

W.A. Side To Meet Victoria

Victoria, which easily beat the titleholder, South Australia, on Saturday, is favoured to clinch the Australian lacrosse championship by beating W.A. on the Perth Esplanade today.

The match, which will start at 12.30 p.m., will be preceded by a game between S.A. and the W.A. No. 2 side at 11 a.m.

Victorian forwards Allen Rolley and Graham Reddaway, who scored 13 goals between them in the match against S.A., may be too much to counter with stick checking. The W.A. defence lines may have a better chance of curbing them with solid body checks.

Elusive
Seven members of the Victorian team scored goals last Saturday and the fast and elusive attack players will be hard to stop—particularly if they apply pressure throughout.

W.A., which has the disadvantage of playing in senior interstate competition only every three years, can rely on good service from outstanding forward Brian Griffin, provided referee Peter

Reid protects the attacking player by penalising those who fail to make the ball their objective.

W.A. goalkeeper Keith Maynard should be able to withstand any challenge because his stick-work appears superior to that of the S.A. and Victorian goalkeepers, who conceded 41 goals between them in last Saturday's match.

If W.A. wins today the result of the championship will not be determined until Saturday.

After the main game today the W.A. and S.A. women's teams will meet in a match starting at 2.45 p.m.

A strong W.A. women's side has been chosen to meet S.A.

The S.A. team is one of the best ever to represent that State.

Victoria yesterday won the Australian lacrosse championship when it beat W.A. 10-8 on the Esplanade.

Victoria last won the title when the competition was last held in Perth in 1956.

Victoria started the game at a fast pace and scored immediately, but W.A. fought back and scored three goals in quick succession through John Keen, Bob Warner and Roger Turnbull. At the end of the first quarter W.A. led 4-2.

However, in the second quarter Victoria took charge, and controlled the game in midfield where John O'Keefe was in top form. He gave his forwards many scoring chances.

Victoria's attack-forward Ivan Brynning also was in top form and he created many openings. Victoria outscored W.A. 4-1 in the quarter to lead 6-5 at halftime.

Victoria continued its good form in the third quarter and W.A.'s few attacks were repelled by backman Kevin Crane and goalkeeper Alan Ingalls.

In the final quarter the standard of play was high and both backlines played skilfully. However, Victoria maintained its supremacy despite several promising W.A. moves.

On Saturday W.A. will play S.A. in Perry Lakes Stadium to determine second and third placings.

The W.A. No. 2 team yesterday found the pace and teamwork of the South Australians too much to handle and was beaten 19-3.

W'STOWN'S NEW MAYOR IS A FORMER NAVY MAN

The coming year will be a notable one for Lionel Edward Burgoynes, of The Strand, Newport . . . it will bring up his 50th year as a resident of Williamstown . . . and during that time he will be Mayor of the seaside city.

Cr. Burgoynes, who has had sporting, business and community interests within the municipality down the years, was elected Mayor last Wednesday.

"Williamstown is a closely-knit community," the new Mayor observed this week. "There are many old families who have lived here for generations."

Williamstown is noted among Melbourne suburbs for the way people remain here.

"Then there are the people who come to Williamstown as strangers. They seem to be quickly convinced that this is the place for them to stay. They are quickly accepted," he said.

The new Mayor is him-

self one who came from another place. He was born at Beechworth in the Mallee. The family had vineyards.

When he was four the family moved to Williamstown and lived in Cedar St. Lionel went to Williamstown South State School and Williamstown High, where he gained his intermediate certificate.

Lacrosse

Like many Williamstowners, he was a keen lacrosse player, playing for the school team and for the Williamstown club.

He captained Williamstown Lacrosse Club teams and played in several pre-mixed teams.

He also played cricket.

As a player with Electra Street Methodist team in the Williamstown Churches' Association, he won the association fielding award one year.

He worked on the administration of churches' cricket and lacrosse.

Actually, he has been a member of the committee of the Williamstown Lacrosse Club for some 30 years, and still is. He is a life member of the club.

His father, incidentally, was an accomplished rifle shot and captain of the Williamstown Rifle Club. He died in 1948.

Cr. Burgoynes married a Newport girl, Miss Kathleen Watkins, in 1937. When the war came two years later their home life was interrupted.

Mine-sweeper

Cr. Burgoynes joined the Navy straight after war broke out. He was to be a sailor for 6½ years, on mine-sweepers. In shore-base duty at Darwin and on destroyers.

He joined as a stores as-

sistant and became a petty officer.

All of his Naval service was in the Pacific area and he saw action several times. His ship, the Tribal-class destroyer Arunta,

took part in the Battle of the Philippines Sea just after the Allied landing in the Philippines.

Entering business after resuming civilian life, Cr. Burgoynes conducted a variety of businesses. He had a fruit shop, a milk bar, and then a hardware store.

The hardware store was conducted in Geelong Rd., Brooklyn, for five years. The business was sold out to Simmers and Co. Pty. Ltd. three years ago. Cr. Burgoynes stayed on as manager until recently and now manages the hardware section at Simmers's Williamstown store.

When a vacancy occurred in the Williamstown Council, with the retirement of Capt. Sam Benson, who became a Federal MHR, Cr. Burgoynes decided to stand for the extraordinary election. It was in the North Ward on June 1, 1963.

Election

"I think that anyone who feels they can do a job for the city should take the opportunity to stand for council and offer their services," says Cr. Burgoynes.

His candidature was somewhat successful. He won the election to become the first non-party councillor in the North Ward for 21 years.

Labor has since continued to return councillors in the ward, but was defeated, and with a substantial win by Cr. H. W. Clancy.

However, when Cr. Burgoynes's term expired last month he stood again. He defeated a Labor candidate by 66 votes.
