ACROSSE, which is of Canadian origin, was introduced into Victoria in 1874 by Mr. L. L. Mount, a Canadian. One afternoon in Albert Park Mr. Mount, with a "crosse," was throwing the ball when he attracted the attention of a young main named George Beech. Mr. Mount lavited the young Australian to try to throw the ball with the "crosse." The invitation was accepted and Mr. Beech, who is now a life member of the Vil.A., was so successful that he became interested and induced some of his friends to form a team. Later regular matches were played and thus locrosse, described as the "sport for thoroughbreds," became established in Australia as a field game.

Sixty-two years later a similar occurrence has taken place in Albert Park in the introduction of women's lacrosse. Mr. Beech, who is still keenly interested in the game, attended the first women's practice where he himself had had his first increase leason.

To the newly formed women's association the V.L.A. extends congratuations and best wishes for a successful future.

Lacronae in Victoria has made big strides since those pioneering days of the 70's and 80's, and to-day over 1000 players take part in matches in Melbourne each Saturday. AUSTRALIAN LACROSSE CHAMPIONSHIP

The All-Australian Lacrosse Carnival to decide the Australian Championship and the possessor of the Garland-McHarg Cup — the Blue Riband of Australian Lacrosse — was commenced in 1916.

Victoria, the present holder of the Cup, has won the championship on four occasions. The complete record is as follows:—

Won by Victoria 1910 at Adelaide
Won by Victoria 1912 at Melbourne
Won by South Australia 1920 at Sydney
Won by South Australia 1923 at Brisbane
Won by South Australia 1926 at Adelaide
Won by Victoria 1929 at Perth
Won by Victoria 1932 at Melbourne

LONG THROW RECORD

What is claimed to be the world's lacrosse long throw record was created by MR. C. L. MURRAY, of the Caulfield Club, in 1803. Using an old type Flannery stick, Murray threw a distance of 486 FEET 6 INCHES.

Using modern lacrosse sticks the following records were created at the 1934 Gymkhana:-

W. REID (GLEN IRIS) . . . 236 feet 7 inches R. GILLIES (M.C.C.) 220 feet R. BRIERLY (MALVERN) . 219 feet 3 inches

At the 1935 Gymkhana the event was won by J. MERRELL, of the Hawthorn Club, who threw a distance of 360 FEET. Merrell used a Flannery stick.
