MALVERN SHINE IN LACROSSE OPENING

THE opening round of lacrosse matches, while providing many interesting contests, were not of a particularly high standard, due no doubt to lack of preparation.

AGAINST University, Malvern showed remarkable speed all day and much unerring stick work and combination demonstrated that they are just as formidable as ever.

UNIVERSITY HAVE PROMISE

University, stronger than last season, need not be perturbed by their downfall at the hands of Malvern. They give promise of settling down into a clever side.

Caulfield impressed as a team of big possibilities against University H.S.O.B., but one or two faults need to be remedied.

Caulfield have the makings of an outstanding keeper. If he learns to get more behind the ball, his sweep with a cross racket is too risky.

Camberwell had no new man, but Ker-

igan will be missed before long. On Saturday H. Smith and Fox gave finished displays in front of goal.

M.C.C., who had the bye, will play their first game on Saturday against University at the Albert Cricket Ground.

Allan Jenkins, captain of Williamstown, is a versatile athlete. As well as being an interstate player, he is an outstanding runner and hurdler at V.A.A.A. meetings.

Otto Unkenstein, new honorary secretary of the V.L.A., who did not play last season, turned out for Malvern on Saturday and soon showed that his spell has not affected his form.

Few players retain their form as does Ashby, the Caulfield forward. After his many years of play he was as dashing as ever on Saturday, and was outstanding against U.H.S.O.B.

How these dead and dumb boys retain their form—Puddy, of Coburg, like Ashby of Caulfield, although prominent for years is as good as ever. Puddy was as elusive and clever as usual in front of goal against Glen Iris.

Bob Reid, who stood down for Earl Worrall as captain of Glen Iris, has the makings of a champion. Relieved of leadership cares he gave a great display on Saturday and should soon attain interstate honors.

Two juniors of more than average ability were outstanding for Williamstown. They are Hiddle and D. McNellage, the latter brother of Glen, who played with Williamstown for many years as goalkeeper Hiddle got three goals and McNellage five.

Scott, best and fairest last season, is not available regularly for Camberwell. He was able to turn out on Saturday and his finished display showed what a loss his absence will be to Camberwell.

Lacrosse GLEN IRIS WINS AGAIN

By its splendid display of lacrosse against Caulfield on Saturday, Glen Iris has justified the belief that it will play a leading part in the A section premiership this season.

It was a fast, vigorous game. The ball was swept from one end of the field to the other continuously. Quality contributed to the win by Glen Iris by restricting the opportunities of Ashby, from whom most of the forward moves by Caulfield are initiated.

Camberwell put up a vigorous defence against Malvern—premiers last year—and only in the last few minutes of the game did Malvern show to advantage. The initiation of Page and Brierley gave it sufficient stability in attack to gain a winning last forward touch.

Although M.C.C. had 2, Reid and McCreger (in goal) again in the team, it was not strong enough to hold University. Harry from Adelaide University, played his first match with University, but, like many other players, was troubled by the bounce of the new type of ball being used in competition matches.

Williamstown was too strong for University High School Old Boys, whose back line was weak.

# R.A.A.F. Crash FLEW OVER BAY

## Official Report

Official details of the flight of R.A.A.F. bombers from Laverton, one of which crashed with the loss of four lives, were given yesterday afternoon.

It was officially reported to the Air Board yesterday that five Avro-Anson bombers attached to No. 2 squadron at Laverton, engaged in a navigational reconnaissance course, left the station on exercise yesterday morning.

They followed a short triangular course with Port Phillip Bay, Westernport Bay, and the Gellibrand lighthouse as the points. Four of the planes completed the course and returned on time. One of the machines crashed into the hillside at Arthur's Seat, and four men were killed and one injured.

It was intended to repeat the exercise with the second pilot of each crew in control, but owing to weather conditions near the completion of the first exercise the machines were recalled. The plane which crashed had apparently received the call and was turning back.

Weather conditions deteriorated after the commencement of the exercise, and low clouds formed. Arthur's Seat was covered in cloud and Pilot Symonds crashed.

A direction finding wireless equipment was available to Symonds, but he did not call for a bearing. A further report to the Air Board after a cursory examination of the wreckage stated that there had been no engine failure.

## Graduated in June

Pilot-Officer Symonds came from Adelaide to join the Royal Australian Air Force in 1937. He entered the Flying Training School at Point Cook in July, and he graduated in June of this year after completing successfully the 12 months' course. He was recently transferred to the Laverton air station.

In lacrosse Pilot-Officer Symonds was one of the best back men in Australia and represented South Australia in interstate games on several occasions. Last year he played for Malvern (V.), which won the Victorian lacrosse premiership. Before going to Melbourne he was a playing member of the Sturt Lacrosse Club. He will be buried in Adelaide at the North Road Cemetery on Friday.

Sergeant-Pilot Gillespie joined the R.A.A.F. in July, 1936, and he graduated in June, 1937. He had 360 hours' flying in his credit in official records.

Aircraftman Mawson was educated at Cranbrook School and Sydney Grammar School.

## Minister's Sympathy

SYDNEY, Wednesday.—The Minister for Defence (Mr. Thorby) expressed sincere sympathy to-day with the relatives of the men killed. "It was a most tragic accident," he said. "On the facts as they have been reported to me it appears that no defect of the machine was responsible. It was sheer bad luck."

The Air Accidents Investigation Committee reported to Mr. Thorby that it was obvious that the Anson had flown straight into the side of Arthur's Seat at about two-thirds of the height of the hill while on a direct course to Laverton.

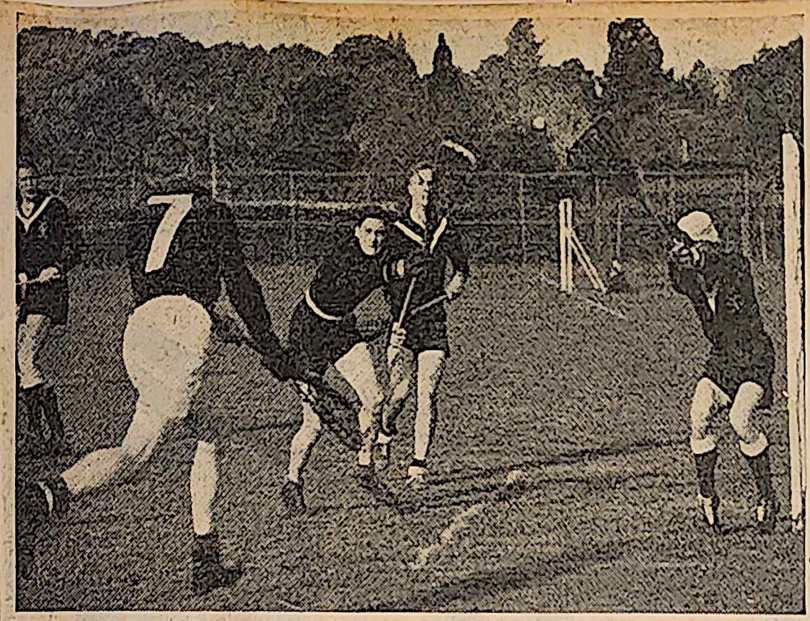

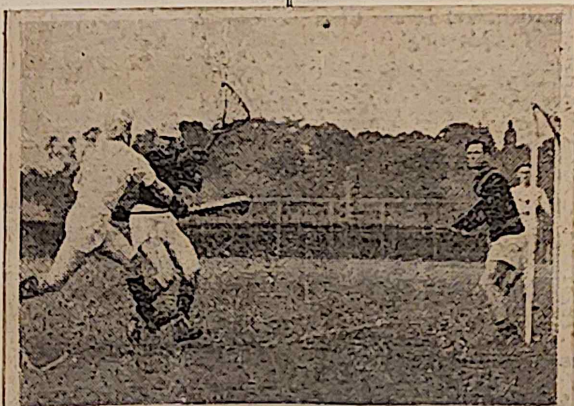

Horwood, A. W. Swallow, H. B. Giffen, M. Haddad, C. B. Ridings, R. E. Stephen, G. W. Hall, W. J. B. Symonds, and M. W. Nairn.

Victoria's twelve will be selected from the 13 players.—S. McCorkell, G. Smith, O. G. Unkenstein, N. Gibbs, G. Knowles, A. Jenkins, W. and H. Edwards, C. Foster, E. Fox, N. Robson, H. Wood and F. Hogarth.

The home team has been training vigorously at the Neutral Oval this week. It has only been able to train as a combination for two weeks, while the Victorians have been practicing for some time. Both sides will play several experienced men who have played in one or more interstate games. Victoria will include eight men who represented it in the Australian lacrosse carnival in Adelaide in 1936. Non-observance of the rule will be penalised by a free throw.

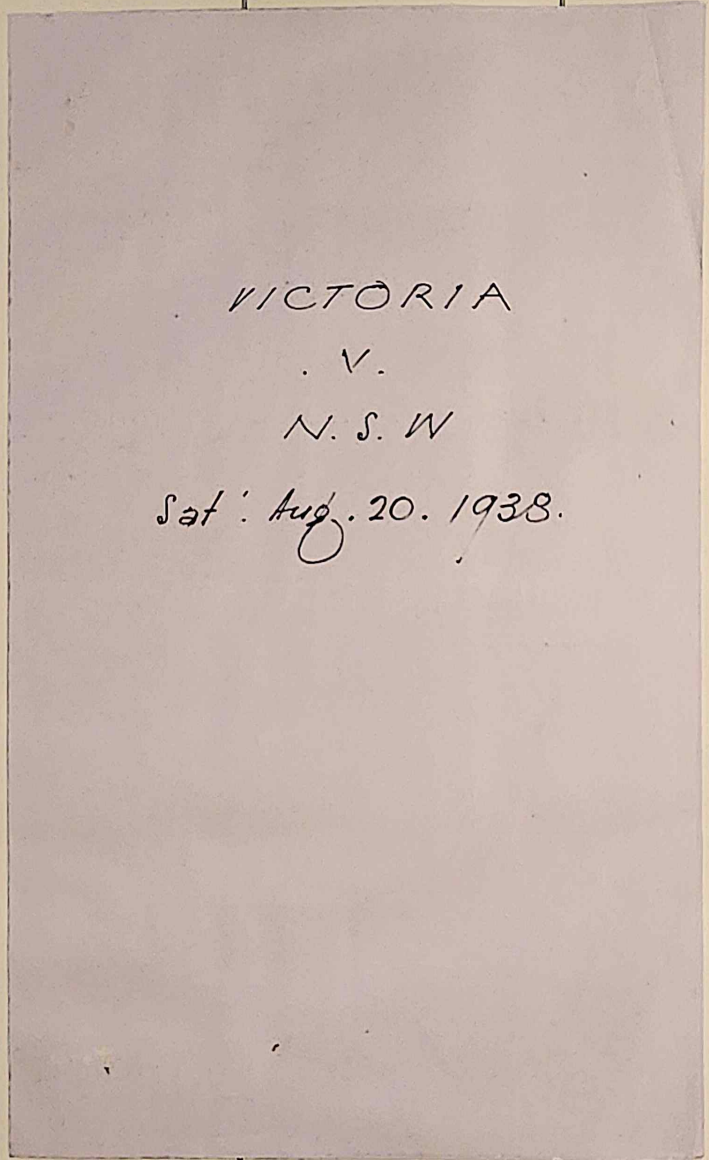

The grand final game between Malvern and Williamstown on Saturday caused one of the greatest surprises witnessed in Victorian lacrosse for many years. On the season's performances Williamstown were considered almost certain to victory, for not once had Malvern been able to defeat the seaside's. However, a few judicious alterations in the position of players and the introduction of Smith into the team, together with altered tactics, enabled Malvern to win the premiership.

It was a much more pleasant game than that of the previous week. There was an absence of that bitterness that marred the final of the game was played in a manner more in keeping with the high traditions of Victorian lacrosse.

Malvern owe their success to the fine game played by Jack Beattie—who did the final goal—and the steadiness and cleverness of the back line. When Malvern settled down in the early days it was seen that the defence was playing under instructions not to open out and to keep in as close formation as possible. As a result, every Williamstown attack was met by a unassailable defence, which made scoring most difficult. As a loss to get their forward line open, the Williamstown attack, usually so taxing and effective, was unable, except on rare occasions, to score, with the exception of the premiership was won by tactics alone, for in my opinion there is little to choose between the two teams.

**ALL PLAYED AT TOP**

The winners have not shown to better advantage throughout the season, and every man seemed to be playing at his top; if anyone deserved the credit for being the best player it was Edwards, who was of outstanding rank on the ground. He was always busy, ready to go into position, and always so clean in everything he did. The veteran, Pilla, kept goal remarkably well. Never once did he show any signs of being out of the game; his work was so clean and so well earned. Smith, who was promoted from the juniors, showed plenty of spirit, and as a result much of the effectiveness of the Williamstown battery was silenced. Hilly, Webb and Glenn, with Unkenstein, formed a defence that seemed almost impenetrable.

It was a triumph for the winners that their back line was able so consistently to spout the strong, persistent attack of the Seaside's. Knowles and Dan Harrison were always in evidence, and led the Malvern forwards with a coolness and certain judgment that made the eyes of the goal throwers much calmer than usual. Hugh Beattie was not as impressive as in some games, but he was in his element. His experience and coolness helped the Malvern out many a several positions, and the manner in which he fed Jack Beattie was delightful.

Many were disappointed that Williamstown failed, for they have been very consistent. If they were to win a second premiership, it would be well earned, but it is generally said that the Seaside's are now in a position to reduce the form of recent games, due mainly to their opponents closing up the game so much that the usual dash and speed of the seaside's are denied them.

Few of the Williamstown side were at their top, but A. Deacon was an attractive player, even if he was unable to stop Beattie's scoring. Prochivitis, Jones was as good as any man in the team. Seldman hurried, and generally very safe, he made few mistakes. The forward line seemed unable to open up the play, hence no unusually brilliant, like Reid, Crooks, Ferris and P. Deacon, were only now and again in the limelight.

Claribrough was again a splendid custodian, and the Malvern score would have been higher only for his cleverness in stopping many hard shots.

In addition to playing great lacrosse, Beattie handled the winners with judgment. Malvern are the first team to hold the shield recently presented by Lord Jos. Fox, president of the V.L.A. This shield has to be won three times before it can be permanently held.

**REFEREE DISABLED**

An unusual incident happened during the third quarter, when the referee, Mr Geo. Flood, suddenly pulled up the game and limped away. After receiving attention from the trainers, it was found impossible for him to continue, and after a slight delay, Mr R. Lovers took his place, and finished the game. Mr Flood has been accustomed to his bed since the match, having broken a muscle of his leg.

The grand final of the senior section concluded the season. Every section has been completed. The season has been really the most successful in the history of Victorian lacrosse. All four teams are abandoned for next season, so it would seem that the game has now so firmly planted that its progress in our country is assured.

## Malvern Again Take Honors At Lacrosse

By "Referee"

MALVERN won another lacrosse premiership on Saturday, when they defeated Williamstown, 17-10, in the grand final.

ONE of the most successful seasons in history was brought to a conclusion on Saturday.

The standard of the game in this State, particularly in the junior grades, never has been higher, and throughout the season there has not been one incident to mar the progress of lacrosse either in the field or on the administrative side.

The improved standard is most gratifying, but not nearly so pleasing as the fine sporting spirit that has characterized the matches, and although the V.L.A. has every reason to be gratified with the progress during one of the happiest seasons of the game.

One fact will prove what a happy feeling has existed in the matches. In the senior section in particular. Last year the grand final was a torrid, hectic affair, but this season the grand final between the same teams, Malvern and Williamstown, was as clean and sportsmanlike as any match could ever be.

Once again Malvern merited the premiership early in the season many thought that Malvern at last were beginning to lose their luster, but in their prowess lacrosse just as good and as clever as ever.

Malvern are a wonderful combination and each year are able to field a fast, dashing, clever side, comprising men who not only know how to handle their sticks but, what perhaps is more important, who seem to have a greater knowledge of tactics and technique than any of their opponents.

The grand final seemed to lack the usual life and excitement so customary when these two fine sides meet, but the first quarter was a delightful period, with easily the best lacrosse of the day.

With the scores equal at the first change it seemed as if another of those wonderful contests that these teams have so often given was in store. However, by half time Williamstown were lagging and never recovered.

All Malvern men were consistently good, with the veteran skipper, Reg. Brierley, setting a great example in goal, but perhaps Foster, Soderberg, Evans, the two

Edwards, Page and Knowles deserve special mention.

Williamstown had great players, with G. McNeillage (goal), Speakman, Wooding, Newgreen and Mouchmore probably the best.

Other premier teams were: B Section: Williamstown; C: Trinity Grammarians; D: Malvern; E: Power House; F: Coburg; Under 17: Melbourne High School.

Williamstown had six teams in the finals, and only the B team won through. They are very little below the standard of the senior side, and finished up not only premiers, but champions.

Williamstown B have some great juniors, and several veterans in Allan Deacon, Arch Fowler and B. Jones to form a backbone to a team to which none other in the section could stand up.

#### TRINITY GRAMMARS SUCCESS

The surprise of the final day was the downfall of the C leaders, Williamstown, who at the end of the home and home matches seemed a certainty for the premiership. Trinity Grammarians, in dealing them, won their first premiership by fine lacrosse. I doubt if any of the final games were of a higher standard or played in a better spirit.

With scores equal an extra ten minutes had to be played, and in that period Trinity got the winning goal and the flag. Trinity deserve their success, and this premiership should do much further to push the game along at that valuable recruiting ground.

The D section also was won only after time was necessary.

I have not handled a racquet since 1923, yet one of my old opponents before the war in Les Webb, was a member of Malvern D. He was one of the best defenders on Saturday.

Coburg senior team had an unhappy season, but the F team compensated to some extent by winning the premiership and doing a great job. The skill of several of the clever Coburg youngsters suggests that they will be a big help to the seniors before long.

With the exception of Williamstown (C) and Footscray (E) every side that led its section at the end of the home and home matches won the premiership.

## New Rules Proposed For Lacrosse May Be Tried In Games Here

So impressed is the Australian Lacrosse Council with the general expression of approval which has accompanied the introduction of new lacrosse rules in other countries, that the council feels that, in justice to the game in Australia, a thorough examination of these innovations should be made.

At the monthly meeting of the general committee of the South Australian Lacrosse Association on July 4, there will be a discussion on the proposed new rules of the game, and it is expected that these will be tried out in trial matches this season. The Australian Lacrosse Council has asked that the suggested new rules be tried in three matches in every State during the present season. In order that the club matches should not be interfered with, these trial games should be staged between teams of a good standard, not necessarily in the running for premiership honors. Such games could still count as competition matches.

#### New Rules

The new rules for trial games will be as follows:—

Goals to be 90 yards apart and ground marked as on the diagram. Sides to consist of 10 players. Substitution of players limited to two on each side. Captains may change the players of their teams during the match at any interval or when the referee has called time for any reason. When a player enters the game he will report to the referee and will take the same position on the field as the retiring player. This does not restrict switching of players when a substitution is made, but it does require that all ten positions will be relatively the same as when play was stopped. A player withdrawn from the game may return to it, but may not return in the same quarter in which he was withdrawn.

#### Off Side Play

At no time during a match must a team have less than three men on the attack between the centre of the field and the boundary of the field of play behind the opponent's goal. At no time during a match must a team have less than four men on the defence behind the centre of the field and the boundary of the field of play behind its own goal. Violation of this provision will be known as "off side play." For slight violations, where the player does not enter in the play, the referee will order the offender on-side with no penalty. For real violations of this provision, where the player violating is on the side that has possession of the ball, the penalty is a free throw to the opponents.

#### Reasons For Change

The reasons why these new rules should be tried out are explained by the council as follows:—

Everything possible should be done to improve lacrosse and make it more attractive and thus increase public support. During the past five years, the United States of America has doubled its playing strength, chiefly since the introduction of new rules. The English Lacrosse Association is trying out these innovations in its competition matches this year. For some reason, the game as it is played in Australia has completely died in hand—be the home of lacrosse; and if America is invited soon to visit Australia, a compromise on rules will be imperative.

#### State Players For Perth

The State team (chosen this week) to meet Western Australia in Perth on July 30 and August 1 will begin practicing at the Norwood Oval at 5 p.m. on Tuesday, when the practice captain (J. S. Muecke) will be in charge. Considering that there were few players available for the trip, the side is a fairly strong one. Six of the players were in the State side which met Victoria in Melbourne last year, and four others played in the interstate practice game at the Unley Oval last July. It is unfortunate that none of the State's three forwards—Lee, Cook and Jenkins—were available for Perth. However, the forwards selected are quite capable of scoring well.

J. S. Muecke, who has been appointed practice captain, has captained the State side for the past four years. It is likely that he will again lead the side. Muecke is a reliable back man, and can also play well in other positions. He is vice-captain of East Torrens.

G. T. Barnfield is University's leading goal-thrower. He is a left-handed, and takes some watching. Barnfield has had experience in inter-University contests.

T. D. Carter (West Torrens) played in the State side against Victoria in Melbourne last August. He is a reliable defence player, and can play a good game at back. It is probable that he may play back in Perth, because of the shortage of back men.

H. Gilten has had much interstate experience. He has played on the defence for Sturt for a number of years. However, he is just as reliable at centre, where he played in the interstate game against Victoria last year.

O. W. Hall, captain of East Torrens, has been a prominent player on the attack for a number of years. He has had previous interstate experience, and, in the game against Melbourne last year, was conspicuous by his assistance to the forwards throughout the game.

R. Kidd is East Torrens' leading goal-thrower, and is a forceful player. He has not had previous interstate experience, but played in the interstate practice game at the Unley Oval last year.

V. W. Medien may be remembered for his brilliant display of goalkeeping against Victoria in Melbourne last year. He has been consistent in goals for West Torrens this season, and his inclusion in the State side should prove a great acquisition, provided he should prove a great acquisition, provided he should prove a great acquisition.

M. Nairn is probably coming from the back line. He has been a regular player in the State. He has been a great help in his position to University this season.

Nairn is fast, and his first experience in the State side last year should stand him in good stead against his opponent in Perth.

C. B. Newland (Port Adelaide) will be a useful player, as he can play well in any position in the centre field.

J. L. Parsons is another player who is reliable on the defence as an attack, and in the centre. Parsons, who was in the interstate practice team last year, just missed a place in the State side.

M. B. Selth has been showing promise in the forward division for East Torrens this season. He is fast and good. He is a good forward. He also gained a place in the interstate practice game at the Unley Oval last year.

W. J. B. Symonds is a reliable goal-getter, and in his few games with East Torrens this season, has scored high. He is solid, and generally takes some stopping. Symonds was chosen to play in last year's interstate practice game.

M. G. Taylor has been a consistent back for University for a number of years. Taylor has represented the University in inter-University games against Melbourne.

W. J. Wiles plays centre for Goodwood. He is one of the Goodwood team's most consistent players.

#### Chief Game At Norwood

The chief game will be played between East Torrens and North Adelaide at the Norwood Oval tomorrow. These teams are level on the premiership points table, but East Torrens has slightly better percentage, and is second on the premiership table. It will be the first time these two teams met in season. Both sides are strong in the centre divisions and the forward lines, but East Torrens is more solid at back than North Adelaide. It is therefore expected that the East Torrens forwards will score more freely. A great upset should be provided by East J. Lee (North Adelaide) and J. Muecke (East Torrens). Both men have had considerable interstate experience, and will not be the first time they have opposed each other.

Another good game should be that between St. Peter's Glenelg and West Torrens at West Park. St. Peter's will be the first time in which will give it a place in the four. This team has had three successive wins in its last three games. West Torrens, which had only one win this season, will have to play against West Torrens against the fast St. Peter's side, which is expected to win.

Port Adelaide should win against Goodwood at the Woodville Oval, and the top team—Brisban—is expected to continue its broken series of wins by defeating University at the Students' Oval.

Carter and Medien, who have been selected to play in the games against Western Australia, are two of West Torrens' most enthusiastic players. They should give as good an account of themselves in Perth as they did in Melbourne last year.

The club's C team is doing well, chiefly because of the interest shown in training on Sunday mornings, when the players are coached.

#### Positions Of Teams

The first round in A grade will finish tomorrow, and the second round will begin for B and C grades. The positions of teams on the premiership table in each of these grades is interesting, particularly in the C grade, where only two points separate the five top teams. The premiership points in these grades are as follows:—

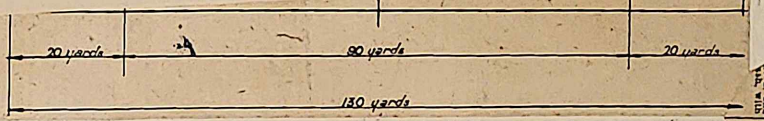

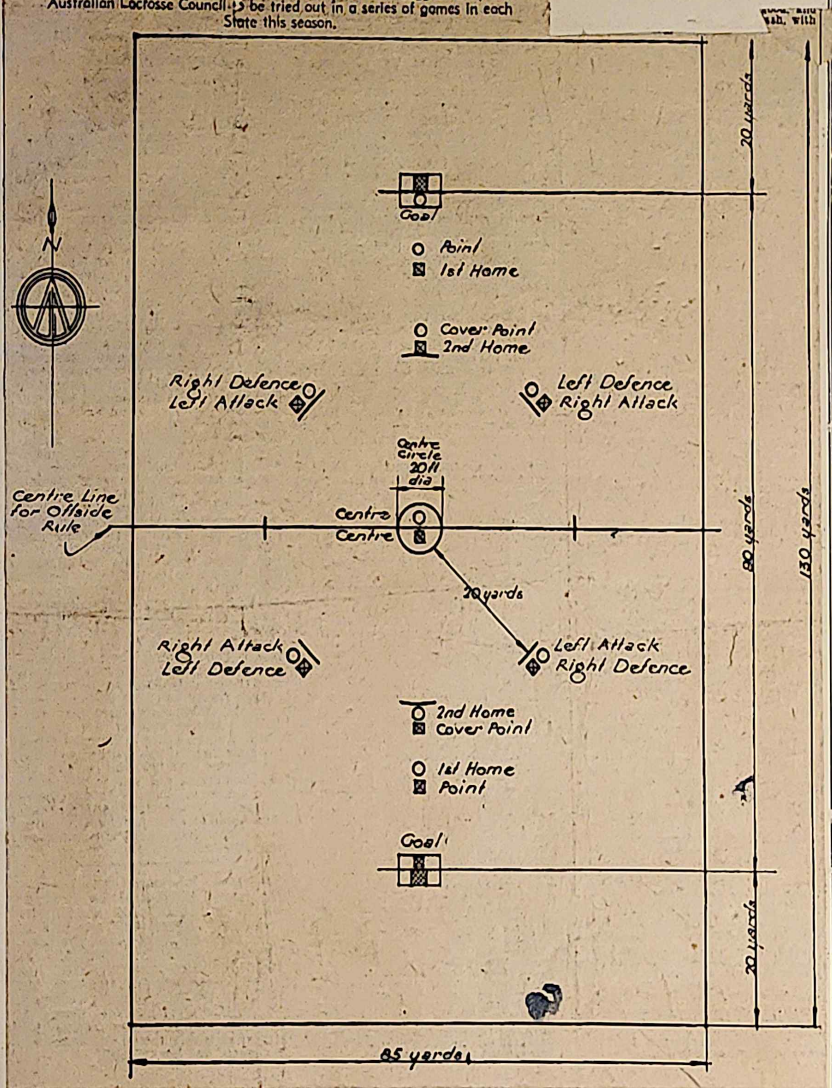

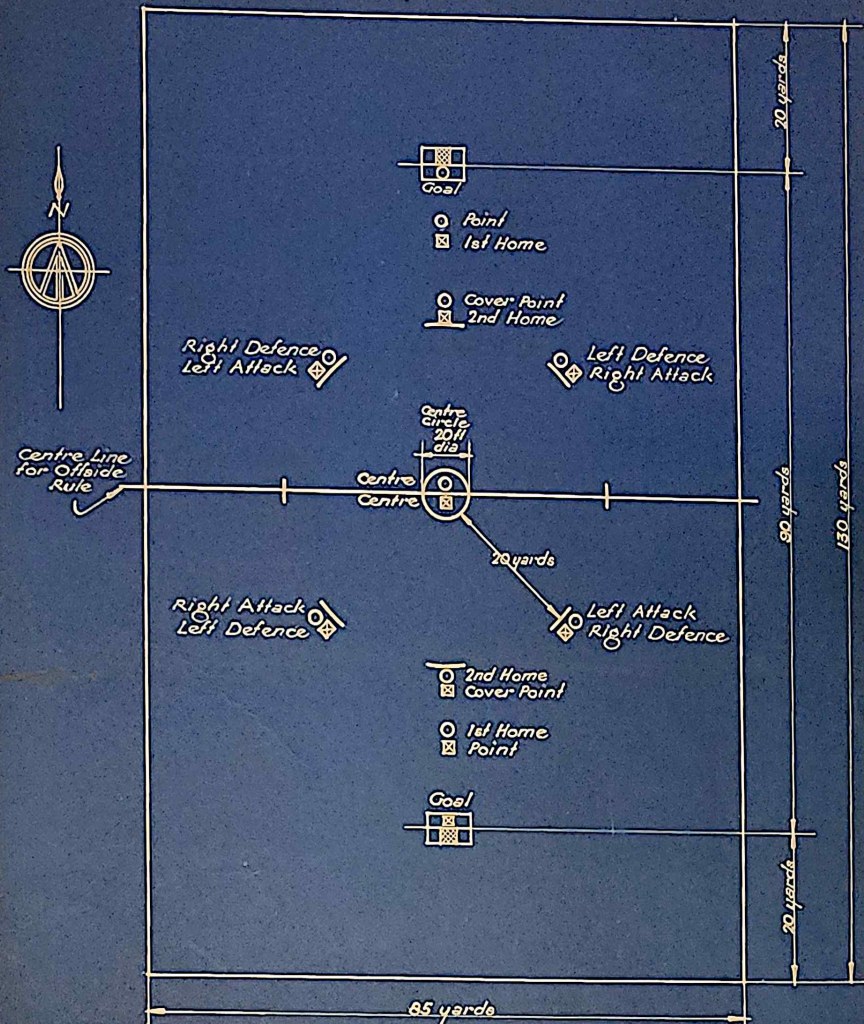

## CONDITIONS :-

1. Side to consist of 10 players.
2. Goals to be 90 yards apart.
3. Ten feet radius circle at the centre mark - nobody to be closer than 20 yards to the circle at the draw.
4. Substitution of players limited to two for each side, who may be changed at any interval or when the Referee has called time for any reason.
5. OFF-SIDE RULE - not less than three players shall be in the Attack half of the field, and not less than four players in the Defence half. - PENALTY, a Free Throw.
