CIRCULAR TO CLUB SECRETARIES

30th May, 1960.

Queen's Birthday Junior Gymkhana

A Junior Gymkhana, of a series of six-a-side matches for the "E", "F" and "G" sections, will be held at the Malvern Cricket Ground, rear of Malvern Town Hall, on Queen's Birthday holiday, Monday, June 13th.

There will be no field events, just a programme of six-a-side, knock-out matches and each team will have a minimum of 4 matches. First match commences at 10.24 a.m. sharp. There will be no admission charge to the ground.

The following conditions will apply:-

- (1) Entries are compulsory.
- (2) Each Club will enter 1 six-a-side team, in the respective sections, for each team they have engaged in the "E", "F" and "G" sections in the Saturday pennant competition.
- (3) Failure to enter a team will incur a fine of 15/- for each team not entered.
- (4) An entry fee of 6/- for each team-entered will be charged.
- (5) Competing teams must wear their correct Club uniform when taking part in matches. In cases where 2 teams from the one Club are engaged in the same match the Association will provide distinguishing sashes.
- (6) Points will be allotted for matches played as follows:

Win	-	2 points	Draw	-	1 point
Loss	-	0 points	Bye	-	2 points
- (7) At the conclusion of the programmed matches the 4 top teams in each section, i.e. the four teams with the most points, will play-off a series of final matches for each section on the "Page" system. The third and fourth teams will play-off and the first and second teams will play-off. The winners of the third and fourth teams match will then play-off against the losers of the first and second teams match. The winner of this match will then play-off against the winner of the first and second teams match to decide the winning team for the section.
- (8) Should 2 or more teams tie on points scored, the team higher on the list will be decided on percentages calculated as follows:-

$$\frac{\text{Goals for}}{\text{Goals against}} \times \frac{100}{1} = \text{Percentage}$$

- (9) Each match will be of 10 minutes duration, played in 2 halves each of 5 minutes. The opposing teams will change ends at the half-time interval, which shall be a period of approximately 30 seconds.
- (10) In the ordinary knock-out matches, if scores are equal at the end of the match, the team that scored the first goal shall be deemed the winner. If no goals have been scored the match will be declared a draw.
- (11) In the final round of matches, if the scores are equal at the end of the match, the teams will again change ends and play will be resumed until 1 goal is scored. The match will then be declared finished and the team scoring the goal will be declared the winner. If the extra time exceeds 5 minutes the Time-keeper will advise the Referee of this and the Referee will declare the match finished and a draw. The team then deemed to be higher on the list shall be decided on per centages as set out in paragraph No. 8.
- (12) Each participating Club must provide 1 ball for each team entered. Failure to do so will incur a fine of 10/- . The Association will not accept any responsibility for the care, loss or damage of balls.
- (13) The team named first in the programme for a match about to be played shall be regarded as the home team and shall be responsible to provide the ball for that particular match. Failure to do so will incur a fine of 5/- .
- (14) Each participating Club must provide at least 1 competent person to serve on a panel of Referees. Failure to do so will incur a fine of £2. 0. 0. Clubs are required to submit names of persons nominated to act as Referees, to be in the hands of the Hon. Asst. Sec. before first mail Friday, June 10th.
- (15) Referees will be required to report to the Referees Marshall for duty no later than 10.10 a.m. and serve under his direction throughout the programme. Any Referee defaulting in his duties will render his Club liable to a fine of £2. 0. 0. for each default, subject to the ruling of the Gymkhana Sub-committee.
- (16) Each referee will be required to wear white shirt and shorts and to provide his own whistle.
- (17) Each participating Club must provide at least 2 competent persons to serve on a panel of Gymkhana Officials. Failure to do so will incur a fine of £1. 0. 0. for each person not so provided. Clubs are required to submit names of persons nominated to act as Gymkhana Officials, to be in the hands of the Hon Asst. Sec. before first mail Friday, June 10th.
- (18) Gymkhana Officials will be required to report to the Hon. Sec. for duty no later than 10.10. a.m. and serve under his direction throughout the programme. Any Gymkhana Official defaulting in his duties will render

- his Club liable to a fine of £1. 0. 0. for each default, subject to the ruling of the Gymkhana Sub-committee.
- (19) Club officials will ensure that their teams, dressed and equipped ready to take the field, report to the Ground Marshalls in the respective ground assembly areas at least 3 minutes prior to their next programmed match.
- (20) In the event of a team not being ready to take the field when directed by the respective Ground Marshall, he will advise the Referee who will on the sounding of the starting bell or siren for that series of matches, bounce the ball in the centre and call "play". The team on the field may then score 1 goal and the Referee will then declare the match finished. The team on the field will be awarded a 1 - nil win.
- (21) The Club of any team not fulfilling its programmed match will be liable to a fine of £1. 0. 0. for each offence and the offending team will be penalised by the loss of 2 points from its aggregate, subject in both cases to the ruling of the Gymkhana Sub-committee.
- (22) Goal Umpires, who will be appointed by the Hon. Sec. from the panel of Gymkhana Officials, will be required to ensure that, immediately upon the completion of any match at which they officiate, the score card is taken without delay by the Captain of the winning team to the Records Marshall who will be in the upper grand-stand.
- (23) Ground Marshalls will be required to ensure that immediately following the completion of a series of matches the two teams next to use the ground move on to the ground from the assembly area without delay, ready to toss for ends and take their positions in readiness for the starting bell or siren. If necessary, Ground Marshall will take such action as set out in paragraph 20. Ground Marshalls will also ensure that non-participants keep clear of the playing areas.

Club Officials are requested to take careful note of ground numbers and also of ground assembly areas, which the announcer will describe frequently. They are also asked to take careful note of paragraph 23 and advise their team Captains of their responsibility.

# 'Space-men' look in Lacrosse

The "new look," it seems, is not confined to fashion.

Lacrosse players will assume a more ferocious appearance when new protective equipment is introduced this year.

Instead of just helmet and gauntlets, Australian lacrosseurs will soon wear a padded leather helmet and face mask, shoulder, knee and arm pads; and reinforced gauntlets that come almost to the elbow. Eighteen sets of this equipment, modelled on the American style, have been made.

"They proved successful, and will be used in the 'Six-a-side' and one-on-one matches before the winter season begins.

The Australian tour last year, the American Washington and Lee University team showed the value of the equipment.

In spite of the rougher

rules, the American team suffered no injury. The Australian team, used to the more skillful Australian game, carried many souvenirs.

The new equipment will make Australian lacrosse more spectacular according to Mr R. Coldstream, president of the Australian Lacrosse Council.

"And that is what the public wants. The danger of being seriously hurt often prevents the game becoming really spectacular," he says.

There will be a number of rule changes.

The use of "free arms" (warding off of another player with the arm) previously forbidden, will tend to roughen up the sport.

The council considered introducing the new equipment before the American tour. Western Australian teams for instance

use the face mask. We would have been forced to introduce some sort of extra protection.

Mr Coldstream said the equipment would be used for the Saturday afternoon matches but not for about two or three years.

He considered it would not take the players long to get used to it.

Some of our boys after using the American equipment for about only five minutes, said they almost forgot they had it on.

It was hoped the equipment would help to increase the popularity of the sport.

The Australian rules call for plenty of skill but less spectacle. The American rules are spectacular but not particularly skilful.

Originating in Canada, where it was played by the Indians, the game received its name from the Bishops Crozier — or Crosse, as the French called it — that the racquet so closely resembles.

The game went first to England and the United States and is now played in most countries within the temperate region.

Like most field sports, the object of the game is to score by putting the ball of india rubber through the opposing goal.

This can be done either by kicking, hitting or throwing it with the Crosse.

At no time, however, may a player touch the ball with his hands.

Lacrosse is one of the fastest field games in the world of sport.

Yet the Canadian "box" lacrosse is even faster.

And it is in order to make Australian Lacrosse still faster, yet safer, and more spectacular that this new equipment, as Mr Coldstream pointed out, is being introduced.

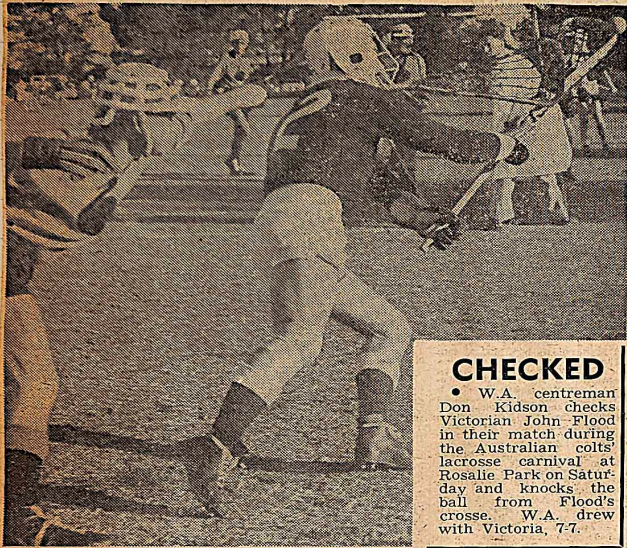

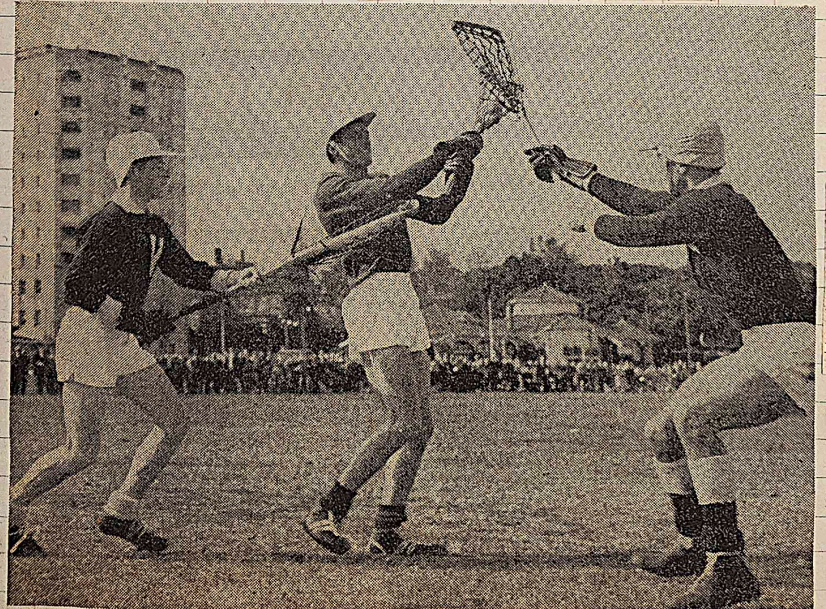

Victoria dominated the first half when their mid-field attack players John Flood and Alan Bassett ran riot.

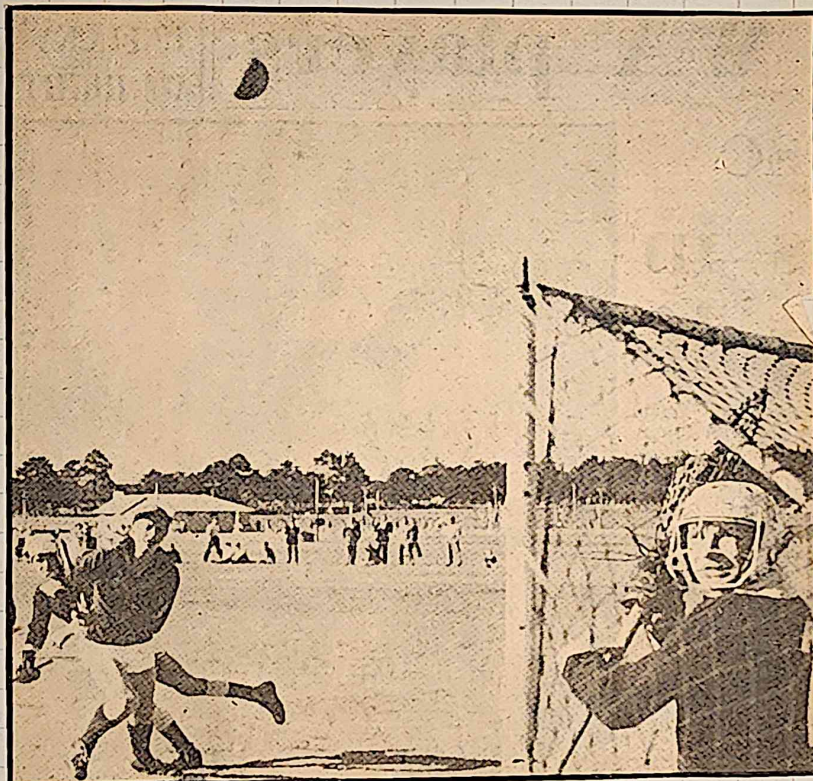
Bassett scored 3 goals in this half and Flood fed his forward line with pinpoint passes.
