LACROSSE (About the game)

Lacrosse combines the fluency of team play with the exciting spectacle of individual skills. It has sufficient content of physical contact to necessitate endurance and stamina.

It makes demands on nerve and adroitness, strength and intelligence.

It is for good reason called the fastest game on two feet.

Today's game will be played to International Rules. In the simplest terms, this means the following:

- (a) Ten players constitute a full team and there will be a maximum of nine substitutes.
- (b) The game is controlled by two officials, a referee and an umpire.
- (c) Either official may suspend play at any time.
- (d) The home side shall provide an official time keeper whose duty will be to keep accurate time of each period of play, intermissions and team "time-outs".
- (e) Either team captain may request an official for a 'time-out' period, not to exceed two minutes and limited to two such periods in each half.
- (f) There will be an official scorer, whose duties will be as follows:
 - 1) To keep an official record of the score and players involved in scoring.
 - 2) To keep a record and check on substitution, time-outs and penalties.
 - 3) To notify the time-keeper to signal to the officials as appropriate.
- (g) The playing time shall be 60 minutes divided into four periods of 15 minutes each, with intervals of 2 minutes between the 1st and 2nd and 3rd and 4th quarters. There will be 10 minutes interval between the 2nd and 3rd quarters.
- (h) An offside rule applies when there are less than 3 attack men on the opponents side of the field or when there are less than four defence men (inc. goal-keeper) on the defending side of the field of any one side. The offending team lose possession or, if not in possession, suffer suspension of the offending player(s) for 30 seconds.

(i) There are three classes of fouls:

- 1) Personal
- 2) Expulsion
- 3) Technical.

The Personal foul comprises any deliberate intimidation, provocative or dangerous action or unsportsman like conduct. The offending player suffers suspension, at the discretion of the officials, for one to three minutes, depending upon the severity. Any one Personal foul may be interpreted by the officials as an 'Expulsion' foul, in which case the offending player would be suspended for the remainder of the game.

Any player committing five 'Personal' fouls will suffer automatic suspension from the game.

Technical fouls are less serious and are defined generally as any breach of the rules as laid down. More specifically for example, illegal interference or screening or action with the Crosse; holding, pushing when not directly involved in the game, withholding the ball from play, failing to obey instructions of an official.

Note: Fending off a check or player with the arm or body when in possession or about to take possession of the ball does NOT constitute a foul.

Substitution

Under normal circumstances substitution may only be made when play is suspended.

Exceptions are:

- 1) A substitute may be introduced to the game to replace a suspended player or expelled player when the appropriate penalty time has elapsed, which in the case of an expelled player is three minutes.
- 2) Substitutes may be introduced singly, after the substituted player has left the field of play. A substitute must, under these circumstances, enter the field of play on the same side of the centre line as the substituted player makes his exit.

THE AUSTRALIANS

The Australian squad seems to be, from advance reports on their tour in the U.S.A., as formidable a Lacrosse combination as have set foot in England for some years.

Their previous visits to England, in 1962 and 1967, although beaten by England 7-5 and 10-7, leave memories of tense exciting games in which the utmost advantage was taken of the slightest mistakes made by either side.

Today's game is likely to be no exception.

There is only one member of the present touring side of 21 players who visited England in 1967, Brian Griffiths, who was then captain. It is he, Mike Raggatt and Noel Speck, England can expect front of goal attacking action from, but the Australians great strength in depth will probably result in goals from almost any source. The Australians average age is 25, height 5'-11" and weight 180 lbs. Also their 12 years average experience promises a high standard of Lacrosse.

DISLEY LACROSSE CLUB

When England last played against the Australians in 1967, it would have been incredible had an article about Disley appeared in the match programme. However, since then things have changed considerably at Disley, with this season standing out as easily the club's most successful for many years. The increased stature of the club is registered by the presence of two Disley players in the squad for today's game, namely Brian Robinson and Bill Horton.

Just three seasons ago when Disley finished third from the bottom of the second division and the 'A' team were bottom of the fifth division, the future looked very bleak for the club. The first team had passed the stage of being referred to as ageing - it was aged. There were one or two young players developing in the 'A' team but they were far too raw to be considered for the first team.

The following season the improvement began with the arrival of two new players from Mellor, the Gould-Martin brothers, who were experienced enough to make a big impression on the first team. Although the team's league position was only one place higher and the composition of the first team was altered only by the addition of the Gould-Martins, Disley reached the final of the Junior Flags but they were easily defeated 3-15 by Cheadle 'A'. The path to the final had been exciting and memorable for an 11-2 victory over the rising Stockport side, a game in which Brian Robinson scored eight goals.

The close season saw the arrival of Danny Roden and the return of Alec Healey to the game. After half a dozen games these two and Len l'Anson had established places in the team which was now far more youthful and becoming a force to be reckoned with. David Morris, a defence man who had been playing lacrosse for only eighteen months, was introduced into the first team in the middle of the season and grew in confidence and competence with every game. The return of David Bailey to the game further strengthened the attack and the team settled down. Much credit for the 'A' team revival must go to Neville Oliver and David Morris who introduced new players to the game and to Ray Gould-Martin, the match secretary, who worked miracles to ensure that the 'A' team had twelve men.

Both teams were then, at the beginning of this season, well placed to challenge for promotion and both have achieved this with the 'A' team also winning the bonus of the sixth division championship. Recognition has come for individual players; Bill Horton and Brian Robinson have played for Cheshire and the North as well as England, David Williams and Ray Beck have had Cheshire trials, whilst Peter Williams has played for the Cheshire Under 21 team and Terry Underwood and Danny Roden went with the England Under 18 team to America at Easter.

On the administrative level it is nice to see Bernard Everett, now nearing the end of his term as President of Cheshire, rewarded for his many years of service to lacrosse as a player, secretary and later president of Disley. To end on a sadder note, we wish David Williams well for his new life in South Africa and thank him for his fine service to the club when he emigrates later this month.

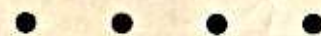
