

LACROSSE IN AUSTRALIA

Lacrosse first reached Australia in 1874, courtesy of a Canadian enthusiast named L. L. Mount. Five years later, the Victorian Lacrosse Association was founded. From that time until the outbreak of World War II in 1939, the game prospered, listing on the latter date some 80 teams and 1300 players. Although not fully recovered from the wartime hiatus, lacrosse is well organized today in three Australian states — Victoria, South Australia and West Australia — and boasts a playing strength of some 1500. Interstate carnivals have been held every three years since 1910, rotating the site between the competing states. In 1926, the Australian Lacrosse Council was established and was quickly ratified by Queensland and New South Wales as well as the three previously cited states.

The Australian game is a different type from the American game and is played under different rules. Due to a lesser degree of aggressiveness, the Australians wear no padding or protection. Despite a lack of set patterns, the visitors feature hard passing and agility as the hallmarks of their style. The rules on offside play, body-checking and out-of-bounds play differ considerably from the American code. Today's game, however, will be played under American NCAA rules.

THE CURRENT TOUR

The current tour by the Australians reciprocates a trip "Down Under" made by an American team a few years ago. Composed of players from The University of Virginia and Washington & Lee University, the team succeeded in generating a desire on the part of Australian lacrosse players to visit the United States. Gene Corrigan, coach of Virginia, and Princeton coach Ferris Thomsen are serving as co-chairmen of the Australian Games Committee of the U. S. Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association, the official hosts for the visiting athletes. Stops on the tour which began March 12 and concludes April 18 are: University of Virginia, Duke University, Washington & Lee University, University of Maryland, the Naval Academy, Baltimore Lacrosse Club, Johns Hopkins University, Rutgers University, Princeton University, Philadelphia Lacrosse Club, and the Military Academy.
