Versatile In Games

Seeing his well-preserved, rugged, short figure you would scarcely realise that Mr. Bill Noal, of "The Advertiser" staff, played lacrosse for SA 50 years ago.

And he played league football for Norwood Oval 1910, and 1921, and Sturt 1911-15, for Glenelg in 1923.

He was secretary of Sturt football club for 17 years.

Mr. Noal certainly served a good game apprenticeship, having played in Proprietary football team at Port Pirie in 1907 when Essington Lewis was captain.

He became captain of the first team of Port Pirie team who played Port Adelaide League team at Port Pirie in 1919 and beat them.

Mr. Noal thinks he still holds record for throwing eight goals during lacrosse for SA. Victoria in a 1920 carnival match on the Jubilee Oval, Adelaide.

But we could go on ad infinitum.

In Sturt's first premiership game in 1915 he was in Milnham Camp with the 6th Machine Gun Co. and was given leave to play. Of Sturt's tally of 6.10, Bill Noal kicked 4. This one takes beating. Back before 1957 Mr Treweek and the school staff were worried because the boys of the "Town Tech. seemed to dislike all kinds of sport.



In that year Mr. Treweek bought the pennant and told the school: "We'll fly this flag every Thursday after one of our sporting teams has had a victory."

YOUNG LACROSSE—THE GENTLE WAY...

FOR the first time since the beginning of World War II, Victorian girls are playing the ancient sport of lacrosse.

The Victorian Women's Amateur Lacrosse Association was formed only a few weeks ago with Mrs. J. Parker, secretary of the pre-war association, as president. All the players at present are teenagers.

We became interested in the game at first watching our brothers and friends play it," said 15-year-old Judy Hong, the association's secretary. "We're only a couple of newly formed clubs around Williamstown and Footscray at present, but we're growing fast.

As the girls teams have just started playing, their "uniform" is mainly slacks and jeans. But they hope to have a proper sports uniform for an Interstate match in Adelaide at the end of July.

Most of the girls in the teams have lived with lacrosse for years — many of them others were intermediate players. And the girls have played since they were young, when they joined in with the boys, playing casually, and for fun.

The girls' teams will not play against the boys, however.

Australia Having a Big Year in Sport

By Ken Knox

By the end of 1962, the greatest number of Australians in this country's sporting history in any one year will have competed in international contests.

More than 20 international teams will have competed in Australia (exclusive of Commonwealth Games teams), and representatives of more than 30 Australian sports will have competed overseas.

An estimated 450 Australian sportsmen and women will have been in action abroad by the end of the year.

Representatives of many sports which seldom engage in overseas contests have joined in the rush to travel. These include teams and individuals from canoeing, lacrosse, ice hockey, shooting and equestrian associations.

The overseas tours by Australians take them to places as far flung as Persia, Djakarta, Tokyo, Switzerland, Manila, Ireland and Peking.

History Making.

1962 has been, and will be, a history-making year of sport for Australia—

- It will challenge for the Americas Cup for the first time with Great Britain.
- The first international paraplegic sports meeting will be held in Australia.
- The first Australian lacrosse team to tour abroad has been to America and England.
- An Australian team completed the world ice hockey titles for the first time.
- A Japanese rugby team toured Australia for the first time for 35 years.

Women's Part

Women are playing almost as big a part in international contests as men.

Some of the sports our women have competed in overseas lately include basketball, softball, table tennis, tennis, canoeing and skating championships.

Woman officials are also planning tours with cricket and basketball teams to England early next year, another basketball trip to Peru and hockey trips to Mexico and America.

Many Australians who have gone abroad as individuals have done just as well as full teams.

Margaret Smith, with three national champion-

ships behind her, is one of these.

Then there is Murray Rose, who won two events at the recent American collegiate championships; Colin Ridgway, who became the first Australian to jump seven feet, and cycling brothers Ron and Ken Baensch, who have been in winning form in Europe and England.

Money Winners

Some of the world's biggest money winners in international sport in 1962 have been Australians.

They include Peter Thompson, who has done so well in the Far East and England, and Bruce Crampton, who has earned more than 20,000 dol. in America so far this year.

Others in the really big money are Jockeys, A. Bresnley, Neville Sellwood and Ron Hutchinson; racing driver Jack Brabham, who still commands high fees, though he has lost his world title, and the top Australian tennis professionals.

One of the biggest reasons for the tremendous increase in international competition is the speed, and relatively low cost, of jet-age aircraft.

But while jets have put Japan and many other countries less than 12 hours away from Australia, not all teams regard speed in travel as a first essential.

The M.C.C. cricket team, which will arrive here later this year, will come by ship.

Rugby Tours

The M.C.C. team will be only one of three overseas cricket teams to have played here this year, but that record is still one behind rugby.

There have been three overseas Rugby Union teams and one Rugby League team in Australia.

The total cost of this sports touring runs into well over £1 million.

Australians competing overseas will spend about £400,000 this year on travel, and those coming to Australia—including Commonwealth Games teams, will spend almost £900,000.

Although this year's figures will be big, they could well be beaten next year. With the stimulus of the 1964 Olympic Games, and increased interest in South-East Asia, the trend will probably be for more and more teams to tour abroad.
