An Australian lacrosse team may tour America next year.

An invitation has been extended to the Australian Lacrosse Council to make a three to five weeks' tour beginning in March.

The A.L.C. will make a decision on the tour when it meets next month.

The invitation follows an American visit to Australia in August 1959.

The American invitation has offered the Australian team accommodation and travel expenses within America and the total cost for each member of the Australian team would be about £500.

Preliminary arrangements are for a 15-match series against American colleges and universities. — KEN KNOX.

# Still Going Strong After 26 Years

Just 26 years ago, a small boy with an oversized lacrosse racquet ran out on to the Malvern oval to try his hand at a game he knew very little about.

Next Saturday the same player will run out again with the Malvern players to start his 27th season of lacrosse.

He is Noel Jeffrey (pictured above), now one of the most lacrosse-wise sportsmen in Australia.

Noel has come a long, long way since that first game back in 1935, and has built up a remarkable record during his years with the Malvern club.

He has been captain of the club for the past two years, and is the only player to have two wins in the Vince Healy Memorial Trophy for the State's best and fairest player.

### Five-Year Gap

He won this award first in 1954, and just to prove lacrosse players can keep going for years, won it again two years ago.

Jeffrey first represented Victoria in 1951, and was chosen again in the State team last year.

In 1959 he was captain of the Victorian team that played the touring American side.

He has been selected twice in all-Australian teams, and has played in no less than 14 consecutive grand finals for Malvern. His club won 12 of them — 10 consecutively.

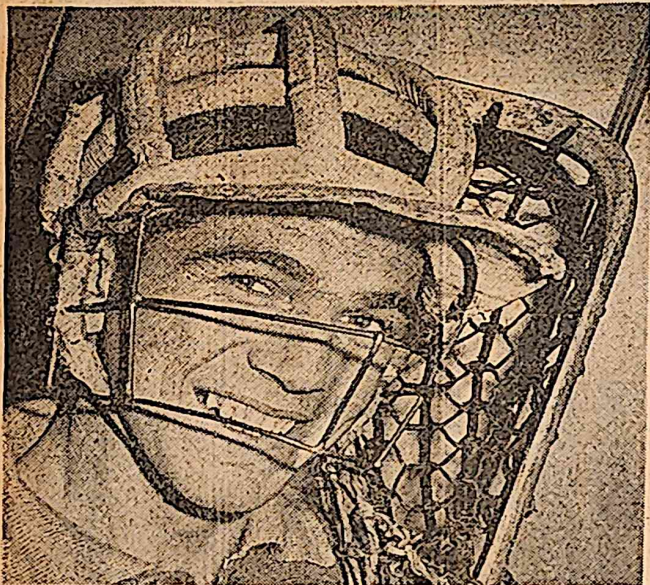

Brian Griffin, 20-year-old Caulfield lacrosse player (pictured above), has been in Victoria for only a year — but already he has proved himself the outstanding forward in this State.

This season, Griffin has thrown 101 goals for Caulfield and the next highest scorer in A grade, Ivan Bryning, also of Caulfield, has thrown 50. Griffin, who played for Western Australia in 1958 and 1959, started lacrosse when he was 13.

Three of his uncles played lacrosse for Western Australia, and Griffin has been chosen to play for Victoria against South Australia at Malvern on July 29. Tomorrow Griffin and the other Caulfield forwards are expected to prove too strong for Williamstown City in the A

Lacrosse team to tour U.S.

EIGHT Victorians have been nominated for the Australian lacrosse team to visit the U.S.A. early next year.

They are: D. Miller, I. Bryning, B. Griffin (Caulfield); K. Atkins, N. Jeffrey, T. Campbell (Malvern); I. Jewitt, L. Goding (Williamstown).

The team will arrive in New York on March 15 and will tour through eight States on the eastern sea-board, covering approximately 2500 miles, before returning to New York for the game against a combined USA team on April 27.

Their opponents in USA will be principally University teams and through out the tour the Australians will be billeted at university hotels. Well-known names on the itinerary include Yale, Harvard, Princeton, Hopkins, Rutgers, and Virginia and Washington.

Victoria's nominations will help to form a strong contingent, since all were members of the successful 1961 Victorian interstate team.

S.A. Out of U.S.A. Lacrosse Tour

South Australia has withdrawn its support from a proposed lacrosse tour of America next year.

The total cost to Australia of the tour was expected to be about £14,000, and South Australia was expected to contribute about half this sum, and half the players selected.

Victorian officials, who were shocked by the South Australian decision, have decided to go ahead with the tour.

The South Australian decision came less than a week before the date set for final selections.

The complete failure of the South Australian fundraising programme caused that State's withdrawal.

It is now possible that the tour will be shorter than originally planned.

Original Plans

The plan was for a visit of the eastern States from March 15 to April 27 next year.

Australia must notify American officials of its exact schedule by December 7, the date set for the start of the annual meeting of the American Lacrosse Association.

It was originally planned to send a team of 24 to America. Last night a team of eight certain selections was announced. They were Don Miller, Ivan Bryning, Brian Griffin,

Keith Atkins, Noel Jeffrey, Trevor Campbell, Ian Jewitt and Les Goding, all of Victoria.

Eight Victorians who will be considered for selection are: G. Hill, P. Hoag, E. Toomey, C. Eddy, J. Martin, G. Minniece, N. Melville and D. Trainor.

Victorian officials said last night that it would be essential that at least 18 players made the trip to America.

It is possible that Western Australia will nominate three players, and pay their expenses for the tour.

If the tour was cut by a week, and if a team of only 18 was selected, it would be possible to keep the overall costs to only a little more than £10,000.

Prior to the carnival, we asked for information of past players, and among the many fine replies we received this reply from Harry Radford of 184 Grango Road, Glenhantly (LN 4286):

Players known in years 1895 - 1898 - Wally Francis - last known address, Brighton Beach.  
P. WELLS, W. STRICKLAND, R. (DICK) PYKE OR PIKE, W. REYNOLDS,  
R. MC CHEANE, ALF. RUDD, W. RICHARDS, R. HOOPER, "MONTY" BOND, "OLD" JAGER,  
"JOE" MORRISON, GEORGE GAY, DAVE SADLER, W. SPROTT.

Those played in Flemington team in years 1896-97. Flemington gained the premiership of "B" Division in 1896 - put into "A" division in 1897, finishing sixth on the list. In 1898 several of these joined Essendon, among these were George Gay, Alf. Rudd and myself as Essendon was our home. Other Essendon players at that time were "Joe Fison", Lewis Search; Fred Dolvos, Arthur Francis and Charlie Thruswell.

In other clubs the members I remember were J. Latham (University, the present Sir. John, I think), Arthur Rudd (University, last I heard of him he was at Clayfield, near Brisbane.) Dunno (University, Solicitor in Warragul, a few years ago, two brothers Bavan (University and Melbourne), F. and W. B. House, C. B. and Hugh Murray (Melbourne), R. Hamblot, R. Scholl (University I think), Batchelor (Collingwood), Dan White (Melbourne - one of the carriage building firm well known in those days). In 1898 I played first home for a team chosen to give a practice game on the Albert Ground against Victoria's Interstate team, Scholl, Interstate man played back, right defence I think.

During 1898, I was in Williamstown and some lads of my age became interested in my lacrosse. I borrowed some racquets and gave them some practice on Market Square, open ground near a State School. That, I think, was the beginning of the Williamstown Club, formed soon after 1898. The names of some of those beginners:- F. & B. Arthurs, G. Westcott, Arthur Whitnoy, Charles Scott, two brothers of surname Hicks and McKonzie.

Almost certainly very few of those I have named are still with us. As after 1898 I was away from Melbourne for many years, I lost touch with the game and the players. The only past players I see nowadays being George Gay, Bill Furneaux (a fellow bowler at Glenhantly) and R. Kiernan, a Brighton Beach bowler.

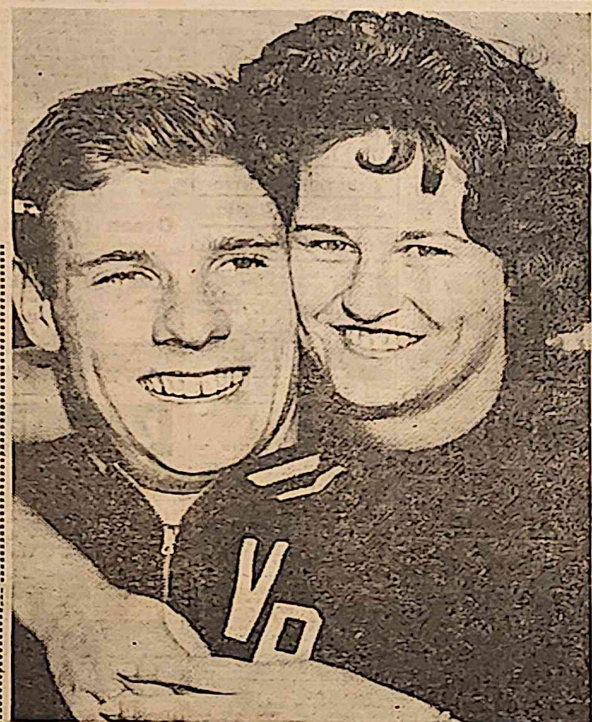
# GREAT FINISH WON THOUSAND FOR VIC
