LACROSSE.

METING OF THE ASSOCIATION.

The annual meeting of the Lacrosse Association was held on Thursday evening. There was a fair attendance of members. Many players are absent at the front, lacrosseurs have done remarkably well in the matter of volunteering for active service. The President (Mr. Mostyn Evans) occupied the chair. The Secretary (Mr. C. A. M. West) presented the committee's report and balance-sheet, which were adopted by Mr. H. W. Hodgetts. The Secretary moved that rules 25 and 32 of the association, relating to the continuation of matches and the fixing of games for the following year, should be suspended for the coming season and so long as a state of war existed. The motion was carried unanimously.

The committee's report stated that no official matches were played during the past season, but at the request of players undergoing their military training at Mitcham and other camps, and with the full approval of the committee, six games were played between the members of the University Club and the opposition of civilians. Owing to the cessation of official matches, the finances were not appreciably affected, and it was gratifying to report that the statement of the accounts for the year ended 31st Dec. indicated a credit balance of £11.17.9.

In consequence of the war, the only Victoria Cross which had

been gained by a South Australian was awarded to Capt. A. S. Blackburn, a member of the University Club.

Distinguished Service Orders had been awarded to Drs. Frey and Jeffries, two members of the University Club, and decorations had been conferred upon Capt. G. C. Campbell and Lieut. L. Shattock, members of the University Club.

Decorations had been awarded to Capt. J. A. Full, H. White, and F. Lang.

The committee recommended that the rules dealing with the playing of matches during the coming winter should not be suspended, and that the association should go into recess until the completion

of the war.

LACROSSE ASSOCIATION ANNUAL MEETING.

The annual general meeting of the S.A. Lacrosse Association was held last evening at the Exchange Hotel. Mr. Mastyn Evan occupied the chair and referred in fitting terms to the large number of lacrosse players now serving at the front.

The annual report, which was read by the secretary, showed that no official matches were played during the year, but at the request of players engaged in their military training at Monash and other camps, and with the full approval of the committee, six matches were played; one side being composed of soldiers and the opposition comprising civilian players from the northern areas and also from Broken Hill took part, the games which were warmly enjoyed by the participants. Owing to the cessation of official matches, the finances were not appreciably affected and the auditor's (Messrs. W. G. Batchelor's) statement showed a credit balance of £11. 17. 0. The glorious achievements of many of the members at the front had filled the association with patriotic pride. The only Victoria Cross which had been gained by a resident of South Australia, was earned by Captain A. S. Blackburn, a member of the Association and of the University Club. Blackburn, who has been awarded the University Cup, whose decorations have been conferred upon Captain G. C. Campbell, Lieutenant Clark and P. Audit, and there are probably others whose names had not come under notice. The association

always emanated from the players upon the lacrosse field, had justified their remarkable work in the defence of their country and the race. Many brave acts had doubtless been modestly performed by them unnoticed in their fight for right and justice. The programme had been put on by a number of lacrosseists in the hotel hall. Such well-known players as F. Hutch, Roy Free, S. E. J. A. Yull, H. White, and F. Lang had had their turns in the activities of the country. The services of some of the committee went out to their relatives. The committee acting upon the suggestion of the donor, Mr. G. Mastyn Evan, had decided not to erect the hall in honour of him as he had ended. Then it would be made as comfortable in detail as possible, and unveiled with fitting ceremony. The thanks of the players was acknowledged by Lieutenant J. Clark before his departure for the front. The presentation which took place at the Unity Oval, Lieutenant Clark, late of the Goodwood Club, and previously with the Port Pirie Club, was most responsible in the fulfilment of the match programme between the soldiers and civilians.

The treasurer reported that the balance of assets was £23. 15. 0. The election of officers for the coming year was as follows:- chairman, the Governor (Sir Henry Galway); president, Mr. Mastyn Evan; vice-presidents, Sir T. Smith, K.O.M.G., Drs J. J. Counter, F. A. H. Russell, H. H. Gill, H. C. Watkins, Mr. P. G. H. Angus Parsons, K.C.; H. Gill, Williams, W. H. Hughes, C. A. Edmunds, L. Humphreys, H. W. Hodgetts, and W. D. Taylor, chairman of committee, Mr. H. W. Noblett; treasurer, Mr. Mastyn Evan; Mr. V. Roach (on active service); honorary treasurer, Mr. W. G. F. Batchelor; members of the committee, Mr. E. A. H. Williams, Mr. W. Williams, Mr. W. C. Noblett were re-elected; auditors, Messrs. H. R. Adamson and L. Shuttleworth; selection committee, Messrs. Hodgetts, Wicks and Campbell.

A sum of £200. 0s. 0d. was voted by the association towards the Soldiers' Tobacco Fund.

The rules providing for the registration of players and for the arrangement of premiership and grade matches have been suspended to last year.

The meeting concluded with the singing of the National Anthem.


In support of the recommendation of



Minutes of Conference between Committee of the South Australian Lacrosse Association and delegates from the High Schools Sports Association, held at the Exchange Hotel, at 8pm Monday, May 28th 1917

The Secretary briefly outlined what transpired at the High Schools Association Annual Meeting, at which he, supported by Mr Nicholas, had pleaded for the introduction of lacrosse into the schools. The Chairman then

BIOGRAPHICAL.

LATE SURGEON-CAPT. N. C. SHIERLAW, M.C.

Nova has been received in Adelaide of the death from wounds on April 11 of Surgeon-Capt. N. C. Shierlaw, aged 33, whose receipt of the Military Cross was announced last month. He was a son of Mr. J. G. Shierlaw, of Eton street, Malvern. After he left Prince Alfred College, he went through the medical course at the Adelaide University. He then proceeded to Edinburgh, and in 1900 took the L.R.C.P. degree. He became resident house surgeon at Midstone Ophthalmic

Hospital, where he remained for 18 months. In 1912 he was admitted a Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons at Edinburgh. He returned to Adelaide after an absence of between four and five years. He had been in practice in his native city as an eye specialist for about 12 months when the war broke out, and he volunteered for active service. He was medical officer at German infirmary camp until the camp was broken up, when he again requested he was sent abroad. After about nine months at Woodcock Park he was transferred to France, and had been at the front on field service for about 12 months at the time of his death. In September, 1916, he received from Major-General Sir H. V. Cox (commanding the 4th Australian Division) a card congratulating him upon "his courage and devotion to duty near Pozieres on August 29-30, 1916." Another brother, Mr. A. E. Shierlaw, of Sydney, is a sergeant in the artillery.

Mr. S. Mitchell, of Alexander street, Port Pirie, has been notified that his third son, Sgt. R. E. (Eric) Mitchell, has been awarded the Military Medal. Sgt. Mitchell is a unknown and popular local lad, skilled lacrosse player, and a successful football player. Prior to leaving for the front he resided in Adelaide and played for the Sturt Lacrosse Club. He is now attached to a machine-gun section.

LATE SECOND-LIEUT. V. N. HOPKINS

The late Second-Lieut. V. N. Hopkins, who died at Fontenay-le-Pesnel, France, on April 11, of wounds received in action, was the second son of Mr. and Mrs. H. O. Hopkins, of the National Bank, Eudunda. He was educated at the Public School, Eudunda, and at the University, where he joined the staff of the Bank of Australasia, Adelaide, where he remained for three years. For a similar term prior to enlisting, in December, 1914, he was in the employ of Messrs. G. and F. G. Whiting, Accountants, Sydney. He served with the 5th Field Ambulance (C.N.S.W.) in Egypt for two months, and then became attached to the 11th Battalion, which he rejoined in the 11th, when he remained until the evacuation. Thence he went to France, where he served as a private until April, 1917. He received his commission in the 11th, and became a lance corporal, and returned to the front very early in August. The deceased was a member of the Woodville Cricket and Port Adelaide Lacrosse Clubs, and in the latter game represented South Australia in the national meeting at Queensland in 1914. Mr. and Mrs. Hopkins' three sons enlisted in the early part of the war. One, Lieut. P. R. Hopkins, who was invalided home in December, 1917, was officially reported wounded during September, but the exact nature of his injuries is that he is progressing well. This son is a Lieutenant in one of the English regiments.

LATE LIEUT. L. A. WHITTINGTON

Mr. and Mrs. Peter Whittington, of Hyde Park, have been notified by the military authorities of the death in action on October 12 of their youngest son, Lieut. Louis Arnold Whittington, of the 4th Battalion, A.I.F. The deceased soldier was born on September 16, 1888, in the old home at Hyde Park, where the family lived for 30 years. He was educated at Prince Alfred College and the Adelaide University, and took his degree of LL.B. in 1911, in entering it, the Chancellor (Sir Samuel Way) congratulated the applicant on having passed first class in logic and psychology, and in Human law, and on having been the Roby Fletcher Scholar in 1909. He was admitted to the Bar of Messrs. Anderson and Gordon, and later to others, and entered the war, and was admitted to the Bar on December 10, 1911. He was chief clerk to Messrs. Poole and Johnson, and later practised his profession at Narracott, and from there he enlisted. After passing the A.O.T. he was appointed second lieutenant on March 16, 1915, and was made a lance corporal, he was appointed second lieutenant on March 16, 1916, and left for the front in August, 1916. He made rapid advancement at Gouffre, and was chief clerk to the commanding officer, and was acting adjutant, and later was placed temporarily second in command of the 12th Training Battalion, and was pressed to remain on the staff in England, but this work did not fascinate him, and he returned to Australia. After passing the N.C.O. and officers' schools at Maran, he was appointed second Lieutenant on March 16, 1919, and left for the front in August, 1919. He made rapid advancement at Gouffre, and was second in command first of the 12th Battalion, and then another friend, Lt. Col. R. G. Gordon, the latter of whom was killed early in the war, and was admitted to the Bar on December 10, 1911. He was chief clerk to Messrs. Poole and Johnson, and later practised his profession at Narracott, and then elsewhere. After passing the court martial, he took special pleasure in winning his cases. In one of his last letters he wrote:—"Had a glorious victory; got my man of today, and made another friend for life. Lieutenant FREDERICK HARVEY, killed in action on November 12, in Palestine, was the second son of Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Harvey, King's Park. He was one of the first to enlist from South Australia with the Light Horse, and was then 18 years old. He sailed with the 1st Extraordinary Force for Egypt, and accompanied his unit to Gallipoli on May 2, 1915. He fought in the battle of the Dardanelles, and then took part in the heavy fighting in Mesopotamia, where the Australian Light Horse distinguished themselves conspicuously. In consequence of his devotion to duty, soldierly qualities, and gallantry, he was wounded in the Raifa battle, but joined his unit again, and was in many fierce battles. At the age of 21 years II months he fell, after three years active service. Fred (as he was known) was a brilliant lacrosse player, and played with the Goodwood team. He was a member of the Goodwood Presbyterian Young Men's Bible Class. He was employed on the Messrs. Meek's Colonial Woolen Mill, and was of a bright cheerful disposition, and had many friends. His elder brother, Lieutenant J. McF. Harvey, has been on active service from the beginning of the war.
