



THE GARLAND-McHARG CUP. HISTORY OF CUP.

After the Canadian visit in 1908, Mr. Garland, a Canadian, and Mr. McHarg, both residents of Melbourne, presented to the Victorian Association a Cup for competition amongst the various States. The Carnival Matches were then originated, and in the first series at Adelaide in 1910, South Australia won the honours.

In 1912 at Melbourne, Victoria were successful, but in 1920 at Sydney, when the matches were resumed after the war, South Australia again obtained possession of the Cup, to hold for a term of three years without defending it.

This explains the history of the above Cup, value 100 guineas, which is now in the hands of the South Australian Association, the State team having won the Cup at the Brisbane Carnival, 1923. The Cup is being competed for during the 12th and 21st of August at the Jubilee Oval, Adelaide. The contesting States are Victoria, New South Wales, Western Australia, Queensland, and South Australia.



This programme is for the guidance of visitors and spectators at games, and every care has been taken to supply all information desired, but do not hesitate to ask for further details we have overlooked.

The Carnival Committee will greatly appreciate the co-operation of managers of teams at all functions where large bodies of players need organising.

SYNOPSIS OF PLAY.

The playing ground measures 110 yards from goal to goal; in the centre is a circle 18 feet in diameter. Here the ball is faced off between the two centre men; no other player is allowed to enter this circle until the ball leaves the ring. Round the centre ring are two attacking players on each side; they are opposed by defence players from the opposing side. From the face off a series of attacks are made on the opponents' goal mostly by the three players known as forwards, who are checked by players known as back men.


It is unusual for more than one player to tackle an opponent; each player closely watches his own man, hence the game is a tussle to create a loose man among the forwards from the centre players.

The chief features of the game are speed, clean stick-work, and clever dodging. Lacrosse is the fastest of winter games. This is on account of the almost absence of free marks. A player can only have a free throw if he has been fouled in any way. Frees are given in the case of wild hitting of sticks, charging or checking before the opponent is near the ball.

No player is allowed within the goal-tender's square, which is 6 feet all round the net. Player may carry the ball into that square, but not be there to receive it.

The referee has full power to penalise for breaches of the rules, even to sending players off the field for various periods.

Usually the side who combine best score most freely. Individual effort tends to give advantage to the opposing side by allowing time for players to close in on open positions.


