A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE GAME IN AUSTRALIA

The field sport of lacrosse is known as the "fastest game on foot", and it was in this form that lacrosse has been played in Australia for 105 years. In the early 1970's box lacrosse was first introduced to Australia under modified rules in Victoria. Shortly afterwards it was introduced to South Australia and both states now boast a strong summer competition. In 1978 the opportunity arose for an Australian team to tour to Edmonton and play exhibition matches against teams in Canada, the high-light being games played as part of the Commonwealth Games. This tour gave box lacrosse the boost it needed and it is now recognised as a sport with a bright future in Australia. Western Australia are competing in these Championships to add another growth factor to the sport.

The game itself, as you shall see in these Championships, is fast and exciting, bringing the crowd close to the game and with a shot or goal being required every 30 seconds by the team in possession, the action is non-stop.

The Championship is a round robin event with each team playing three matches, with the top two sides than playing off for the trophy on Saturday night. The soft lacrosse winner will be decided on goal average in a two game play-off.

REFEREE'S SIGNALS AND WHAT THEY MEAN

Boarding - (minor or major penalty)

Referee pounds the closed fist of one hand into the open palm of the other hand. Imposed for cross-checking, elbowing, charging or tripping an opponent in a way that causes the opponent to be thrown violently into the boards.

Butt-ending - (major or match penalty)

Referee makes a cross motion of the forearms, one moving under the other. Imposed for jabbing an opponent with the butt of the stick.

REFEREE'S SIGNALS AND WHAT THEY MEAN

Charging - (minor or major penalty)

Referee rotates clenched fists around one another in front of chest. Imposed for running or jumping into, or charging an opponent, or for charging a goalkeeper while the goalkeeper is within his goal crease.

Cross-checking - (minor penalty)

Referee makes a series of forward and backward motions with both fists clenched extending from the chest for a distance of about one foot. Imposed for checking an opponent with the stick in a hitting manner.

Delayed Calling of Penalty

Referee extends arm and points once to penalized player.

Elbowing - (minor or major penalty)

Referee taps either elbow with the opposite hand. Imposed for using the elbow to foul an opponent.

High-Sticking - (minor or major penalty)

Referee holds both fists, clenched, one immediately above the other, at the height of the forehead. Imposed for carrying or holding stick above the height of the shoulder so that contact with the neck, face or head of an opposing player results.

Holding - (a. minor penalty; b. loss of possession)

Referee clasps either wrist with the other hand well in front of the chest.

a. Imposed for holding an opponent with hands or stick.

b. Imposed if an attacking player pushes off a defending player's stick with the palm side of his free hand.

Hooking - (minor or major penalty)

Referee makes a series of tugging motions with both arms, as if pulling something toward the stomach. Imposed for impeding or trying to impede the progress of an opponent by "hooking" with the stick.

Interference

Referee holds crossed arms stationary in front of the face, fists closed. Imposed for numerous reasons.

<u>Misconduct</u> - (misconduct penalty or bench minor)

Referee places both hands on hips several times and points to penalized player. Imposed for using obscene, profane or abusive language or gestures; banging the boards with sticks; etc.

REFEREE'S SIGNALS AND WHAT THEY MEAN

Slashing - (minor or major penalty)

Referee makes a series of chopping motions with the edge of one hand across the opposite forearm. Imposed for impeding or seeking to impede the progress of an opponent by "slashing" with the stick, i.e. striking with the stick over the arm or any part of the body without really trying to check the ball carrier's stick.

Tripping - (a. minor penalty; b. penalty shot)

Referee extends right leg forward, foot flat on the floor,
and strikes it with right hand below the knee.

- a. Imposed for placing stick, knee, foot, arm, hand or elbow or drop in front of an opponent in a way that causes him to trip or fall.
- b. Imposed when a player is tripped from behind while in control of the ball in the attacking zone and with only the goalkeeper to pass.

Wash-out - (goal disallowed)

Referee swings both arms laterally across the body with palms down.
