coaches and Trainers for their efforts in connection with our representative teams. Seniors, Colts and Juniors competed in matches during the year.

(5) Presentation Ball

The end of season function this year took the format of a most enjoyable ball.

The thanks of the Committee are extended to Surrey Park Club for conducting the organisation of the ball in a most satisfactory way.

C. General

(1) Referees

The Victorian Division of ALRA was this year affiliated as a club with the Association. A high and imposing standard of refereeing was evident throughout the year.

(2) Publicity

This aspect of our administration was again handled

most capably by Mr. Alan Chiron. His work in promoting the Interstate senior game staged in Tasmania must surely rate special consideration from the Committee.

Also active in the area of promoting and publicling our sport was Mr. Roy Freeman whose untiring efforts especially in promoting the final series particularly deserves the thanks of the committee.

D. Conclusion

A review of achievement for 1975 is normally a decidedly subjective affair when conducted by one person. It would certainly appear that 1975 has seen many improvements to our sport with the introduction of international rules, the publication of good quality news magazine and a change of grading systems.

The Association exists primarily to facilitate and promote the playing of lacrosse and the changes that have been made, the inovations that have occurred have been in the interest of the game in the opinion of those persons who make up the various committees that administer the sport. Many of these matters arcse from the Report of the Committee of Advice and all were raised not with the interest of any one Club or individual in mind, nor with the thought that instantaneous success would result, but rather with the interests of the sport and with a view to the bng term good of the sport.

Those who are familiar with the report will be aware that in the not to distant future the policies adopted as a result of the report will bring new pressures to bear on many of our Clubs, in the case of the larger Clubs this could take the form of a surfiet of players, and in the smaller clubs the need to administer teams in junior competitions. When this does occur and when the Association hears of this as it no doubt will it will be necessary to keep the larger perspective of the good of the sport overall clearly in mind, or the result could well be a less than progressive set of decisions, in fact a return to where the game stood some twelve months ago.

I will not be available as secretary in 1976, my best wishes to Bill Taylor in taking up the position and my thanks to all those Association members who have accepted the pressures that may have fallen their way during my term of office.

Finally the very best of wishes for a happy Christmas and a prosperous New Year are extended to all members and supporters.
