Monash University has entered a team in the Victorian Amateur Lacrosse Association competition for the first time.

They have star Williams-town defenceman Ian Jewitt as playing coach. The team is in "C" Grade but under Jewitt's direction they should improve their rating by the end of the season.

Matches in all sections will begin on April 24. Because of retirements several changes will be noticed in team line-ups. Last season's premiers Malvern could be without top forwards Trevor Campbell and John Martin. Runners-up Williams-town will be without Peter Hogg, their devastating midfield player.

### TITLE HOPES

Melbourne University, strengthened by the inclusion of former Williams-town player Rod Cordell, look a strong chance for premiership honors.

## New-look lacrosse

Lacrosse, which opens its Australian season on Saturday in three southern States — Victoria, South Australia and Western Australia — will take on a new look this season, with the introduction of American rules.

The three State bodies have been preparing for the changeover for the past three months.

The main object is to overcome crowding in the goal areas.

The American association some time ago introduced an off-side rule which has had the effect of opening the game and making it a better spectacle.

### ZONE LIMIT

The new rule restricts the number of players in the attack zone where previously there had been no limit.

Australians first became aware of the difference in the two games when the

Australian team played several games on tour in America in 1962.

Subsequent recommendations that the off-side rule be adopted here brought about the change in Victoria two years ago.

### AT TITLES

Other States have observed the faster, more open style of play in the Victorian association, and have now decided to follow suit.

At this year's Australian championships, to be played in Perth, the new rules will apply for the first time.

However, one thing which even the new rules are not expected to counter is South Australia's dominance of Australian championships.

South Australia will start the favorite to retain its national title.

## Lacrosse May Lose Monash

Monash University's hopes of fielding a lacrosse team this year received a setback this week when a rule binding players to university teams was abolished.

The dropping of the rule by the Victorian Amateur Lacrosse Association could mean Monash will fall out of the competition because of the lack of seasoned players.

Victoria's action is understood to be a counter to the Australian Lacrosse Council's move to advance the game by introducing the American style of play to all States this season.

Ian Jewitt, a former Williams-town and international player who has been appointed coach for Monash, believes the change will result in the new club being unable to gain sufficient players.

## Lacrosse season begins

Last year's best and fairest trophy winner, Leon Gardiner, did not train with his club, C.G.I., but with Malvern.

He is an accomplished player but it is very difficult to see him being placed to advantage at Malvern.

C.G.I. could be in trouble this year as they have already lost Allan Bassett and Gordon Jacobs, now at Monash University.

## Floods, Now Fire Threat

LA CROSSE (WISCONSIN), Apr. 20.

The flood-ravaged town of La Crosse was faced with a new threat today — fire.

The raging Mississippi yesterday tore two large holes in dykes protecting the city and swirled a cluster of bulk petrol storage tanks, posing an "extremely serious" threat of fire.

Officials ordered the evacuation of families from the area because of fears that fire might spread among the tanks containing about 15 million gallons of petrol.

One of the tanks, holding 107,000 gallons, listed at a 45 deg. angle and was believed to be leaking.

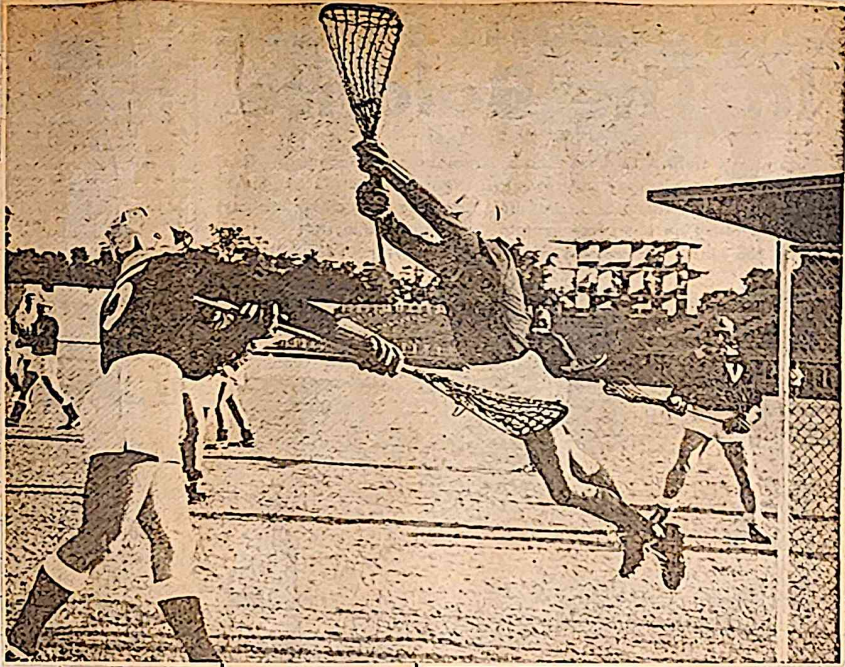








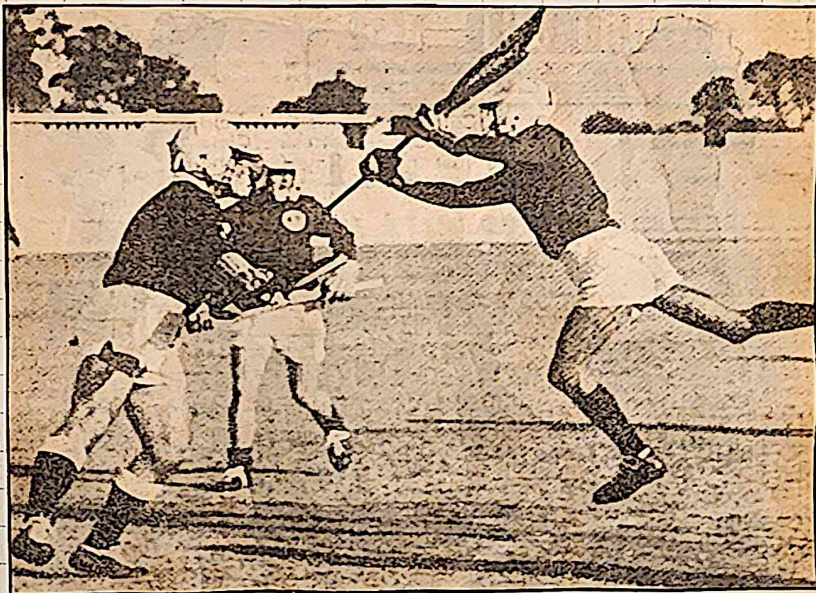

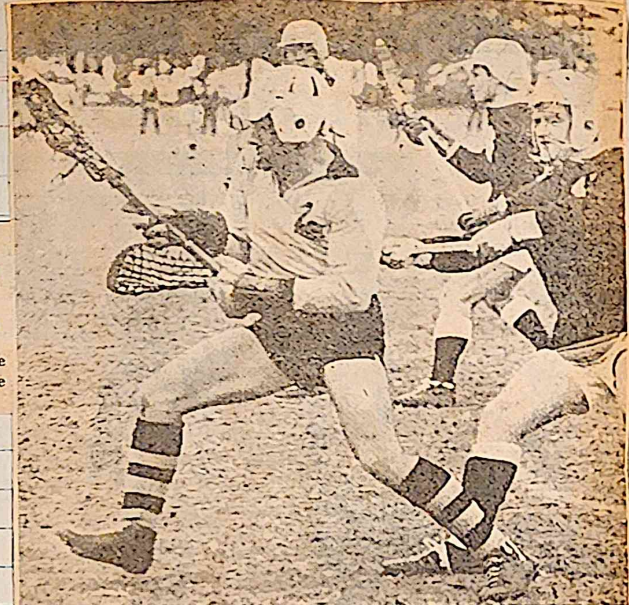

He went to school there, he played lacrosse and cricket, married a Newport girl and enlisted in the Navy. He returned to conduct businesses, and finally won a notable election victory to enter the council.

W'STOWN'S NEW MAYOR IS A FORMER NAVY MAN

The coming year will be a notable one for Lionel Edward Burgoyne, of The Strand, Newport . . . it will bring up his 50th year as a resident of Williamstown . . . and during that time he will be Mayor of the seaside city.

Cr. Burgoyne, who has had sporting, business and community interests within the municipality down the years, was elected Mayor last Wednesday.

"Williamstown is a closely-knit community," the new Mayor observed this week. "There are many old families who have lived here for generations.

"Williamstown is noted among Melbourne suburbs for the way people remain here. "Then there are the people who come to Williamstown as strangers. They seem to be quickly convinced that this is the place for them to stay. They are quickly accepted," he said. The new Mayor is him-

self one who came from another place. He was born at Bealiba in the Mallee. The family had vineyards. When he was four the family moved to Williamstown and lived in Cecil St. Lionel went to Williamstown South State School and Williamstown High, where he gained his intermediate certificate.

Lacrosse Like many Williamstownians, he was a keen lacrosse player, playing for the school team and for the Williamstown club. He captained Williamstown Lacrosse Club teams and played in several premier teams.

He also played cricket. As a player with Electric Street Methodist team in the Williamstown Churches' Association, he won the association fielding award one year. He served on the administration of churches' cricket and lacrosse. Actually, he has been a member of the committee of the Williamstown Lacrosse Club for some 30 years, and still serves. He is a life member of the club.

His father, incidentally, was an accomplished rifle shot and captain of the Williamstown Rifle Club. He died in 1948. Cr. Burgoyne married a Newport girl, Miss Kathleen Watkins, in 1937. When the war came two years later their home life was interrupted.

Mine-sweeper Cr. Burgoyne joined the Navy a fortnight after war broke out. He was to be a sailor for 6 1/2 years — on mine-sweepers, in shore-base duty at Darwin and on destroyers. He joined as a stores assistant and became a petty officer. All of his Naval service was in the Pacific area and he saw action several times. His ship, the Tribal-class destroyer Arunta,

took part in the Battle of the Philippines Sea just after the Allied landing in the Philippines.

Entering business after resuming civilian life, Cr. Burgoyne conducted a variety of businesses. He had a fruit shop, a milk bar, and then a hardware store. The hardware store was conducted in Geelong Rd., Brooklyn, for five years. The business was sold out to Simmers and Co. Pty. Ltd., three years ago. Cr. Burgoyne stayed on as manager until recently and now manages the hardware section at Simmers's Williamstown store.

When a vacancy occurred in Williamstown Council, with the retirement of Capt. Sam Benson, who became a Federal MHR, Cr. Burgoyne decided to stand for the extraordinary election. It was in the North Ward on June 1, 1963.

Election "I think that anyone who feels they can do a job for the city should take the opportunity to stand for council and offer their services," says Cr. Burgoyne. His candidature was singularly successful. He won the election to become the first non-party councillor in the North Ward for 21 years.

Labor has since continued to return councillors in the ward — unopposed, and with a substantial win by Cr. H. W. Clancy.

However, when Cr. Burgoyne's term expired last month he stood again. He defeated a Labor candidate by 66 votes.
