MANAGER'S REPORT

AUSTRALIAN LACROSSE CARNIVAL held at Perth August 1956

It is my privilege to report herewith on the 1956 Australian Lacrosse Carnival at Perth and with particular reference to your team who so successfully represented Victoria in this Series.

I think I would be failing in my duty to this Association and its players if at the outset I did not comment briefly on the manner of appointing Interstate selectors and the responsibility that is theirs. Three gentlemen were appointed early in the season but as far as I am able to gather were either not officially aware of their appointment or were not all able to devote the necessary time to this vital job. As a result the height of absurdity was reached when after several postponements, only two official selectors were on hand to make the final choice. The delay in announcing the team did not make any easier the preliminary work in connection with the trip nor did it assist players who were given such short notice in which to make arrangements for the necessary leave. I am pleased to know that an alteration in the rules of the Association is to be proposed which will guard against a recurrence of anything of this nature happening in the future.

Your team of 15 players, Manager and supporters, was met at Perth Railway Station, on Friday 3rd August by a large crowd including W.A. officials and players and the South Australian team. A civic reception was tendered the visiting teams by the Lord Mayor of Perth in the afternoon. The W.A. Lacrosse Association officially welcomed the Victorian and South Australian teams at a smoke social in the evening.

On Saturday August 4th, Victoria played W.A. combined Clubs and Western Australia played South Australia at Leederville Oval. Our team did not include Noel Jeffrey, who had contracted a severe boil on a leg, Ian Mountford, Trevor Campbell and Allan Woodbridge, who was due to arrive by 'plane on the following Monday. In view of the fact that we had only got off the train the day before, we were quite satisfied with our form in winning 6-2.

The W.A. and S.A. game saw a brilliant exhibition by South Australia. Undoubtedly W.A. were caught napping and with the Keen-Gandy combination functioning perfectly, West were quite unable to stem the side. The scores 21-8 in Souths favour were a true indication of their superiority on the day and straightaway made them hot favourites for the title.

In the intervening days before our first big game on the Wednesday, we were entertained lavishly by W.A. officials and Clubs - a highlight being a launch trip on the Swan River to Fremantle and back. Notwithstanding South Australias great form against West, our boys were full of confidence for Wednesdays big game at Fremantle Oval. Your selectors decided on the following line up.

with a knock on the head and as he was still feeling the effects in the second

It was goal for goal in the second quarter and we led at half time 9-8. Our goalscorers were Woodbridge2, Campbell, Sloggatt, Stapleton each 1 and South's goalie Bob Alexander obliged by also scoring one for us in attempting to intercept a pass from the back of the net.

The game continued at a terrific tempo in the third quarter. Woodbridge, Trainor and Mountford, who after the first quarter played under difficulties as the result of a heavy fall, scored for Victoria and Lines and Gandy did likewise for South. Third quarter scores Vic. 12 goals - S.A. 10 goals.

The last quarter saw a torrid struggle between defences. Sloggett went down with a severe head injury and Picton had to be carried from the ground as the siren sounded. In the meantime, Mountford had scored for Victoria and Gandy for South. Perhaps the classic episode of the match was the strategy of Max Kinderman in the last minutes of play when in the midst of a hectic scrimmage in the goal crease, he spread his 6 foot trans across the goal mouth to prevent the ball being knocked in. A great game ended with Victoria winning 15 to 11.

Every Victorian player was magnificent. Injured players in Sloggatt, Mountford, and Imlach who in ordinary circumstances would have gone off, just would not give in and battled the issue out till the end.

The Carnival Ball on the Thursday night was a brilliant affair but our enjoyment of the function was tempered somewhat by worries regarding our injured. As no arrangements had been made in respect to a trainer, we had to act quickly in this direction when we reached Perth. It was fortunate that we did, as Mr. Les Jamieson who was secured for us the day after we arrived, was called upon for a herculean effort to patch up our injured which totalled eight altogether after the S.A. match. As we were obliged to engage hire cars to get our players to Jamieson's headquarters 6 miles from the city, this was a costly business but when Saturday arrived with all players reporting fit (several undoubtedly with tongue in cheek) we counted it well worth while.

We chose the same team in the W.A. game as against South Australia.

By defeating South Australia and in view of Souths drubbing of West, we were now
the favourites for the Cup. However, we were under no illusions regarding the task
in front of us. I had always maintained that W.A. would be particularly hard to
beat and was still of that opinion in spite of their display against S.A. which was
certainly not their true form.

made match was played at Subjaco Oval, the surface being a vast

improvement on Frementle. The game proved to be in the nature of an anti-climax, the spectacular features of the earlier games being missing. This was undoubtedly due to the style of refereeing by Referee Allan Vial of South Australia. The frequent and monotonous blast of the whistle right from the outset gave neither side a chance to settle down to anything approaching systematic play. Picton was penalised in the first mimute right in front and Whiteman scored easily for West. A further spate of frees on our back line put us in more trouble and it was only Max Kindermans great goalkeeping that enabled us to clear. Dennis Trainor and Ian Mountford eventually scored to give us the lead 2-1 at quarter time. West evened early in the second but Trainor and Mountford again accred to leave us 4-2 at half time. In the third quarter, West had us defending grinly and with our back men unable to check Victorian style without being penalised. West scored three Mountford again came to our rescue to even the scores 5 all at the last change. W.A. packed their back line in the last quarter and for most of this term had only one player on the forward side of centre. We were therefore forced to play a "keep possession" game and hope for a chance to break through. At this stage, Inlach who had been down earlier in the game for five mirates was carried off (his opponent receiving the free) and O'Brien came on. Mountford received from O'Brien and in a "do or die" effort forced his way through the pack to score the winning goal seconds before the siren.

In a game of frustrations brought about by queer interpretations of the rules by the referee, neither side could give of its best. In the words of one of the W.A. back men after the match "the backs were hamstrung and the match spoiled." The interpretation of the boundary "first on" was also foreign to both sides and I feel it is vitally necessary for the three States to get closer together on rules interpretations and so avoid the irritations of Carnivals and State matches of recent years. All players in a team which were not hyndred per cent fit, played their part nobly in this match but a special word of praise must go to Ian Mountford whose great effort in notching 4 goals against such tough opposition was outstanding.

After this, the final game, the Garland McHarg Cup was presented to John Heathcote as Captain of the Victorian team and winners of the Carnival, by A.L.C. President Mr. J. Carden. Cur Captain also received the Symonds Memorial Cup from Mr. Bob Alexander, Captain of the South Australian team - this cup of course being won from S.A. after being held by that state since 1954.

The All States Committee consisting of Mesars. E. Selth, A. Vial and A. Swan then announced the winner of the Brady Trophy for the outstanding Australian player of the Carnival. This was the brilliant South Australian forward Allan Gandy.

The Carnival was a personal triumph for our captain, John Heather The responsibilities of leadership rested securely on John's broad shoulds He was always solicitous for the welfare of his team and enjoyed confidence. His knowledge of the game and the splendid exemple he set on and off the field was a vital factor in our success. John's appointment as Captain of the Australian 12 was a most fitting climax to a great effort.

Coach

Although State coach Alf. Evans could not make the trip, the influence of his coaching was undoubtedly a great factor in the teams performances and our thanks go to Alf for his splendid contribution to the cause.


Conclusion

The same clubs which took part in the 1955 competitions again fielded teams in the 1956 season and fourteen players from U.H.S.O.B. - disbanded at the end of 1954 - were playing with some regularity. The last time no club was lost to the Association was between the 1950 and 1951 seasons.

The slow downward trend in the number of teams taking part in the open age sections continued but the junior grades showed a net increase of three after taking into account the amalgamation of the Camberwell-Glen Iris and Surrey Park Under 16 sides late in the season.

Registrations showed the same trends as with teams. A drop of 13 in open age players was more than offset by an increase of 35 amongst the juniors helped mainly by a substantial influx to the Williamstown Club. Of the other clubs only Caulfield, with a marked loss, showed no gain in under age players.

As was indicated in last season's report the total number of re registrations is apt to cause a misleading impression of the strength of the game in the State. The summary below gives the division between those who played regularly and those who did not do so.

- Committee met 5/6/56.
- The Treasurer reported that accounts for affiliation and registration fees, sticks, etc., to value of £396.16 .- were still outstanding from Clubs.
- An entry was received from Swinburne Technical School for the schools mid-week competition.
- Copy of Minutes of A.L.C. Annual Meeting, Annual Report and Balance Sheet were received. A special meeting of the Executive Committee has been called to consider the A.L.C. Report & Association finances only.
- Requests for subsidies on sticks has been deferred pending discussion of Association finances at a meeting to be held on 21st June.
- The Secretary reported that Clubs are over-looking minute requiring 50% deposit on all orders for sticks, which is payable with order.
- The Secretary reported an estimated nett loss of £8 .- .- on the Barbeque. The Treasurer was empowered to meet loss on Barbeque from Carnival Fund.
- 8. A special savings bank account has been opened for Monster Special Effort.
- Mr. Volk reported that as South Melbourne Technical School has at present a number of trainee teachers on staff it is not possible for the school to field a team in the mid-week competition. There are insufficient masters to supervise the present sports played.
- 10. Messrs. D. Hobbs and Con Otto of South Australia have agreed to accept appointment as Victoria stick selectors in dealings with P. J. Brady. Since this arrangement was instituted the quality of sticks has considerably improved. There have been only two reported breakages of sticks supplied this season by Brady.
- 11. Forty-two players have been selected to train in Senior Interstate squad.

Precis of Executive Committee Activities and Recommendations

- 1. Committee met on 21/6/1956 for a specially convened meeting to consider financial and A.L.C. matters.
- 2. To assist in sending away the best available teams, a levy of 4/- per head is to be struck this year on all open age players. 50% of levy to be allocated to 1956 Carnival Fund and 50% to 1956 Junior Interstate trip.
- £100: -: is to be allocated to 1956 Carnival Fund from present accumulated funds of Monster Special Effort.
- 4. Carnival team to West Australia to comprise 15 players.
- 5. Mr. A. Evans, if available, to be appointed coach to team visiting West Australia and to accompany team on same basis as selected player.

- 7. If ultimate nett profit of Monster Special Effort is as indicated by progress reports, £500: -: is to be placed in a special Trust Fund for the New and Junior Teams Sub-Committee to be used for the propogation of Lacrosse.
- 8. Question of stick subsidies to be finalised at end of 1956 season. The sum of £100: -: to be allocated for stick subsidy distribution to Clubs who have requested subsidy, on basis of total number of sticks in relation to quantity asked for under subsidy. Subsidised sticks to be used for school and junior players only. The £100: -: allocation to apply only to applications for subsidies received up to 21/6/56.
- 9. At end of 1956 season, the securing and marketing of sticks to be discontinued by Association and marketing of all Lacrosse equipment generally to be placed in hands of a selected sport store on conditions satisfactory to V.A.L.A. and Clubs.
- 10. All Clubs are advised that all Affiliation, Registration and Referee fees fall due and are payable by 30th June, 1956. Any failure to meet these commitments will incur the penalties under the V.A.L.A. rules which the Committee will strictly enforce. Payment of these dues will enable your Association to meet some of the above commitments in time.

- 11. It is to be recommended to the A.I.C. that the Constitution and Laws of Lacrosse, page 31 "Definition of Terms" paragraph "Free Position", 9th line, be amended by deleting the words "in front of him."
- 12. The Carnival Team to West Australia must be selected and announced no later than Monday, July 2nd.
- 13. At the next A.L.C. meeting our delegate,
 - a) When state of game is discussed, to put forward for consideration the lateral division of the ground into three areas - Home, Centre and Defence - beyond the boundaries of which the players so grouped can only proceed under penalty.
 - b) Delegate to oppose Biennial Carnivals
 - c) Delegate to oppose Colts' Carnivals for immediate future, but to suggest matter be raised again at next Senior Carnival. Suggest States may hold series of Colts' matches if they so desire in the meantime.
- 14. Messrs. P. Shappere and E. Selth to be nominated for A.L.C. Certificate of Merit.
- 15. It is to be recommended to the A.L.C. that the Annual Subscription to the A.L.C. be increased to £5: 5: -.
- 16. A suitable type of V.A.L.A. Lapel Pin is to be procured.
- 17. Carnival players to purchase sweaters and socks from Association on C.O.D. basis.

Insert the following new Rule: -

- 5A. Notwithstanding anything elsewhere contained in these Rules for a period of 12 months commencing on the First day of January, 1955, the following shall apply:-
 - (a) The Management of the Association shall be carried on by the Executive Committee, subject only to control as hereinafter set out by General Meetings of members and the Committee of the Association.
 - (b) For the purposes of this Rule the Executive Committee shall in addition to the powers given to it elsewhere by these Rules have the same powers and functions as the Committee of the Association except the power to elect the Permit Committee, the Weather Committee, the Selection Committee and the Investigation Committee which shall be elected at the first Committee Meeting of the Association each year but any decisions of the Executive Committee may be cancelled, set aside or varied, either in whole or in part by a General Meeting of Members or the Committee of the Association.
 - (o) The Committee of the Association shall meet when considered necessary by the Executive Committee or on a requisition being made pursuant to Rule 8 of these Rules but a Meeting of the Committee shall be held at least once every four months. The time and place of any such Meeting shall be determined by the Executive
 - (d) There shall be a General Meeting of Members at least once a year at a time and place to be determined by the Executive Committee, provided however that the Executive may, if it considers it necessary, convene-General Meeting of Members at any time and also a General Meeting shall be held if a requisition is made pursuant to Rule 2 of these Rules.
