The First Six

A history of the World Cup

The World Lacrosse Championships are in Manchester for the second time since they started in 1967, but international lacrosse has been played here longer than anywhere.

Even the visit of the Iroquois National's squad is not novel. As long ago as 1867, a squad of Caughnawaga Indians visited the UK and inspired the formation of the first British club in Glasgow. Rapid development, notably around Glasgow, Liverpool and London, and in Ireland, occurred during the next decade. Internationals between the Home Countries started in 1875. In 1883, England first played Canada, the world's best at the time, losing 12-1, but next year won 5-3 in their first encounter with the USA.

At the turn of the century, however, the transatlantic encounters ceased due to the time and cost involved, except for demonstration matches at the London Olympics in 1908, when Canada defeated England 14-10; the Amsterdam Olympics in 1928 when England defeated the USA 7-6 but lost 5-9 to Canada who in turn lost 3-6 to the USA, and the London Olympics in 1948 when England drew 5-5 with the USA.

Modern travel enabled international lacrosse to re-start in the UK in 1962 when the Australians played and won two matches before losing 7-5 to England at Hurlingham.

The First World Championships in 1967 in Toronto were decided on a league basis. Amazingly, USA won the title without even picking a national squad! They were represented by their champion club, Mount Washington, but their superiority was such that they were the only team to finish with a positive goal difference. When Australia defeated England 11-9 in Toronto, six of their goals were scored by Brian Griffin, whose son played in the 1990 Perth Championships but has, unfortunately, had to withdraw from the Australian Squad this year, due to injury.

USA were again dominant in 1974 at Melbourne, winning all their matches and scoring 20 or more goals in each. England gave one of its best-ever performances by defeating Canada 19-11 and had the consolation of defeating the USA 17-15 in a thrilling friendly match when the Americans stopped off in England on their way home.

In 1978, in Stockport, a new format was introduced to maintain interest to the end of the tournament. The first and second and the third and fourth teams played each other respectively after the league tournament to decide the final places. After defeating Australia 22-7 in a feast of high-quality play at breakneck speed, USA trounced Canada 28-4 and ended with another 100% record in the league, but only after being given a severe fright by England when a USA goal in the dying minutes gave them victory by 12-11. Now the new format proved itself. It certainly maintained interest to the end! In one of the best and most tense matches ever seen, Canada scored the only extra-time goal to take the title 17-16, a remarkable turn-round after the very different score previously. That earlier defeat led to the anomaly that Canada won the world title whilst conceding more goals than they had scored (58-72)!

USA domination returned during the eighties. At home for the first time in Baltimore in 1982, they won all their matches with an average of 23.5 goals in each and, in 1984, repeated their success at an unofficial pre-Olympic World Series in Los Angeles.

The Fifth World Championships returned to their starting point in Toronto in 1986. The USA defeated the home team, Canada, 18-9 in the final which the latter reached by winning 15-12 against England, who had four goals disallowed. Noteworthy in this tournament was the fact that Victoria's Graeme Reddaway and South Manchester's Graham Lester joined Gary

MacDonald to make a select band of three who have played in the World Championships and subsequently refereed in them.

At the 1990 Championships on the magnificent WACA cricket test match ground at Perth, in another superb close final between USA and Canada, the USA retained the title yet again, this time by 19-15.

And so to the Seventh World Championships in Manchester. Will any team be able to break the USA stranglehold? Each time, all the squads learn their lessons, improve their skills and tactics, and train ever harder. Yet the differences between them seem so narrow but little. All advance together. But some day, the American dominance will inevitably be neutralised. It is the ultimate target for all nations.

Can the Canadians repeat the only non-USA title? Can the Australians, who have fought some tough, close matches, come out on top at last? Can England, who have trained harder and longer than ever before and are obviously enjoying their game, be inspired in front of their home supporters? What about the historic originators of the game, the Iroquois Nationals? Or could the Japanese, entering for the first time, surprise everyone with their amazing speed and fitness? Whatever the result, the standards will be higher and the competitive demands much tougher — a sure guarantee of enjoyment for players and spectators alike.

ILF Award Winners

An ILF Championship Awards Committee, consisting of a representative of each participating country, watches all matches and, based on the evidence of the play, selects a World Team of the best 10 players (a goalkeeper, 3 defence players, 3 midfield players and 3 attack players). From this team it selects the World's Best Goalkeeper, Defence Player, Midfield Player, and Attack Player and, finally, the Most Valuable Player in the Championship. The Committee establishes its own criteria for judgement, within guidelines made available to it by the ILF. The Awards are announced at the Presentation Banquet, when each winner is presented with a Certificate. Previous winners were as shown below.

World Championship Trophies

The Turnbull Trophy

Laurie Turnbull donated a Shield to the IFL in 1974 to be awarded to the winners of each World Championship. As President of the IFL at the time, he presented it to the USA, the 1974 winners in Melbourne.

Laurie Turnbull was an outstanding lacrosse figure, well-known throughout the world. He dedicated himself to the growth of lacrosse and climbed through the club and state administrative ranks to national level. He was Manager of the first Australian Squad to tour the UK and then in 1962, became President of the Australian Lacrosse Council and was President of the International Lacrosse Federation from 1967 to 1974.

The Most Valuable Player Trophy

Ray Kinderman of Australia donated this trophy to the IFL. As a craftsman in wood as well as a lifelong devotee to lacrosse, he hand-carved a beautiful intricate model of a lacrosse player. Unfortunately, the MVP in Manchester will not be presented with it. It now stays in the Hall of Fame in Baltimore, USA, as it is too fragile to travel. The MVP will be presented with a photograph of the model.

The Centurion International Trophy

The Centurion Lacrosse Club has presented to the ELU a new Trophy, to be called the 'Centurion International Trophy'. This will be awarded to the winners of appropriate international events, the first of which will be the new Division One Championships. The trophy, a bronze figure of a lacrosse player, will be presented to the winning team but then retained, hopefully in the projected Centurion Lacrosse Museum. The winning team will be given suitable mementoes to keep.

The Centurions are ex-players who encourage development, particularly by new ventures that will advance the game. Recently these have included the start-up of the *LaCrosseTalk* magazine and the Centurion Awards for Service to Lacrosse. Their next venture will be to work with and support the administrators of university lacrosse to ensure its continuity.

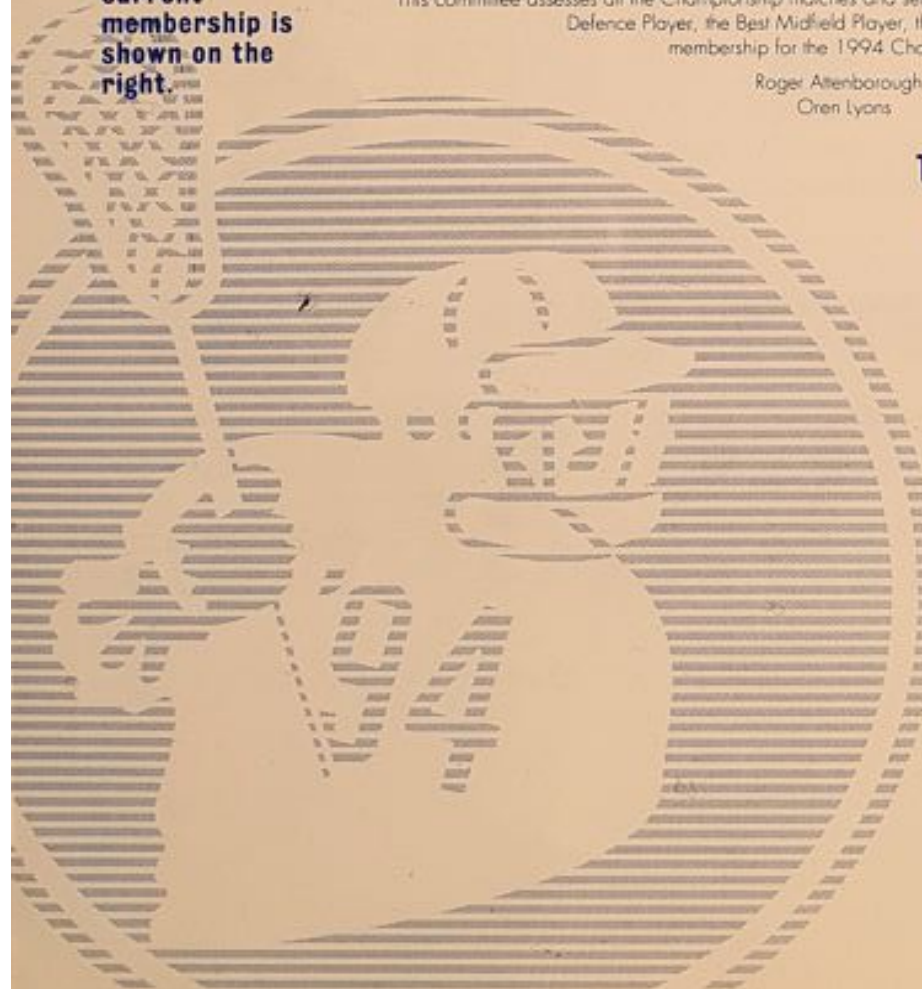

The World Championship Competition Format

Play is to the International Rules laid down by the ILF. Each Nation may nominate up to 26 players in its Squad, up to 23 of whom may play in any one match. The ILF Committee drew the match schedule by lot. Each Nation plays each other once in the Qualifying Round. The winner of each match gains one point. If the teams are level on goals at normal time, they play an extra five minutes each way. If they are still level they play on until sudden victory is achieved by the team to score first. The positions of teams level on points after the Qualifying Round depend on the percentage of goals for/against in those games in which they were mutually involved.

After the Qualifying Round, the first and fourth Nations and the second and third play each other, respectively, in the semi-finals. The winners contest the final and the losers play each other for third place.

This summary is for general guidance and is not authoritative.

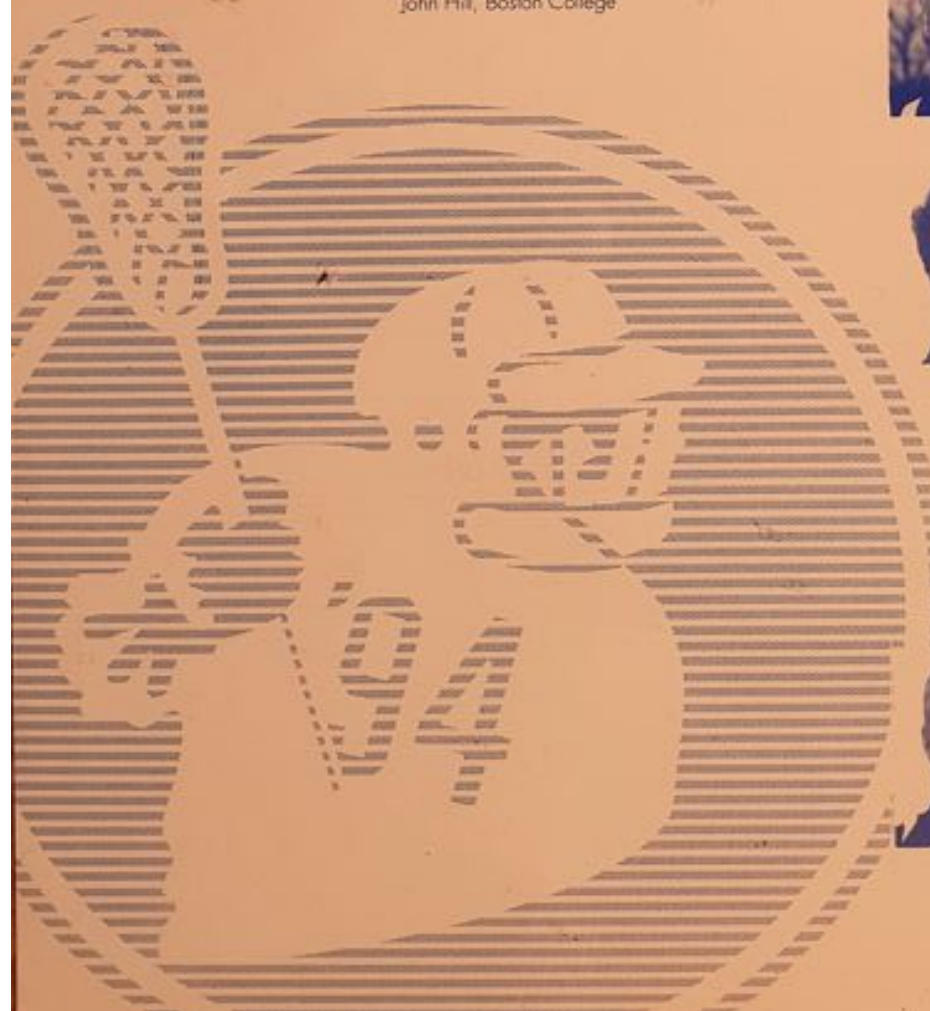

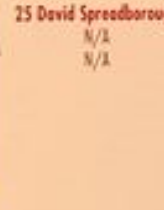

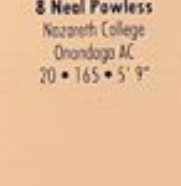

The International Lacrosse Federation and The English Lacrosse Union welcome the Czech Republic, Germany, Scotland, Sweden and Wales to the World Championship Festival for the first time and hope that participation will be enjoyable and provide valuable experience so that they may soon become Premier Division Competitors.

Since the highly successful 1990 World Championships in Perth, over 50 Nations have started to play lacrosse. Many of these wished to participate in the Manchester World Cup but were prevented by lack of funds or they felt that they were not yet up to the necessary standard in all-round ability.

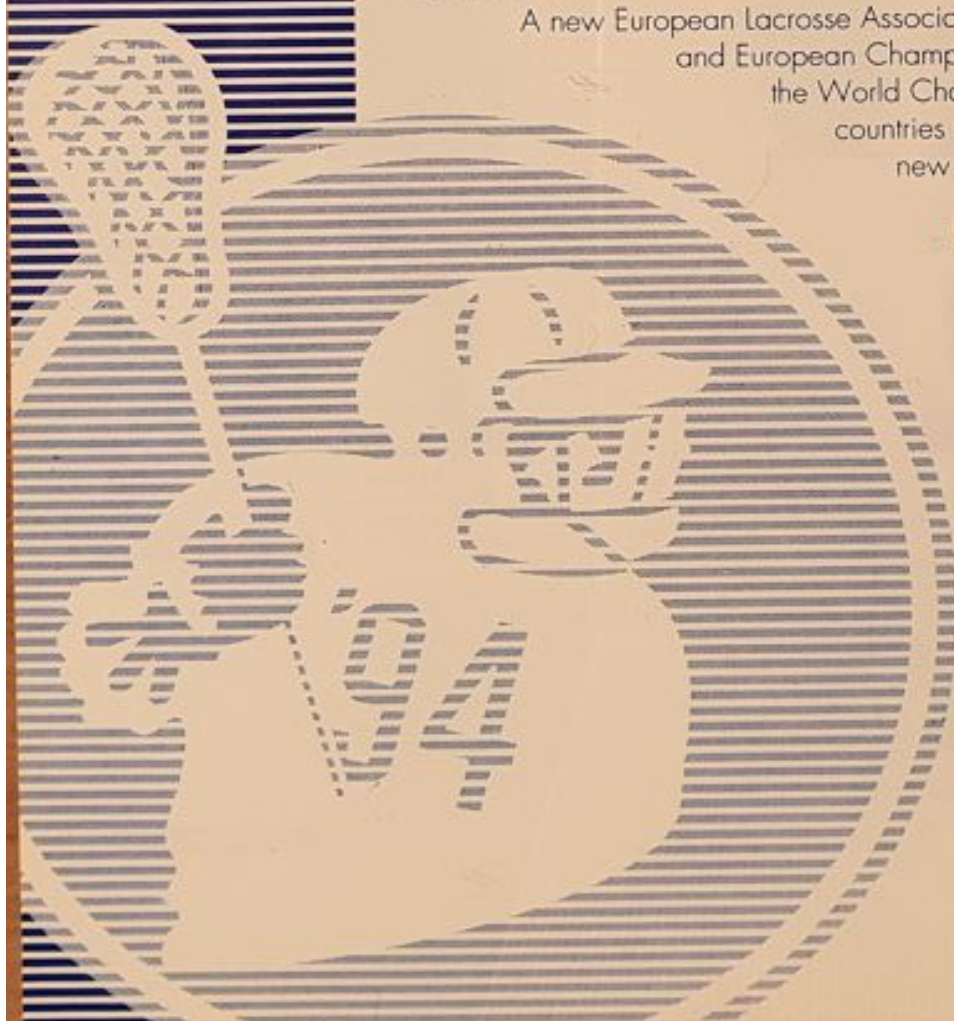
The English Lacrosse Union took the initiative to help those who wished to broaden their experience, by inaugurating the new Division One Championship. This will hopefully continue as a part of future World Championships and provide a stepping-stone for newer lacrosse nations into the top class.

A new European Lacrosse Association has recently been established and European Championships will take place in between the World Championships. At a lower cost, more countries will hopefully be able to enter these new Championships.

Division One Format

The competition will be played to International Rules laid down by the ILF. All teams will play each other once in a qualifying league. Two points will be awarded for a win and one for a draw.

The third and fourth teams in the league will play each other for third place and the first two teams will play each other for the Division One Championship and the Centurion International Trophy.

The Tournament will be managed by Ray Nash, a qualified senior coach and referee, and Peter Mundy, who has long been associated with the development of junior lacrosse and latterly with the expansion in Europe.

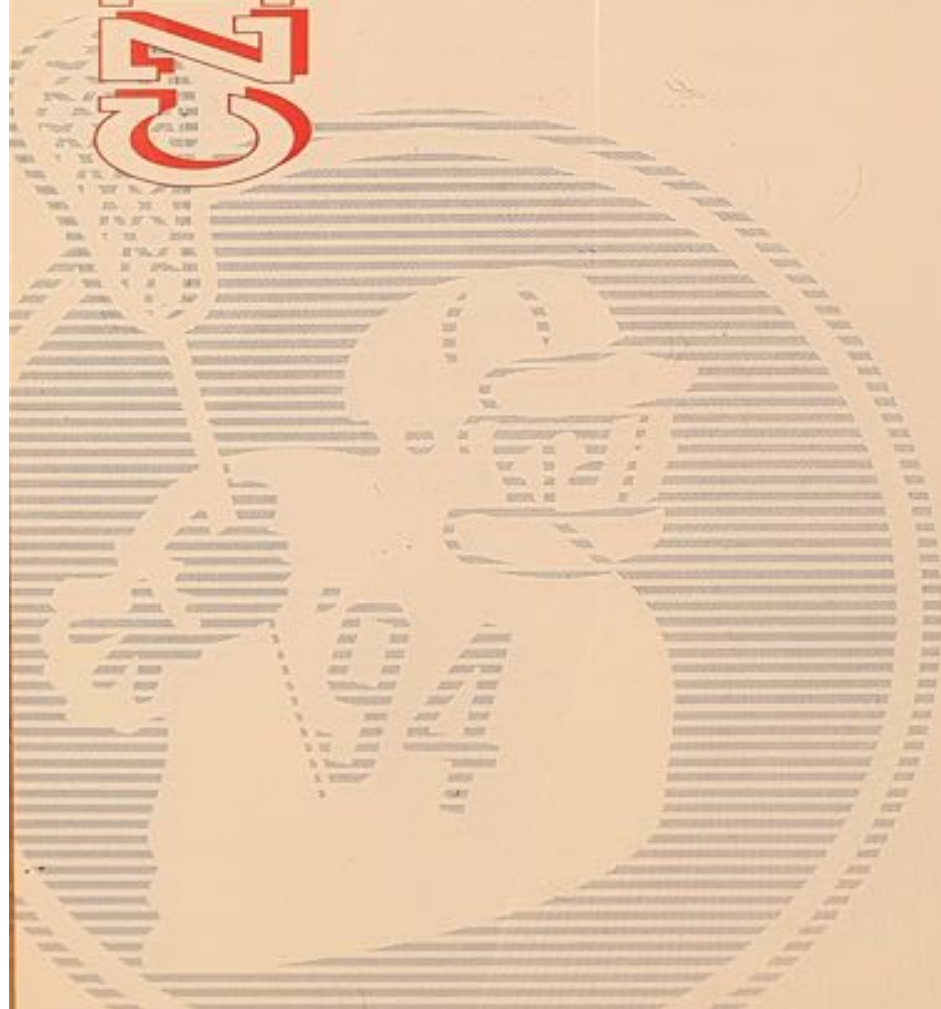

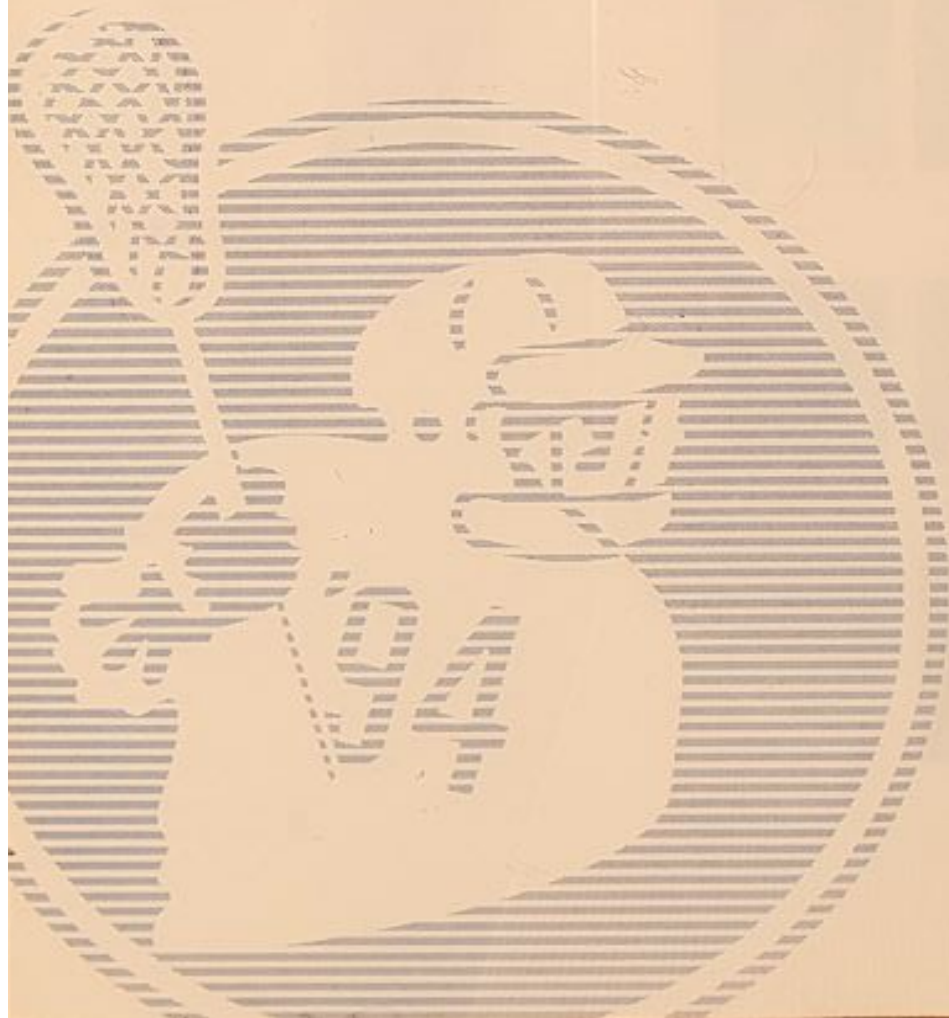

Masters & Grandmasters Festival

at The Firs, 24-29 July 1994

The English Lacrosse Union welcomes all those former players; many of whom have played in past World Championships, to renew their friendships and refresh their skills in these friendly contests for those over 35 years old.

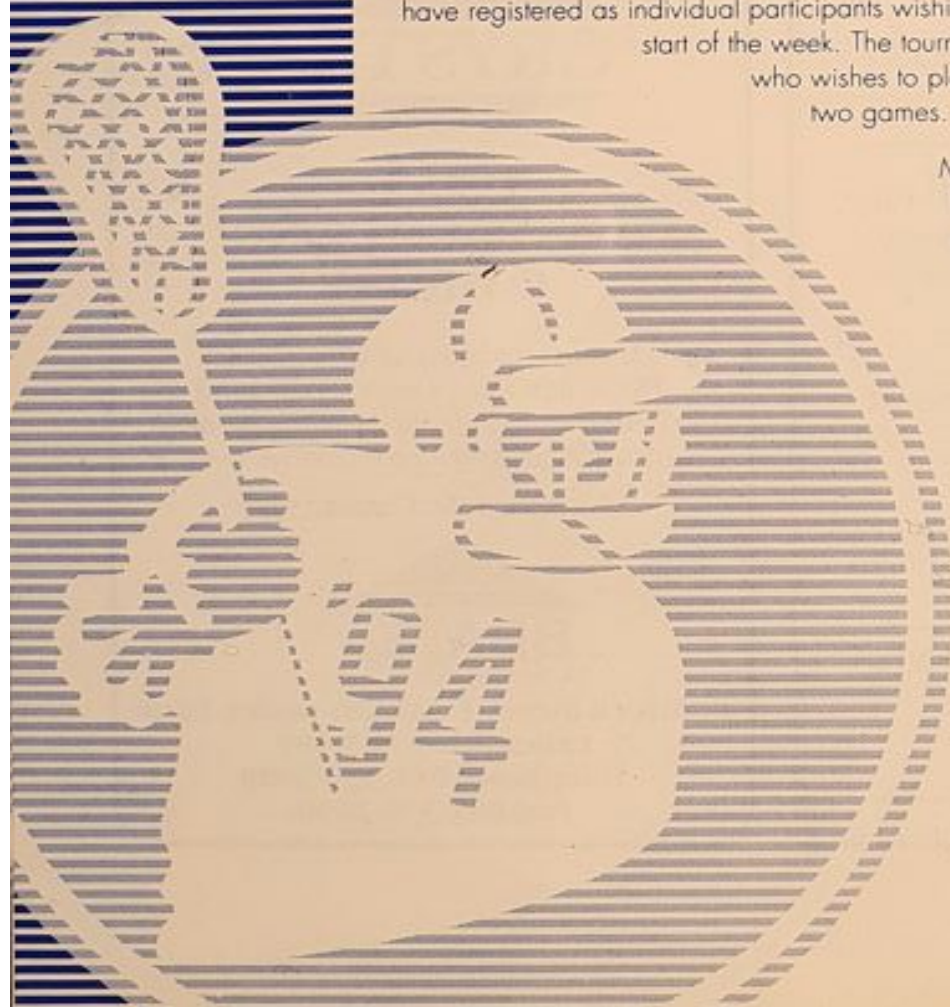
THE WORLD CLUB MASTERS CHAMPIONSHIP is a competitive tournament played to International Rules for 4 quarters of 15 minutes each with a 2 minute break at the end of the first and third quarters and a 5 minute break at half-time. One time-out per team per half is permitted. A squad may consist of up to 21 players of which not more than 10 may be on the field of play at any one time.

Each squad will play four games. A winning team will be awarded 10 points, a drawing team 5 points and a losing team no points, but all teams will receive a point for each goal scored. Thus if Team A wins 10-8 against Team B, then team A will receive 20 points and Team B 8 points. The two teams with most points after the league matches will play each other in the Final on Friday 29 July.

Organised squads have entered from Australia, England and USA. Many players have registered as individual participants wishing to join squads to be made up at the start of the week. The tournament can accommodate any player who wishes to play on this basis, even if only for one or two games.

Matches will be played at 1000 and 1200 from 24 July to 29 July inclusive, except 28 July when there will be a Masters/GrandMasters Golf Tournament. The prestigious Stockport Golf Club has been reserved for this event which is open to any lacrosse golfer. Details are available from Peter McCulloch.

The Masters Tournament will reach a finale when England, as host nation, will select a team to play a Rest of the World Masters Team. This will be arranged and announced during the Festival when the requirements of other Festival matches are known.



The Grandmasters Tournament

This is a gentler form of lacrosse with no checking nor body contact. The player's handling skills need to be well tuned because he must pass the ball within 4 seconds of gaining possession.

The field is 90 yards by 50 yards with the goals, which are 6 ft x 4 ft, placed 30 yards each side of the centre line. The ball is lighter and less damaging to the body than the standard lacrosse ball, and so only the goalkeeper may wear protective equipment.

A squad may consist of up to 16 players of which not more than 8 may be in play at any one time. These will be a goalkeeper, 2 defence, 3 midfield and 2 attack players. Each team must retain 3 players in the defensive half and 2 in the offensive half.

The points scoring system and the duration of the games and intervals will be the same as for the Masters tournament.

Organised squads have entered from Australia and England with many individuals indicating that they would like to be included in less formal squads. It is hoped that many old friends and former players will take the opportunity of playing one or more games during the week. Matches will be played at 0900 and 1100 from Monday 25 July to Friday 29 July, inclusive, except Thursday 28 July when there will be a Masters/GrandMasters golf tournament, for which details are available from Peter McCulloch and Peter Nugent.

The Tournaments will be managed by Peter McCulloch (Tel: 0625 524226) and Peter Nugent (Tel: 061 643 3447). They will be able to provide playing equipment for any visitor who would like to participate. All visitors will be welcome at The Firs to renew old friendships and share anecdotes of former glories over a pint or two.

Junior International Festival of Lacrosse

The World Championships are the pinnacle of lacrosse today. The youngsters will be the pinnacle tomorrow. The English Lacrosse Union welcomes 50 teams of youngsters from around the world to join in probably the world's largest ever gathering of junior players. Over 1,000 of them will meet at the Firs, concurrently with the World Championships and form new friendships and bonds, learn new skills and create a firm foundation for the future of lacrosse.

The teams will play friendly matches within three age bands, Under 12, Under 14 and Under 16 (the ages as on 31 August 1993) and in response to demand there will also be a few Under 18 matches.

Matches will be played at 0900, 1030 and 1200 between 21 July and 29 July, inclusive, to International Rules, over 15 minute quarters with a running clock and only one time-out per team per half. There is no limit to squad size.

The Festival will have no overall winners. It has been designed to provide an opportunity for youngsters to play lacrosse against those from other countries and to be involved in the World Cup.

Aims & Aspirations

The Junior International Festival was conceived to fulfil three of the objectives set for the World Championships by the English Lacrosse Union, namely, to organise a successful and prestigious festival of lacrosse that will be enjoyed by players and spectators; to cover all costs at least; and to provide a platform for the further development of lacrosse afterwards and to provide a secure base for junior lacrosse. The Junior Festival Committee sought to encourage young people to attend the World Cup and particularly to give those from different countries a chance to compete with each other. In the event we have attracted 50 teams, including 15 from the USA.

From the outset it was intended to hold a 'festival' rather than a tournament. I first helped to organise such an event when Lutherville toured England in 1987 for Stockport Grammar School's quinqucentenary celebrations. A two-day event with almost 20 teams was played on 4 pitches for 2 full days. Nobody received a cup or medals but 300 young people spent an enjoyable couple of days and made many friends. The concept of a 'friendly' tournament was a little difficult to appreciate at first but is now commonplace for exchanges between the two countries.

Sport is a crucial part of the development of young people, teaching them to compete against others to the best of their ability within a set of accepted rules. The objective on the field is to win but every winner necessitates a loser and sport should teach young people to respect their opponents both on and off the field.

I have been involved with lacrosse for about 20 years and have always been impressed with the remarkable camaraderie of the game. The lacrosse fraternity is closely knit and many of them know each other well, even across international boundaries. Lacrosse is not only for the stars who will entertain us on 30 July at Bury but is also for the players who have never risen above the 'C' teams but are always ready to run their clubs in various capacities. Any sport should offer youngsters an activity in which they can participate throughout their lives. Lacrosse does this better than most.

The Junior Festival struggles to justify the title 'International'. The challenge to lacrosse today is to continue to broaden the influence of our great game to many other parts of the world and to deepen it in those 50-60 countries who have taken it up during the past few years and yet to retain the characteristic camaraderie.

I hope that the Festival will prove to be enjoyable and that the matches will be competitive but, more importantly, that the players will develop friendships which will last long afterwards. Finally I hope that this Festival will start a tradition that will henceforth become much more international. I look forward to such a wider festival in Baltimore in 1998!

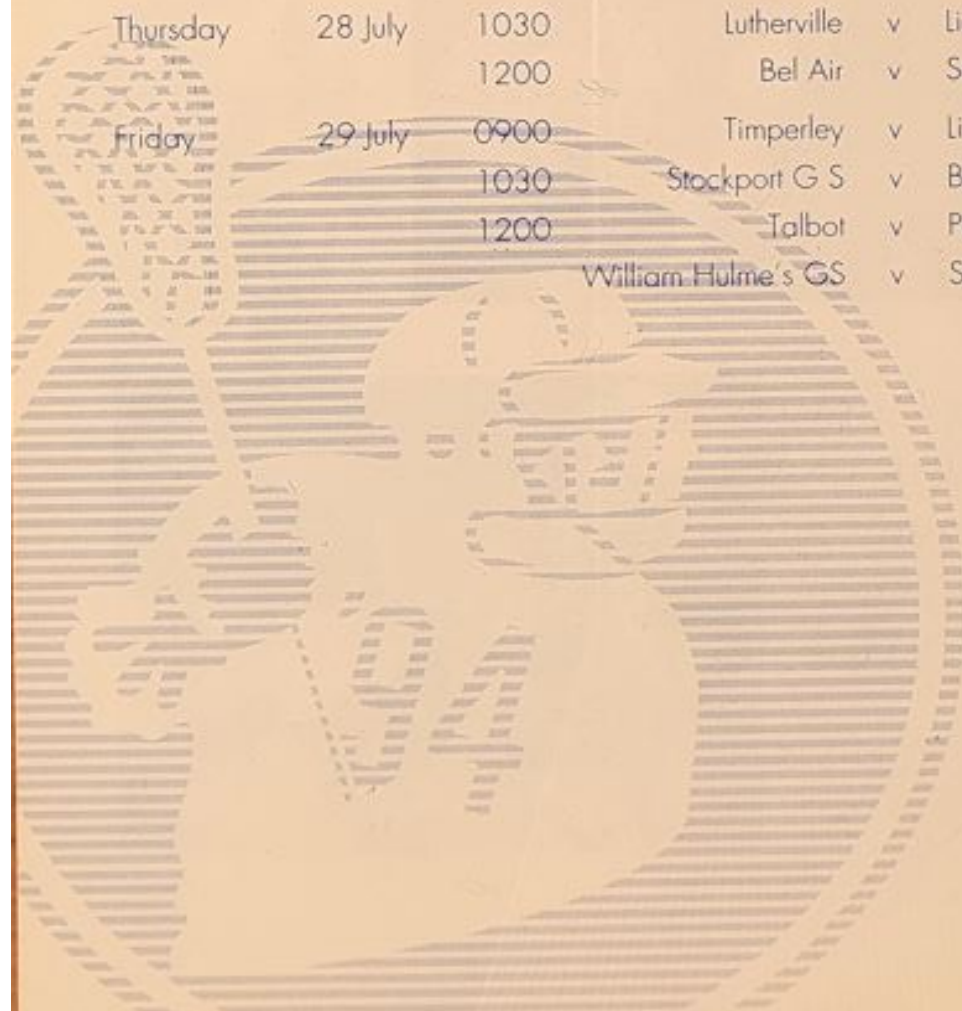

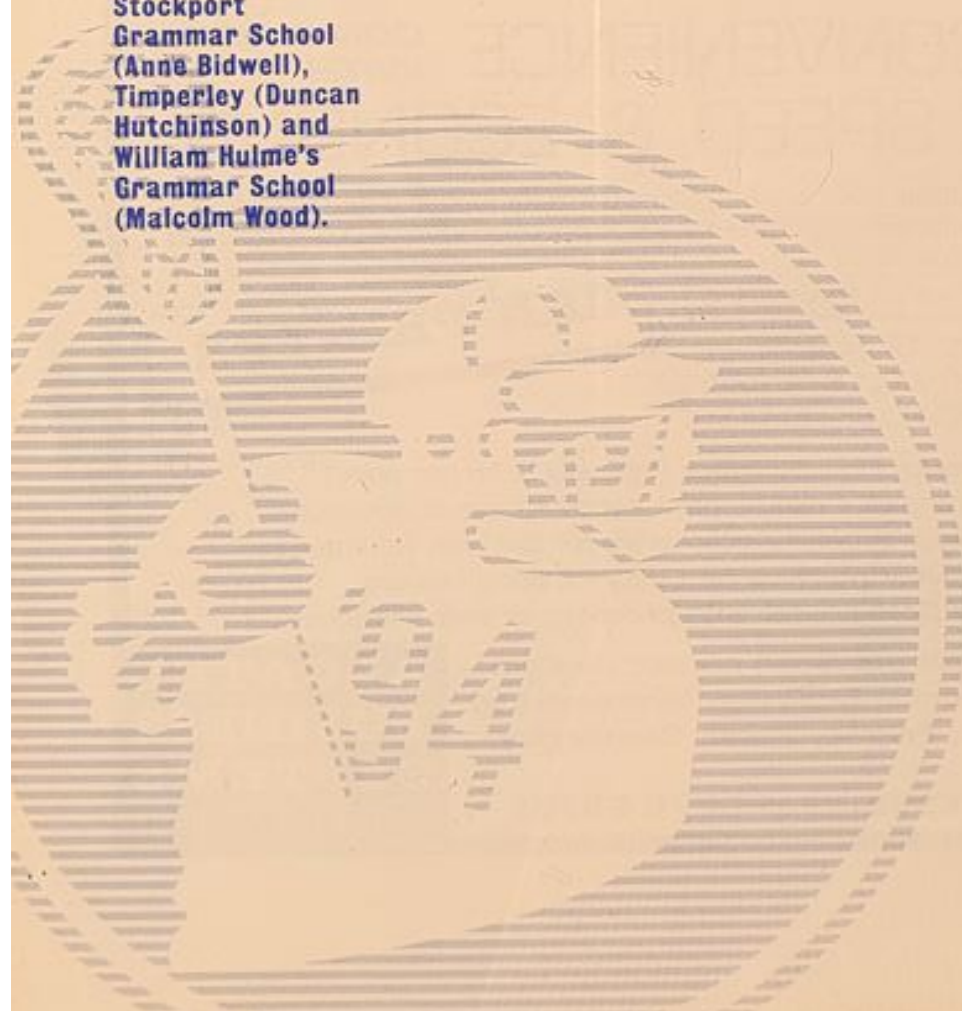

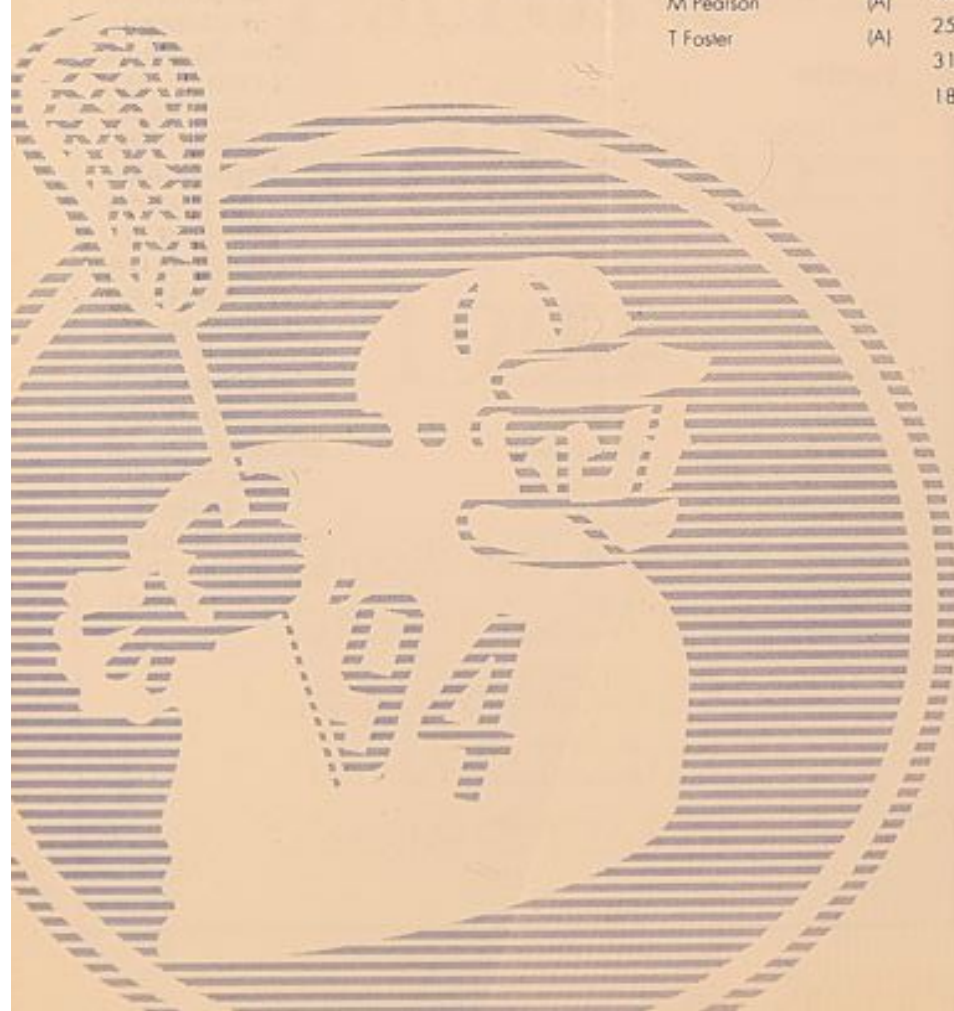

Brunswick School Connecticut, USA

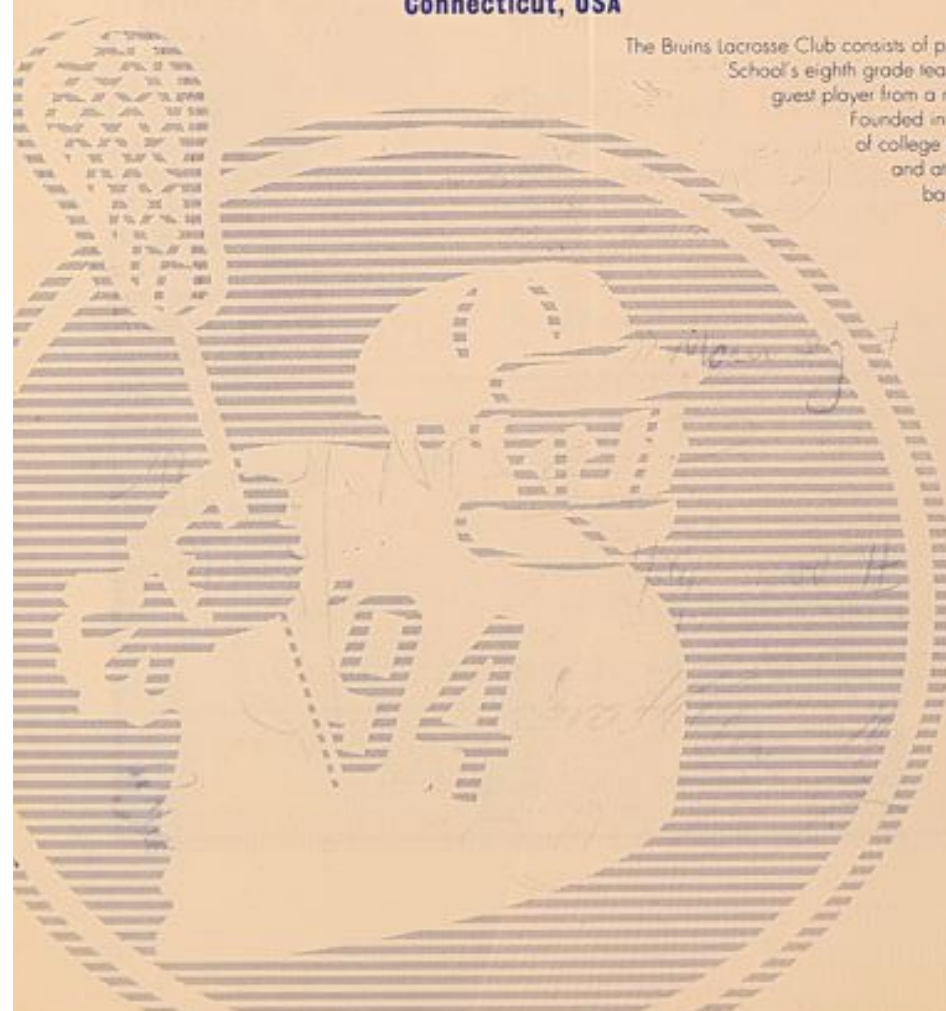

Let us all celebrate this game during July and make lots of enduring friendships. Above all we wish the England Team and their staff the best of success. Timperley will be shouting for you!

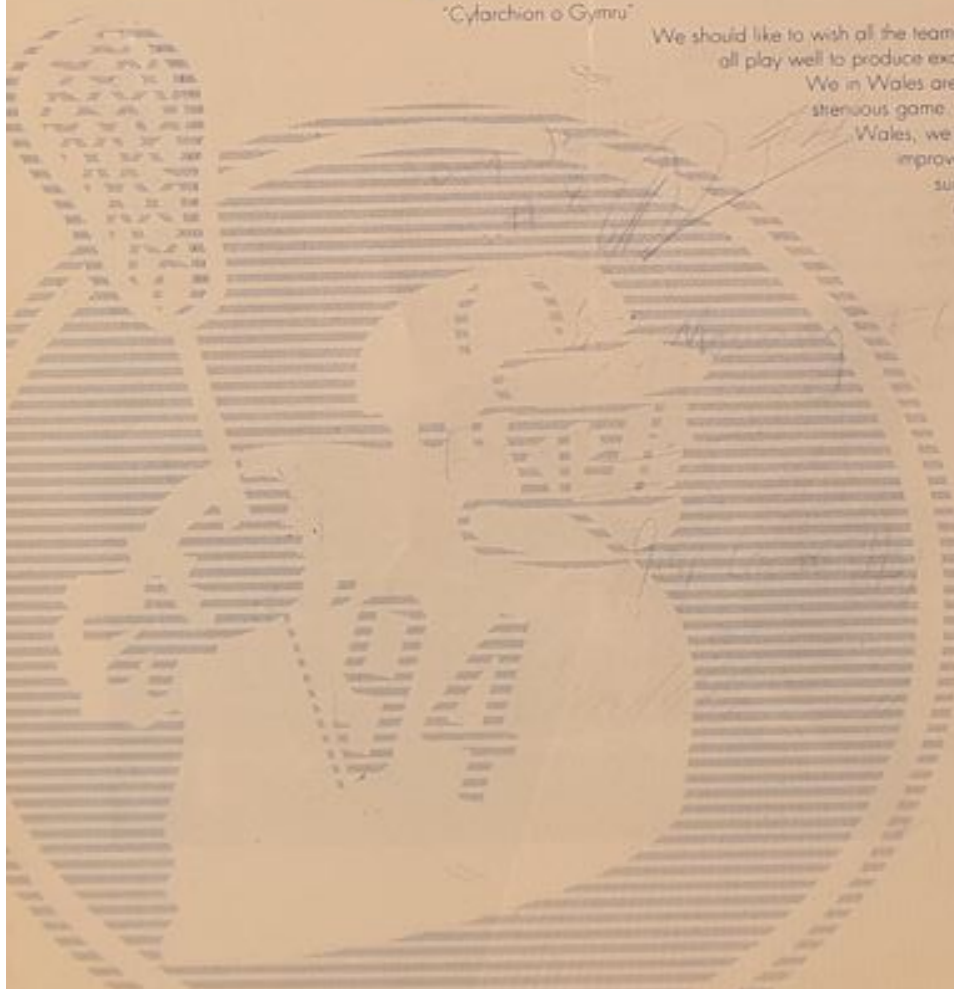

POP-Lacrosse

at Bury Football Club, 30 July 1994

A Summary of the Game

Pop-Lacrosse is played between two squads of 8 players of whom no more than 5 may be in play at any time. They score by throwing a light hollow plastic ball into 4' x 4' goals using a specially designed light-weight moulded plastic lacrosse stick.

It is essentially a non-contact sport, with no stick nor body contact, no intentional ball off the body, no dangerous propelling, no dangerous follow-through, no entry into the goal circle, no trapping/guarding the ball, no defending of the goal, and a maximum 4 second possession of the ball by any player at any one time.

The playing area can be of any size but is usually about the size of a netball court. The only ground markings are a centre mark, two goal circles of 2 m radius, a goal line and a 5 m arc around the front of the goal area.

Indoors, the ball may rebound off the wall. Outdoors, there is no boundary and play is continuous, though the referee will use discretion if play becomes remote from 'natural' boundaries and award a throw to the nearest player at the national natural boundary.

POP-Lacrosse may be played by people of any age and teams may be male, female, or mixed. The game has grown rapidly throughout the world during the past 10 years being called variously Soflacrosse, Mod-crosse or Inter-crosse in different countries, with minor variations to the rules. Its popularity is based upon its simplicity, freedom of movement and safety. It is one of the very few field games which can be played by boys and girls, men and women on equal physical terms.

The rules above are a descriptive resume of the essence of the game. The full rules are short but more precise and are available together with an information pack about the game from the British Lacrosse Development Team, Rycroft Mill, Smith Street, Ashton-Under-Lyne, Lancashire OL7 0DB (Tel: 061 339 7508).

The World Cup is the serious top class competition. This Mixed Tournament is a series of games of mixed sexes and mixed skills purely for having an enjoyable run around a lacrosse field without serious risk. There is a party for all participants at Owens Park on Saturday evening which includes dinner and a disco. The latter will be open to all and tickets will be available on Saturday morning from the Mixed Lacrosse Festival organisers table at The Firs. On Sunday there is a barbecue and plenty of refreshments and music throughout.
