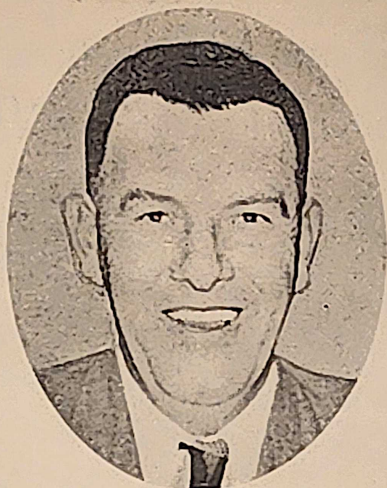

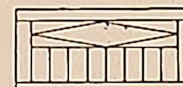

The formation of the Australian Lacrosse Council was accomplished only after many years of negotiations between the various Lacrosse bodies. So long ago as 1907, when the Canadian visit was first mooted, the absence of a controlling body was severely felt. Much of the unpleasantness of the Canadian tour was due to the variations in the playing rules of the two Dominions, of which the Australian authorities had been advised, but through the absence of a Council nothing was done to iron out these differences in advance.

The Associations were fully conscious of this weakness in the Australian set up, and as a result at an Inter-State Conference of delegates held at Adelaide in 1910 during the first Australian Lacrosse Carnival, an Australian Lacrosse Union was agreed to. However, a majority of the States failed to ratify the proposal and the Union was still born.

At the Melbourne Carnival of 1912 the project was again revived, but the 1914-1918 War intervened, and it was not revived again for many years.

At the Adelaide Conference of 1926 the formation of a Council was agreed to and a Committee, comprising Messrs. H. R. Balmer, J. W. Schafe, and the late Captain J. H. Fearson were appointed to draw up a draft constitution. This constitution was submitted to a Conference held in Perth in 1929, and with a few amendments was agreed to and forwarded to the State Associations for confirmation.

Western Australia, Victoria and Queensland subsequently ratified the constitution at a meeting held in Melbourne on June 8th, 1931. New South Wales was admitted in 1932 and in the following year South Australia joined and thus the Council became truly representative of Australian Lacrosse.

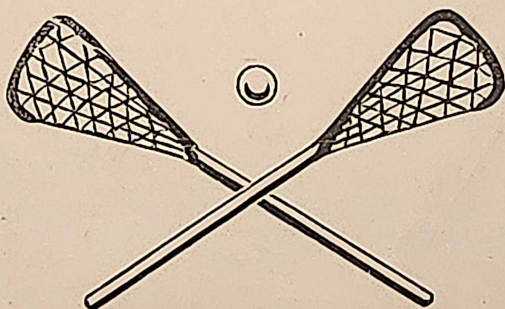

History of the Garland - McHarg Cup

After the visit of the Canadian Lacrosse team in 1907 the Cup was presented to the Victorian Lacrosse Association for competition between the States, the donors being Mr. Garland, a Canadian, and Mr. Andrew McHarg of Melbourne. The Carnival matches were then originated and now take place every third year, each competing State taking its turn in organising the series. The Cup, which is valued at £100 is at present held by Victoria. The Cup has been competed for twelve times; Victoria having won eight times; South Australia three times and Western Australia once.

(The Cup is on view at the Murray St. Store of the Perth Sports Depot)

Carnival Rules

The Carnival shall be played under the following rules:—

- (1) The team of each State or Territory shall play one match against the team of each other State or Territory.
- (2) For a win two points shall be scored; for a draw one point.
- (3) In the event of a match being abandoned, two points shall be awarded to each of the teams drawn for such match.
- (4) In the event of a walk-over two points shall be scored by the team receiving the walk-over.
- (5) The State or Territory whose team obtains the highest number of points shall be declared Champion State of Australia.
- (6) In the event of two or more teams scoring an equal number of points their relative positions shall be determined on the percentage of goals thrown for and against during the Carnival matches, such percentages to be ascertained by dividing the total number of goals thrown by a team by the total number of goals thrown against such team. The State whose team has the highest position shall be declared the Champion State of Australia.

How to Follow the Game

As a guide to any spectators who may not be fully conversant with lacrosse in all its details, the following comments on the game and rules may be of assistance

Usual arrangement of a team:— Twelve players in all.

Three Forwards — First Home, Second Home, Third Home.

Two Attacks — Right and Left, Centre.

Two Defences — Right and Left.

Three Backs — Third Man, Cover Point, Point (first man out from goal, Goalkeeper.

The goal is six feet square. The goal crease is a rectangle, 18 x 12.

The playing ground between goals is 90 yards long and 80 yards wide, the ball still being in play behind each goal for 20 yards. The centre is a circle with a diameter of 10 yards. No player, other than the centremen shall be allowed to enter this area or touch a ball until the same has been played clear of it.

The game is divided into four quarters, the first two of 25 minutes each, the second two of 20 minutes each, with an interval of 10 minutes between second and third quarters.

When the Referee has called a "foul" or "out of bounds" the ball must not be touched by either party, nor must the players move from the position in which they happen to be at the moment, until the Referee has called "play." A goalkeeper can resume his place in goal providing a "foul" has not been given against him or his side.

The Referee need not suspend play when the player who has been fouled (or his side is still in possession of the ball.

If any player drops his crosse (stick he is out of play until he recovers it.

The ball is of solid rubber the size of a tennis ball but weighing about the same as a cricket ball.

Two reserves can be fielded at any stage of the game as replacements for injured players.

FOULS.

Touching the ball with the hand, save by the goalkeeper, who may do so while defending the goal

within the goal-crease, although not allowed to catch and throw the ball with his hand, may put away with hands or feet or block the ball in any manner with his crosse or body.

Hitting wildly with the crosse or throwing it at an opponent.

Charging into, shouldering or interfering in any way with another who is in pursuit of an opponent. This does not prevent the use of the "body-check" nor the pushing of an opponent with the shoulder in ground scuffles.

Holding an opponent's crosse, or pushing him with crosse in hand, or running in front of him or interfering in any way to keep him from the ball until the other player reaches it, or checking the crosse of an opponent who is not actually in possession of or immediately about to take possession of the ball.

Using the free arm to protect his crosse.

Holding, striking or tripping a player with the crosse.

"Cross-check", which consists of a player charging with both hands on the crosse so as to make it meet the body of his opponent.

Swinging the crosse into or across the body of an opponent in such a way as to hit or otherwise endanger the body.

"Shepherding." "Up-check" is not permitted.

No attacking player shall stand, or check the goalkeeper, within the goal crease until the ball has entered the crease.

PENALTIES

The Referee may give a "face-off" or bounce or free position at the place where the foul occurred, yet not nearer either goal-post than 10 yards, unless the foul be made by the defending side, and/or he may disqualify the offending player or players for such time during the game as he thinks fit.

When the ball goes out of bounds the Referee shall give it to the nearest player or bounce it if two opposing players are an equal distance from it.

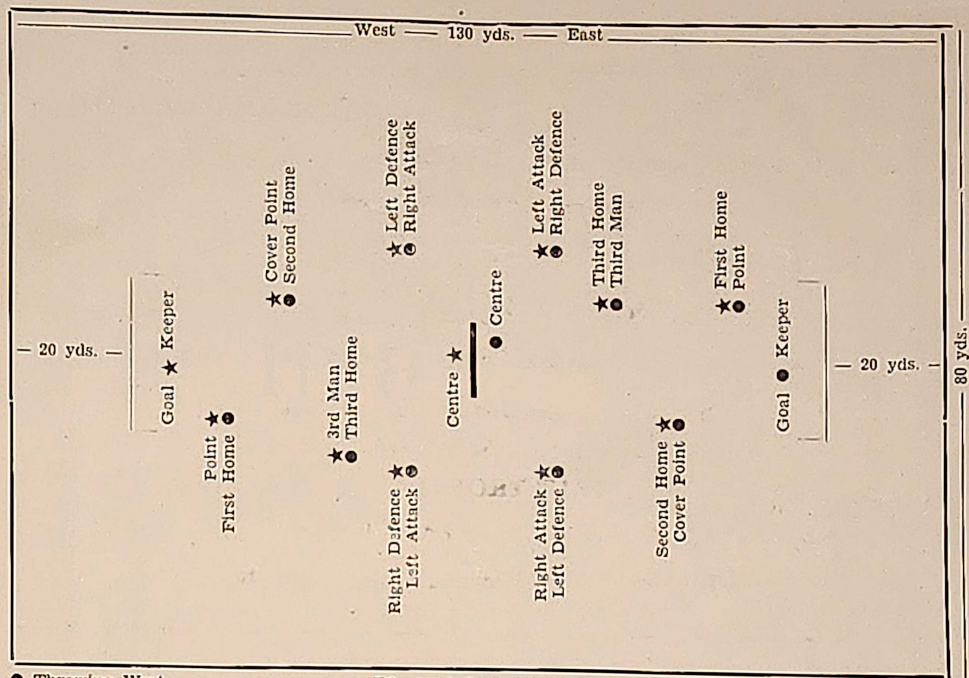

History of the Game in W.A

In 1896 at a meeting convened by the late Fred C. Parsons held in the United Service Hotel, Perth, and attended by about a dozen enthusiasts who had played the game in the Eastern States, it was decided to launch the game here. Unfortunately for our historical records the original minute book has been lost but it is known that amongst the foundation members of the two Clubs, Perth and Fremantle, were W. D. Henderson (a player from S.A.), Perth, and Fred Wingrove (an ex-Melbourne University player) and L. H. Wicksteed, Fremantle. Mr. Wicksteed was chairman for many years, closely followed by Mr. Wilfred Stow, who held the office for a considerable period. The following year another two clubs, Mercantile and Cottesloe (which changed its name to Banks the following season) were formed, and pennant games commenced, Mercantile being the first premiers. A Goldfields Association was also formed by players who had flocked to Coolgardie (in the zenith of prosperity) and Kalgoorlie, and the first of a series of inter-association matches in 1899 resulted in a defeat of the Coastal team. With the decline of prosperity of the 'fields players left the district and the game languished and died with World War I.

The visit, in 1907, of a Canadian team resulted in a revolutionary change in the game, with introduction of smaller crosses and different tactics, but the

change did not bring the increase in the number of players expected. However, W.A. was represented at the first All States Carnival held in 1910 at Adelaide and again in Melbourne in 1912. Perth was fixed as the venue for the 1915 carnival, but the response to the call to arms in that year was so great there were virtually no senior players left and the Association went into recess.

Early in 1919 a number of old stalwarts, chief among them being C. E. M. Hickey, and the then Association Secretary I. J. Taylor, got players together and succeeded in instilling enthusiasm into members generally, with the result that although we were not strong enough to finance sending teams to the 1920 and 1923 carnivals held in Sydney and Brisbane, we have been represented at each held since. We were runners-up in 1932 and again in 1939, and were the winners in 1947.

The Association has been well served by its chief executive officers — the Hon. Secretaries. In 50 years we have had only eleven, the first being the late Fred Wingrove, followed by the late Ern Harvey, Gil Clarke, Dan Arons, Ike Taylor, Hartley Angus, Russ Page, the late Harry Wood, Fred King, Ron Wheatley and the present Secretary, Ron Hart. To them in no small degree is due the efficient organisation controlling lacrosse in this State, with its nine clubs fielding 8 senior, 7 "B" grade, 4 "C" grade and 9 Junior teams, totalling approximately 400 registered players.
