The 2007 Australian Lacrosse League is the 50th competition in which Australian States have competed for the title of Australian Champion Lacrosse State since the Australian Senior Lacrosse Championships commenced in 1910. Victoria has won the title 23 times, Western Australia 15 times and South Australia 11 times.

These carnivals have been conducted annually since 1981 but with the increased number of international competitions and the resultant demands on time and money for participants at the international level, it has resulted in this premium Australian lacrosse tournament being diminished on occasions by the absence of some of the sport's recognised 'top' players.

The Australian Lacrosse League (ALL) was introduced in 2004 in a new format to decide the winner of the Garland McHarg Cup. It is scheduled to be played in October/November, avoiding any clash with international competitions. It is played in a league format, with games played in each participating State on Friday, Saturday or Sunday, thus reducing the demand for time off work for most participants. All teams pay the same nomination fee which provides 20 air fares for each team - creating a fare equalisation scheme. Each State has the opportunity to promote the highest national level of lacrosse in their State every year.

The Hobbs Trophy, which has been presented to the player judged to be the Best and Fairest in each Australian Senior Championship since 1956, will be presented to the Best and Fairest player in the Australian Lacrosse League. The Australian Lacrosse League All Stars Team will be selected during the Qualifying Round and those selected will receive their Lacrosse Australia Medallions after the Championship Game.

A survey conducted during the 2006 ALL competition indicated strong positive support for all aspects of the ALL concept. Approximately 80% of respondents to that survey were supporters/spectators who are very important to lacrosse. State Associations, on whose support the concept depends, are being invited to indicate their preferences for a range of options before a decision is made on the format for future Australian Senior Lacrosse Championship competitions.



Garland McHarg Trophy

In 1912 businessmen Richard Garland and Andrew McHarg donated a fine sterling silver cup, valued at 100 guineas, to the Victorian Lacrosse Association for annual competition between South Australia and Victoria.

Garland was a former Canadian champion player who had set up business in Melbourne. He helped to start a junior team at Brighton, was a generous benefactor for lacrosse and served as a VLA Vice-President between 1903 – 1914. McHarg played attack with Melbourne University and represented Victoria in the inaugural Victoria versus South Australia match played in Melbourne in 1888 and again the following year in the first interstate contest played in Adelaide.

The Garland-McHarg Cup was first played for by South Australia and Victoria as part of the 1912 Australian Lacrosse Carnival in Melbourne when all six Australian states competed. Such was the success and significance of this event, a first for any sporting code in Australia, that the controlling bodies agreed on a triennial format for future Carnivals. South Australia and Victoria continued to contest the Garland-McHarg Cup until 1923 when it was decided that it become the prize for the winning team at Australian Championships. The cup was passed to the care of the Australian Lacrosse Council and has served as the premier trophy in Australian lacrosse since that time.





LACROSSE RULES – A Brief Summary

- Number of players: 10 on the field (goalkeeper, 3 defenders, 3 midfielders, 3 attackers) plus 9 substitutes. Substitution can occur at any time.
- ➤ Playing time: Four periods of 20 minutes each. During the last three minutes of the fourth period and in all overtime periods the clock is stopped when the game is interrupted. If the score is tied at the end of regular playing time, then 2 x 4-minute periods of overtime are played. If the scores are still equal then additional 4 minute periods are played with the team scoring the first goal being the winner ('sudden death').
- > The field size is approximately 100m x 55m the goal size is 183cm x 183 cm.
- > The goals are inside the field approximately 14 m from the end lines.
- > All the players must wear a helmet with a face mask and protective gloves.
- > The pocket of the stick cannot be deeper than the diameter of the ball.
- The game starts with a face-off in the centre of the field. There is also a face-off after each goal. When the game is commenced the players from the wing areas join the face-off players struggling for the ball. When the ball is in one's possession or it leaves the central area other players can join the game.
- > There must be four players in the defensive half and three players in the attack half of the field at all times.
- There is no time limit for how long a player may hold the ball, and no limit on how far the ball may be thrown.
- ➤ A player can stop an attacking player in possession of the ball with the body and poke the ball out of the attaching player's stick with his stick. A player can defend another player within 3m of the loose ball.
- > The players can kick the ball, but they must not play the ball with their hand.
- > There can be up to four long sticks on the field at anytime.
- When a ball goes out of bounds in general play the last team to touch it loses possession. When a ball goes out of bounds as a result of a shot or a deflected shot at goal, it is awarded to the player who was nearest to the ball when it went out of bounds.
- There is a penalty of losing the ball or 30 seconds suspension if a team does not have possession of the ball when a technical foul (off-side, holding, interference, push from behind etc) is committed.
- There is 1, 2 or 3 minute penalty for personal fouls (slashing, tripping, cross-checking etc) depending on the severity of the foul. The penalty for an expulsion foul, or committing 5 personal fouls, is suspension for the remainder of the game.




