



Letter to the Editor

MOVING UP IN THE WORLD

I have recently transferred to Sydney for work and will be stationed here indefinitely. I could only have made the move knowing that there was lacrosse to go to, otherwise the deal was off. Lacrosse was my main way of getting a social life in town as I only know one other person in Sydney and he's off doing manouvers in Hawaii.

I flew to Sydney for a few days to get acquainted with work and find somewhere to live. After getting those things out of the way I then pursued lacrosse. Finding the ground was fairly easy with a little bit of help from the Park Ranger. The game didn't start until 1.00 p.m. and the second game was at 3.00 p.m. I watched the first game and was introduced to a few people, the President, the Vice President, the Secretary and the Treasurer of NSW Lacrosse I then had to leave to return to Melbourne.

Playing my last game in Melbourne against Chadstone was a good game to leave on. I headed back to the club rooms for a

couple of drinks and was treated to a bit of a send off by the Club. I would really like to thank them all at Surrey Park for the support they have given me through my years of lacrosse.

I changed my flight so I could get a game in on the Sunday afternoon. I ended up playing in both games that afternoon. Immediately after the game we went to the club rooms of NSW Lacrosse - The Centennial Hotel, across the road from the ground, then on to a local Indian restaurant and further on to another pub closer into

town. The people here are great, they have been very friendly, and have really helped me settle into NSW.

The standard of play here is what I would expect for a sport that is only one and a half seasons old. They are still learning the concepts and basic skills of lacrosse. A majority of the players would be aged around 26 and until last year hadn't known what a lacrosse stick was. There are a few immigrants, as myself, from WA, SA, Victoria, England and USA who have played for years. These people do stand out with their skill levels well above those that have just picked up a stick 12 months ago. If it weren't for these people lacrosse would really be struggling to get off the ground here. The more experienced people are moving into teams and taking over as coaches, tacticians and skills coaches for the existing five teams here.

It is still growing. We seem to be one big team that has split into five smaller teams. If your team has the bye you are expected to help officiate in some way on the day. Otherwise you can get a game with one of

the sides that may be short of a player. To get lacrosse in Sydney off and running has taken a few people a lot of effort. Some of the problems they have to face are finding grounds on which they can train and play on. The grounds are expensive to hire and that's providing you can find a spare one. This is partly the reason for Sunday games. Where I train at the Allan Border Oval in Mosman, the ground is used for junior soccer training until 7.00 pm then we can move in. The lighting of the ground is brilliant. We don't have access to club rooms. We train with a few Under 15s and the rest are seniors. We get about 10-12 at training, the other sides are much the same.

One team has recruited well, they have 16 regularly on a game day, the others have between 8-12. The girls have five teams too but only enough regulars to field three teams for a Sunday morning game. This year 14 women and 16 men are going to the Senior Nationals in Adelaide. Between these two teams there is enough energy, talent and skills to give the other State teams a run for their money. The men

have a game against STX All Stars just before the tournament which will be a great stepping stone for many of the team, giving them something to aim for.

My next step is to help with the development through juniors over the next few months. There are some very talented kids playing and like everywhere else, after they have had the time to develop, they will be able to compete with the best.

Lacrosse in NSW is not much more than a social outing for some, and a full-on game for a majority, but it will become a largely recognised sport once again in Sydney, soon. As they say "it's not going to happen overnight, but it will happen".

I wish all the people involved in NSW Lacrosse all the best and if there is anything I can do to help, get in touchll



Manchester '94 The Aussie Sharks take a bite at the World Cup

The week that started the road to the World Cup Finals started in Adelaide on a sunny, warm July 3 Sunday, when the team played in the Nationals as a warm-up to the World Cup games in Manchester. 
It's interesting to note a little tension is creeping into the air.

Tuesday July 19 - Everyone took it easy with the Opening Ceremony due in the evening.

The Opening Ceremony was, as usual, filled with speeches and some presentations from local schools. It was good to see a short game of Sof Crosse put on by a group of 10 - 12 year olds. The highlight of the ceremony was the inclusion of Scotland, Wales, Germany, Sweden and the Czech Republic in the games. This can only be good for lacrosse.

In an awesome display of power and agility Australia annihilated England. The game was played under lights on a cool evening after some light showers which made the ground a little slippery. England scored first and at the end of the first quarter lead by a goal. However, the Sharks started to smell blood and outscored England 7 - 1 in the second quarter to lead 11 - 6 at half time. The third quarter showed how strong the Australian defence could be and Spiro Melissovas once again showed his skills in goals. This gave him the MVP for the game. The Sharks bit deeper to outscore England 9 - 0. The last quarter was a none event with Australians like John Brewer continuing to press to goal at every opportunity and backmen like Matt Windsor taking the ball off England and setting a perfect clear. England had no answers. The final quarter saw an 8 - 1 score line. The Manager of England, Mick Moore, described the Australians as fine athletes who just simply dominated the game once they settled down. Final score Australia 28 defeated England 7. This is the highest margin by which Australia has ever defeated England

In the first quarter, with 5 minutes to, lightening delayed the match between Australia and the USA for over an hour. The score was 5 - 0 to the USA. The delay and the downpour that accompanied the lightening made the ground very heavy and meant the teams virtually had to start over again.

Australia were slow to get going and the USA outscored them 4 goals to 2 in the second quarter. After half time a new buzz went through the Sharks team and they came out fighting like a white pointer. Through some outstanding defence work by Brad Skepper and Matt Windsor the USA had difficulty in scoring. AaronStubbs was dynamic as he moved the ball through the midfield to set up many scoring opportunities. The third quarter saw the Aussies outscore the USA 6 Goals to 2. The scene was set for a frantic last quarter and the crowd were not disappointed. The ball moved from end to end with both sides missing many opportunities to score. At

the end of the game the Aussies had again outscored the USA 4 - 3 but it wasn't enough and the USA were victors 14 - 12.









The 'phone was running hot on the final day, with individuals, parents, referees, clubs having parties etc constantly calling to ask the quarter by quarter score. The players did Australia proud and although their performance in the final was below both their own and our supporters expectations. This was brought about by the somewhat emotional build up prior to, during and after the semi final against Canada. The USA team provided Australia with many compliments. At the post final game press conference, both the USA Head Coach, Tony Seaman and defenceman Dave Pietramala were quick to say "this Australian team earnt their greatest respect as an opposition that all the USA Coaching staff and captains were unsure of the final outcome prior to the game starting. Their position of current and prospective World Champions could only be threatened by Australia and the style of game and coaching they had developed."

The inclusion into the 1994 World Team of Steve Mounsey (Defence), Gordon Purdie (Midfield) and Chris Brown (Attack) backed up by both Gordon and Chris winning Midfielder and Attack players of the series, is further proof of Australia's improvement and threat to winning in 1998.

The Longest Match !!

Ilt may go down as the longest quarter of lacrosse in modern history. The first quarter of the Australia vs USA in the qualifying round of games took two hours and 15 minutes to complete. It started at 2.15pm and finished at 5.30pm.

The reason: A thunderstorm interrupted the game for one hour 50 minutes where the referees halted the game for fear of a lightning strike on one of the players.

After its resumption, the game itself turned out to be the best result ever by Australia against the USA ending up 14 goals to 12 goals in favour of the USA. It was one of the most exciting World Series games ever played.

At one stage the USA held a 9 - 2 lead due to two slow starts in the game by Australia. It was the awesome speed of Australia's midfield and attackmen that made the USA look very average to the point where they looked as though they were even panicking. Dave Pietramala of the USA, who was voted MVP in the 1990 World Series, was matched up against Chris Brown on the Australian attack. Brown played superbly ending the game with one goal and four assists, and more importantly, not being dispossessed on any occasion by Pietramala. I would like to suggest that Australia may have won the game if they had not had to start the game twice, but that is mere speculation.





Texan Antics





USA Finals

From the USA, Princeton won the NCAA Division I lacrosse title 9 goals to 8 against Virginia when Princeton's Kevin Lowe scored the winning goal only 42 seconds into overtime. The game was seen by a record crowd of 24,730 screaming fans.

In the Division III final Salisbury defeated Hobart 15 goals to 9 goals also before a record crowd of 12,142 spectators.

In the womens Division I final, Princeton were again successful when they defeated Maryland 10 goals to 7 goals.

Carrie Steffan, the Australian Sports Commission (ASC) Lacrosse Liason Officer is no newcomer to the game. She was at Cornell University for a few years in the mid 70,s, when they were a dominant force in Ivy League Carrie Steffan - ASC at that time. Carrie has been in Lacrosse Liason Officer Australia since 1977, and with the the ASC since 1987, and has



retained the interest she developed in the sport during her time at Cornell. She started as a Secretary to the ASC Board.

When drugs in Sport became an issue in the late 80's she got involevd in this, and her adminstrative involvement in this area grew. When the ASC was restructured earlier this year she joined the newly created Sports Management Division, with involvement in diving and wrestling as an Olympic Sport. Carrie requested that she become the Sport's Liason officer for Grid Iron and Lacrosse, as she knew of these sports from her time in America, and had retained an interest in these. So it was great to see her enjoying herself at the National Championships in Adelaide.

Those who had the good fortune to meet Carrie during the Championships found a very pleasant personality, a person who took her job very seriously, and one who will will obviously be a very good link between the Lacrosse Administrators in Australia and the Australian Sport's Comission.

Most of those involved with lacrosse in Australia would not be aware of the support which the Australian Sports Commission provides to lacrosse. It is not supported to a high level, largely due to the relatively low participation base. This is something obviously the Lacrosse Organisers are seeking to overcome, and to address, particularly in NSW and Qld. Funding levels depend on a number of categories, and participation levels is only one criteria. Other areas include international profile, and sucess in international competitions.



ASC FUNDING FOR MEN'S LACROSSE DEVELOPMENT INCREASES FIVEFOLD

It will also help to lift the profile of the sport, a necessary ingredient in the attraction of younger players to the sport. So look out

Paul Wehrum -Coach Extraordinaire STX Team

The National Titles usually results in some colourful characters coming to the fore, and this year was no exception. This year it was in the form of Paul Wehrum, the STX Coach. He displayed a dynamic style of coaching, a voice which many did not think could last out the week, and a remarkable technique for communication.

Paul hails from Herkimer County Community College where he is Head Coach of the College's Lacrosse Team. His team is currently on a 51 game winning streak run which has covered 3 National Championships. He has won 5 of the last 7 National Championships altogether, demonstrating it has been by far one of the most sucessful Junior College programs in the last 5 or 6 years in the USA. So many of our coaches, junior and senior should have looked at his style in Adelaide.

The Team got together when Eddie Ryder of the US STX Company asked Paul to assemble a team to represent STX in the Australian National Titles this year. These were the men who first signed up, and they did "real good", winning 4 games, and losing only 2. "They were a great group of kids". Most would observe they were rather big kids!

The Australian National Titles were another level up from that which the STX Team were previously involved, so the results they produced were very good considering the little time for preparation. Paul acknowledged they were no match for the Australian Team though observing, amongst other areas, "the way the Australian Team domintaed the centre face-offs, they really controlled the ball"

Paul first got involved with lacrosse as a 9th Grader at Freeport High School, then to Courtland where he was a 3-time All American. He then went on to coach Football and Lacrosse at Rook High School. From there he went on to Herkimer where his team have won 5 of the last 7 year's National Championships. But when you play at this (Australian National) level "it's a little different". Not one of these kids would have made the USA, but they've done real well to get together and play like they have here over the past week.

NATIONAL LACROSSE

Interest in Lacrosse across Australia was centred in Adelaide, a prelude for many for the World Series. Not only were there the Men's Senior events, but also the Under 15 Tournament, and the Senior Women's State Titles. It would be possible' for'some to suffer from 'lacrosse overload' by the time the world series is over, but following close on the heels are the individual State Local Championships. This edition also covers the Under 17 NationalChampionships held in Perth.

The 'Carnival' atmosphere of the Mens and Womens's Series provided great opprotunities for younger lacrosseurs the opportunity to experience the thrill of experiencing competition in the sport at it's highest level in Australia. The gathering of the elite players in Australia in one event also provided lacrosse with some profile in the community, highly desirable publicity which is critical for achieving success in our sport. TV and newsprint coverage helps attract people to the sport.

MEN'S SENIOR CHAMPIONSHIPS AND TOURNAMENT

Ellis Park in Adelaide was the focus of attention for men's lacrosse in Australia in the week 3rd to 9th July. The 1994 Australian Senior Championship and Tournament provided spectators with two different competitions plus a number of exhibition games involving teams with a wide range of skills and experience.

The Australian Tournament involved a Victorian Under 21 Team, which was a development project, just as were the teams representing New South Wales and the President's Team.

The traditional Senior Men's Championship was contested between Victoria, South Australia and Western Australia.

As well as these two events spectators were treated with exhibition games by a visiting STX Team from USA, and our own Australian Team, preparing for the upcoming World Series Challenge in Manchester, England.

Another sucessful ingredient to the series was the weather. Adelaide put on a week of pleasnt warm weather, prompting the visiting USA STX Team John Wehrum to comment "If this is Winter in Australia, I think I'll migrate!"

This year there has been more competition than ever in the mens series, with 6 teams participating, presenting a major task for the organisers and referees to handle.

Victoria Regains Championship Mantle in Adelaide.

After losing to WA last year Victoria were determined to regain the title in 1994, and they did this decisively in the Grand Final on Saturday 9th July, downing South Australia

Adelaide treated the large gathering of lacrosse followers assembling in SA for the National Titles to a week of outstanding weather, culminating in a 24 degree day for the Grand Final. This isn't quite what we followers might call 'typical' wintry lacrosse weather, those coming from interstate bringing a range of attire to cover any eventuality.

WA, having won 7 of the 10 previous Championships, did not look strong in 1994, being relegated to the third position in the lead up to the Grand Final on Saturday 9th July.

South Australia were on the other hand keen to earn their first Championship since their last win in 1983. The Victorians however looked strong in the lead up to the Grand Final, although their encounter with SA on the Tuesday was by no means convincing enough to enable the Victorians to take it easy.

All Teams were somewhat depleted in strength with many of the stronger team members playing with the Australian Team, competing as a seperate Group in the Tournament Series. This tended to favour those States with more depth in Lacrosse, and it seemed apparent that Victoria was stronger in this regard.



Victoria then won the next face-off through Cam McLachlan and David Mounsey scored a good individual goal. Cook then brought the ball down and gave a good pass to Butler that resulted in a goal. SA replied quickly and tied the game up after Jim Mihelios scored on Colin Harper with a nice long-shot. At the end of the first guarter the Vic's led 6-3. Cook was creating many chances for his Victorian teammates and Harper was playing a blinder in goals. It seemed for the moment that Victoria had withstood SA initial onslaught. They had been playing patient offense and good defense whereas SA had had

trouble clearing the ball and converting during man-up opportunities. Nevertheless the game was only one quarter in and SA and their supporters no doubt felt they were still very much in the game.

The second quarter was to be a big victory period for the Vic's defense line-up, well lead by Ansell, Slattery and Greg Moore who was in his first year playing with a long-stick. Victoria's defense was inpenertrable, allowing no goals for the quarter while Victoria's attack was playing well with good goals to Butler, Adrian Slattery and Tim Murphy. Murhpy was setting a fine example for his teammates in attack and his trademark dodge from behind was killing SA. Harper was continuing his great game in goals and nothing seemed to be close to going in. SA however had their opportunities but failed to score on any of their nine shots for the quarter.

By the time the long break began, Victoria had increased their lead to 10-3. The statistics told the story of the game well. Victoria was controlling the face-off with 11 wins to 4 and had 13 more shots. SA had their chances with 8 man-ups but had only converted on two occassions. The writing seemed already on the wall for SA. Either they would come out in the third quarter fighting or the game would be all but over.

In the third quarter the crowd witnessed much more of a battle. Led by Tim Mildren, SA's defense, which had played reasonably well so far against an extremely dangerous Victorian attack combination, held Victoria to a game low quarter score of just three goals. Across the centre, SA also fought back to win 3 of the 5 centres for the quarter. The problem for SA was again on the attacking side of the field. Only James Inge could score for SA in that quarter, and it was from a relatively text-book fast-break. Victoria's defense played very well for the quarter, with Moore, Ansell and Slattery constantly stripping their opponents and only allowing 4 shots to be put up , whereas up the other end Victoria had 14 shots for the quarter, but bad conversion lead to only 3 of the shots being converted. At the end of the "premiership quarter", Victoria led by 13-4. SA would have to pull a 1993 Victorian "Surrey Park" Grand Final effort to win the match.

A giant was awakened in the final quarter and unfortunately for SA, that giant was Victoria. Led again by Tim Murphy with three goals for the quarter, Victoria piled on 9 goals to 0 goals from SA. Victoria's superior stickwork, evident throughout the whole game, was pretty to watch as their attackmen and attackmidfielders went to work sugically destroying SA's defense. Cook, Spreadborough, Butler, Mounsey, Slattery and Vincent just steamrolled over SA's defense that had played commendably all day. Stevens, McLachlan and Co once again controlled the midfield and Victoria's brillant defense all dominated SA's attackline. With the championship all but theirs, the Vic's cruised to victory although SA, who had been outclassed all day fought valiantly to the very end. The end score saw Victoria winners 22-4. Once again the Garland McHarg trophy was back in Victoria. The victory was a testament to the strength of Victorian lacrosse, who with 12 players in the Australian side to play in Manchestor could have had a seriously depleted state side, as was shown in the defending champions Western Australia's case. This was not the case. The Victorian players had played with skill, determination and conviction throughout the week and thoroughly deserved to win.





The Garland MacHarg Connection

The Garland McHarg Trophy for the National Men's Championship is indeed a magnificant trophy, and efforts have been made to track down some history of it's donators. It was donated by Richard Garland and Andrew McHarg in 1910, and subsequently passed to

the Australian Lacrosse Council by a Deed of Trust in 1939.

Richard Garland was born in Dublin, and was an athlete of note in the sporting circles of Ireland of the 1880's. He excelled at running. jumping, rugby football and above all, cycling.

In the late 1889 Garland was invited, through his contacts in the cycling fraternity, to form a company to develop the John Boyd Dunlop Pneumatic Tyre. He was given the authority to assume complete control of the organisation, appoint the Directors, write the Prospectus, and make the issue to the public. After this he joined the Company, and in 1892 was appointed Manager of the Canadian branch of the American Tyre Company. Garland's prowess as a cyclist, alied to a charming, witty and unobtrusive personality, served in promoting Dunlop throughout Canada.

After some intersting experiences as General Manager, MacHarg was involved in the setting up of the Dunlop Pneumatic Tyre Company of Australasia, which began operations on 1st August 1899. After returning to Canada for a short time to purchase machinery from North America, and to hire experienced men for the new Dunlop Factory at Port Melbourne, Garland returned to Melbourne and was appointed Director of that Company. In 1904 he was appointed Managing Director, and served in that capacity until his death in 1919.

Richard Garland played an active role in the sporting life of the new State of Victoria, especially lacrosse. He is buried at Brighton Cemetery.

Lacrosse Historian Terry Allington has searched in vain for any history of Andrew McHarg. With his name this should not be a difficult task, however his efforts to date have been to no avail. Any leads on McHarg's history? Ring Terry (03) 551 2871

RULES & UMPIRING

The STX Trial Ball is unsatisfactory, particularly in windy conditions and this ball trial has ended. It is recommended for training and developmental use.

It was stressed that personal and team fouls are different systems. A player can receive a Green/Yellow (team foul) and Yellow personal foul.

The optional broken line to act as a visual guideline to indicate the playing boundaries was strongly recommended for all matches.

IFWLA August 1993 Rule book - please note that there is an omission of "and a verbal call of "Advantage" on page 50. Rule 16.C, last line; and a correction on page 74, Rule 20.A.13, Definition pg 99.

A new Umpiring Manual is being produced, and a FWLA Umpiring video available soon. Increase of IFWLA Umpires' registration fee to US\$25.00, renewal fee US\$10.00.

WOMEN'S NATIONAL TITLES

1994 saw South Australia win it's consecutive Senior Australian Women's Championship defeating Victoria 8 - 3 in the final. This is a magnificent achievement by SA, and their victory this year was due to some quality shooting which saw them score 5 goals from their first 6 shots, and race to what proved to be an insurmountable 5 - 0 lead midway through the first half.

The staging of both the Senior Men's and Women's Nationals at the same venue seemed to be very successful, and should be continued on a yearly basis.

It is a great way to show off the two different styles of lax to the general public and must position "us" as a sport, more favourably from a marketing and media exposure point of view.

The non-appearance of Western Australia and Tasmania at these Nationals was a great disappointment from the women's point of view, and almost resulted in the competition becoming a nonevent. The inclusion of a Presidents Team made up of prospective 1995 U19 World Cup Trialists and NSW's appearance for the second year in a row, helped give the competition a much needed four team look about it. In reality, however, no-one ever thought that the final would be anything but a Victoria-South Australia affair! Whilst not wanting to get into politics here the question must be asked of West Australia and Tasmania - what has their nonappearance done for our sport as a whole and to the development of the sport within their States and in turn their aspiring Australian Representatives??? Let's hope both these States are back competing in 1995, and that the Men's and Women's Senior National Titles are staged in Victoria (or possibly NSW from a development point of view).

There were some notable firsts at these titles. Firstly the optional wearing of helmets was permitted after years of debate. It will be interesting to see the feedback from the inclusion of this trial rule. Also the positioning of the Women's final as the last game of the tournament week and not the Men's final, was an interesting decision, and provided the opportunity to show Women's lacrosse off to a big crowd.

The game did not live up to the standard of the same game earlier in the week however, where Victoria won 6-5 in sudden death overtime. From the Women's perspective a great showpiece final could have won it many new fans, but the lop-sided score line and

the inconsistency in umpiring was disappointing and saw spectators walk away before the game ended. In no way was the umpiring the difference between the two teams, but many decisions were very hard to follow, too long in being made, inconsistent and came to a head when spectators slow hand-clapped a very confusing send-off decision, which ultimately saw the player re-instated on to the field.

Congratulations to NSW on fielding a team for the second year in a row at a senior national level. Ex-Victorian Linda Roylance along with ex-Aussie players Lydia Thompson and Vikki Spencer have no doubt been instrumental in getting Women's lacrosse going in this State, and I only hope the game really can catch on there.

Also it was a great experience for U19 World Cup Coach Cathy Flett's aspiring "Junior World Cuppers" to play in a Senior Nationals and for her to assess some of the talent that will ultimately represent Australia next year.

THE FINAL

The first ten minutes of this game saw Victoria have a couple of good opportunities to get a score on the board, but good saves by Janet Maitland denied them a goal. Debbie Babbage scored the first goal of the game with a "reflex" hit in goal which no doubt gave South Australia great confidence. Ex Victorian Lee Middlehuis (or Doodaughter of Otto!) scored South Australia's second goal with a good shot from the crease from a Babbage feed.




Captain's Toss - Jenny Williams (SA) and Margaret Barlow watch as Dedrie Olwen (umpire) tosses the coin for ends.

The game was blown apart in a matter of three minutes of lacrosse midway through this half with quick



Victoria on the other hand had five shots for no goals, and were failing to put adequate pressure on the ball carrier and support each other in the one on one contests! A late goal to Victorian Leanne Trainor was quickly answered by Sasha Newmarch of South Australia, and at half time South Australia had a commanding 6-1 lead.

To Victoria's credit they did not give up and another goal to Leanne Trainor and then to captain Margaret Barlow early in the second half really gave the Vic's a chance to turn the game around if they were good enough. But they were hit a "body blow"

when Leanne Trainor was red carded from the field and South Australia re-focused and got two more goals through Leanne Craddock and Lee Middlehuis to give them the Championship.

Victoria was always going to have to play its best to defeat a South Australian team boasting eight players from the 1993 Australian World Cup Team. Victorian Coach Jason Simpson feels that the many young players who played at these Nationals can only be better players for the experience, and Victoria's future is dependent upon them staying together and developing further.

1995 might finally be Victoria's year or will it? One thing is for sure, the traditional Victoria - South Australia rivalry will go on, and that's a plus for Women's lacrosse.









Between trips she worked at the Australian Football League. While in the US she worked for two months teaching physical education to disabled high school students in Fairfield, lowa.




Teams participating in the finals were:

Both winning teams were presented with medallions and pennants by Mr George Tillotson, past President of the Victorian Lacrosse Association.



SOUTH AUSTRALIAN WOMEN'S COMPETITION

The 1994 senior season commenced on the Anzac long weekend with the junior program beginning two weeks later.

The format for the senior grades was six B Grade and 11 League Reserve teams to play at Ellis Park on Saturdays and the six League teams to play at Club grounds on Sundays. The mixed Saturday/Sunday 1993 A Grade competition was not successful so it was decided to try all Sunday games this year. (Oh, for a larger area so that all games could be played on Saturdays!!!) Five times during the season the men's and women's League games will be played at the same venues on Sundays thus assisting Club fund raising through catering, etc. There were several attempts to set an early program but changes were needed when the men's program altered and when the League was set at six teams. The League Reserves originally started with 11 teams but one team has now been transferred to B Grade because of the number of players who were new to the game this year. It is pleasing to see the number of prospective teachers playing with the University of SA team (formerly College) as this is productive for their future teaching years of PE and the inclusion of lacrosse in their programs. Glenelg have been very busy this year with junior recruitment and they have eight girls' teams in the Year 7 and Under programs. WestTorrens and Southern Districts both have two senior teams entered this season and it is pleasing to see Sturt once again part of the League program. Brighton, who did not field a League team in '93 have combined with Seacombe League team and are playing as Stingrays in this grade.

We are trialling several rule changes this season and the major change seems to have been received by players, officials and umpires as very productive to the game - the rule in question is the yellow and red card system. A yellow card requires the player to spend 3 minutes in the penalty box (with no player replacement allowed) and the red card signifies no further play or player replacement for the remainder of the game. The point system last year had been found unsuitable because it could be manipulated by deliberately fouling to get the game suspension over and done with.

The season has proceeded quite smoothly thus far but, due to the trialling of the STX 'pink' ball at this stage of the season strong dissension has been forthcoming. The ball does not appear to be suitable after watching the girls use it and it is strongly hoped that it will be rejected in its present form. I understand that IFWLA are looking at the safety factor of the ball but they should also be looking at the helmet issue as a major safety precaution. I have always been anti-helmets but after seeing some of the injuries sustained by players and the bruising to my daughter's face from sticks during a recent game, I am thankful that the wearing of a helmet is now left to the individual to decide and is no longer a SA versus AWLC matter.

Serious thought is required in relation to future National Championships. SA are in a precarious position this year in relation to the Under 16 Championships. The date set by Tasmania coincides with our Preliminary and Grand Finals. Tasmania, who have not fielded an Under 16 team for numerous years, have been given the right to disrupt States that have continually competed at this level and therefore have been responsible for keeping the Under 16 Championships viable.

The Grand Final Day is again being held at the Pines Stadium one wonders how many times the 'pink' ball would have to be retrieved from the grass verges if it is ever used at this venue.

REF'S CORNER

FROM THE RULEBOOK......

POSSESSION - THE FACTS

The rules applicable to possession have implications apart from being able to control the ball and throw goals. Here are a few:

Possession of the ball is defined as being able to carry out the normal functions of carrying, cradling, passing or shooting; a team has possession when the ball is being passed (and is in mid-air) between players on the same team. remember this one as it will be useful further on. This raises the interesting question of what happens when the ball is intercepted in mid-flight by a player on another team? Quite obviously, the ball is not in possession.

SOME SITUATIONS MAY HELP

A ball is being passed between two players on the same team and while the ball is in flight, the whistle indicating the end of a period is sounded.

The referee looks to the penalty box and sees that there is one man in the box. Does the team with the ball retain possession or is there a face-off at the beginning of the next period?

Answer. The team in possession retains possession at the beginning of the next period.

What if the referee sees that there are two men in the box (one from each side) in the situation described above?

Answer. Face off at the beginning of the next period as there is no extra man at the end of the preceding period.

POSSESSION AT THE CENTRE

In normal circumstances, after a centre face-off and when possession is called, players are released from the goal areas (i.e., allowed to come over the end restraining lines). What about the situation when a team commits a technical foul before possession is called and play is stopped and possession is awarded to the team fouled. Can attack and defence plxayers cross the end restraining lines at this point?

Answer: No, they are released only when the whistle to start play again is sounded. This avoids the situation where a team is fouled and then immediately surrounded by a bunch of mean defenders.

CREASE INFRINGEMENTS

When there is a crease infringement and the defending team is awarded possession. Which player gets possession and where?

Answer: Any player on the defending team, 18 metres sideways from the goal.

What if the goalkeeper holds the ball too long in the goal crease?

Answer. The attacking team is awarded possession, again 18 metres from the goal.
