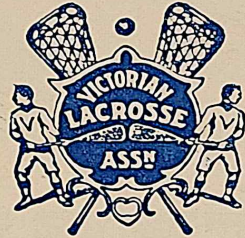

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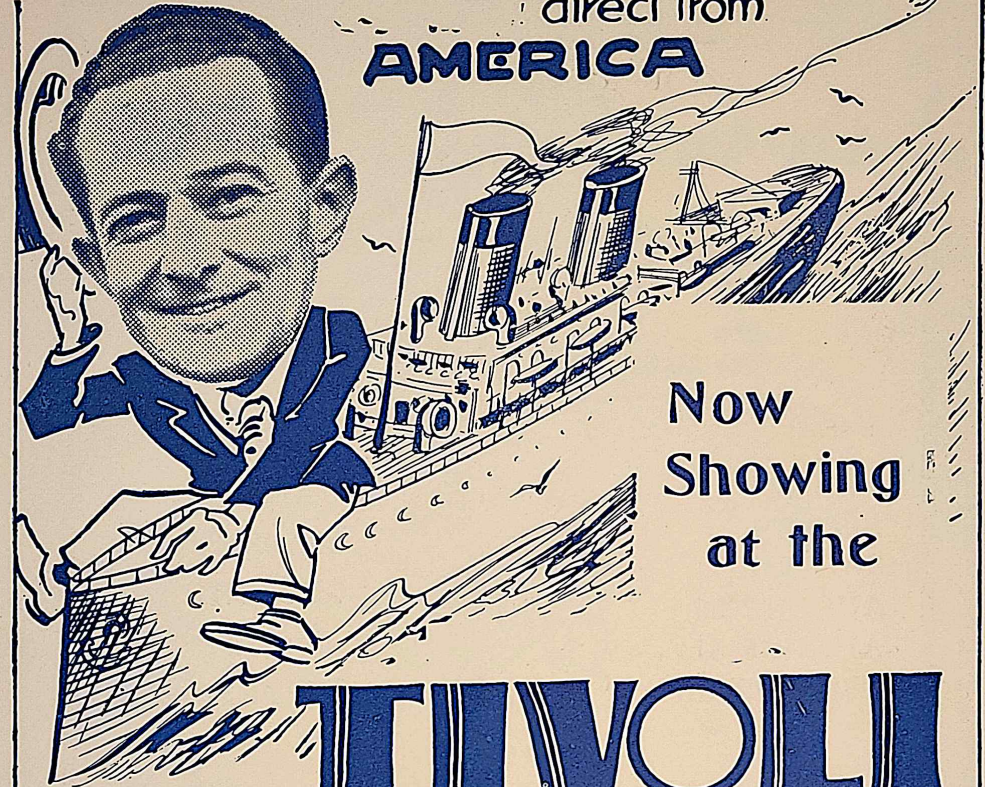

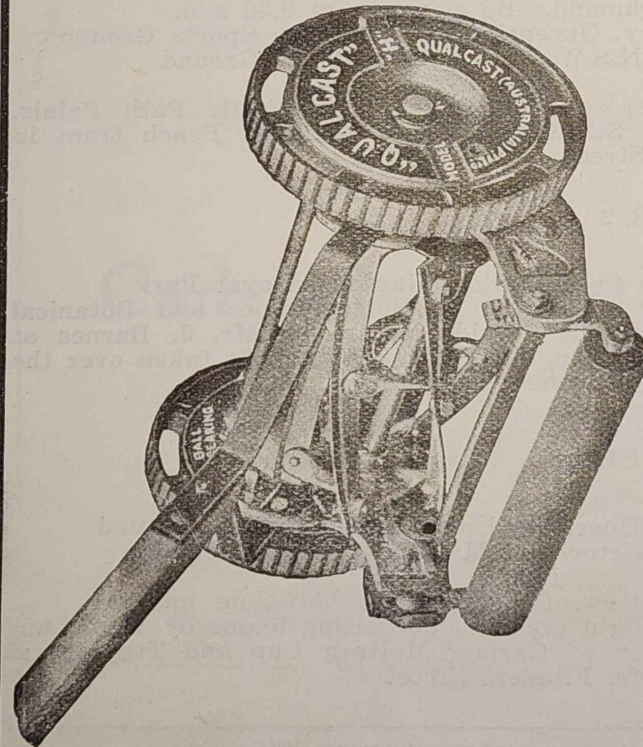

## THE HISTORY OF THE GARLAND-McHARG CUP

After the Canadian visit in 1907, the cup was presented to the Victorian Lacrosse Association for competition amongst the various States, the donors being Mr. Garland, a Canadian, and Mr. Andrew McHarg, of Melbourne. The Carnival matches were then originated and now take place every third year, the venue changing from one capital city to another by rotation. No contests were held during the war period. The cup, which is valued at 100 guineas, is at present in the possession of Victoria. It is interesting to note that South Australia and Victoria have each won this handsome trophy three times. It is regretted that Mr. McHarg has missed an opportunity of presenting the cup to this Carnival's winners, as he is at present on a trip to England.

The Cup, together with other V.L.A. trophies, will be displayed in the windows of T. Mackenzie Kirkwood, 333 Bourke Street, Melbourne, during Carnival Week.

## From Here and There.

Roy Read holds the goal-throwing record for a carnival match with ten for Victoria against New South Wales in 1929.

Is Hugh Beattie's sixteen goals for Victoria the highest aggregate thrown by an individual during the carnival series?

C. L. Murray holds the Victorian, and perhaps the world's record throw in lacrosse with 162 yards 6 inches. The world's record cricket ball throw is 140 yards 2 feet.

The greatest number of goals ever thrown in a senior section match was in 1928, Caulfield 42, defeating Adult Deaf 12.

Fred (Dad) Sutherland, of Camberwell, has probably been playing the game longer than anyone in Australia (he started in 1890), while Vinc. Healy, Henry Wrixon and Reg. Briereley have played in senior lacrosse longer than any of our present-day players.

The largest lacrosse club this season is Caulfield, with a playing membership of just over the century. The Williamstown club made an Australian record in 1929 with 121 registered players, and put seven teams in the field each Saturday. A team reached the semi-final in each section except the A team, who finished fifth. Can any other amateur club in any sport boast of having fielded seven full teams each week?

On August 6 last Williamstown, 13 goals, defeated Tasmania, 6 goals, at Launceston. May the newly-formed Tasmanian Association go on from strength to strength and be represented at the next carnival.

The highest score ever recorded in an interstate contest was Victoria's 24 to 1 win over South Australia in 1930.

Essendon's record of nine senior premierships is in danger of being equalled by Malvern, who have eight to their credit.

The first six-a-side tournament held in Australia was staged by the V.L.A. last year, M.C.C. winning the senior section and S.M.T.S. the junior. This year's winners were Malvern and University High School.

Mr. Mount was ninety-three years of age in 1929, and was living in London. We believe he is still "attacking."

Mr. Joel Fox apologises to the visitors for his absence, and keenly regrets missing the carnival through absence from the State.

Lacrosse was introduced into Victoria in 1874 by Mr. L. L. Mount, a Canadian. Mr. George Beech, a life member of the V.L.A., was the first Australian to play the game. Mr. Joel Fox, president of the V.L.A., was another pioneer. Earliest clubs were Melbourne, South Melbourne and Carlton.

The following paragraph appeared in "The Herald" of 29th June, 1881:—"Lacrosse, the great national game of Canada, is promising to become a favorite pastime for Victorians. There are now six clubs and more than 200 members."

\* \* \* \* \*

The Canadian visit in 1907 revolutionised the game. May the time be not far distant when we have another international visit.

\* \* \* \* \*

Victoria is credited with having initiated box lacrosse, which is now played in U.S.A., Canada, Ireland, England and Germany. An American celebrity states: "Not since Ben Hur rode the chariot and Thornei rent the lion in the Coliseum, has there been anything like box lacrosse. I am a God-fearing man of gentle peace, therefore I refuse to play, but I certainly will be looking on."

\* \* \* \* \*

Has there been a lower scoring game than the second grade Williamstown v. Essendon contest in 1902, which ended one all? Tom Golding, the one-eyed goalkeeper for 'Town, allowed only nine shots to get past him in the whole season, and four of those were in the final match.

\* \* \* \* \*

The Victorian high scoring record was put up by the Williamstown E team in 1930, when they overwhelmed S.M.T.S. by 61 goals to nil.

\* \* \* \* \*

The V.L.A. in 1930 secured the Australian record membership, having 68 teams and 1,115 players, exclusive of country and school competitions.

\* \* \* \* \*

In 1931 Jack Beattie threw 19 goals for Malvern during a senior match. In 1930 J. S. Smart netted 22 goals for Artillery in an A section game.

\* \* \* \* \*

In 1926 Jack Beattie put up the senior goal-throwing record with 138 goals for the season, including twelve in carnival matches.

\* \* \* \* \*

This is the thirty-second successive year that Capt. J. H. Fearon has been president of the Williamstown Club.

\* \* \* \* \*

Has anyone had a longer interstate record than George Flood, who represented Victoria in the carnival sides of 1910, 1912, and 1920?

\* \* \* \* \*

Some years ago the V.L.A. had a very aptly-named Weather Committee, comprising Messrs. Flood, Coldstream and Waters.

\* \* \* \* \*

A popular senior player is about to be married and recently a kitchen tea was tendered to him. It is said that the gift he will find most useful was an axe given him by someone who has seen him play on the back line.

Lacrosse was one of the field games played at the present Olympic Games.

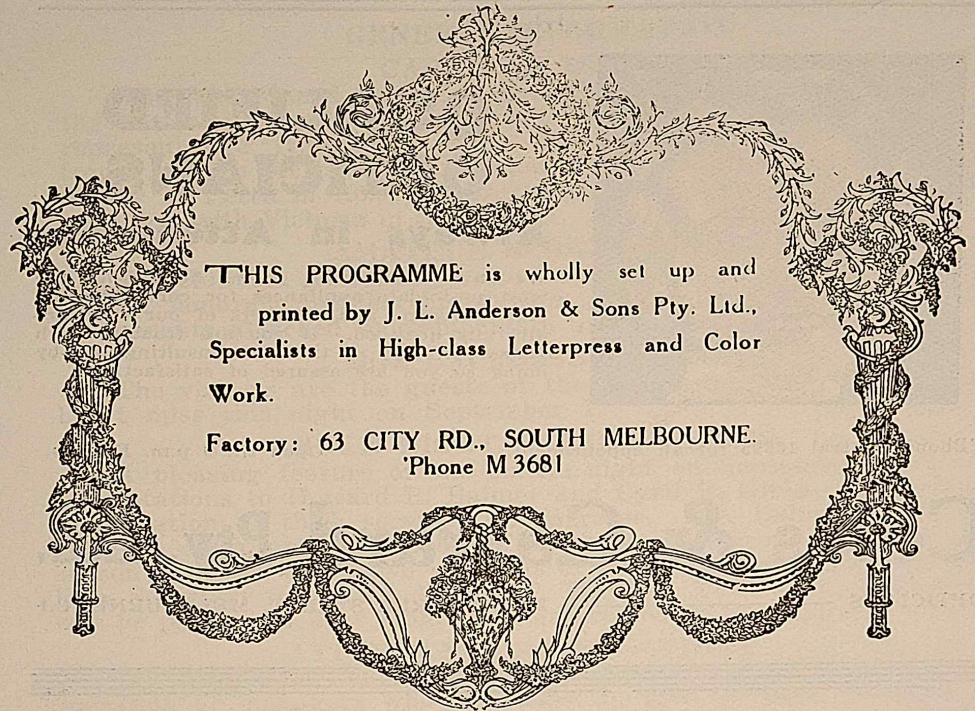
