The complaint will be heard by the complaints committee prior to Victoria's next match on Thursday.

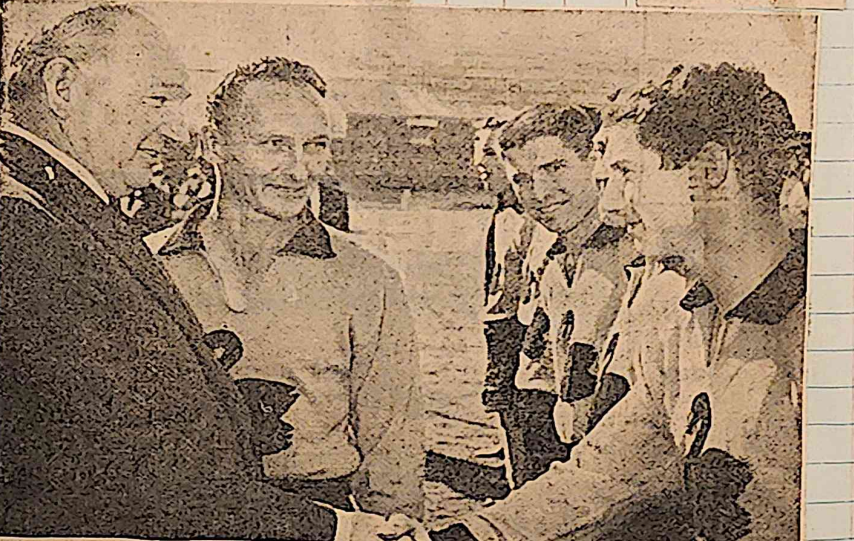

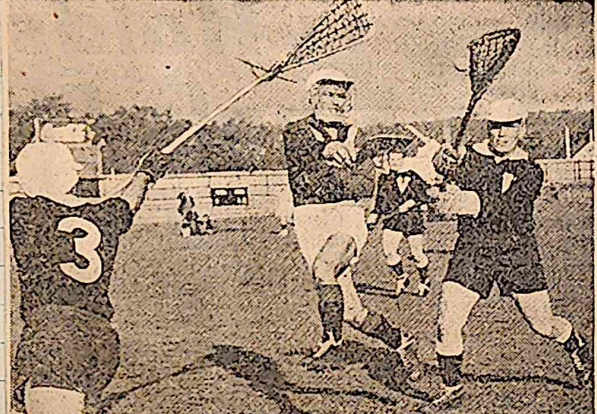

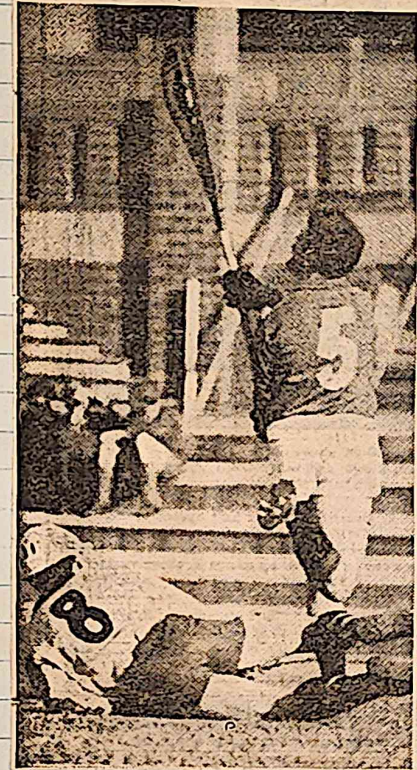

And he played league football for Norwood in 1910 and 1921, for Sturt 1911-15, for Glenelg in 1923. He was secretary of Sturt football club for 17 years.

Mr. Noal certainly served a good games apprenticeship, he played for the Proprietary football team at Port Pirie in 1907 when Essington Lewis was captain.

He became captain of the first combined Port Pirie team, who played Port Adelaide League team at Port Pirie in 1919 - and beat them.

Mr. Noal thinks he still holds the record for throwing eight goals playing lacrosse for SA v. Victoria in a 1928 carnival match on the Jubilee Oval, Adelaide.

But we could go on ad infinitum.

In Sturt's first premiership game in 1915 he was in Mitcham Camp with the 6th Machine Gun Co. and was given leave to play.

Back before 1957 Mr Treweek and the school staff were worried because the boys of the 'Town Tech. seemed to dislike all kinds of sport.

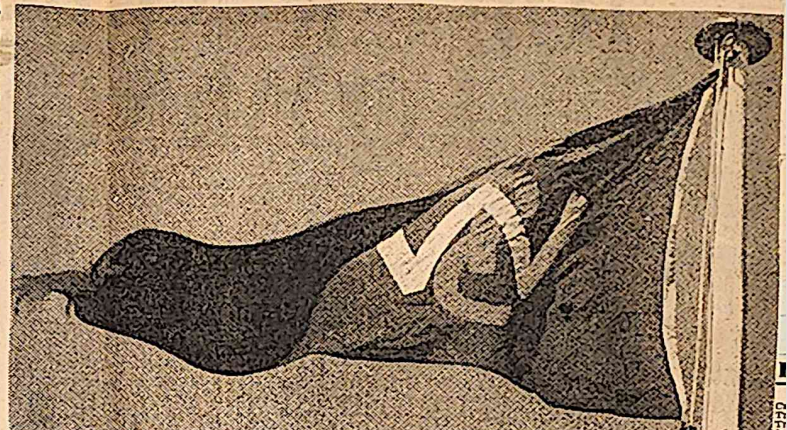
In that year Mr Treweek bought the pennant and told the school: "We'll fly this flag every Thursday after one of our sporting teams has had a victory."

FOR the first time since the beginning of World War II, Victorian girls are playing the ancient sport of lacrosse.

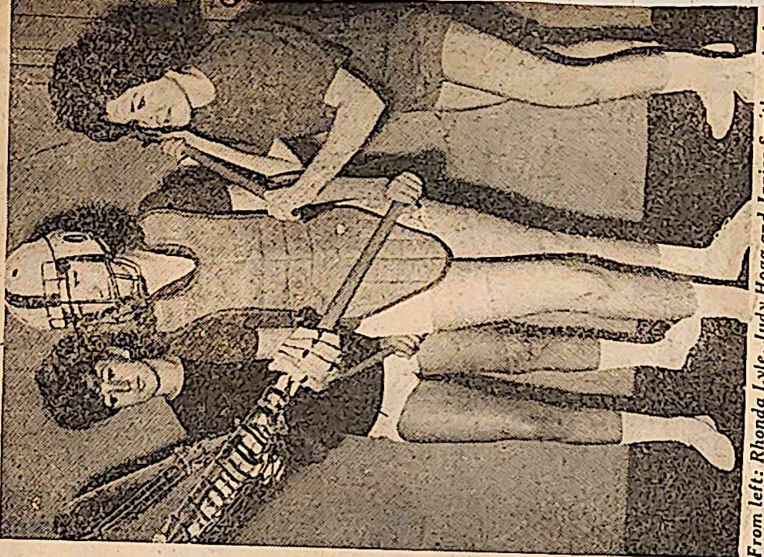

Still rough

Time and advance of civilisation, mellowed the game a little. But an American team visiting Australia in 1959 played in heavy leather head-guards, steel facemasks, arm-guards and gloves. They knocked out two Victorians in one match. In the first match of the four marked with "A" side, the 300 players got clashes with sticks and elbows, and two more players were carried off. A gentle sport, indeed! "But it's not very rough at all the way we play it," Judy protested when I tackled her with the record. "We've had only a few minor injuries — bruises, scratches and cracked knuckles — and that's because we haven't learnt all the 'Rhonda's' yet." "We are not allowed to body check and do many of the other things which cause injuries among the boys."

LACROSSE IN COMEBACK

FASHIONS in hair, make-up and clothes keep changing, and so do fashions in outdoor group games.

How long, for instance, since you heard of girls playing lacrosse, a game that used to figure prominently in English school-girl stories?

Now lacrosse for girls is staging a comeback in Melbourne, and the boys, who have been playing for years, are encouraging them.

Saturday afternoons the girls watch their boy friends and brothers in exciting match clashes. On Sundays the boys are there in force to encourage and advise sisters and girl-friends.

No women's lacrosse team has played in Melbourne since 1940, until

this month, when four teams in three suburbs played in the revived Women's Lacrosse Association.

Team numbers are convenient as from six to 12 girls can play in a team. Each girl has a crosse (lightweight men's handle with a small, sagging net one end, for the ball to flop into as it is caught. It is thrown with an over-arm motion. The ball is made of hard rubber.

Mrs L. A. Parker, the association president, and a player in the pre-war association, said: "The girls will become less awkward with their crosses as they become more used to controlling them. They will hit the crosse handles to dislodge the ball, and not each other's hands!"

Judy Hogg, 17, of Willamstown, the secretary of the association, said: "The more you play the game, the faster it gets. It is not a rough game — for girls."

As the girls teams have just started playing, their "uniform" is mainly slacks and jeans. But they hope to have a proper sports uniform for an interstate match in Adelaide at the end of July.

Most of the girls in the teams have lived with lacrosse for years — many of their fathers were interstate players. And the girls have played since they were young, when they joined in with the boys, playing casually, and for fun.

"The girls' teams will not play against the boys, however."

Australia Having a Big Year in Sport

By the end of 1962, the greatest number of Australians in this country's sporting history in any one year will have competed in international contests.

More than 20 international teams will have competed in Australia (exclusive of Commonwealth Games teams), and representatives of more than 30 Australian sports will have competed overseas.

An estimated 450 Australian sportsmen and women will have been in action abroad by the end of the year.

Representatives of many sports which seldom engage in overseas contests have joined in the rush to travel.

These include teams and individuals from canoeing, lacrosse, ice hockey, shooting and equestrian associations.

The overseas tours by Australians take them to places as far flung as Peking, Djakarta, Tokyo, Switzerland, Manila, Ireland and Peking.

History Making

1962 has been, and will be, a history-making year of sport for Australia.

- It will challenge for the Americas Cup for the first time with Gretel.
- The first international para-olympic sports meeting will be held in Australia.
- The first Australian lacrosse team to tour abroad has been to America and England.
- An Australian team competed in the world ice hockey titles for the first time.
- A Japanese rugby team toured Australia for the first time for 35 years.

Women's Part

Women are playing almost as big a part in international contests as men.

Some of the sports our women have competed in overseas this year include squash, softball, table tennis, tennis, canoeing and skating championships.

Women officials are also planning tours with cricket and basketball teams to England early next year, another basketball trip to Peru and hockey trips to Malaya and America.

Many Australians who have gone abroad as individuals have done just as well as full teams.

Margaret Smith, with three national champion-

ships behind her, is one of these.

Then there is Murray Rose, who won two events at the recent American collegiate championships; Colin Ridgway, who became the first Australian to jump seven feet; and cycling brothers Ron and Ken Baensch, who have been in winning form in Europe and England.

Money Winners

Some of the world's biggest money winners in international sport in 1962 have been Australians.

They include Peter Thomson, who has done so well in the Far East and England, and Bruce Crampton, who has earned more than 20,000 dol. in America so far this year.

Others in the really big money are jockeys, A. Drensey, Neville Sellwood and Ron Hutchinson; racing driver Jack Brabham, who still commands high fees, though he has lost his world title, and the top Australian tennis professionals.

One of the biggest reasons for the tremendous increase in international competition is the speed, and relatively low cost, of jet-age aircraft.

But while jets have put Japan and many other countries less than 12 hours away from Australia, not all teams regard speed in travel as a first essential.

The M.C.C. cricket team, which will arrive here later this year, will come by ship.

Rugby Tours

The M.C.C. team will be only one of three overseas cricket teams to have played here this year, but that record is still one behind rugby.

There have been three overseas Rugby Union teams and one Rugby League team in Australia.

The total cost of this sports touring runs into well over £1 million.

Australians competing overseas will spend about £400,000 this year on travel — and those coming to Australia, including Commonwealth Games teams, will spend almost £200,000.

Although this year's figures are big, they could well be beaten next year. With the stimulus of the 1964 Olympic Games, and increased interest in South-East Asia, the trend will probably be for more and more teams to tour abroad.
