

ORIGIN OF THE GAME.

The game of Lacrosse originated with the North American Indians, and was called by them the "Ball Game." The name "Lacrosse" was given it by the French Priests who penetrated the country on missionary expeditions, on account of the funcied similarity of the sticks to a Bishop's crozier. The Indians used a ball made of dried hide firmly rolled together and tightly bound with thongs; its weight varied, but was generally about one lb. The sticks used by the various tribes also varied in shape and size. The Delawares and Ottawas used a stick with a triangular net of wood and thongs; the Choctaws used two sticks, usually of hickory, and about three feet long, each having a loop of hickory at the end, bound and netted with strips of dry hide.

The very few records that exist tell us that on all great fete or gala days a lacrosse match between two tribes was the chief feature of amusement provided. There was generally no limit to the number of players on these occasions, from one to two hundred frequently taking part, whilst the extent of the field was arranged in accordance with the numerical strength of the tribes engaged, and the goals were generally one and often two miles apart. The goals were constructed of two wigwams or huts at each end.

There is no record of any rules or regulations in these contests, but it is safe to say they were expressed by the axiom "the best side wins," and it can be readily imagined the games were fairly strenuous. As in our civilized version, the game was started in the centre, the ball being thrown in and the fortunate brave who succeeded in catching it in his stick would, if he were a Choctaw, clap the other stick over it like a lid of a saucepan and run as fast as he could. The opposing braves would endeavour to wrest the ball from him by smashing at his crosse with their own; and even if they were unsuccessful in hitting his stick they seldom missed his body. Many of the braves engaged in a Ball Game emerged from it with more scars than they ever got in battle.

During the progress of the game the squaws encouraged the players both by voice and the aid of whips applied to their backs as incentives to greater speed.

The Canadian white men learnt the rudiments of the game from the Indians, and considerable credit is due to them for having constructed so fine a game as lacrosse from such rude materials.

The earliest record of the game being played in Australia is in 1874, when lacrosse was introduced into Victoria by Mr. L. L. Mount, a Canadian. He interested Mr. George Beech, who is now one of four Life Members of the Victorian Lacrosse Association, and he has the honor of being the first Australian lacrosse player.

South Australia commenced playing the game shortly after its introduction into Victoria, and senior competitive games began in the year 1888, and the formation of the controlling Association dates back to 1890. Western Australia commenced playing the game in 1896.

HOW TO FOLLOW THE GAME.

As a guide to any spectators who may not be fully conversant with lacrosse in all its details, the following comments on the game and rules may be of assistance:—

Usual arrangement of a team:

Three Forwards-First Home, Second Home, Third Home,

Two Attacks-Right and Left.

Centre.

Two Defences-Right and Left,

Three Backs-Third Man, Cover Point, Point (first man out from goal),

Goalkeeper.

The goal consists of two poles, which are six feet above the ground and six feet apart. To each pair of goal posts is attached a net sloping towards and reaching the top of the posts, and closed in on the sides. The width of the goal posts is preserved by a bar across the top of the posts, to which the net is fastened.

The playing-ground between the goals is 110 yards.



HOW TO FOLLOW THE GAME.

(Continued from Page 23).

The centre is a circle with a diameter of six yards. No player-other than the centre men-is allowed to enter this area until the ball has been played clear of it.

The game is divided into four quarters, the first two of 25 minutes each, the second two of 20 minutes each, with an interval of 10 minutes between second and third quarters, but at quarter and three-quarter time the interval shall be only enough to change ends.

When the Referee has called a "foul" the ball must not be touched by either party, nor must the players move from the position in which they happen to be at the moment, until the Referee has called "play," A goalkeeper can resume his place in goal providing a "foul" has not been given against him.

The Referee need not suspend play when the player who has been fouled is still in possession of the ball or the ball remains in the possession of such player's side.

Touching the ball with the hand, save by the goalkeeper, who while defending the goal within the goal-crease, although not allowed to catch and throw the ball with his hand, may put away with his hands or feet or block the ball in any manner with his crosse or body.

Hitting wildly with the crosse or throwing it at an opponent or at the ball.

Charging into, shouldering or interfering in any way with another who is in pursuit of an opponent. This does not prevent the use of the "bodycheck" nor the pushing of an opponent with the shoulder in ground scuffes.

("Body-check" is placing of one's body in the way of an approaching opponent, so that the latter is simply impeded. No checker shall use force in the body-check.)

Holding an opponent's crosse, or pushing him with crosse in hand, or running in front of him or interfering in any way to keep him from the tall until the other player reaches It, or checking the crosse of an opponent who is not actually in possession of or immediately about to take possession

Holding, striking or tripping a player with the crosse.

"Cross-check," which consists of a player charging into another with both hands on the crosse so as to make the stick meet the body of his opponent.

"Up-check" is not permitted.

Swinging the crosse into or across the body of an opponent in such a way as to hit or otherwise endanger the body.

Penalties.

The Referee may give a "face-off" or bounce or free position at the place where the foul occurred, yet not nearer either goal-post than 10 yards, unless the foul be made by the defending side, and/or he may disqualify the offending player or players for such time during the game as he thinks fit. Definition of Terms.

"Face-off,"-The ball is placed upon the ground between the crosses of two opponents, each of whom shall have his face towards the goal he is attacking. The crosses shall be back to back, wooden blades down, lapping at least two-thirds of the net. They shall not move until "play" is called. when the ball shall be drawn clear.

"Free Position."-The player awarded "free position" shall be placed in such position of advantage as in the opinion of the Referee he has been roboed of, and all other players shall remain in the position in which they happen to be at the moment. The player awarded "free position" shall take the bell on his cross in front of him, and at the said from the Refere the game shall proceed. Prices 18 60 mg


