EXPERIMENT IN LACROSSE New Rules Trial

New rules to speed up lacrosse and lessen the possibility of congestion in play will be adopted by the Australian Lacrosse Council if experiments, to be carried out in Victoria within the next three weeks, are auccessful.

The new rules provide that teams consist of 10 players instead of 11; that goals be 90 yards apart; that a 10-feet circle be marked in the centre of the ground, and that no player be permitted closer to the circle than 20 yards at the draw.

The substitution of two players is also provided for, but the substitution may be made only at an interval or whenever the referee calls for time-off. The change of players may be made as often as thought desirable by the team captain, provided not more than 12 players represent the team in any match.

An interpretation of the off-side rule, given by the council, provides that not less than three players shall be in the attack half of the field, and not less than four players in the defence half, wherever the play may be. The penalty for a breach of this rule is a free throw.

The Victorian association has agreed that the new rules be tried in three competition matches this season.




