INCLUDED AMONGST THE VISITORS ARE:

Captain J. H. Fearon. A gentleman of the game, aptly described as a Lacrosse Warrior and a "stickler" for Juniors, and the W.A. Lacrosse Association is indebted to him for a fine cup bearing his name.

He is President of the Victorian Lacrosse Association and his name is a byword amongst lacrosse players in all States of Australia. He has well-earned the respect and prestige he commands. His liberality to football and lacrosse juniors suggest that the inspiration lies in his keen interest in youth. He likes to see a hard game but has no time for the dirty player or bad sport.

S. McCorkell. One of the best goal keepers the game has seen. Smart out of goal, his great asset is a wonderful eye and strong supple wrists, that enable him to catch shots that other keepers would deflect; clears goal quickly and thus often turns an attack on his goal into an attack on that of his opponents. Represented his State the last five years and has won the State trophy for the Fairest and Best for the last three years. A typical fine sportsman. Plays with Camberwell.

J. Reid. Has been the backbone of the Victorian back line for many years. Not a particularly quick mover but too wily to be lured away by a faster man. Cool and sure. Plays with M.C.C.

J. Lake. Plays on the back line. Particularly close checker, and a previous State representative. M.C.C. is his Club.

A. Munt. Another back man of the close checking type. His first appearance in Victorian side and is a player with much promise. Also a M.C.C. man.

N. Robson. A particularly stylish defender or attacker and a generally versatile player. One of the best Lacrosse players in Victoria. Has represented his State for the last six years. A M.C.C. player.

A. Jenkins. A tall rugged defence player, first appearance in the State team and forwards will have a hard time to score against him. Member of Williamstown club.

C. Foster. A centre man, and very fast. Particularly dashing player and good stick handler. Malvern.

B. Newgreen. A utility man, can play in practically any position, very fast; a relief goalie. New man to the State side and in this match will possibly play on the forward line. Williamstown club.

Roy Read. One of the finest attacks in Australia. Has represented his State for many years. Holds the goal throwing record with Buchan of W.A. for most goals thrown in a Carnival game, namely 13. This player is also a splendid tactician. Williamstown Club.

J. Murrowood. State player, a forward who can make good position play, fast, dashing and a good stick handler. Caulfield Club.

F. Hogarth. First time in State team, particularly good pass.

Good attack and tricky player. Williamstown club,

W. Ashby. Deaf and dumb but very clever forward. Won Victorian goal aggregate last season, good dodger, hard worker and particularly hard to dispossess of the ball when in possession. A particularly good tempered fellow, and a more than popular player. Coberg is his club.

E. Booth. A brilliant 3rd home, is a two way dodger, particularly fierce hard shot on the run; Team mate of Murrowood; new player

to the team. Victoria expects great things of him.

B. Kerrigan. Tall and tricky forward. Has particularly good goal sense; plays from behind goal and a proposition for any goal keeper. Victoria has big prospects for this player. Camberwell is his club.

Arch Fowler. The manager of the team and Honorary Secretary to the Victorian Association. Has been manager of a number of visit-

ing teams.



PARS ON W.A. STATE TEAM.

Angus, H. B. (Nedlands). Captain and Coach. Goalkeeper. Commenced game with Fremantic Club in 1920. Represented the State in 1925 as 2nd Home. Joined up with East Fremantle 1927, and captained that side for many years. Was the State captain and Goalkeeper of the 1932 Carnival side which finished second to Victoria at the All-States Carnival in Melbourne.

Boxhorn, A. R. (Mt. Lawley) 2nd home. Has been playing with Mt. Lawley since 1931. First appearance as State representative.

Buchan, K. C. (Nedlands) 1st home. First played the game with E. Fremantle in 1926. Joined up with Nedlands in 1930. Selected as 1st home in 1932 Carnival side and secured 18 goals for the series. Holds Australian record, with Roy Read, Victoria, for the most goals thrown by an individual player in a Carnival match, i.e. 13.

Cocks, M. A. (Mt. Lawley) Defence. First played with Mt. Law-

ley in 1933 and this is first Interstate appearance.

Draffen, H. L. (Mt. Lawley) Centre. Has been with his present Club since he started playing in 1928. Winner of Fairest and Best Trophy in 1934, and runner up in 1932. Represented this State in 1932.

Harrison, D. S. (Nedlands) Vice-Captain. Third home, Began playing at the age of 11 years under the tuition of Jack Beattie, of the Malvern Club, Victoria. Transferred to this State in 1930 he joined up with his present club the next season and has been captain ever since. Was Vice-Captain of the 1932 Carnival Team.

Horner, A. (Midland Junction) Attack. Commenced his Lacrosse

with his present club in 1931. First Interstate appearance.

Johnson, E. F. (Nedlands) 2nd home. First commenced with Ned-

lands in 1930. First Interstate appearance.

Knight, H. C. (Midland Junction) Defence, Started playing in 1928 with Guildford and transferred to his present club this season. Was a member of the 1932 Carnival side,

Mowbray, J. (Midland Junction) 3rd man. First started in 1920 with Guildford. Left the game and took up Football for a number

of years. Joined up with his present club in 1911.

Peacock, M. (Perth) Cover point. Commenced in 1925 with Westral Club. Transferred to Maylands in 1927 and Vice-Captain for 4 years. Has been playing for past 5 years with Perth Lacrosse Club. Was a member of Maylands side which visited Adelaide in 1928. Represented the State in 1932.

Priestman, J. (Midland Junction) Centre, First started with Guildford in 1928. Transferred to Midland Junction in 1931. Has not

played Interstate Lacrosse before.


Rudderham, H. C. (East Fremantle) Point. Has been playing for 10 years and first represented the State in 1929 against Victoria in W.A. Was selected in the 1932 Carnival side and Eastern States critics stated that he was one of the best men in the Carnival. Originally learned the game with the Fremantle Club in 1925.

Stammers, J. G. (East Fremantle) Centre. First Interstate ex-

perience, been playing since 1931,

Stammers, K. R. (East Fremantle) Goalkeeper. First commenced in the home position with the East Fremantle Club in 1932 and through the transfer of Angus was placed in goal in which position he has excelled himself. Has not represented the State before.

Scott, D. C. (Perth) Attack. Represented W.A. in 1932 and with Len Berry was responsible for the defeat of S. Australia by 1 goal. His performances throughout the series were also praised by critics.







PERSONAL PARS ON SÉLECTORS

C. E. M. Hickey. First played game 1905 with East Fremantle having the late Fred C. Wingrove as mentor. Played against Canadians in 1907 and S.A. in 1909. He played centre for W.A. in 1912 and captained a State team against S.A. in 1925, and at Adelaide carnival in 1926. Has been a member of the State team Selection Committee since the War, and has held the office of Chairman of Committees for sixteen years.

H, J. Carmichael. Present Vice-President of the W.A. Lacrosse Association and a past President, State Team Manager, and All-State Carnival Referee. Foundation Chairman of Amateur Referces and Old Players Association and Publicity Committee. Old player for the

North Perth and Midland Junction Clubs,

G. A. Kennedy. President and State Selector of the Association for the 1935 season. A very old and experienced Lacrosse player started the game in 1904 with Iroquois (Midland Junction) Club. Premiers for four years in succession. Continued actively with the Club until 1922. With the exception of war period, captained the team from 1905-1922 inclusive. Was a State representative in the first All-States Carnival, 1910. Has been a Vice-President for many years, and a past president of the Midland Junction Lacrosse club.

DO YOU KNOW?

Ken Buchan divides with Roy Read (member of the visiting Victorian team) the goal throwing record for a Carnival match with 13 for W.A. against N.S.W. in 1932, Read's tally was also thrown against N.S.W. Read previously held the Record with 10 against N.S.W., in 1929.

W.A. has another record holder in Clive Hickey whose 12 games for his State were spread over 20 years. He played first in 1907 and last in 1926. The runner-up is believed to be George Flood who played for Victoria in the Carnival games 1910-1912 and 1920.

The Australian Record for high goal throwing is believed to be 61 to nil by Williamstown E team in 1930, while the lowest is said to be that of Williamstown v Essendon in 1902 which ended 1 all. Probably the lowest scoring match in W.A. was E. Fremantle v Swans in 1908 with a tally of 2-1.

In the last carnival held in Melbourne, 1932, Victoria in the series had 15 goals scored against them and of these, six goals were thrown by Western Australia.

Western Australia threw the greatest number of goals in a single match against Canada when they toured Australia in 1907. 8 goals were recorded against the tourists on the Fremantle oval.


That 2 of the earliest teams in Victoria were known as the "Fox Terriers" and "Gordon Setters" the reason being that there were so many brothers named Fox and Gordon playing in the respective teams.

Ernie Stokes playing for W.A. against Canada in the second match on the Fremantle Oval in 1907 threw the greatest number of goals by any player in any one match—5.

Vic. Levine—goalkeeper in the combined Fremantle—Perth match played in June 1902—threw a goal from his goal crease. Distance 130 yards the ball only bouncing once before going into the net. The throw was made on a "Flannery" stick. Can any of the present day players throw as far?

An interesting argument—Whether Capt. Fearon has been associated longer with the Williamstown Club than R. W. Elliott has been with the Fremantle Club. The latter has been connected with the seaside club since 1900. Can the grand old man from Victoria equal this record?

Johnson, Doug. This stalwart missed inclusion in State team they say by inches, but he would have had to be some tiger in the match, if he wanted to equal his zeal and untiring efforts put into Publicity Committee and Executive generally.




