The game of Lacrosse originated with the North American Indians, and was called by them the "Ball Game." The name Lacrosse was given it by the French Priests on account of the fancied similarity of the sticks to a Bishop's Crozier.

The very few records that exist tell us that on all great fete or gala days a Lacrosse match between two tribes was the chief amusement provided there was no limit to the number of players, from one to two hundred taking part and the goals were generally one and often two miles apart. The goals were constructed by two wigwams at each end.

There is no record of any rules in these contests, but it is safe to say they were expressed by the axiom "the best side wins," and it can be readily imagined the games were fairly strenuous many of the braves engaged in a ball game emerged from it with more scars than they ever got in battle.

The Canadian white men learnt the rudiments of the game from the Indians, and considerable credit is due for them for having constructed so fine a game as Lacrosse from such rude materials. The carliest record of the game being played in Australia is in 1874, and since that time the game has gone ahead in leaps and bounds, and enjoys a high place among the popular winter sports.

HISTORY OF GARLAND-McHARG CUP.

After the Canadian visit in 1909, the Cup was presented to the Victorian Lacrosse Association for competition amongst the various States, the donors being Mr. Garland, a Canadian, and Mr. Andrew McHarg, of Melbourne. The Carnival Matches were then originated and now take place every third year, the venue changing from one capital city to another by rotation. No contests were held during the war period. The Cup, which is valued at 100 guineas, is now in the possession of Victoria. The Cup will be displayed in the window of Pike Bros., Queen Street, during Carnival Week.

The Referees for the Carnival Matches have been appointed from the Queensland Lacrosse Referees' Association and have been allocated to the various games as per Score Board on Page 32.


BALL



HOW TO FOLLOW THE GAME.

As a guide to any spectators who may not be fully conversant with lacrosse in all its details, the following comments on the game and rules may be of assistance:—

Usual arrangements of a team;

Three Forwards-First Home, Second Home, Third Home.

Two Attacks-Right and Left.

Centre.

Two Defences-Right and Left.

Three Backs-Third Man, Cover Point, Point (first man out from goal).

Gdalkeeper.

The goal consists of two poles, which are six feet above the ground and six feet apart. To each pair of goal posts is attached a net sloping towards and reaching the top of the posts, and closed in on the sides. The width of the goal posts is preserved by a bar across the top of the posts, to which the net is fastened.

The playing-ground between the goals is 110 yards.

The centre is a circle with a diameter of 50 yards. No players—other than the centre men are allowed to enter litis area until the referee has blown the whistle for the face off,

The game is divided into four quarters, the first two of 25 minutes each, the second two of 20 minutes each, with an interval of 10 minutes between second and third quarters, but at quarter and three-quarter time the interval shall be only enough to change ends.

When the Referee has called a "foui" the ball must not be touched by either party, nor must the players move from the position in which they happen to be at the moment, until the Referee has called "play," A goalkeeper can resume his place in goal providing a "foul" has not been given against him.

The Referee need not suspend play when the player who has been fouled is still in possession of the ball or the ball remains in the possession of such player's side.

Fouls.

Touching the ball with the hand, save by the goalkeeper, who while defending the goal within the goal-crease, although not allowed to catch and throw the ball with his hand, may put away with his hands or feet or block the ball in any manner with his crosse or body.


Hitting wildly with the crosse or throwing it at an opponent or at the ball.

Charging Into, shouldering or interfering in any way with another who is in pursuit of an opponent. This does not prevent the use of the "body-check" nor the pushing of an opponent with the shoulder in ground scuffles.

("Body-check" is placing of one's body in the way of an approaching opponent, so that the latter is simply impeded. No checker shall use force in the body-check.

Holding an opponent's crosse,, or pushing him with crosse in hand, or running in front of him or interfering in any way to keep him from the ball until the other player reaches it, or checking the crosse of an opponent who is not actually in possession of or immediately about to take possession of the ball

Holding, striking or tripping a player with the crosse.

"Cross-check," which consists of a player charging into another with both hands on the crosse so as to make the stick meet the body of his opponent.

"Up-check" is not permitted.

Swinging the crosse into or across the body of an opponent in such a way as to hit or otherwise endanger the body.

The Referee may give a "face-off" or bounce or free position at the place where the foul occurred, yet not nearer either goal-post than 10 yards, unless the foul be made by the defending side, and/or he may disqualify the offending player or players for such time during the game as he thinks fit.

Definition of Terms.

"Face-off."—The ball is placed upon the ground between the crosses of two opponents, each of whom shall have his face towards the goal he is attacking. The crosses shall be back to back, wooden blades down, lapping at least two-thirds of the net. They shall not move until "play" is called when the ball shall be drawn clear.

"Free Position."—The player awarded "free position" shall be placed in such position of advantage as in the opinion of the Referee he has been robbed of, and all other players shall remain in the position in which they bappen to be at the moment. The player awarded "free position" shall take the ball on his crosse in front of him, and at the signal from the Referee the game shall proceed.



RULES AUSTRALIAN LACROSSE CARNIVALS

The Carnival shall take place in rotation in the Capital Cities of the States eligible to compete, subject to alteration from time to time by the Council at an Annual Meeting.

The Carnival shall be played under the following rules:-

- (a) Each State shall play each other once.
- (b) For a win two points shall be scored and for a draw one point.
- (c) In the event of a match being abandoned two points shall be awarded to both States drawn for such contest.
- (d) In the event of a walk over two points shall be scored by the State receiving the walk-over.
- (e) The State obtaining the highest number of points shall be declared Champion State of Australia.
- (f) In the event of two or more States scoring an equal number of points their relative positions shall be determined on the percentage of goals thrown for and against during the Carnival matches, such percentage to be ascertained by dividing the total goals thrown by a State by the total goals thrown against such State, and the State having the highest percentage shall be declared the Champion State of Australia.
- (g) The Trophy for competition at the Carnival shall be the Garland-McHarg Cup (hereinafter called the Cup) which shall at the conclusion of each Carnival be officially presented to the Lacrosse Association of the Champion State of Australia or its nominee.
- (h) The Lacrosse Association of the champion State of Australia shall be entitled to hold the Cup (subject to performance of all requirements of the Council or its Trustees) until the opening day of the next succeeding Carnival when the Cup shall be formally delivered into the possession of the Council or such person as it shall nominate.
- (i) Every Carnival match shall be played in accordance with the Laws of Lacrosse, as adopted by the Council and every ball used shall be of the type adopted by th Council as the standard ball for the time being.

Queensland's Goal

SYNOPSIS OF PLAY.


On referring to the diagram, it will be seen that from end to end of the field each of the representatives has a particular opponent to play against. On the one hand the goal defenders, viz., Queensland 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, have to prevent the opposing attack players, N.S.W. 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, from scoring goals, and vice versa at the other end of the field.

'The allotted positions are not fixed, but may be changed as desired according to the success or otherwise of the individual against his opponent.

The play is commenced in the centre of the field, the "centre" player (7) being the connecting link between his side's defending players and the attacking players, giving help as occasion demands to both defence and attack divisions. The players are allowed to go wherever they please; experience has taught them how and when to change their positions to the best advantage.

It will thus be seen that the game is simply a struggle by a combination of attack players to get past a combination of defending players, and so by sprinting, dodging, quick passing, feinting, and manoeuvring for positions, a breach is made in the ranks of the defenders and a shot at goal results. Each goal counts one,


