#### PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

November, 1976.

Gentlemen.

A very full coverage of the year's activities is given by our secretary in his excellent annual report. There are however a few points I should like to add or in some cases emphasize.

The general administration of the Association has proceeded smoothly under the overall control of the Management Committee most ably supported by our secretary, and the various sub-committees upon whom falls the majority of the work associated with the implementation of the decisions of the Management Committee and the routine conduct of our inter-club games.

Our special thanks here must be given to those officials who constitute the Match, the Permit, the Visits, the Investigation and the Final Series Committees. Few realize the time and thought these men give to our game so that clubs and their members can enjoy their sport.

We cannot afford however to be complacement as there are several areas where improvement is not only desirable, but essential if our game is to progress. The secretary's report covers them in some detail, but I must emphasize them because of their importance. Briefly they are -

- (i) Non-representation at Management Committee meetings by several clubs.
- (ii) Lack of publicity this year the association has reached en all-time low in this important area.
- (iii) The Junior Advisory Panel has not received the support it deserves.
- (iv) The recruitment of referees is sadly lagging. Surely a player retiring from active play could afford to devote one or two seasons to refereeing.

There are several items on the credit side that make encouraging reading.

- (i) As the result of representations made to the Minister of Youth Sport & Recreation the association received the sum of \$1570 to be spent as outlined in the Annual Report. Under the guide lines laid down I think we can also confidently expect some assistance towards the cost of the 1978 World Championship.
- (ii) The interest shown by teachers of physical education in several colleges in our game is encouraging. The liaison work of John Harris, and the courses conducted by Les Goding and Don Miller at the Preston Institute of Technology have created great interest in the game. 1977 could see similar courses at the Footscray Institute.
- (iii) The transfer of Mr. Peter Lane of C.G.I. and his three boys to Hobart combined with the interest already existing in that city, could conceivably lead to lacrosse again being played in Tasmania. Mr. Lane is prepared to look at the possibility but will undoubtedly need some initial assistance from the mainland states if he is to succeed.

Early this year Mr. John F. Rossiter, our patron since 1970, took up his post as Agent General for Victoria in London. Λ letter of congratulation on his appointment was sent to him from the V.A.L.A. and we are happy to welcome Dr. W. McRae Russell to his stead.

On behalf of your Committee it gives me much pleasure to submit for your approval this 98th Annual Report covering the Association's activities during the 1976 season.

The Treasurers Report and Financial Statements are attached.

#### 1. Administration

#### (a) Management Committee

The administration of the Association is controlled by this Committee which is composed of delegates from all the affiliated clubs together with the President, General Secretary and Treasurer. This Committee is the main line of communication between the Association as such and the Clubs which form it. Accordingly, it is essential that all clubs should be represented at each of its meetings but it is disappointing to report that at several of the ten meetings held during the year, not all clubs had a delegate present.

Usually a great volume of work is transacted at Management Committee meetings and although the President has commented on this matter several times some delegates still do not take notes. We trust that all relevant information gets back to those clubs just the same.

Regular meeting night is the third Wednesday of each month unless otherwise advised and a prompt start at 7.30 p.m. is necessary to enable all the necessary business to be dealt with by the stipulated 10.30 finish time.

#### (b) Permit Committee

This Committee met each Tuesday during the season to collate each week's match reports, record scores, deal with any transfer applications and any other "permits to play" as requested. Unfortunately the work of the Permit Committee is made more difficult by several clubs who are consistently late in lodging match reports.

A special thanks to Don Miller for his work as Secretary of this Committee and the Record Secretaries for coping with the hyroglyphics on many match reports so that up-to-date records were available each week.

#### (c) Tribunal

This body was two under strength for most of the year and although a fifth member was elected in July this still left the Tribunal one short of quota and made the job just that much more difficult. The 1976 season gave the Tribunal plenty of work and the Association extends to its members sincere thanks for giving so freely of their time and performing one of the most onerous tasks connected with any sport.

Our thanks go to Ed. Spreadborough for acting again as Tribunal Secretary and for his precise and informative reports of the Tribunal's preceedings.

Thanks also to the M.C.C. for making their club rooms available for Tribunal meetings.

#### (d) Visits Committee

As there were no visits by interstate teams this year the Committee confined its activities to fund raising and provided financial assistance to both senior and junior teams for their trips to Adelaide and Perth respectively.

#### (e) Match Committee

Team entries this year were received in reasonable time and after direction from the Management Committee, gradings continued in line with the Committee of Advice recommendations . Members of this Committee are to be complimented on their pre-season preparations and for the excellent fixtures, both senior & junior which were printed and distributed before the start of the season.

#### (f) General

The Association is fortunate to have in Doug Fox such an industrious and competent Liaison Officer for the Department of Youth, Sport and Recreation. Through Doug's endeavors a grant of \$1570 was received from the Department towards the cost of two full promotional kits and these have already been put to good use in schools.

An active role has also been taken in the Sports Council of Victoria at which Les Goding has acted as our able delegate.

A very pleasing aspect of Lacrosse promotion has been the introduction of Lacrosse as a course within the Physical Education degree program at the Preston Institute of Technology. A ten weeks course was conducted during the final term at the Institute with John Harris acting as the Associations Liaison Officer and Les Goding and Don Miller supervising tuition. It is worth noting that the Institute provided a complete set of equipment for the course which will become a permanent feature of the Physical Education program as long as we have members willing to offer their expertise to the Institute.

The Footscray Institute of Technology is geared to commence a similar course in 1977. As all participants in these course are future P. E. teachers and sports masters, the groundwork for the return of lacrosse to primary and secondary schools in the future is being undertaken.

At the start of the season a Junior Advisory Panel consisting of one delegate from each club was formed with the object of making recommendations for the betterment of Junior Lacrosse. Some excellent ideas have come from the Panel but not all clubs are attending meetings. As this could possibly have been due to the venue, future meetings will be held at the Amateur Sports Club on 2nd Monday at 8 p.m. We look forward to full club participation in this important part of the Association's administration.

Financial assistance towards Lacrosse pronotion was sought by only one club during the year and a grant of \$200 was made from Association funds. Other expenditure towards promotion which in providing belance of cost of promotional kits over and above the grant received from the Dept. of Youth Sport & Recreation.

## 2. Playing Activities and Advantage of the Activities and Advantage of the Activities and Activi

#### (a) Donestic.

The season extended over a longer term than usual with Ttwenty one home and away games being played. Whilst Williamstwon again took out the A Grade flag it wasnoticeable that during the semi- and preliminary finals only one goal separated the other three teams in the final tour. Perhaps 1977 could see some different colours in the A Grade Grand Final after so many years.

Congratulations to all the other winning teams and appreciation to Roy Freeman and Max Kindermann for their work in arranging grounds for the finals.

The season also saw the introduction of the three Referee system to our game when it was used in the grand finals of  $\Lambda$ , A Reserve and U.16. The advantages were obvious to most observers and we trust that the system will be used whenever possible for all major games in future.

#### (b) Interstate

Congratulations to all players who gained State selection this year and appreciation to the Coaches and Team Managers for their efforts.

Senior Championships were held in Adelaide during July where the South Australian side proved too strong and took out the honours. Victoria played well against W.A. to win 25 - 20 but went down against S.A. team 6 - 18. It was most unfortunate for Jeff Kelly that he suffered a fractured leg during the series which kept him out of the game for the rest of the season. We wish him a speedy recovery and return to the Malvern defense in 1977.

The Junior Championships were held in Perth where once again the South Australians triumphed. Victoria won comfortably against W.A. 22-12 but lost to S. A. 15-18.

#### (c) Gymkhana

Once again the Queens Birthday six-a-side matches proved very popular with the junior grades and the support given by parents and Lacrosse enthusiasts who attended helped towards financing the Junior State Teams visit to Perth.

The gymkhana was held at Glenroy and appreciations for the excellent arrangements are extended to Rob Jackson and Jack Couch.

#### (d) Fairest & Best Player Award

Congratulations to John Butkiewicz of Williamstown Club on winning the coveted Vince Healy award for the second year in succession. Having missed the first six games of the season whilst on tour with the Australian Team, John was really under a handicap and had to be consistently good to come out on top of the poll.

Fairest and Best awards for the other senior sections were won by A. Jackson (A. Res.), C. Rodrigues (B), and M. McCubbin (B. Res.).

Congratulations to those players on a fine season.

## (e) World Tour

Prior to the start of our season an Australian Team left for a tour of the U.S.A., Canada and England. Victorian Lacrosse was well represented with players in Ron Twomey (co-captain), Alan Bower, John Butkiewicz. Doug Carter, Greig Garmsworthy, Michael Hilsberg, David Joy, Jeff Kelly, Geoff Spicer, Bill Stahmer and Garry Tillotson. Ted Clayfield was appointed as Tour Director, Alan Chiron as Manager, Joy Clayfield as Physiotherapist and Bill Taylor as referee.

The team played thirteen games in all and was successful in eight of them.

Following receipt of the tour reports the Association convened a sub-committee of nine to explore ways and means whereby experience gained on any tour could best be passed on to those undertaking future tours. The sub-committee arrived at numerous recommendations which have been passed on to A.L.C.

#### (f) Referees

The lack of official referees has been a problem to the game for many years and the Administration has endeavoured, with only moderate sucess, to increase the number of gentlemen who are willing to take on this job on a permanent basis. The Referees Association will extend practical training to any competent and confident person wishing to referee, before being let loose on his own.

To be able to provide one Official Referee to each senior game let alone two as required by the rules, we have a long way to go. Clubs are again requested to contact all past players who may be likely candidates and endeavour to recruit them to the Referee ranks.

The Association gratefully acknowledges the efforts of the many players who acted as Referees during the season. Appreciation is also extended to the Secretary of the Referees Association, John Gunn, who handled match allocations of the Referees throughout the home and away series.

#### (g) Box Lacrosse

This fast and exciting code was again played at the Williamstown

courts under lights during the interval between the 1975 & 1976 Field seasons. Bight teams formed the competition and 68 players were registered.

The Sea Wasps finished premiers for the third consecutive season to retain the Jack Hodges Perpetual Shield, but in the March play-offs for the title of Champions the Squids ran out victors.

#### (h) Intervarsity

The competition was held in August this year at Latrobe University. Latrobe, Melbourne and Adelaide University teams took part with Melbourne taking out the honours. Scores were:

Melb. 36 v Latrobe 9 Adelaide 39 v Latrobe 6 Melb. 20 v Adelaide 17

Latrobe University acted as hosts to the Adelaide team and had charge of arrangements. Our appreciation to John Plummer and his hard working club officials who organised this successful series.

## (i) Schools Competition

There has been no regular Schools Competition for some years, however during this season some inter-school natches were played with Melbourne, Chadstone, Box Hill and Wattle Park High Schools taking part.

One of the main essentials for the advancement of Lacrosse is for it to be an alternative sport in schools. This would not only increase the number of both players and participating teams in the future, but bring the game to the notice of a much wider section of the public.

We must give school lacrosse high priority in the coming year and institute a definite program for its introduction to as many schools as possible.

## 3. General

#### (a) Australian Lacrosse Council

The A.I.C. has had a busy year in arranging a World Tour by an Australian team, organising the interstate championships, collating and printing a standard rule book and doing the spade-work necessary towards Australia's participating in the next World Series to be held in England during June/July of 1978.

A great deal of thought, work and time is put in by members of the A.L.C. and we must offer our thanks to those who are prepared to contribute so much to Lacrosse. Our appreciation is extended in particular to George Tillotson for the time and work he has given to his position as A.L.C. Delegate.

## (b) Publicity

Through not having an appointed Publicity Officer this year our game has fallen down badly in this area. It would seen that any sport played can get space in our dailies except Lacrosse. Obviously this is due to the lack of scores being relayed to a central point and passed on to newspapers in time for publication.

It is essential that the Office of Publicity Officer be filled and by someone who will make it his sole duty. Not only should home and away scores be published each week but the forthcoming Championship in Perth and the next World Series need to be publicised. If we cannot got any news coverage how can we expect to get Government subsidies?

#### (c) Magazine

Once again thanks are extended to those who have taken time and interest to contribute articles and information to our publication "Lacrosse",

Terry Allington has done a wonderful job in launching and maintaining the magazine and we thank him for his continued efforts as Editor. Appreciation also to Sue Fox and the Melbourne University Club for handling publication and distribution.

I feel quite sure that the only type of thanks Terry would want is in the form of more articles, club notes etc. and an expanded list of subscribers.

#### (d) Presentation Ball

The Surrey Park club again handled the arrangements and presented the 540 people who attended with the best night yet. Tremendous band, good meal and ample refreshments helped the dancers to see out the distance. Formalities occupied less than ten minutes and left plenty of time for all the goals that were thrown during the night.

Well done Surrey Park - any club aspiring to take this job from you will have to be sure of its capabilities.

An excellent standard has been set for this annual event and the only improvement which can be suggested is more support from some of the clubs whose representatives were present in very small numbers or not at all.

#### (e) Rules of Lacrosse

We have now played two seasons of what is commonly referred to as as "International Rules" and most players and coaches are conversant with the basic rules of the game as we now play it. However, there have been some amendments adopted to meet Australian conditions since the introduction of these rules in 1974. Lacrosse rules as applicable to all states have now been printed in book form and the Association has ample stocks for distribution to clubs at 60 cents per copy.

#### 4. Conclusion

It would be remiss of me if I did not make mention of the excellent work done by our Records Secretaries, Barry Moore and Frank Lansbury through whose efforts the year's statistics have been compiled and included in this report. I would take this opportunity also if thanking the Assistant Secretary, Steve Spreadborough for his help during the year and for shouldering the whole load during my absence overseas. A special word of praise also to Sue Fox for her expeditious handling of correspondence during the year and the manner in which she has brought this report together.

Finally, best wishes for a happy festive season and a prosperous New Year.

# VICTORIAN AMATEUR LACROSSE ASSOCIATION TREASURERS REPORT ON OPERATIONS FOR YEAR TO 31st OCTOBER, 1976

This year recorded a surplus of \$617 (1975 \$4002).

Administrative costs of the association remained on a steady level recording only a \$283 increase.

Competition expenses increased substantionally during the year and the significant movements are highlighted below.

- 1. During the year the V.A.L.A. Fixtures Printing was reintroduced at a cost of \$150.
- 2. The increased cost of trophies and medallions is reflected by the increased cost of the association stocks which were purchased in 1975.
- 3. The association embarked upon a program of purchasing up to date lacrosse publications for purchase by clubs. The increase in costs of \$164 records the write off of old stocks and a reduced price to clubs for publications purchased.
- 4. Interstate teams expenses rose this year by \$591 and is fully detailed in the financial statements.

Attention is drawn to the number of reports (7) originated by persons other than the Referee. This can be attributed in part to the use of non-professional and inexperienced referees in lower grades. Such reports presented some problems to the Tribunal in that they were not well documented in a number of cases and the evidence presented was inconclusive.

It is regrettable that the number of penalties imposed increased by 30% over the previous season, while the actual length of suspensions increased by 25%.
